REP. FISH ASKS U. S. CONGRESS TO DECLARE WAR ON GERMANY, GIVE PRESIDENT FULL POWER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Rep. Hamilton Fish, New York Republican, and house non-interventionist leader, today introduced a resolution to declare that a state of war exists between the United States and Germany.

The Fish resolution would have congress direct the president to "employ the entire naval and military forces of the United States and the resources of this government to carry on war against the German government."

Representative Fish, some months ago, said he would introduce such a resolution in order to force a showdown on the issue of United States' participation in the affairs of Europe.

300,000 SERBS HAVE BEEN EXECUTED

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The Yugoslav refugee government was said today to have received detailed reports from the Serbian orthodox church sources estimating that more than 300,000 Serbs have been executed since the German-Italian attack on Yugoslavia.

FD ASKS ALL-OUT EFFORT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—President Roosevelt said today that Americans must make "full sacrifices now," submerge labor industry differences and work "three shifts a day" to help defeat Hitler and bring about the "better world we aim to build" after the war.

The president addressed the international labor office in the East Room of the White House, where delegates representing 33 nations had gathered to end their annual convention.

The president's speech was broadcast.

CAR LEAPS 27 FEET OFF R.R. EMBANKMENT

LeRoy Millican, living in the Carbon community, was taken to Graham Sanitarium this morning in an unconscious condition to be treated for minor injuries sustained when his car leaped off the embankment just south of the Katy freight depot.

The accident was reported to police and the A-G. wrecking crew about 2:20.

The car, an old model Plymouth, was going west on E. Seventh street, a dead-end thoroughfare that stops at the Katy tracks, but this fact was either unknown to Millican or he was driving too fast to stop.

Reaching the east side of the Katy tracks, the car plunged over the embankment to the Katy tracks, landing 27 feet from the spot where it left the ground.

The driver of the wrecking car said the Plymouth turned over after catapulting from the embankment and rolled over on one side.

The car is about as complete a wreck as can be found. There is hardly a piece of the running gear and body that is not damaged.

Millican's father came to Cisco today and removed him to his home.

TOURIST CABIN GAS EXPLOSION TAKES 2 LIVES

EASTLAND, Nov. 6.—J. N. (Noah) Cowan, 62, of Gatesville, and Mrs. Zella Kimbrough, 38, of Ranger, are dead from burns received when gas from a stove exploded in a tourist camp here Tuesday night.

Taken to a Ranger hospital, Cowan died there at 3:30 Wednesday morning, and Mrs. Kimbrough at 5 that afternoon.

Cowan for a number of years has conducted a Bible forum program over Station KPPL, at Dublin. He is survived by his wife and three children.

Mrs. Kimbrough is survived by six children. No funeral arrangements had been announced last night.

Before he died, Cowan told officials he struck a match to light a heater, and the explosion resulted.

Separate business sessions of the legion and auxiliary are scheduled for 2 p. m., with District Commander Wisdom and President Farrar in charge.

7 CENT SINCLAIR CRUDE RAISE BE MET BY OTHERS

FT. WORTH, Nov. 6.—Move of the Sinclair Prairie Oil Marketing Company in lifting the crude price in North Texas to the level of that in Oklahoma and East Texas Thursday was expected to be followed by other purchasers in the area. Sinclair Prairie raised the price 7 cents per barrel to \$1.25 for 40 gravity and above, posting of Oklahoma and East Texas crude.

The North Texas crude, it has been contended by the North Texas Oil and Gas Association in its fight to obtain a parity for oil in the area with others of like grade, competes with that from Oklahoma and East Texas in Northern markets.

Sinclair Prairie is one of the largest buyers in the area, purchasing approximately 20,000 barrels of crude daily. Stanolind Oil and Gas Company is another large purchaser in North Texas, buying around 25,000 barrels daily.

Continental Oil Company and Magnolia Petroleum Company also buy in the area, as do several independent refineries in the sector.

The adjustment by Sinclair Prairie in the price was effective as of 7 a. m. Thursday.

Removal of the differential resulted from a long fight of operators in the North Texas area.

SCHOOL OF INSTRUCTION.

The meeting was opened by singing the campaign song, "Jesus Saves," which was followed with prayer by Mrs. J. E. Shirley. Mrs. Crawford brought a splendid devotional, basing her remarks on scripture reading, Ecclesiastes 9:10. The school of instruction was then held, after which the meeting was dismissed with prayer by Mrs. Russell Dennis.

A social hour was enjoyed after the meeting and refreshments were served, with appointments carrying a patriotic theme. Seventeen members were in attendance.

CATTLE MARKET

The cattle and calf market at Ft. Worth Thursday was a slow and weak affair with declines general on all classes. Compared with a week earlier losses were about as follows: Common to good yearlings 25 to 50 cents, odd lots of choice fed yearlings steady to 25 cents, cows 25 to 50 cents, bull 25 cents, slaughter calves 25 to 50 cents and stocker calves generally 25 to 50 cents, with some still lower.

The hog market opened steady while later sales showed advances of 15 to 20 cents to a top of \$10.70.

In the sheep yards a few fat lambs, wethers and feeder lambs were steady while yearlings were strong.

Good to choice steers and yearlings ranged from \$9.50 to \$11.50 with one load of steer yearlings at \$11.25 and a package of steer yearlings at \$11.50. About 10 loads of steers were unsold at 10:30 o'clock.

Common and medium steers and yearlings were quotable at \$8 to \$9.

Good fat cows brought \$6.75 to \$7.50, butcher cows \$5.75 to \$6.50 and canners and cutters \$3 to \$5.50. Bull prices ranged from \$6 to \$7.

Fat calves sold at \$8.50 to \$9.50 with a few even higher. Butcher calves cashed at \$6.50 to \$8.50 and culls at \$5.50 to \$6.50.

Good to choice stock steer calves ranged from \$9 to \$11 with a few higher. Heifer calves sold at \$10 down. Common to medium stocker calves brought \$6 to \$8.50. Stocker steers and yearlings ranged from \$6 to \$8.50. A few good lightweight yearlings sold above these figures. Stocker cows brought \$5 to \$7.

Hogs were steady on a few early sales while later sales carried prices 15 to 20 cents above Wednesday's average. The top of \$10.70 was paid by all interests. Good and choice 180 to 280 pound averages ranged from \$10.50 to \$10.70 with most sales at \$10.65 or \$10.70. Good and choice 150 to 175 pound butchers brought \$9.25 to \$10.50. Packing sows were steady, mostly \$9 to \$9.50. Pigs ruled strong to 25 cents higher at \$9.25 down.

DIES OF HEART ATTACK.

STAMFORD, Nov. 6.—Harry Alfred Price, 72, died of a heart attack Wednesday at the home of a son, H. D. Price, in the Ericksdahl community, near here. Funeral services will be held at Electric Friday.

BUT SOVIET HEAD SAYS SPEED IN FURNISHING WAR MACHINES FOR RED ARMY IS IMPERATIVE

CHINESE TO FURNISH AID TO RUSSIANS

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The radio at Hsinking, capital of Japanese-dominated Manchoukuo, declared Thursday that nearly 500,000 Russian soldiers had been transferred from Siberia to the European theater of war and that one of China's red armies was about to contribute 100,000 troops to the battle with Germany.

Hsinking is headquarters of Japan's Kwangtung army which guards the Manchoukuo-Siberia border.

Josef Stalin, grim, determined head of Soviet Russia, promised the world by radio today that coalition of the Soviet Union, United States and Britain would conquer Hitler, but he called for the utmost speed in providing war machines for the Red Army and the opening of a second fighting front.

Coalition of Russia with the United States and Britain can be described "with certainty as a reality," Stalin said in asking who would doubt that the two democracies would give "full support in a fight against the Axis?"

As Stalin spoke from embattled Moscow, the Red Army was reported counter-attacking on isolated sectors of Leningrad, Moscow, and Donets fronts, and standing off the Axis armies all along the line, with the possible exception of Crimea. There, Germans said, they are bombarding the naval base of Sevastopol with artillery.

Earlier, Stalin had named Maxim Litvinov as ambassador to the United States.

AMERICAN LOSS OF LIFE ON THE ATLANTIC 140

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—American loss of lives in the grim Battle of the Atlantic Thursday rose to at least 140 as 17 more United States citizens were reported missing.

The British Press Service announced in Washington that the 17 Americans and two Canadian volunteers for the British Civilian Technical Corps were presumably lost in the submarine sinking of the British merchant ship carrying them to England.

While it was disclosed that the British ship was part of a convoy there were no details as to the date it was sunk or the area in which it went down.

British Press Service officials said that so far as could be ascertained the 19 volunteers, mostly experts in radio and related fields, are the first to have met harm in the hazardous Atlantic crossing of hundreds recruited since last June to help Britain's radiolocator men and other technical devices.

The latest loss of American life came as the navy checked its list of 97 men lost on the destroyer Reuben James. It is tracing reports that four of these said to be missing were erroneously reported aboard the craft when it met its fate in the icy waters of the North Atlantic.

The navy confirmed a report that Lewis Aubrey Turner, seaman, of Rio Hondo, Texas, also perished with the Reuben James.

WINTER COMES TO MANY PARTS OF LONE STAR

FT. WORTH, Nov. 6.—Winter came to Texas Thursday. Minus most of its usual bluster it settled gently over the upper portion of the state bringing freezing weather as far south as Quanah, where the mercury sank to 31 degrees.

Even Brownsville, where the low Wednesday morning was 68, had 52 degrees. San Antonio, where the low was 53 degrees 24 hours before, reported 43.

Here the low was 38 degrees after a top of 66 Wednesday, and the same low temperature is due Thursday night.

At Amarillo the low was 32; Clarendon had 33, and Pampa, Lubbock, Wichita Falls and Gainesville all reported 35.

The forecast calls for warmer weather over most of Texas Friday with the high mark in Ft. Worth expected to be 63. The weather bureau expected the thermometer to register no higher than 60 degrees here Thursday.

DAMAGE SUIT ASKS \$26,149 OF COACH CO.

EASTLAND, Nov. 6.—A personal injury suit for \$26,149 is pending in the 88th district court in which Maxine Tucker, minor, et al, of Breckenridge, is plaintiff, and J. C. Creamer of Eastland, operating as the Cisco-Waco Coaches, is defendant. In this suit the plaintiff is joined by her parents, M. N. Tucker and wife.

In plaintiff's petition it is alleged that on January 5, 1941, Maxine Tucker, aged 17, who at that time was a student at Baylor university, Waco, was a passenger on a bus owned and operated by the defendant between Waco and Eastland; that the bus collided with an automobile at Hico, and by reason of this collision she was permanently injured. Also, that because of her injuries, her parents are being deprived of her services and had to incur expenses for medical attention.

READY FOR TAX DAY.

There's a good deal of groaning about taxes, but it doesn't mean what it ought to mean—full comprehension of the situation. According to Secretary Morgenthau, the public still does not realize how stiff the new federal income levies will be. Too many taxpayers haven't considered the problem of paying taxes. It has not been too difficult, hitherto, to pay taxes on a given year's earnings out of the next year's earnings. It won't be so easy in 1942, however, or for many years to come. The Treasury Department is distributing, chiefly through banks, millions of pamphlets showing about what anyone with income from \$750 to \$25,000 will have to pay. Study of those tables may make the taxpayer groan more, but the idea is to make him take thought of the future in a more practical way.

Bankers have not been pushing the tax anticipation notes by which the government makes it easier to budget those taxes. They may begin to do so. Purchasable in amounts of \$25, \$50 and \$100, and paying a little interest, such notes enable any thrifty and forehanded taxpayer to face the Ides of March, 1942, with confidence. If he can buy enough in November and December to cover most of the income tax that will be due on next March 15 he will accomplish the rare but wise act of PAYING THE TAX FROM THE INCOME TAXED.

CANNON FODDER.

There are many indications lately that Germany is running short of cannon-fodder, along with her other privations. Fresh recruits are called up oftener, and in greater numbers, and they are younger. Observers tell of seeing mere boys in the ranks now. At the same time more and more workmen are released from the factories to go to the front. Also more and more workmen are drafted from the populations that Hitler has conquered, and rushed into the factories to replace Germans. He has even draft-

ed into the army men from the enslaved nations, but he doesn't dare do that on a big scale because he cannot trust them to betray their own countries. Napoleon, too, ran short of cannon-fodder in his wars, and eventually he had more aliens than Frenchmen in his army. That was easier to do then because nationality was not so strong. But today patriotism rises so high, even in the conquered countries, that the master-killer still has to depend almost entirely on his own Germans. And how they are being slaughtered in Russia! Next to the mass-slaughter of Poles and Russians by the Nazi armies, that is the most horrible result of the vast blood-bath Hitler is giving the world.

Cigarettes are supposed to be bad for some people, and maybe they are; but we read that an old sinner in Oak Harbor, Ohio, on his 100th birthday, "smoked a few cigarettes with his friends and walked without a cane."

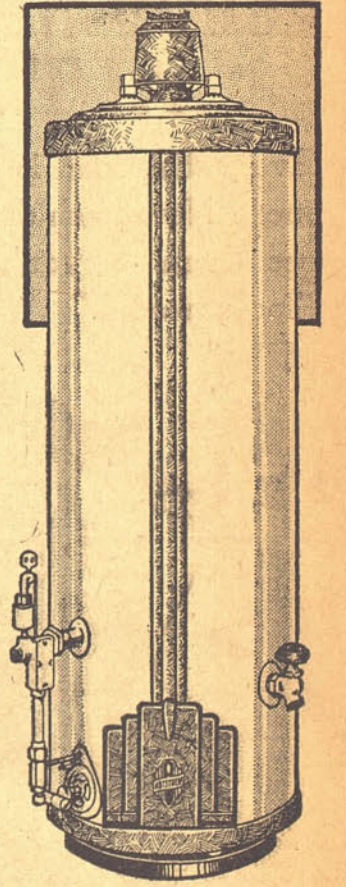

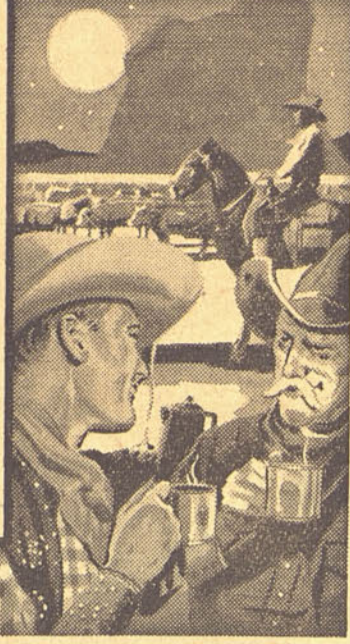

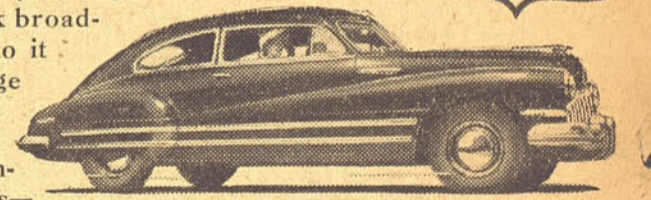
