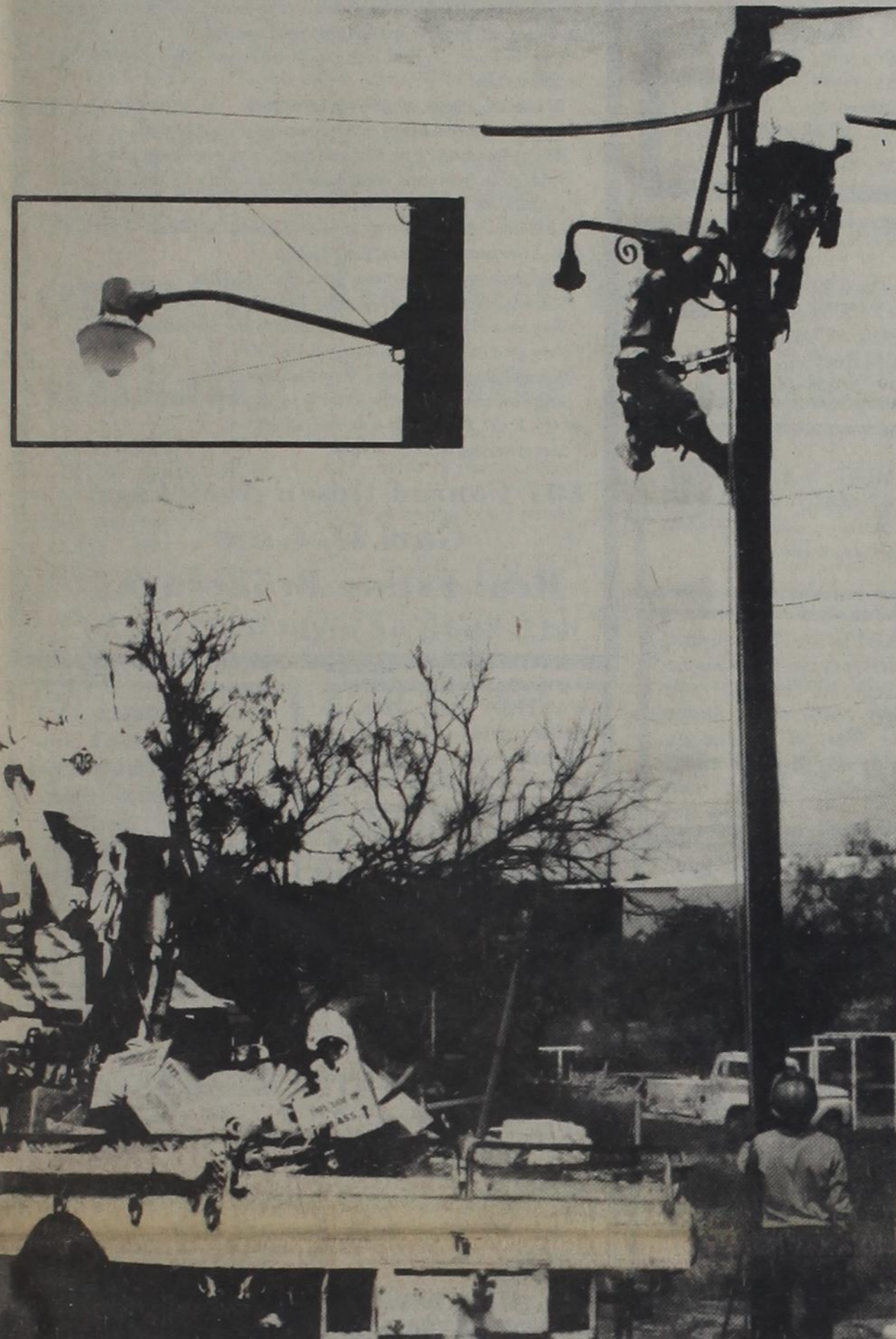

UPGRADING STREET LIGHTING—Four West Texas Utilities Company crews from Abilene were in Cisco Thursday replacing old street lights with new ones following the approval of such a project a few months ago by the City Council. Local WTU manager, Jack Kennedy, said the crews came to Cisco from Abilene whenever the are available. He said the first crew was in Cisco a few weeks ago and they plan on the upgrading to be finished by October 1, if not before. WTU is changing out the old-style 189-watt incandescent lamps with new 175-watt mercury vapor lamps which will provide better light. The approximately 208 lights being changed are located mostly in residential sections of the city. The WTU crew shown was taking down the old lamp at the corner of Bedford and Hopwood before installing a new lamp, similar to the one shown in the inset (top left).

Westbound Water Members And City Council Discuss Rate Charge

Members of the Cisco City Council met with representative of Westbound Water Supply Corporation Tuesday night at 6 p.m., in the Chamber of Commerce, to discuss water rates for Westbound.

The two groups have been at odds during the past year about what rate Westbound should be paying for water supplied to them by the City of Cisco. At one time, a lawsuit was being threatened against Cisco because an agreement had not been reached on the rate;

however, at Monday night's meeting it was indicated the lawsuit had been dropped and the two groups are interested in working out an agreement suitable to both parties.

Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie said he would like to express his appreciation of Dick Woolley for his efforts in acting as a mediator between the two groups. He also stated the City Council "has no desire for anything except what is fair to the citizens of Cisco and to Westbound."

Westbound has been pay-

ing \$1.27 per 1,000 gallons of water since December 1983. In September of 1984, the City of Cisco and Westbound disagreed on the \$1.27 rate and Westbound asked for a \$0.90 rate. City officials were willing to compromise to \$1.10 until actual cost of operation at the water plant could be determined.

Westbound and the City did not seem to agree on the rate and the lawsuit was threatened putting a halt to negotiations, until the past few weeks. New board president Troy Hightower and

secretary-treasurer Carolyn Hull (both of Westbound) contacted city officials and indicated they wanted to get together and work out a solution to the problem.

City Manager Mike Moore said the city will not be able to supply actual confirmed water usage figures until possibly January of 1987. He suggested the two groups agree upon a price to be charged Westbound from the present until January 1987. At that time, the two groups can get back together and study the actual cost figures

of the city and come up with a price agreeable to both parties.

Should the actual cost be less than the rate Westbound has been charged, the city will reimburse the over-charged amount. At the same time, should the actual cost show the rate should have been more, Westbound will be expected to make up the difference.

After a rate is agreed upon in 1987, the city and Westbound will get together once a year to review the rate and see if it needs to be adjusted up or down.

Representing Westbound at the meeting were Troy Hightower, Carolyn Hull, Harold White, and Joe McColum.

City officials present were Mayor Ritchie, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson, and councilmen Bill Roberts, Bobby Ingram, and Brad Kimbrough. Councilman Joe Besselaar came into the meeting just before it adjourned.

Schools Will Dismiss Early Friday, Sept. 20

Students of Cisco Public Schools will be dismissed early Friday, September 20, according to Cisco High School principal Jim Puryear. Mr. Puryear said the students will be released at an earlier time because of the football game to be played in Mart that night.

Dismissal time will be 1:40 p.m. for the Primary school, 1:50 p.m. for the Intermediate school, and 2:00 p.m. for the Junior/Senior high school.

Chamber Of Commerce Breakfast Well Attended

Forty-seven persons attended the quarterly Chamber of Commerce breakfast held at 7 a.m., in the Colony Restaurant Wednesday, September 11. New teachers in the Cisco public school system and the Cisco Junior College system were guests of the Chamber.

Bill Austin Jr., CofC president and in charge of the breakfast, stated that teachers are "still honored and revered in the Cisco area." He introduced those teachers present and also Rev. and Mrs. Otto Urban, new pastor at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Cisco.

A slide presentation was made by the Cisco Historical Society on the "Main Street America" program. The slide show dealt with refurbishing older building fronts.

Maps of Cisco's proposed historical district were available for those desiring one and also a sheet which lists 14 items "considered detrimental to a good restoration project," according to the Secretary of the Interior's "Standards for Rehabilitation."

Those items are as follows:

1. Moving a historic structure.
2. Inappropriate signage.
3. Altering grounds in such a way as to destroy architectural resources.
4. Unsympathetic replacement of mortar on brick or stone buildings.
5. Sandblasting.
6. Removal of architectural features.
7. Artificial siding (aluminum, asbestos, masonite, etc.)
8. Major additions to the building that detract from the primary facade or that are made to appear as part of the original plan.
9. Inappropriate windows (replacing original windows with different style or with

material such as tinted or mirrored glass).

10. Inappropriate roofing material or window shutters.

11. Aluminum windows, doors, screens.

12. Alteration of steps, skirting, or porch foundations.

13. Unsympathetic removal of paint; inappropriate colors; painting of brick.

14. Imitating an earlier style that was not part of the building's architectural history.

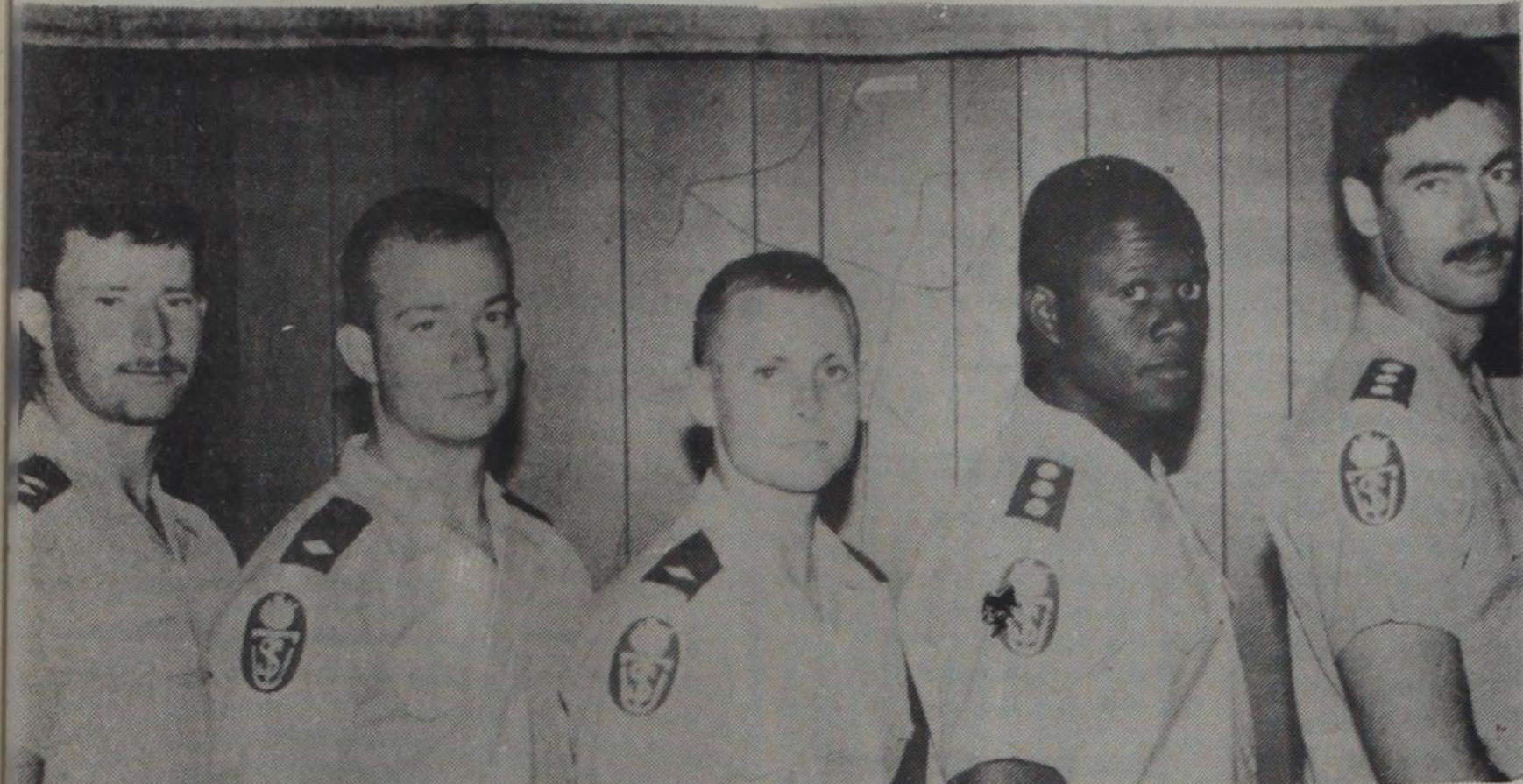

Cisco Council Members Approve 3 Ordinances

Cisco city council members approved the second and final reading of three ordinances during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night at City Hall. The three ordinances had been approved on their first reading at the last meeting. The first ordinance approved an increase in sanitation collection rates effective September 1, 1985. The second ordinance approved an update in service credits for employees of the city, and the third ordinance approved the abandonment of an easement of land in the Oakcrest Addition.

One item on the agenda was not attended to since members of the volunteer fire department were not present to address the council regarding maintenance and improvements. In new business, the council approved the first reading of an ordinance accepting the proposed budget for the fiscal year of October 1, 1985 through September 30, 1986, for the City of Cisco.

The council also decided to terminate six lake lot leases because they have not been paid. The owners of the leases have received two notices since the due date on July 1. One of the lots is located on the north shore and the remaining five are located on the south shore. City manager Mike Moore asked the council for its feelings regarding suggested proposals for the annual budget of the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch. Mr. Moore said he would be representing Cisco at the Dispatch meeting September 11.

Council members seemed to be in agreement that the city manager should support the second proposal which called for a total budget of \$85,061 (12.3 percent increase). The proposal also called for an employee wage increase of \$0.15 an hour (3.5 percent) which makes Cisco's share of the budget 23.2 percent or \$17,776 (\$2,016 annual increase).

Council members also heard a presentation by Harold Dement, sales representative, and Charles Fielder, staff engineer, of Energy Advancement, Incorporated. The two were here to answer any questions by the council and to explain what type of agreement would be involved should the City of Cisco decide to enter into an agreement with them for the use of a solid waste disposal service to be located in Eastland.

The company has already reached an agreement with Eastland city officials to build a plant on their present landfill site if all the applications filed are approved. Mr. Dement said he feels the summer of 1987 should see the plant in operation. Basically what Energy Advancement's facility does is provide a place where any combustible material may be burned and the heat is captured inside the facility. The heat is then used to make electricity which Energy Advancement, Inc., will sell to utility companies.

Should the City of Cisco decide to enter into an agreement with the company they will have two options: either collect trash in Cisco and haul it to Eastland; or have Energy Advancement, Inc. build a transfer station in Cisco where the garbage will be dumped until the company removes it to their site in Eastland.

If the city delivers the garbage to Eastland they will be charged \$2.75 per cubic yard or \$.67 per person per month, whichever way the city decides it would rather pay. If a station is built in Cisco the charge will be \$2.35 per cubic yard or \$.79 per person per month. Council members have been faced with the knowledge that they will have to find a new landfill site in the very near future. The present site is almost full and the city must look at finding a new site or finding an alternative to a landfill. City officials present for the meeting were Mayor Ernie Ritchie, councilmen Bobby Ingram, Joe Besselaar, Bill Roberts, and Brad Kimbrough, city manager Moore, and city secretary Ginger Johnson.

Robinson and Dill voted for the motion. L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, voted against it. The motion carried. L.T. Owen had previously made the motion that the County Budget be kept at the 1985 level across the board - not making any raises anywhere. This motion died for lack of a second. The Commissioners had previously approved a request from Gene Hicks, Constable of Rising Star, for an adjustment on his car allowance from \$50 monthly to \$300 monthly.

The approval of the Budget ended lengthy discussions on the needs of various Departments. Some of these discussions had continued over a number of sessions, and others began at the regular meeting Monday, Sept. 9. The needs and cost of law enforcement has posed some difficult problems, with no easy solution in sight. The Sheriff Department and Jail Budget is expected to be around \$370,000 for the upcoming year.

Another exception would be the salary of J.P. R.G. Lyerla, Pct. 1, whose salary would be raised to around \$13,000 annually. The salary of his clerk would be raised to \$5.90 per hour of approx. \$12,000 annually. Another provision was that one additional Deputy Sheriff would be hired for the Sheriff's Department rather than the two Deputies Sheriff Underwood requested. An additional Jailer will also be hired under the Sheriff's proposed budget. One more full-time worker will also be hired in the District Clerk's office. C.B. Dill, Pct. 4, seconded the motion to approve the adoption of the Budget as modified orally. Judge Bailey called the vote, and

During Thursday's meeting Judge Bailey and the Commissioners discussed County income and expenditures with County Auditor Emma Morris. Taxes have been raised 1 percent per \$100 valuation, but it is not known how much this will generate. So County revenues are anticipated to be very near expenditures during the next fiscal year. The figures from various Departments will be published when final details are worked out.

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County's Peanut Crop Prospects Deteriorating

Eastland County's peanut crop prospects are deteriorating each day that dry, hot weather continues. County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon said an early September rain can be very helpful to a peanut crop. Instead of rain we have had some of the hottest days of the summer, he says. The peanut crop looked very good the first of August as rains had been adequate.

Some early planted peanuts have been harvested and yields were generally good. However, the later planted peanuts were reaching a stage of high water requirements when the hot days of late August and early September came.

After three consecutive years of poor peanut yields, growers needed a good year in 1985. If it does not rain within the next week, dryland peanut yields will be very low. The irrigated peanuts also need help from rain and cooler weather. The evaporation rate has been so high that irrigations have done little good.

Gordon says the evaporation rates have been more than the .3 inch per day for the last two or three weeks. The Experiment Station at Stephenville has an instrument that measures the amount of water that evaporates from surface water each day. On one of the last days of August the evaporation rate was .83 inches a record high according to the County Agent. It continued above normal through the first week of September.

Rainfall has generally been good in Eastland County, but has now fallen below average according to Ronald Bailey, official Weather Bureau Recorder. The average rainfall for January through August is 18.36 inches. Bailey has recorded 17.50 inches for the year through August.

Gordon says a good rain within the next few days would brighten the prospects of the peanut crop. On the other hand, continued dry, hot weather could be disastrous to most peanut growers.

Stenholm Replies To Letter And Petition

The following is the text of a letter received by County Judge Scott Bailey from Congressman Charles Stenholm in reply to a letter by Judge Bailey and a petition signed by 150 Eastland County citizens. This was mailed in mid-August, and expressed concern on new Wage-and-Hour rulings on city and county employees.

People from throughout Eastland County signed the petition - Mayors, councilmen, ranchers, merchants and others. Hardly anyone declined to sign, and more names are coming in. Copies were also mailed to Senators Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen.

Dear Judge Bailey:

Thank you for your recent letter expressing your concern about the recent Supreme Court decision, *Garcia v. San Antonio*. As a leader in Eastland I certainly understand your interest in this matter. The potential costs if this decision is fully implemented could result in a heavy burden on towns such as yours.

In *Garcia* the Supreme Court overruled another important case, *National League of Cities*. The earlier case held that government entities were exempt from the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) when they were participating in "traditional government functions." This exemption was seen as an important aspect of local and state governmental sovereignty. Like you, I recognize that in many towns this exemption from FLSA is what makes it possible for many important services to be provided without causing undue financial hardship on the government entity.

The *Garcia* decision removes this important exemption from the FLSA. The court held all entities will be required to meet the regulations set forth in the FLSA. I believe that this intrusion into the sovereignty of local governments offends the traditional doctrine of state sovereignty, a tradition long enjoyed in our nation.

I have co-sponsored H.R. 3173 which would exempt public agencies from application of the overtime standards in the FLSA.

Many of the activities affected by this legislation are very important to the citizens of every town. It is important that vital services be offered to those in need as effectively and economically as possible. We should not jeopardize the lives of citizens by forcing government entities to make up costs by reducing personnel in essential agencies.

Please share my views with the other officials and concerned citizens who signed the petition and, be assured, I will be following this legislation as it passes through the House and will keep your views on this issue in mind. If I may be of any further assistance in this matter, or answer any specific questions on the current application of the FLSA to your locality, please feel free to contact me. Senator Lloyd Bentsen also responded to Judge Bailey's letter and the petition. He replied that he agrees in principle, and is studying legislation that would give some relief to states, cities and counties. He has requested that they receive the same consideration as the Congressional staffs, which are exempt from Wage-and-Hour rulings on overtime pay.

His partner, Neal Davis, died instantly in the shooting.

Bill Latch, Sr., of Durango, Colorado, decided to delay a visit to Bangkok, Mrs. Lloyd reported. He plans to go there soon to visit his son's widow and two children, a girl age 6 and a boy age 2.

The family requested that any memorials be in the form of donations to the Pearl S. Buck Foundation, which was created by the noted author to benefit children of USA service men in Korea and Viet Nam. This foundation was a favorite charity of young Latch.

Young Latch's father was born and raised in Cisco. Bill, Jr., was born in Abilene and moved with his family to Colorado as a body. Bill, Sr., is an oil company geologist.

Cisco Elementary Changes Seen Changes at Siebert Elementary

This school year is scheduled to be the last one that sees a split campus for Cisco ISD's elementary youngsters.

The 294 children, 16 teachers and 4 aides of grades 3, 4, 5 and 6, as well as early childhood classes, are housed in what is known as the intermediate school. The 251 children of Kindergarten and grades 1 and 2 are in the primary school with 10 teachers and 1 aide.

Bob Lindsay is Cisco elementary principal with his office in the intermediate school. Geneva Webb is supervising teacher in the primary building.

Work should begin on Phase I of a building program which will see all elementary grades occupy-

ing the same campus.

Space where the building program progresses will be fenced off as a safety measure, according to Mr. Lindsay. He anticipates no particular problems with this activity so close to classes as the children cooperated well during demolition of the gymnasium which was located where the new building will stand.

The gymnasium will not be replaced, but a cafeteria will offer sufficient assembly space.

Phase II of the project will begin when Phase I is completed. Phase II will see the present structure completely refurbished with some remodeling as necessary to provide for specific programs.

Seven of the forty faculty members are new to Eastland's Siebert Elementary School this year.

Cindy Foster, who has the physical education classes, is not new to Eastland as she comes to Siebert from the high school faculty.

Angie Casbeer teaches early childhood classes in Room 24.

Mary Walley is a new speech teacher this year.

Sherry Kelm, who has a fifth grade, comes to Siebert from Comanche. Her husband is on the high school coaching staff.

Mary Jones begins her first year of teaching with a first grade assignment here.

Davene Jeffcoat from Cisco is Siebert's new music teacher.

Enrollment in Siebert Elementary School is more than 650 students.

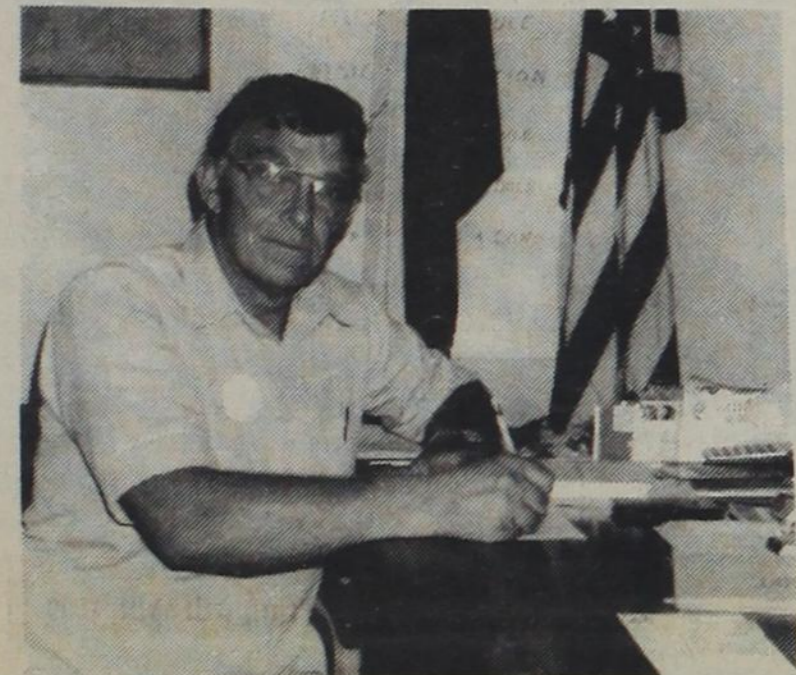
Kindergarten Report...

Mandi's second-grade year will move faster than mine. But that statement is made from my present perspective of time. I doubt Mandi feels there's only a long breath between Labor Day and Halloween, a sneeze until Thanksgiving, then a whistle until Christmas.

While Mandi, our second grader, was counting off eight pencils, eleven tablets, four packages of construction paper, two boxes of tissues--which hadn't been invented in my runny-nosed youth--and assorted items of glue, water colors, crayons, ruler, scissors and extra erasers, I mentioned my own second grade supplies: a nickle Big Chief tablet and a penny cedar pencil.

In these days of instantcy, I would like to have capsules of instant knowledge. Need to know Egyptian history? Take a capsule and instantly be an expert. Want to go to Spain? Take a Spanish language capsule and enjoy! I would have taken a music capsule the day dear Lucy told me, "Your monotone is ruining our song! Please, be quiet."

Despite technological advances, farming and ranching is still one of the most hazardous occupations in the nation. That's why the week of Sept. 15-21 has been set aside to call special attention to farm and ranch safety.

In a proclamation designating Sept. 15-21 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Texas, Gov. Mark White noted: "While new technology has brought advances in safety, the quantity and severity of remaining risks require daily attention to avoid mishap. Incidents of accidental death, injury and job-related illness are still tragically numerous on farms and ranches and in the homes and on the roads of rural Texas. But with increased safety education and continued improvement

in product design, there is hope that further progress in preventing accidents can be made."

The Extension Service along with the Texas Safety Association, Texas Farm Bureau, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers, and the Young Farmers of Texas are encouraging all who farm and ranch and live in rural areas to make a special effort to practice safety in their day-to-day operations.

Among safety and health measures to reduce losses from serious accidents and illness are the following:

-Manage to prevent accidents. Make safety an integral part of every farming operation. Train workers. Buy quality products and take care of them as directed

by manufacturers.

-Strive for good health to accomplish as much as possible with resources available. Eat properly. Deal with harmful life stresses, seeking professional help if needed. Consult a doctor if you develop symptoms such as unexplained fatigue or pain, shortness of breath, or one of cancer's seven danger signals.

-Invest in personal protective equipment, ROPS cabs for tractors and other safeguards to help you avoid injuries and illnesses that could cost many times that investment.

-Keep informed about safety and health. Note newspaper and magazine articles. Acquire publications available from Extension, health and safety organizations, insurance companies, public libraries, and such. Take advantage of opportunities to learn first-aid, CPR, defensive driving and water safety.

Board Of Directors Adopt \$85,061 Budget

The Board of Directors of the Eastland County Dispatch adopted a budget of \$85,061 Wednesday afternoon. This is a 12.3 percent increase over fiscal year 1985.

Board members listened as Eastland County Sheriff Don Underwood and Gorman Police Chief Cecil Funderburgh stressed the need for a substantial pay raise for dispatchers to keep experienced people from leaving.

Underwood said that in circumstances like his

department had the other night, "we could get in a bad situation." He also questioned the wisdom of the dispatch for answering services for several companies. His wife, Delores, is a police dispatcher.

Funderburgh explained how recently passed laws put extra burdens on dispatchers. He suggested workers get at least a 5.8 percent pay raise.

Directors voted to adopt a budget allowing a 3.5 percent for 15 cents per hour pay raise for the supervisor, and

four full-time and one part-time employee.

City Manager Michael Moore and Police Chief Billy Rains suggested fewer requests be made for officers to telephone the dispatch by making use of a code that has been developed. Moore also stressed that dispatchers should become concerned about an officer's welfare if radio messages are not acknowledged within a short time.

Board members voted to enter into a 36 month lease contract for a new teletype

machine after Chief Dispatcher Bob Mercer said the present 7-year-old one is outdated. The service contract on the present county-owned teletype now costs \$165 per

month. The total monthly fee to lease the new machine will be \$199.

We have been discussing the steps to take toward a hardy heart. Last week we discussed how the coronary heart disease is brought about, this week we will discuss the five choices that an individual has in preventing a heart attack, as outlined by the Austin Brackenridge Hospital.

The first is the establishing and maintaining a regular vigorous exercise. The report states a 90-minute program per week should be conducted. This includes brisk walking, swimming, hiking uphill, jumping rope, etc.

The next major part of the program is to stop smoking. It has been found there is a connection between smoking and acceleration of heart disease.

Another part of the program is to reduce saturated fat and cholesterol in the diet by eating more fish and poultry.

Next is to maintain your ideal weight. Any time you are 30 percent over your "normal" weight you are putting a strain on the heart.

Finally, the control of high blood pressure with treatment. High blood pressure will increase the risk of heart attack or stroke if left unattended.

CJC Runs Over Panhandle State JV In 55-to-26 Win

Cisco Junior College freshman kicker Bobby Nino missed a 34-yard field goal attempt in the second half of Thursday night's game against Panhandle State University's Junior Varsity from Goodwell, Oklahoma. That was Nino's first scoring try of the game played in Cisco, but it did not matter too much since Cisco still had a 33-to-12 lead.

Cisco went on to win the game by the score of 55-to-26. CJC scored 24 points in the first quarter, 9 in the second quarter, 7 in the third quarter and 15 in the final quarter. Panhandle State scored 6 points in the first quarter, 6 in the second quarter, and 14 in the third quarter.

CJC scored first with a 27-yard field goal by Raymon Hernandez, sophomore from Wichita Falls. He split the uprights with 12:24 showing in the first quarter to make the score 3-to-0.

Panhandle State took the lead when Keith Hamond intercepted a Mark Pilling pass and returned it approximately 64 yards for a touchdown. The extra point kick by Mikeal Tawater, with Shawn Geary holding the ball, was no good, making the score 3-to-6 with 9:47 left in the first quarter.

CJC's Pilling, freshman quarterback from Miami, Florida and transfer from Georgia Tech, connected on a pass to Melvin Patterson, sophomore from Killeen, for Cisco's next score. The pass-play covered 41 yards. The extra point kick by Hernandez, with Neal Kemper holding the ball, was good to give Cisco back a 10-to-6 lead with 6:26 left in the first quarter.

Cisco scored again on a pass from QB Pilling to Patterson, this time on a 13-yard play. Cisco's David Smith, sophomore from Dallas-Adamson, picked up 43-yards on a run during the drive to set up the scoring play. Again, Hernandez split the uprights for the extra point making the score 17-to-6 with 2:59 left in the first quarter.

Not finished scoring, Cisco's John Buesing, sophomore from Vernon, recovered a Panhandle State fumble on their own 28-yard line to set up another CJC scoring drive. Again, Patterson caught the touchdown pass, this time for five yards from quarterback Neal Kemper, sophomore from Groveton. The extra point kick by Hernandez was good making the score 24-to-6 with 59 seconds left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Panhandle's kicker, Geary, received a snap on a punt which sailed over this head into the end zone where he fell on the ball to give Cisco a safety. So, with 14:17 showing in the second quarter, Cisco had a 26-to-6 lead.

CHS Jr. Varsity Defeats Ranger

Cisco High School's Junior Varsity evened up its season record at 1-1 Thursday night in Ranger when it defeated the Ranger JV by the score of 24-to-6. Cisco scored a

touchdown in each of the first three quarters while only giving up one touchdown in the second quarter.

Scoring points for Cisco were Kody Wallace, Larry Fields, and Joe Flores with one touchdown each. Wallace also scored two extra points following the TD by Fields. Flores scored two extra points following his own TD and the Wallace TD.

Defensively, Cisco's Davin Hohbert had one interception while John Clark and Phillip Shackelford had one fumble recovery each. Mark McGinness and Kody Wallace had two quarterback sacks each to their credit.

Coach Jerry Reeves said McGinness and Clark both played real good games both on defense and offense. He said the entire team "has really improved this week overall." He said they eliminated a lot of the things they were doing wrong and "brought their confusion factor way down."

Lions Clubs of this region sponsor the annual game at Breckenridge to raise money for their community programs.

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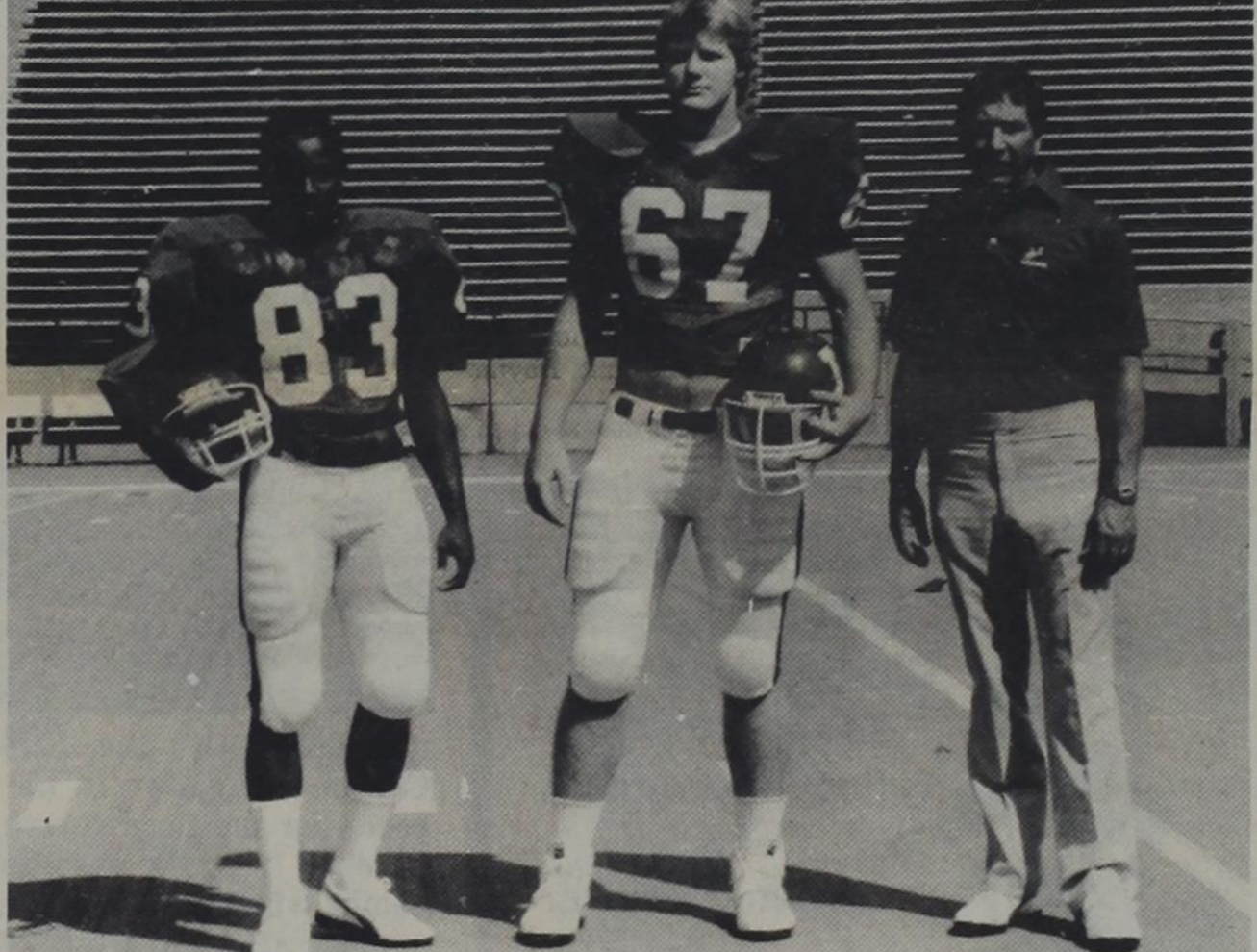

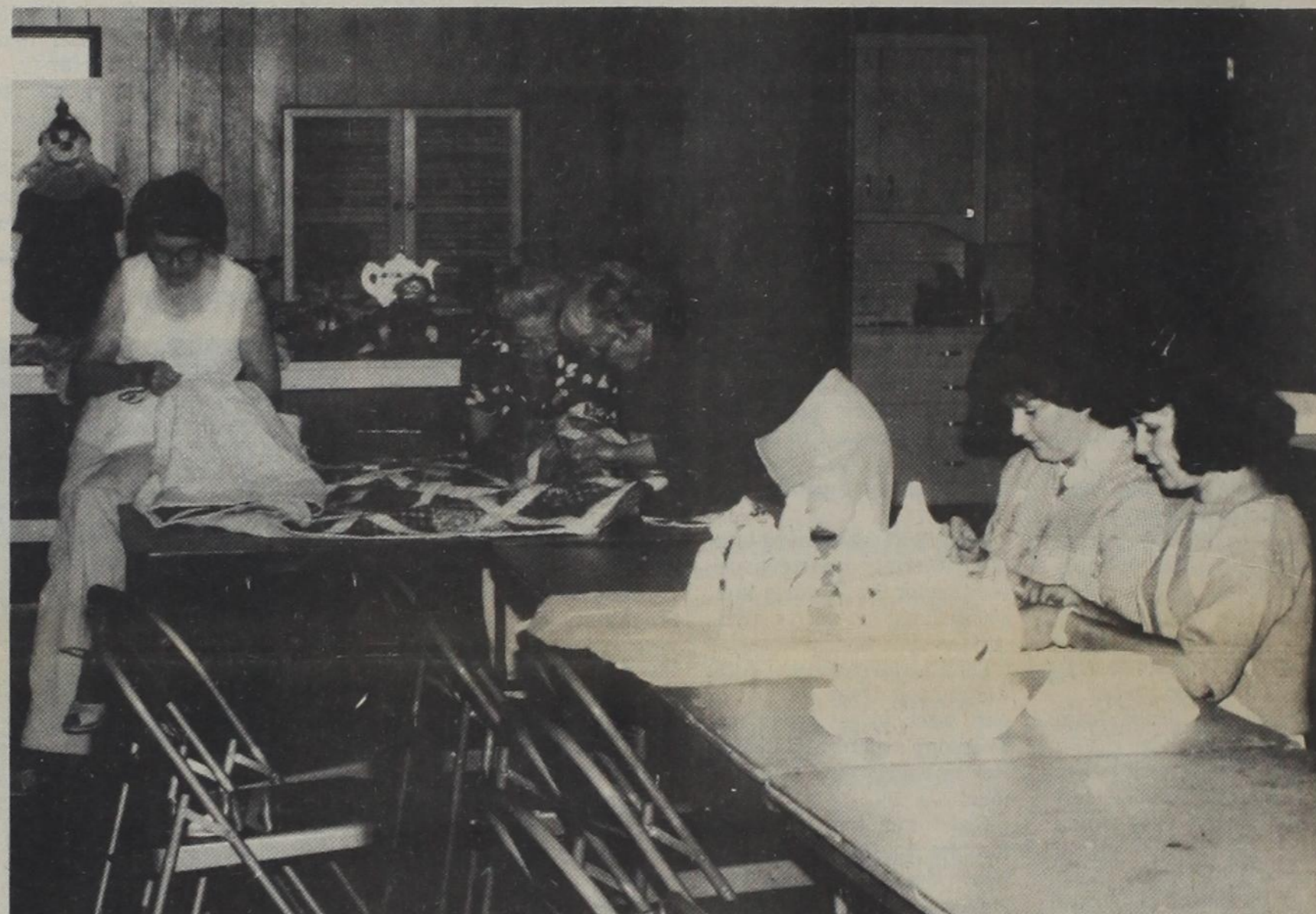

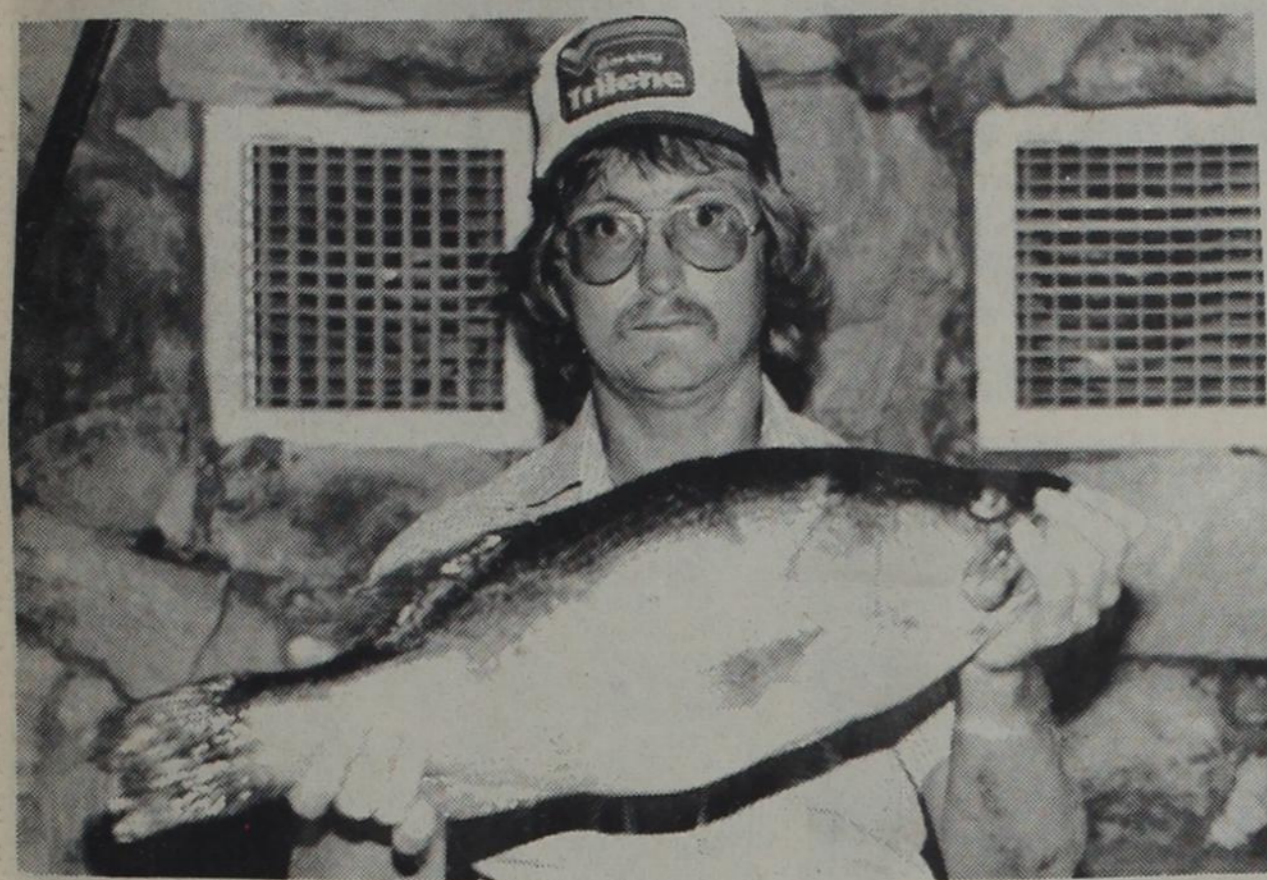

An analysis of hunting and fishing license sales in Texas indicates the state is following a national trend the past two years.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said the trend has been stable or declining licensing sales, but increased revenue because of higher fees.

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service said the number of hunting and fishing license holders in the U.S. declined by more than 400,000 bet-

ween 1983 and 1984, but a record \$552 million was spent for the licenses.

In Texas, the pattern is seen in sales of the resident combination hunting and fishing license, which declined from 714,901 sold in fiscal year 1983 to 681,802 sold in 1984. Revenue from the combination license increased, however, by approximately \$1.4 million.

During the same two-year period in Texas, decreases were noted in numbers of resident hunting, resident hunting exempt, state waterfowl stamps, archery hunting stamps and white-winged dove stamps sold.

Resident fishing licenses showed an increase of 131,146, with a rise in revenue of more than \$3.1 million. All Texas nonresident licenses, including both hunting and fishing, posted gains in numbers sold and revenues produced, officials said.

Federal statistics indicate Texas ranks second to Pennsylvania in numbers of hunting license holders, and second only to California in fishing license sales.

Receipts From Bank

Franchise Tax Returned

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totalling \$61.6 million from the first collection of the state's new franchise tax on banks to 1,996 local taxing jurisdictions across the state.

In a special session last year, the Legislature brought banks under the franchise tax for the first time and allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school district and other local taxing units where the banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting this new plan instead. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

A total of \$68,453.05 has been returned to Eastland County Taxing Units under

this new franchise tax.

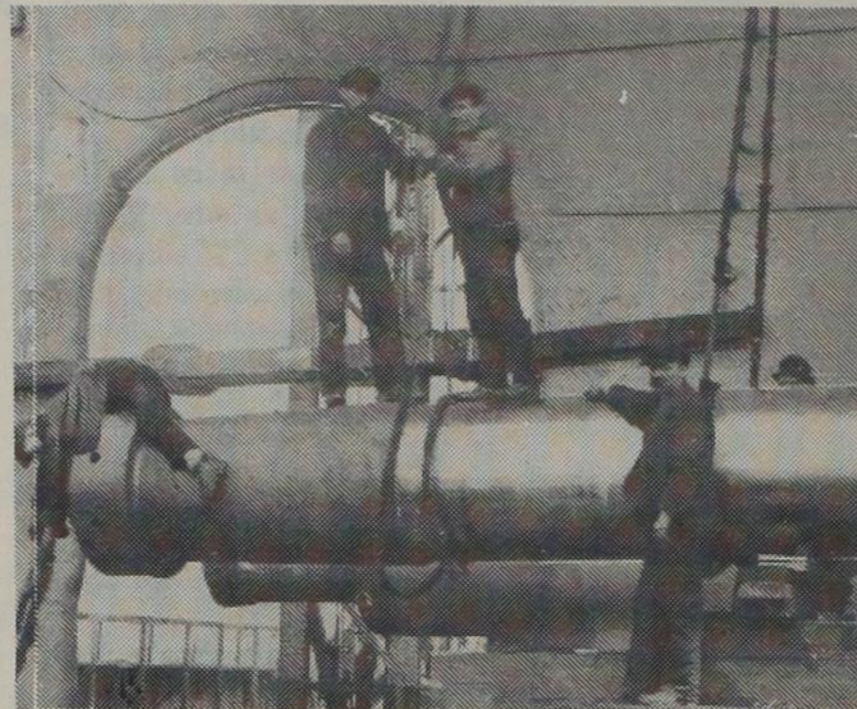

reports from all over the state that most Colleges are experiencing enrollment drops this year."

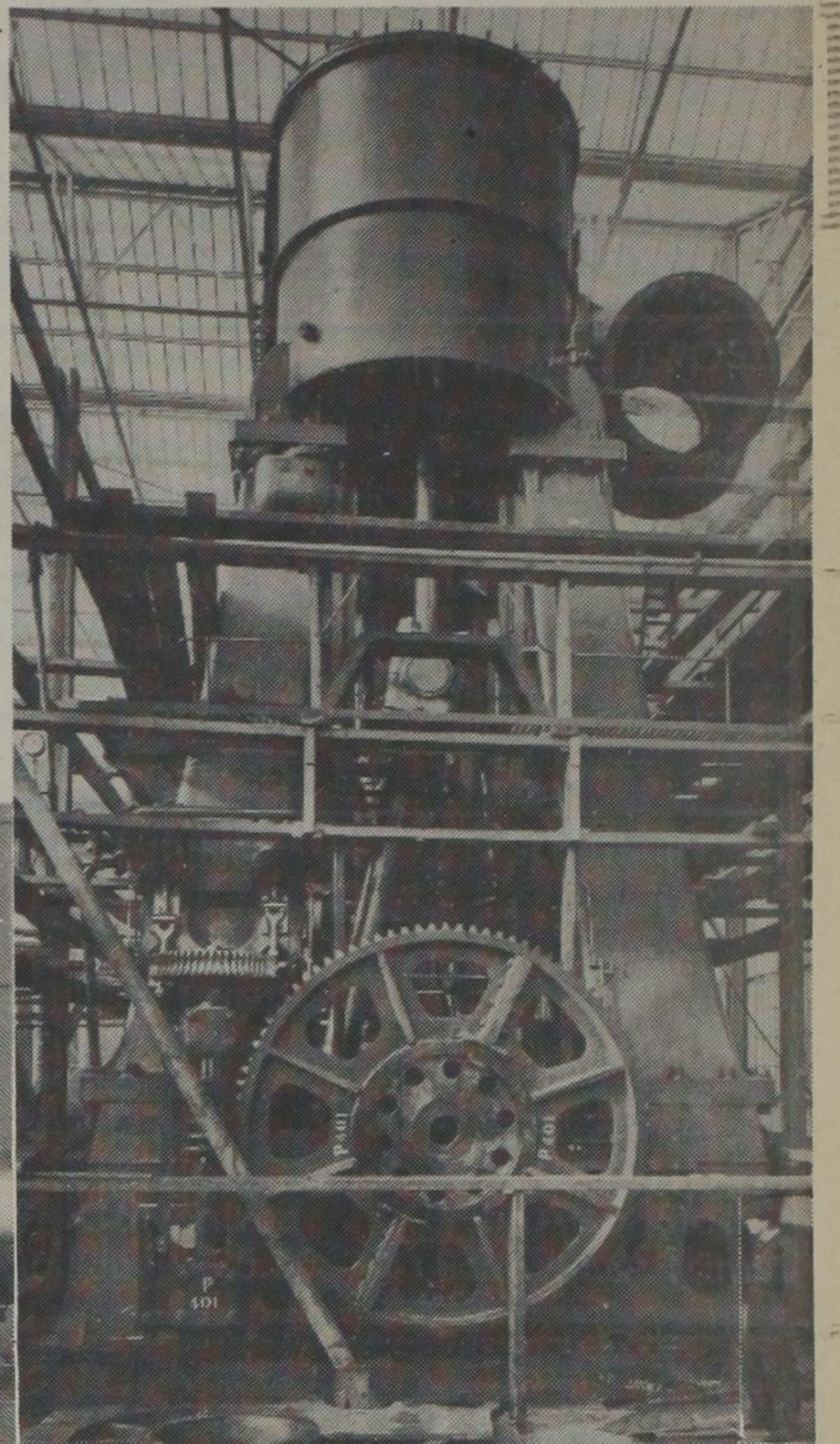

TITANIC SCENES FROM LONG AGO - These rare original photographs were submitted by James Dabney of Eastland, who received them from Harland and Wolff of Belfast, Ireland, the company which built the fated Titanic, which is now so much in the news because of its recent discovery. The "unsinkable" ship was completed in June, 1911 and one photo shows it being towed out of Belfast Harbor. With a gross tonnage of 44,439, it had dimensions of 882 by 92 feet with a depth of 59 feet. One of two-cylinder triple-



expansion engines shown in one photo and it also had one low-pressure turbine. The triple-screw vessel had fifteen watertight bulkheads, seven decks, normal speed and 21 1/2 knots and a crew of 853. Its passenger accommodation was for 2,021 persons in three classes. The third photo shows the shaft onto which one of the giant screws would be installed. It's interesting to think while looking at those old photos, that all of that is now laying on the bottom of the ocean off Newfoundland.
