REPORT OF NOV. 12,816,000 BALES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 .-The government crop forecast as of November 1, issued by the department of agriculture, was bearish in its nature, as conditions of the crop shows an improvement rather than a deterioration over the last report. The condition November 1 indicates a total crop of 12,-816,000 bales, as compared with 10,139,671 last year. The report shows this condition of crop to be 55.9 percent of normal, as compared to 54.7 of October 18 this year, and 47.8 October last year.

La Follette and Wheeler Invited Align With Democrats to Wrest Power From Republicans in 1928

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 .-William Jennings Bryan tonight inaugurated a movement to bring the Democratic and Independent Progressive parties under a single party standard for the campaign of 1928. He extended the olive branch to Senator Robert M. La Follette and Burton K. Wheeler by asking them to come under the Democratic fold that the coalition might be assured of wresting the power from the Republicans in the 1928 general election.

He said the Democratic party remained the only hope of the progressive elements throughout the country. He stated the Progressives must be convinced that it is impossible for a third party to function except by an alliance with the Democratic party, in which event victory would be assured.

SOCIETY'S CRUSH

The limit of the power which can be legitimately exercised by society over the individual is a question that is coming to be discussed more and more.

It is not a new question. In a certain sense, it has divided mankind almost from the remotest ages.

But in old times this contest was between subjects, or some classes of subjects, and the government.

John Stuart Mill, in the introduction of his essay on

Liberty, sums it up for you.

By Liberty, in those days, was meant protection against the tyranny of the political rulers. The people were content then to be ruled by a master, on condition of being guaranteed more or less efficaciously against his

Then men began to believe that the various magistrates of state should be their delegates, revocable at their pleasure. By degrees, this new demand superceded the previous efforts to limit the power of rulers.

As the struggle proceeded for making the ruling power emanate from the periodical choice of the ruled, some persons began to think that too much importance had been attached to the limitation of power itself.

What was wanted then, as Mill puts it, was that the rulers should be identified with the people; that their interest and will should be the interest and will of the nation. The nation did not need to be protected against its will. There was no fear of its tyrannizing over itself.

The idea was not disturbed by such temporary abberations as those of the French Revolution, the worst of which, as Mill observes, were the work of an usurping few, and which, in any case, belonged, not to the permanent working of popular institutions, but to a sudden and conclusive outbreak against monarchial and aristocratic the library. In time, however, a democratic republic, the United States, came to occupy a large portion of the earth's surface and make itself felt as one of the most powerful members of the community of nations; and elective and responsible government became subject to the observations

FAVOR THE BANKNOTE

The United States treasury undertook lately to get rid of some of its surplus silver dollars. It used a pile of them for the government payroll in Washington. It urged subtreasuries to work them off among the banks in their various sections and urged the public to make more use of the silver. But the public failed to take the hint and the cartwheels rolled right back into the treasury about as fast as they were distributed.

People simply do not want to carry around heavy money. Even the West, long partial to silver and gold, is coming to favor the light and convenient banknote in preference to coins. Silver dollars are unloaded on merchants and the merchants in turn unload them on banks, and the banks cannot get them back into circulation again without insisting more vigorously than they care to. So Uncle Sam must keep right on with the expensive printing, cleaning and replacing of millions of dollar bills. The suggestion is made that the treasury solve the problem by melting down its dollars and coining them into half-dollars, quarters and dimes, for which there is always a big demand. This is probably what it will have to do.

POWER FROM CHARCOAL GAS

Swedish scientists have produced a gas from charcoal which is being used satisfactorily as motor fuel. It is being used to drive automobiles, boats and even trains, and is said to be manufactured at a fraction of the cost of gasoline or alcohol.

This is interesting as a scientific fact, and also as assurance that the world need not discard the motor engine

when the gasoline supply gives out. It may be doubted, nowever, whether charcoal gas will be of much practical value in this country, for centuries to come. Our supplies of timber for charcoal-burning are limited and our motor fuel demands are vast. We have a lot of petroleum still untapped, especially in the shale deposits.

Another Swedish experiment is more to the point, as far as America is concerned. A railroad in Sweden is converting its passenger cars to use coal gas, for internal combustion, instead of steam. 20TH CENTURY CLUB NURSES LIBRARY 24 YEAR

CITIZENS GAVE

Mrs. J. J. Winston, one of the charter members of the Twentieth Century club, at the request of the Cisco Daily News, gives a bit of interesting history connected with the Cisco library, and speaks of the formation of the Twentieth Century club and how it came to take charge of the library, some 24 years ago. Mrs. Winston says:

"The Twentieth Century club was organized in my home in 1897, and as I recall only five of the charter members are now living in Cisco These are Mrs. Wm. Reagan, Mrs J. J. Butts, Mrs. C. H. Fee, Mrs. Geo. Langston and myself. Mrs. G. B. Kelly came near being a charter member, joining soon after the XXth Century club was organized.

"It was in 1900 when the club took over the library, and began to sponsor that institution. The library was first started by Frank Vernon in 1894, who in a modest way began to collect books and periodicals from the people of Cisco, using small boys to solicit volumes, offering a shot gun as a prize to the boy who secured the largest number of books. Jonah Eppler and Warren Taylor were two of the boys that I recall. He kept the library in the building now used by the Coca Cola bottling works. In 1900, when his health began to fail, and just before his departure for El Paso, he called the XXth Century club together and made this club the custodian of the RISING STAR GIRL HURT library, with the funds on hand, amounting to about \$200, with the stipulation that should the club disband the library would revert back to him. He had then just recently received a donation from Andrew Carnegie of \$250 to purchase books.
