
SATURDAY NIGHT COSTLY AFFAIR







Phone 622. obligatory voting is desirable. Voting, he maintains, is a privilege, and it is neither right nor wise to punish people for not availing themselves of a privilege. Most people may agree with him. Men and women have struggled for centuries for the right of suffrage. If,

after they, or their forefathers, have won the privilege of choosing their own rules, they see fit to enslave themselves again by not taking advantage of the victory, it is their loss more than anyone else's. It may be that forcing them to go to the polls on election day would be unjust to the rest and harmful to society. Citizens not taking enough interest in public affairs to vote might simply make a mess of things when driven to the polls. It is the quality of votes that matters-not the quantity. The real remedy, as Professor Merriam remarks, is education. Stimulate citizens' interest in and knowledge of government, and they will want to vote.





Mrs. Gneen who lived here until recently, is charged with the murder of her father-in-law near Little Rock, and her mother-in-law near Picher, Okla. It was only after 20 hours grilling that the girl-wife, confessed to the slayings, finally cry-

This is her story: She and Roy's mother plotted to kill the elder Green for his insurance. Winona did the shooting, she said. The will was probated and the insurance paid. After several weeks they took a trip to Oklahoma, going to Tulsa, Pawnee, and several other cities. At Picher, where her mother-in-law owned property, Winona confessed', she killed Mrs. Green. Her body was found in a secluded spot in the hills on directions furnished by the "flapper" slayer.
