BIG SPRING COUPLE LEASE LAKE CISCO LODGE PROPERTY

Lynn's Lake Lodge at Lake Cisco has been leased to Mrs. A. O. Vanderford of Big Spring, according to an announcement today by E. L. Jackson, secretary-treasurer of the corporation that owns the property.

Mrs. Vanderford will be assisted by her husband in operating the business. They hope to be open by April 20—next week—and plan to operate the property the year around.

Mr. Vanderford was born in Cisco and grew up here. His father was the late R. D. Vanderford, who was superintendent of the old oil mill here for 21 years. A brother, Earl, now of Waco,

played on the famous Lobo football teams of the 1920s. Mrs. J. H. Glasscock of Cisco is his sister.

The Vanderfords have lived at Big Spring since 1940.

The lodge, which includes a boat dock and store, five cabins and a large picnic pavilion, was built by a group of Cisco business men and women in an effort to promote Lake Cisco as a recreation center, Mr. Jackson said. "We are glad to have folks like the Vanderfords come to our community and take over this business," Mr. Jackson said. "They expect to do everything possible to help us promote Lake Cisco and this area."

Veterans Hold 'Get Acquainted' Meeting Here

Veterans of World War I, District 17, conducted a "get acquainted" tour of the Eastland County area Wednesday.

They met at the American Legion Hall in Cisco at 10:30 p.m. for discussion and continued the tour to Eastland and Ranger. The group, consisting of District Commander Earnest B. Miller of Abilene and other interested members and executives, heard a proclamation read by County Judge Scott Bailey, declaring the month of April as World War I Veterans Visitation Month, and another signed by Eastland Mayor Frank Deaton.

The proclamation issued by Judge Bailey, reads as follows: "WHEREAS in the month of April 1917, the United States of America joined other Free Nations of the world in declaring a state of war against enemies of freedom in Europe. This mighty conflict became known as World War I. The State of Texas played a leading role in providing and training men for service in that great conflict. More than Two Hundred Thousand Texans served the Nation's Armed Forces and the State of Texas was the site of many of the principal military training camps.

"In recognition of this great service the Eastland County Courthouse was dedicated to the honor and memory of those who served during World War I.

"It is fitting that a grateful nation, state and county set aside a period to pay tribute to those patriotic Americans who fought to preserve our way of life, and who demonstrated a willingness to make the supreme sacrifice to protect our cherished liberty.

"THEREFORE, I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, Texas do designate the month of April, 1965 as

"WORLD WAR I VETERANS VISITATION MONTH in Eastland County, and urge all citizens to use this period to renew acquaintances among World War I Veterans, visit hospitalized veterans and give such other appropriate recognition to those patriotic citizens."

125 ATTEND ANNUAL PECAN BUDDING SCHOOL IN COUNTY

A total of 125 people from 25 counties took part Tuesday in the annual Eastland County Pecan Budding School held in Cisco under the sponsorship of the county pecan growers association, the county agent, the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and Cisco Junior College.

County Agent J. M. Cooper conducted a three-hour lecture and study session at Cisco Junior College's cafeteria Tuesday morning. Some 80 people from out-of-county were present, including 29 from Abilene.

Mr. Cooper, who has conducted similar schools for some 10 years, discussed the proper procedure in using budwood, storing it, and the techniques in budding trees. He had a good supply of budwood on hand for the use of those present.

After lunch in the cafeteria, the session reconvened at the

Kent Word pecan orchard along the Leon River, four miles south of Cisco, for a practical demonstration of budding and grafting. Those who desired were provided with equipment to practice the art.

Those who attended the orchard demonstration will be invited to return later to see the results of the experiments.

Oscar Schaefer of Cook, president of the county association, reported that the growers would meet in Cisco on May 17th at the First National Bank for their field day. The program will open with a program on insect control followed by a tour of orchards.

Mr. Schaefer and Mr. Cooper termed the annual school as a good success.

The agriculture committee of Cisco Junior College assisted with arrangements for the school.

Contractor Will Be Named Soon

Engineers were studying bids today for a contract to lay water and sewer lines across the Interstate 20 Highway route in South Cisco. Six firms submitted bids for the contract to do the work at a meeting of the City Commission last Tuesday night.

The commission met again Wednesday afternoon to study the matter further. Engineers Freeze and Nichols of Fort Worth, who are handling engineering details in the project, are expected to complete their analysis of the bids, which contain some 12 alternate proposals, in the next few days.

Low bidders were Anderson Construction Company, \$39,188.50, and Abilene Ditching Company, \$38,735.09. There were three Fort Worth and three Abilene firms submitting bids. The successful bidders will be named after the alternates are analyzed. City Secretary Hal Lavery reported.

The project will cost the City of Cisco in the neighborhood of \$6,000. The balance will be paid by the government as IH 20 is a federal road program. The city's costs will be in enlarging water and sewer mains to the highway right-of-way area in order that they will be able to handle the necessary volume after the lines are extended south of the route.

Mr. Lavery said it would be necessary to begin work soon as it must be completed by July 1 when the state highway department is expected to begin work on the IH 20 right-of-way.

Plans call for cast iron sewer lines and for the water lines to be in concrete conduit under the IH 20. This will make repairs possible without ever having to damage the highway.

In other action, the returns of the April 6th city election were canvassed and the results were certified as correct. The new mayor and commissioners will take office April 27th.

The council approved the construction of 13 new combination picnic tables and benches at Lake Cisco Park and the planting of grass in the newly improved area.

Bids for a new front-end loader were tabled for further study. The commission had asked for bids to buy the machine for the street department.

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Horseback Ride Through Texas' Is Described In Historical Magazine

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.)—An account of "Rutherford B. Hayes Horseback Ride through Texas" when the 9th U. S. President was a young Ohio lawyer is described in the current issue of the Southwestern Historical Quarterly, published by the Texas State Historical Association at The University of Texas.

Claude M. Gruener, a UT journalism graduate and editor of the Trans-Texas Airways Starliner, relates the resident's impressions of the Texas winter of 1848-49 while he was visiting a college friend, Guy Bryan, on his epfather's Brazoria County plantation.

Hayes took the horseback

sightseeing tour of central and coastal Texas with his uncle, who had accompanied him to Texas from Ohio, and Bryan in February and March of 1849.

They left Brazoria, a town of 200 people, and traveled through Columbia ("a pleasant village of 150 people"), Brenham, Bastrop, and into Austin, an "inconsiderable village with large expectations."

Hayes saw "not more than one or two passable buildings in the city." Several log cabins formed the hotel. The Capitol, "a low frame building on top of a gravelly hill," overlooked a town overrun with discharged Rangers, U. S. Army soldiers, gamblers, and a mixture of politicians.

Hayes and his group then proceeded to San Marcos, New Braunfels ("at the junction of two of the most beautiful streams I ever saw, the Guadalupe and the Comal"), and stayed for several weeks in San Antonio. While visiting the Alamo they found a "party of California emigrants cooking in the room where Crockett fell." He thought San Antonio was "the scene of more bloody fights than any other on the continent."

After returning to Brazoria by way of Seguin, Gonzales and Victoria, Hayes described the Texas landscape in a letter:

"It has the clear running streams of New England, skirted with heavy timber, high hills of smooth greensward, soil, rich and deep to the very top, here called rolling prairie, occasionally dotted with mottes of timber, resembling old orchards in an old cultivated country — except in the absence of buildings, fences and improvements. The Colorado, Guadalupe and San Antonio are the prettiest rivers I ever saw."

An oil producer was in prospect for the George P. Fee ranch two miles northeast of Cisco this week as pipe was being cemented in the Ben Hobbs et al of Dallas No. 1 Fee. The hole was bottomed at about 3,850 feet, it was reported.

There was a good oil show in the Ranger lime conglomerate at 3,632 feet, the report said, in a drill stem test last Sunday.

Completion tests were not due to begin before the coming weekend. The test, a wildcat, is located in the southeast quarter of Section

76, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Fred McCright of Cisco had the drilling contract. Elsewhere, Frank Slyter et al announced plans to re-enter a 3,500 foot hole they drilled several years ago as their No. 2 Albert Schor five miles south of Cisco. Plans called for deepening the hole. The test is on a 250-acre lease in Section 50, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

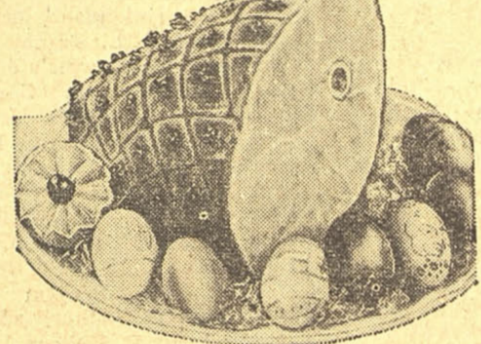

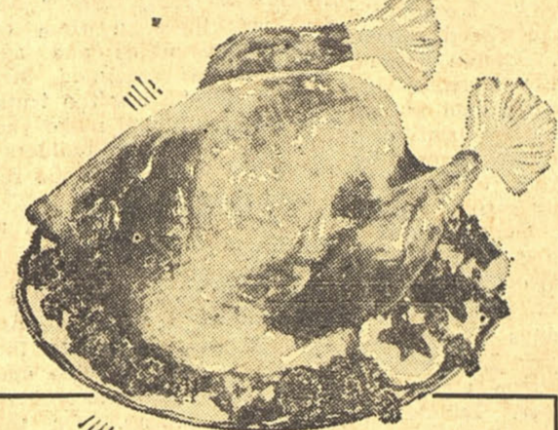

REPORT ON STUDENT COUNCIL CONVENTION BY CHS GROUP

The first meeting was at 7:30 p.m. The presidents of the host schools were introduced. The 1965 officers were introduced, and welcome speeches were made. The keynote speech was made by Lonnie Hayter, 1965 president of Texas Association of Student Councils. The theme of the convention was "I Must Know Myself." Lonnie's speech was centered around this theme. Lonnie said "You must first learn self-discipline. You cannot always win." In closing, Mr. Downing said, "People without a country in which to have pride fail."

Mr. Downing also received a standing ovation.

Following his address, the election results were announced. The following schools were elected: president, Monterey High School, Lubbock; vice president, Tascosa High, Tascosa; Parliamentarian, Hearne High School, Hearne. The convention was closed with a fellowship circle, in which all delegates crossed hands and sang "Auld Lang Syne." It was so sad to say good-bye to all the people you had met.
