College Hill Reservoir Top Collapses Here

Part of the metal roof of the City of Cisco's water reservoir at College Hill collapsed over the weekend and repairs that could cost between \$50,000 and \$150,000 will be necessary, City Manager Mike Moore reported Monday.

A study of the new problems for the water system was being made Monday and Tuesday for the consideration of the City Council at their semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night, Aug. 27.

Water department workers were able to make temporary repairs at the reservoir during the weekend, Mr. Moore said. The diameter of the storage basin is some 75 feet, and the roof was built over it eight years ago.

The reservoir was drained and re-filled over the weekend.

Muddy water in lines over the city during the past few days has been the result of opening new valves recently installed in the system modernization program, Mr. Moore said. As the new lines went into use, the water's course through them often was reversed, causing collections of silt to be disturb-

The lines will eventually clear up, the city manager said.

The weekend reservoir problems did not cause the dirty water situation, he added, as the bad water that resulted there was drained before going into the system.

Scranton Academy Is Destroyed By Fire Friday

Scranton Academy, one of Eastland County's oldest landmarks, was destroyed by fire around 1 p.m. Friday, August 23. The dormitory that served the Scranton High School Academy around the turn of the century had only part of its rock walls standing after the

blaze was extinguished. Mrs. Paul Foster of Scranton reported that she saw smoke in the area about 12:50 p.m. Her husband said he saw a small fire burning about a quarter of a mile south of the old dormitory near a county road.

ing his pickup, Mr. Foster said the blaze was 100 yards wide and moving fast by the time he reached the spot where he saw the fire. He reported there was a brisk southwest wind.

Foster then called the fire department and started working to save his home which is situated about 500 yards from the old landmark. Foster said he used his garden hose to wet down his roof. The Fosters' home

"A private, coeducational school organized in 1903 to augment Scranton Public School (opened 1887).

"Scranton, a small farming-ranching community, was only 13 years old when citizens founded the academy, by public subscription. The school expanded rapidly, reaching an enrollment of 325 by 1910. At its peak all grade levels (then numbering 11) were taught.

"First president, O.C. Britton, presided 1903-1908.

jects, school offered a teacher training program. Physical plant consisted of a large classroom building, a 500-seat auditorium, two dorscientific mitories, laboratory, and library.

"During its lifetime, the Academy contributed much to the town's culture and its graduates entered many different walks of life. It closed with the advent of World War I in 1917.



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

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

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45 Expected To Die On Highways During Holiday said.

The Department of Public Safety estimates that as many as 45 persons may lose their lives in traffic acidents in Texas during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday

"This number is an estimate, not a prediction," said DPS Director Jim Adams. "We hope this number will prove to be far too high."

In 1984, 41 persons were killed in collisions during the holiday period, with five others dying later of injuries suffered on the Labor Day weekend.

In an effort to hold down the number of deaths, the DPS again this year will conduct Operation Motorcide, in which the deaths during the period beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, August 30 and ending at midnight Monday, Sept. 2 will be counted with periodic reports being made to the news media.

"Our philosophy is that public awareness of the number of people who are dying on our streets and

highways will make drivers more cautious and help reduce accidents," Adams

On Sept. 1, Texas' new mandatory safety belt law goes into effect. The law provides a 90-day grace period before fines can be assessed.

"We're hoping Texans will start getting in the habit of using safety belt," Adams said. "If the vast majority of motorists make a conscious effort to buckle up during this Labor Day holiday period, we will see a dramatic decrease in the number of deaths."

Last year, 28 of the 46 persons who died were killed in accidents where speed or drinking were factors, Adams said.

"That amounts to 61 per cent of the fatalities for the period," the director continued. "The message to Texas motorists is obvious: speeding and drunk driving

kill." In addition to conducting Operation Motorcide, the DPS will place additional troopers on duty to deal with the higher volume of traffic anticipated during the

NEWSPAPER QUESTIONS

1. Should the newspaper use the word suicide in its stories?

A. It may be better to err

on the side of conservatism, but not reporting fact could cause a suicide's relatives to field some tactless remarks from sympathizers who would be neither tact-less nor remark-able if they were clued in. Everyone does not swing on the gossip grapevine. However, this question seems to be one where the publisher might as well please himself as he will not manage to please everyone anyway.

2. Should drunk driving citations be listed?

A. Drunk diving citations should be listed because. while the effects of drunk driving may not be any more fatal than suicide, the potentiality for a greater number of fatalities is there. If a drunk could guarantee no one would be hurt but himself, I'd try to ignore the fun and games involved, even if illegal. But a drunk is breaking the law. A suicide isn't. It is illegal to try to commit suicide, but no charge for succeeding.

3. Should court cases be printed?

A. Court cases should be listed, at least. Comments should not be necessary, but reportial responsibilities to the public should be observ-

4. Should the newspaper cover shoplifting?

A. Coverage of shoplifting could be a delicate matter because of the possibility of kleptomania. If investigation distinguishes the positive different between 'the thief and the victim of kleptomania, my reaction would be to ignore the ill person but to sock it to the onery so-and-so who goes for the five-finger discount.

5. Should the newspaper run more photos than copy? A. One picture may be

worth a thousand words, but

this is true only if the pictures are well done and clearly identified. People do seem to be more eye-minded now. Pictures mean that he who runs may "read". Picture content probably is absorbed more quickly than

6. Should the newspaper place less emphasis on

word content.

A. Some sports fans always want more coverage; others may already know more than they care about. An exciting writer can whip up interest in a mumble-peg match; someone else could wipe out on a Cowboy-Steelers game. It seems to me that all the activities could be covered, but I would prefer to know all the names-the bench-warmers, the also-rans, the less-thanheroic players who provide the background for the stars. The best players, like

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7. Should the newspaper endorse national political candidates even though it

concentrates on local news? A. Endorsement of national political candidates could get sticky, but a newspaper should have access to wider sources than the average reader. News should be impartial as possible and obvous Public Relations material should be avoided or identified. However, readers usually value editorial opinions, whether they agree with them or not, and they use those opinions in making personal decisions on political issues. Such endorsements should definitely indicate the line of reasoning the writer followed to reach

the conclusion recorded.



Five Acres Bare, Pecans Rejuvenate, Plans For Seeding at Derailment Site

It has been three months since the train derailment and explosion in Eastland changed the lives of a number of people.

It also changed the face of the land near the Seaman Street Crossing of the Leon River. Few who saw that smouldering area right after the blast believed that any of the trees within a half-mile radius could survive.

But if you go down North Seaman St. now you will be surprised at what a comeback the vegetation has made. Most of the elm, pecan and oak trees which were not intially bulldozed down have put out fresh leaves.

It appears that natural things are programmed for survival, no matter what

kind of treatment they

Only about five acres of land, lying in a rough oval mostly south of the river, was stripped bare by the blast and chemical spill. Not even grass has come in to bandage that up.

The soil was reportedly plowed about four or five feet deep in that spot after the disaster, probably burying native seed along with chemicals and lime.

County Agent DeMarquis Gordon recently inspected some pecan trees which were near the blast site, and was very pleased to note that they had put out fresh green

The trees, located on the Jiminez place, were eviden-

long enough to kill them.

"Although the heat was intense enough to warp the siding on Mrs. Jiminez's house," Gordon says, "It did not burn into the cambium layer on the trees - that last layer of bark containing the growth cells.

"But a tree can have all its bark," he continued, "And still die if it loses all its leaves several times. The leaves make the food supply. It was hot enough during the May 24 blast to sear off a lot of leaves, but most of them have come back in time."

"That good rain in the days following the blast helped the vegetation to recover," the County Agent notes. "Any trees that have not put on new leaves by this it though," he says. At this time there has been

no plan announced to restore the blast site to a more normal appearance. Some of the damaged property is Railroad Right-Of-Way, and the other belongs to individuals.

The usual Soil Conservation proceedure in a situation of this type is to shape the gullies and seed the damaged area, so that it will not wash away if the river floods.

But, in the meanwhile - the good news is that the trees along the Leon are recovering, and things are looking much better.

Most poultry plants now pack poultry in ice and hold it at 28 degrees F., or chill the birds with nitrogen. The results of these quickchilling processes is a slight crusting of ice crystals on the surface of the birds.

"The surface feels frozen. but the inside is not, therefore the bird is still basically fresh," Hunt explains. These quick-chill techniques remove body

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heat from the poultry and preserve it enroute to the supermarket.

Once at the store, it will stay fresh in the refrigerator case for five to seven days.

Since fresh poultry crusted with ice crystals is not frozen, you can cook it using the same temperature and cooking time you use for unfrozen poultry, or you can freeze it for later use, says the nutritionist.

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
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Uganda Missionaries In Cisco For Home Furlough

The Rev. and Mrs. Harry Garvin, pictured above, are veterans of some 15 years in Uganda and departed from that troubled country on August 8th - three weeks ago - for their new home in Cisco and extended home furlough.

The Garvins, who live two miles west of Romney, were in Kenya, near Uganda, when the government was overthrown a few weeks ago. They were there on business for the Baptist Mission Board and visited the Rev. Ronnie Bostick and family while there. Mr. Bostick grew up in Cisco and was a

visitor here two years ago.

Despite the political unrest, the Garvins returned to their home in Uganda in the city of Soroti from Kenya. Their residence had not been distrubed. They had to go through several road blocks but were able to go in to participate in a church dedication before leaving for the USA. One mission home in the area was shelled and looted, Rev. Garvin said.

The Gravins are on official home leave until November and hope to remain until January. During the several months both Rev. Garvin and his wife, the former Doris Shott, will be speaking at assorted church programs throughout West Texas.

The Garvins were born and raised at Lueders and finished high school there. Rev. Garvin came to Cisco and attended Cisco Junior College in 1957 and 1958. He was a track star and captained the CJC track team in 1958. He went to Howard Payne University and graduatd in 1961 and then went to Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary for a graduate degree in 1969. Mrs. Garvin attended Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, Arkansas A&M and the Seminary.

Rev. Garvin was ordained as a gospel preacher in 1958 at the Union Baptist Church in the Cook Community, south of Cisco. The Rev. Benny Hagan, pastor at Corinth Baptist Church, took part in his ordination. He spent 13 years as a minister in Arkansas and Texas before they entered the mission field in

During his 15 years as a missionary, Rev. Garvin has been in Uganda except for a short stay in Keny. He speaks three languages. His work in Uganda includes organizing new churches and he has 45 to his credit. He also helps train native Uganda ministers.

During his years in Uganda, Rev. Garvin has worked with the Rev. Russell Pogue,

missioners' Court met during the morning and afternoon Aug. 26, and went into an Executive Session at 3 p.m. after the public meetings. Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Comm. Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, was absent due to illness. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

The first item under consideration concerned Red. 329 in Pct. 1, with a report by Hattie Williamson. "It's back to the same old problem," she said, reminding the Commissioners that she had appeared before the Court a number of times about an access road to her home. The roadway has been maintained by the County for many years. Now the ownership of the road is apparently disputed by an individual who owns the land on each side of it.

After a discussion Judge Bailey stated that the Commissioners Court could not make a ruling as to the land ownership and control - that only the District Court could make a determination as to the title on disputed land.

"I've tried every way to settle this in some other manner, but I'm fed up - I'm going to Court," Mrs. Williamson stated.

Another problem concerning land use surfaced when Attorney Jimmy Browning and several other persons with Tarrant Oil and Gas Corp. appeared before the Court, petitioning for access to 273.5 acres of state property lying along the Eastland-Stephens County line north of Ranger.

The property is surrounded by the Hagaman ranch, a large land holding which begins north of the American Car Company, and includes a lake once used by the city of Ranger for part of its water supply.

Browning explained that Tarrant Oil and Gas Corp. had leased the mineral rights of the state land, but had been denied access to same. A road presently exists to the property, he said, and other individuals and companies have access. He asked the Court about procedure.

Judge Scott Bailey stated that in his opinion the road giving access to the state property was once a 3rd Class County Road, but was abandoned at the request of the Ranger Industrial Foundation and the Railroad Car Facility around 1977. He said he would research this matter further.

It was suggested that Tarrant Oil and Gas Corp. file their petition with Jo Anne Johnson, County Clerk, and publish same in the local

The Eastland County Com- newspapers. Notices will also be posted, giving all interested parties a chance to appear before the Court. The Commissioners will take up the petition for access at a regular meeting at 10 a.m. Sept. 23.

In other business during the morning, Don A. Jones of Ranger was reappointed to the Board of Directors, Central Texas MHMR. This is a two-year appointment, expiring Aug. 31, 1987. Appreciation was expressed for the work of Mr. Jones in regard to MHMR.

Gilbert Meredith of Enserch Corp. brought a request for permission to cross County Roads 167 in Pct. 1 and 454 and 438 in Pct. 2 with pipelines. These are low pressure 12 in. and 8 in. gas gathering lines going to the Morton Valley Processing Plant. Approval was given.



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

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
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
