

### **Trade Treaty With Canada**

THERE is a lot of kicking over the cutting of duties on certain articles imported from Canada provided for in the trade treat with Canada just concluded. The United States made reductions in the rates on 79 articles. The domestic groups affected by these cuts have set up a great howling, of course. They foresee economic ruin for a great part of the country. They do not complain about the cuts on 180 articles that Canada has allowed, giving the United States better trade opportunity than has been allowered any other non-British country.
