379 County Firms Asked For Financial Statements

A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, announced statement requests were mailed to 379 businesses in Eastland County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1965. Hemphill noted that each county business concerns in parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns — to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions. The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the one million quoted above. During the past year, Hemphill added, 220 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Eastland County businesses, including 73 names added, 64 names deleted, and 83 changes in the listings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Eastland County are about in line with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds. When the owner or officer

Ranger Man One Of Three Still Getting Checks

Records at the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration show that of the 103 area persons who established eligibility for a benefit check in January, 1965, the first month such were payable, three still survive. However, R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager reports that only one of the trio did receive all 300 checks possible since that date, as two of them returned to work and forfeited their benefit checks for several months as a result.

Benjamin I. Harrison of May, 90, is the one who received his 300th benefit check this month. The other two, Phillip H. S. Williams, 92, of Ranger and Mrs. Lydia Withers, also 92, of Hamlin, gave up 7 and 24 checks respectively by reason of going back to work and earning more than the then permitted \$14.95 per month in the early 40's. All three of these initial claimants have given their written permission to tell their stories, as social security records are otherwise confidential and cannot be publicized, Tuley stated.

All told, Mr. Harrison has received \$14,001.12 in monthly benefits, ranging from the in-

itial \$27.19 through various increases to his current \$66.00 rate. Mrs. Withers has been paid \$7,712.80, at rates of from \$13.60 per month to \$41.00. Mr. Williams' benefits have totalled \$13,523.02, starting at \$24.26 and now \$65.00 per month.

Despite their advanced age, all three of these pioneer beneficiaries are alert and aiming at getting many more social security checks in the future. Each felt that the social security checks had been quite valuable in helping them to meet expenses during their retirement years.

A representative of the Agency for International Development will be in Dallas for two weeks, beginning Monday, February 1 through Friday, February 12 to interview applicants interested in secretarial positions OVERSEAS which may pay \$5,000 a year plus housing and other benefits, including a differential as much as 25% of base salary in some posts.

The interviews will be conducted by Mrs. Beulah W. Bean at the Texas Employment Commission, Commercial and Professional Office, Fidelity Union Tower Building, 8th

floor, 1507 Pacific, Dallas. Interviews daily from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. Appointment for interview may be made by calling Mrs. Bean on Riverside 7-2071. A group interview will be held at 6 p. m. on the two Wednesday evenings, February 3 and 10.

Overseas assignments are open to young women with secretarial experience and good shorthand and typing skills. The applicant must be single, at least 21 years of age, an American citizen, without dependents, and possess excellent health and character.

The majority of secretaries are assigned to headquarters in the capital cities of such interesting countries as Laos, Vietnam, Iran, Pakistan, Turkey, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Ghana, and elsewhere in the Far East, Near East, and Africa. Positions are also available at headquarters in Washington, D. C.

A.I.D. administers the economic and technical portion of the Foreign Aid Program in more than eighty missions in the Far East, Near East, Africa, and Latin America. 9 Men To Get Army Physicals During February

Due to be called for pre-induction Army examinations in Eastland County during February are nine men, five of whom are regular registrants and four 18-year-olds, according to the local Board of Selective Service; however, none of these are scheduled for induction.

The tests for 18-year-olds are the result of President Johnson's action in 1964, which ordered the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly registered men who are out of school and available for service. Males married at age 18, and those known to be in school at that age will not be examined, according to a report received from William B. Sinclair, Lt. Col., USAF.

Legion Opposes Closing Two VA Posts, Hospital

AUSTIN — The Veterans Administration's disclosure that it will close two regional offices and one hospital in Texas, comes as a shock to The American Legion, according to Department Commander Lewis W. Emerich of Houston.

Under the plan the VA offices in Lubbock and San Antonio and the McKinney Hospital will be closed, effective June 30.

At its State Convention in San Antonio last year, the Legion adopted a resolution asking for additional beds in the McKinney Hospital due to the long waiting lists. More beds are needed, not less.

These patients cannot be transferred to the Dallas VA Hospital, for they are already extremely overcrowded with a long waiting list. Closing of McKinney will cost the north Texas area 312 sorely needed beds, and will further tax the facilities at Dallas.

The American Legion fails to see how money can be saved in consolidating the San Antonio VA Office with Houston and the Lubbock office with Waco, Emerich added. "Does the VA realize how far it is from Amarillo or El Paso to Waco? The extra costs to the government in travel and per diem would offset any savings realized by putting employees out of work."

The closing of these facilities will eliminate jobs for about 600 trained people. These will be thrown into the labor market, thus increasing unemployment.



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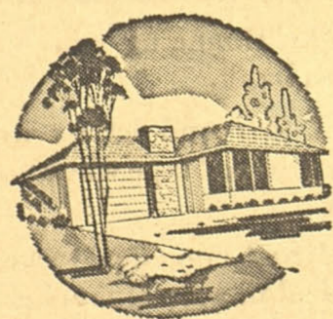
