### Option Contract

An option contract that a Dallas company received last month to purchase the Laguna Hotel in Cisco was extended for 60 days by the board of regents of Cisco Junior College at a special meeting Monday night.

The Dallas concern obtained the option with the view of remodeling the hotel, which has been owned by CJC for a number of years, and using it as an apartment complex for senior citizens, as a place for over-night guests to rent rooms and as a possible dormitory for CJC students if needed, college officials said.

The Dallas concern has conducted one inspection trip to Cisco and requested the option time extension because they were unable to complete their study in the time period of the original contract, college officials said.

### Inch of Rain

### Falls In Cisco

### Area Tuesday

Approximately an inch of rain fell in the Cisco area during an early morning thunderstorm that was accompanied by a considerable electrical storm.

Lightning struck electric power lines near the Russell Newman Manufacturing Company plant on I-20 and north of town. West Texas Utilities Company service men were able to make repairs with a minimum of power interruption. Fire Chief Richard Connell and Fireman Joe Jarvis took a truck to the I-20 trouble area to stand by at 5:21 a.m.

Scranton reported six tenths of an inch, and the area around Romney received an inch of rain, according to reports. Lake Cisco reported nearly an inch of rain.

Cooler night-time temperatures were reported in the area early Monday and Tuesday. The thermometer dropped to 69 degrees Monday but soared to near 100 in the afternoon.

## CJC Accepting LVN Applications

Cisco Junior College is now accepting applications for the September 1985 Licensed Vocational Nursing program at Cisco.

In accord with certification requirements, applicants must make application in advance and pass a pre-entrance physical and examination.

The twelve month program will hold classes in Cisco with clinical work in the E.L. Graham Hospital and the Eastland Memorial Hospital in Eastland on a rotating basis.

Satisfactory completion of the program entitles the student to a certificate from the college, and qualifies him/her to take the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiner's examination.

A prospective student must be at least 17 years of age and must be in good physical and mental health. Students must be high school graduates or have successfully taken the GED examination establishing high school equivalency. The GED examination is given on the CJC main campus in Cisco.

Employment opportunities for a Licensed Vocational Nurse are very good; the demand for LVN's far surpasses the supply.

This week's program will be a scramble using the standard format, Mr. Puryear said.

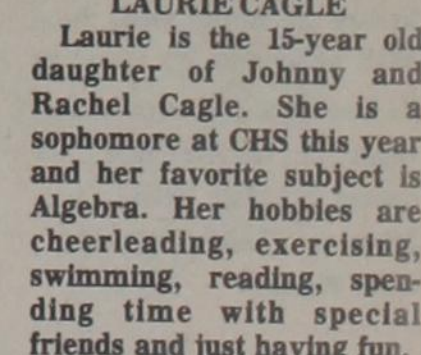

## CHS Football Squads Will Scrimmage Hawley There

Cisco High School football squads will travel to Hawley Thursday night, August 29, for their final scrimmage of the season. The Junior Varsity group will begin playing

at 6 p.m., followed by the Varsity around 7 p.m., according to Head Coach Doyle Walker.

Coach Walker said Hawley has a pretty good team this

year with about the same number of kids out for football as Cisco. He said they have some pretty big players with two running backs weighing about 180 pounds

each.

The coach said he and his staff were pleased with last week's scrimmage against Anson. He said Anson had a number of returning players who had varsity experience.

The Cisco Varsity squad will go with the same starting lineup they used last week, since Coach Walker said all the players are pretty well healthy. He said Jeff Dennis will play this week in the starting position at left guard. He missed last week's scrimmage due to an injury during practice.

Cisco finished their last two-a-days on Monday of this week. When school begins next week, they will have their 4 p.m. practice time only.

In last week's scrimmage, the Cisco JV scored one touchdown and held Anson scoreless throughout the time period. Joe Flores scored on a 21-yard run.

Cisco had a total of 122 yards (87 rushing and 35 passing) compared to Anson's 70 (56 rushing and 14 passing). In the first series of plays, Cisco had 87 total yards while Anson had 66; but, in the second series Cisco got 35 and Anson had only 4.

In the varsity scrimmage, Cisco and Anson each scored one touchdown. Anson scored in the first series and Cisco in the second. Cisco's score was made on a five-yard run by Kevin Kirk.

Cisco had 56 total yards in the first series (42 rushing and 14 passing) while Anson had 105 (90 rushing and 15 passing). In the second series, Cisco gained 90 yards (76 rushing and 14 passing) and Anson had 71 (57 rushing and 14 passing).

Cisco had a total for the scrimmage of 146 yards (118 rushing and 28 passing) compared to Anson's 176 yards (147 rushing and 29 passing).

## Superintendent & Board President Meet Parents

Around 30 people attended a meeting held Monday night at the Cisco High School auditorium. Cisco I.S.D. President, Allen McGinness and Ray Saunders, School Superintendent answered questions asked by local citizens.

Cisco parents were expecting a new addition to be added onto the Intermediate School. It was also thought the Primary School would no longer be in use by the time school was to start in September. But problems arose with the former architect and Tommy Huckabee of Huckabee and Donham of Andrews, will be the new architect.

The new building will increase the playground area since it will be constructed closer to Ave. H. It will also be connected by walkways and not be attached directly onto the old building.

The school board has contracted Hawk out of Clyde to build temporary toilet facilities for the intermediate schools. They will be decent said Mr. Saunders, and will have lavatories. When they are no longer needed at the In-

termediate they will be moved to the High School track field to be used there.

Mr. McGinness said the Primary School should have been torn down a long time ago, but the building is considered safe for students. He said Monday night he heard the school is a fire trap and he wanted to stop that rumor. He said it is not a fire trap since students can empty the building in less than one minute in a fire drill.

# Scranton Academy Is Destroyed By Fire Friday

Scranton Academy, one of Eastland County's oldest landmarks, was destroyed by fire around 1 p.m. Friday, August 23. The dormitory that served the Scranton High School Academy around the turn of the century had only part of its rock walls standing after the blaze was extinguished.

Mrs. Paul Foster of Scranton reported that she saw smoke in the area about 12:50 p.m. Her husband said he saw a small fire burning about a quarter of a mile south of the old dormitory near a county road.

Grabbing a hoe and driving his pickup, Mr. Foster said the blaze was 100 yards wide and moving fast by the time he reached the spot where he saw the fire. He reported there was a brisk southwest wind.

Foster then called the fire department and started working to save his home which is situated about 500 yards from the old landmark. Foster said he used his garden hose to wet down his roof. The Fosters' home was saved.

A Texas historical marker erected at the site in 1971

states the following about Scranton Academy:

"A private, coeducational school organized in 1903 to augment Scranton Public School (opened 1887).

"Scranton, a small farming-ranching community, was only 13 years old when citizens founded the academy, by public subscription. The school expanded rapidly, reaching an enrollment of 325 by 1910. At its peak all grade levels (then numbering 11) were taught.

"First president, O.C. Britton, presided 1903-1908.

He was followed by W.W. Griffin (1909), S.P. Collins (1910-1911), and J.E. Temple Peters (1911-1915). Under Peters, courses were standardized, a science program begun, and a modern laboratory and library added. Later presidents were J.W. Hawkins (1916) and L.E. Ratten (1917).

"Among early trustees were G.W. Bailey, F.G. Boyd, A.P. Brown, W.D. Clinton, W.T. Gattis, E.B. Lane, J.J. Ray, W.T. Rutherford, A.M. Sprawls, J.R. Sprawls, and John L. Woods.

"In addition to basic sub-

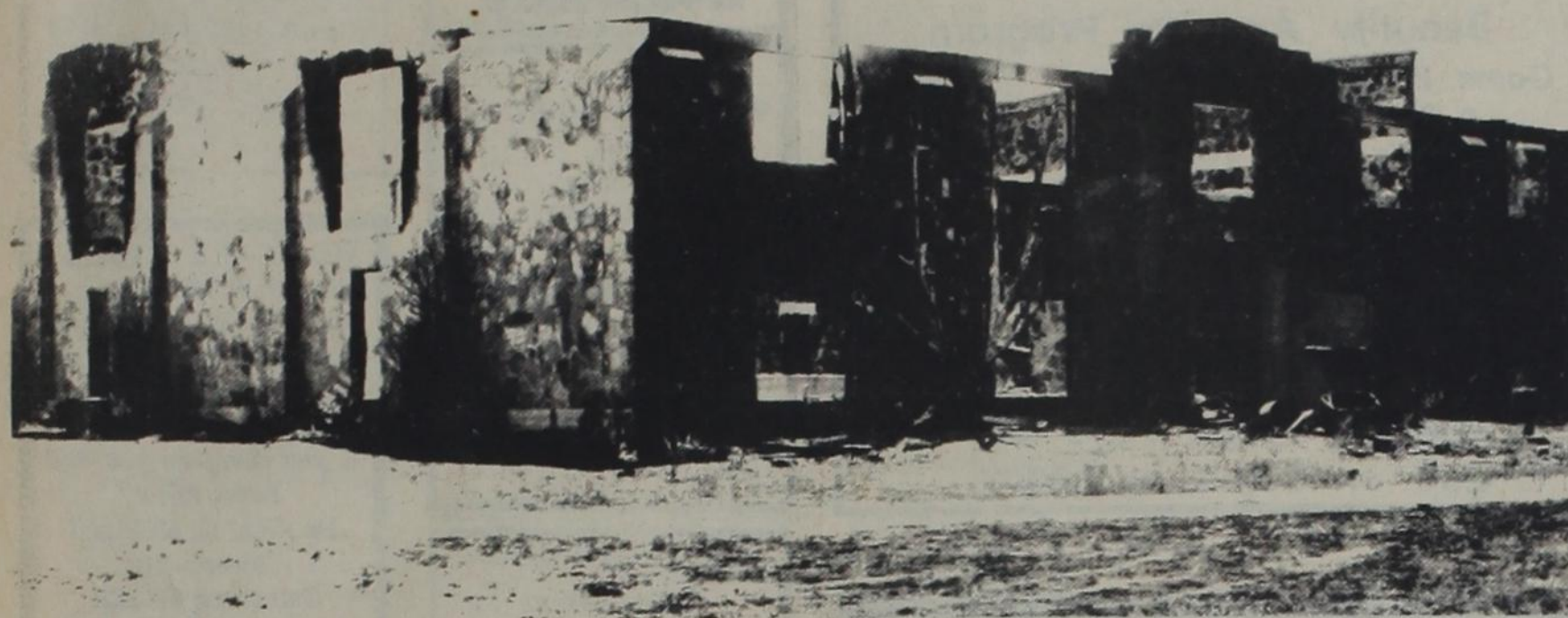
jects, school offered a teacher training program. Physical plant consisted of a large classroom building, a 500-seat auditorium, two dormitories, scientific laboratory, and library.

"During its lifetime, the Academy contributed much to the town's culture and its graduates entered many different walks of life. It closed with the advent of World War I in 1917."

The landmark school was located about a 1/2 mile west of Scranton. Scranton is about 13 miles southwest of Cisco.

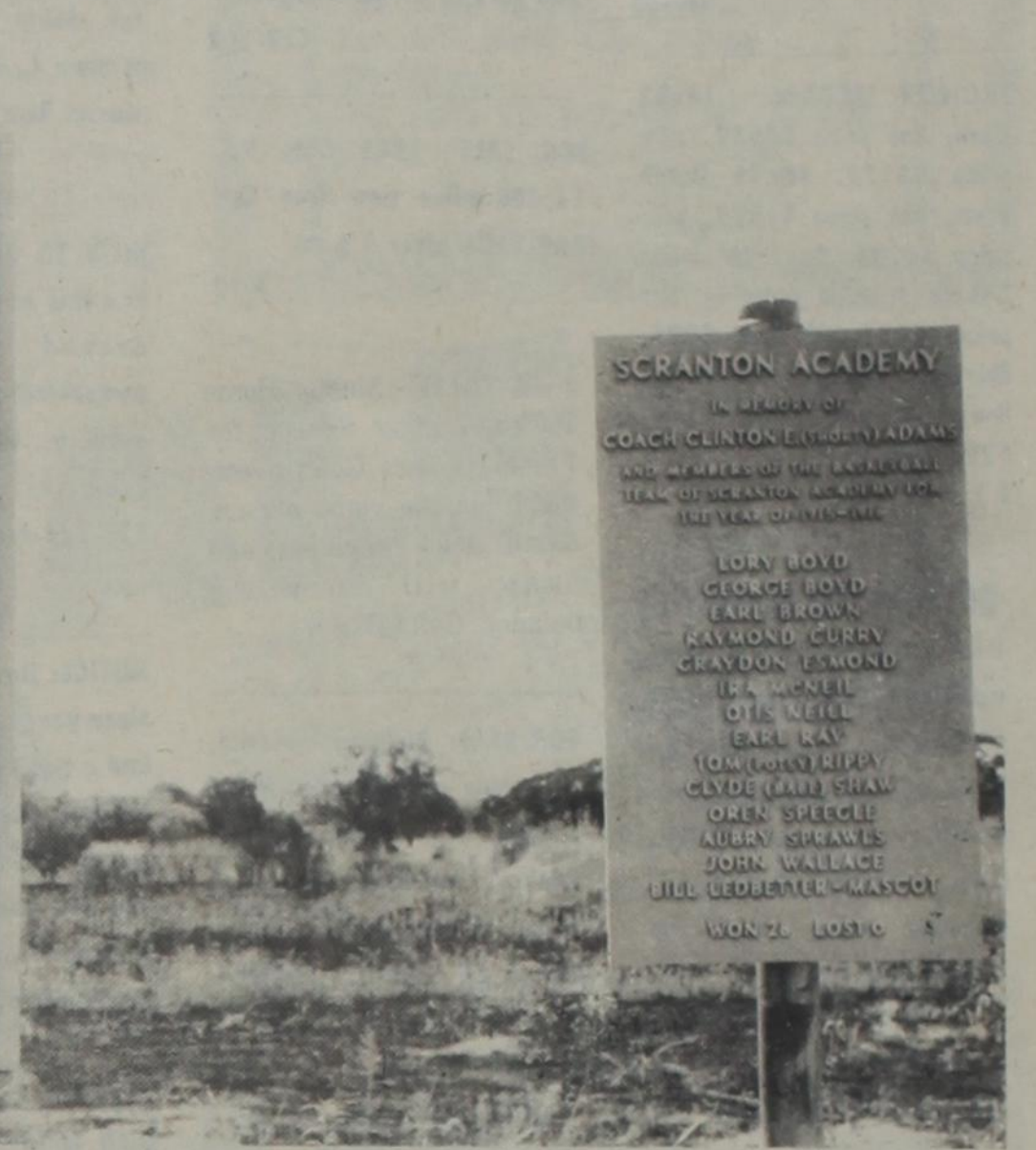
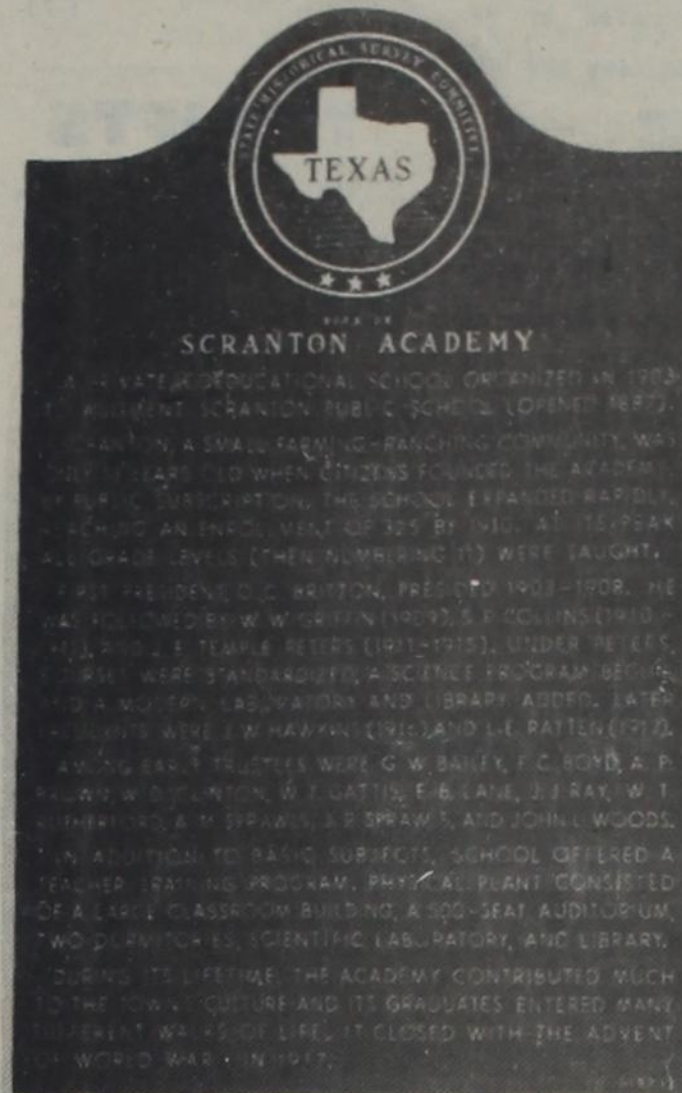

## 45 Expected To Die On Highways During Holiday

The Department of Public Safety estimates that as many as 45 persons may lose their lives in traffic accidents in Texas during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday period.

"This number is an estimate, not a prediction," said DPS Director Jim Adams. "We hope this number will prove to be far too high."

In 1984, 41 persons were killed in collisions during the holiday period, with five others dying later of injuries

highways will make drivers more cautious and help reduce accidents," Adams said.

On Sept. 1, Texas' new mandatory safety belt law goes into effect. The law provides a 90-day grace period before fines can be assessed.

"We're hoping Texans will start getting in the habit of using safety belt," Adams said. "If the vast majority of motorists make a conscious effort to buckle up during this Labor Day holiday period, we will see a dramatic decrease in the number of deaths."

Last year, 28 of the 46 persons who died were killed in accidents where speed or drinking were factors,

kill."

In addition to conducting Operation Motorcide, the DPS will place additional troopers on duty to deal with the higher volume of traffic anticipated during the period.

Adams said.

"That amounts to 61 percent of the fatalities for the period," the director continued. "The message to Texas motorists is obvious: speeding and drunk driving

# Spotlights and Sidelights

by Julia Worthy

**NEWSPAPER QUESTIONS**

- Should the newspaper use the word suicide in its stories?  
A. It may be better to err on the side of conservatism, but not reporting fact could cause a suicide's relatives to field some tactless remarks from sympathizers who would be neither tactless nor remarkable if they were clued in. Everyone does not swing on the gossip grapevine. However, this question seems to be one where the publisher might as well please himself as he will not manage to please everyone anyway.
- Should drunk driving citations be listed?  
A. Drunk driving citations should be listed because, while the effects of drunk driving may not be any more fatal than suicide, the potentiality for a greater number of fatalities is there. If a drunk could guarantee no one would be hurt but himself, I'd try to ignore the fun and games involved, even if illegal. But a drunk is breaking the law. A suicide isn't. It is illegal to try to commit suicide, but no charge for succeeding.
- Should court cases be printed?  
A. Court cases should be listed, at least. Comments should not be necessary, but reportorial responsibilities to the public should be observed.
- Should the newspaper cover shoplifting?  
A. Coverage of shoplifting could be a delicate matter because of the possibility of kleptomania. If investigation distinguishes the positive different between the thief and the victim of kleptomania, my reaction would be to ignore the ill person but to sock it to the onery so-and-so who goes for the five-finger discount.
- Should the newspaper run more photos than copy?  
A. One picture may be worth a thousand words, but this is true only if the pictures are well done and clearly identified. People do seem to be more eye-minded now. Pictures mean that he who runs may "read". Picture content probably is absorbed more quickly than word content.
- Should the newspaper place less emphasis on sports?  
A. Some sports fans always want more coverage; others may already know more than they care about. An exciting writer can whip up interest in a mumble-peg match; someone else could wipe out on a Cowboy-Steelers game. It seems to me that all the activities could be covered, but I would prefer to know all the names—the bench-warmers, the also-rans, the less-than-heroic players who provide the background for the stars. The best players, like cream, rise to the top, and s/he earns it, but let us not forget the curds-and-why that support the cream.
- Should the newspaper endorse national political candidates even though it concentrates on local news?  
A. Endorsement of national political candidates could get sticky, but a newspaper should have access to wider sources than the average reader. News should be impartial as possible and obvious Public Relations material should be avoided or identified. However, readers usually value editorial opinions, whether they agree with them or not, and they use those opinions in making personal decisions on political issues. Such endorsements should definitely indicate the line of reasoning the writer followed to reach the conclusion recorded.



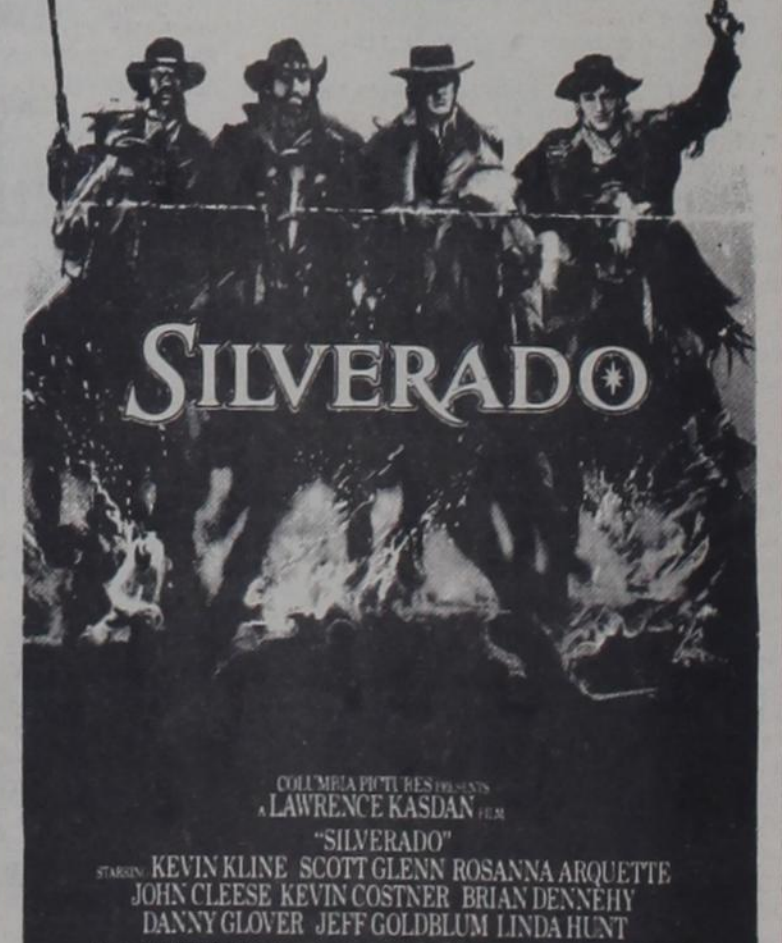

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## Five Acres Bare, Pecans Rejuvenate, Plans For Seeding at Derailment Site

It has been three months since the train derailment and explosion in Eastland changed the lives of a number of people.

It also changed the face of the land near the Seaman Street Crossing of the Leon River. Few who saw that smoldering area right after the blast believed that any of the trees within a half-mile radius could survive.

But if you go down North Seaman St. now you will be surprised at what a comeback the vegetation has made. Most of the elm, pecan and oak trees which were not initially bulldozed down have put out fresh leaves.

It appears that natural things are programmed for survival, no matter what

kind of treatment they receive.

Only about five acres of land, lying in a rough oval mostly south of the river, was stripped bare by the blast and chemical spill. Not even grass has come in to bandage that up.

The soil was reportedly plowed about four or five feet deep in that spot after the disaster, probably burying native seed along with chemicals and lime.

County Agent DeMarquis Gordon recently inspected some pecan trees which were near the blast site, and was very pleased to note that they had put out fresh green leaves.

The trees, located on the Jimenez place, were evidently not exposed to the heat

long enough to kill them.

"Although the heat was intense enough to warp the siding on Mrs. Jimenez's house," Gordon says, "It did not burn into the cambium layer on the trees - that last layer of bark containing the growth cells.

"But a tree can have all its bark," he continued, "And still die if it loses all its leaves several times. The leaves make the food supply. It was hot enough during the May 24 blast to sear off a lot of leaves, but most of them have come back in time."

"That good rain in the days following the blast helped the vegetation to recover," the County Agent notes. "Any trees that have not put on new leaves by this time will probably not make

it though," he says.

At this time there has been no plan announced to restore the blast site to a more normal appearance. Some of the damaged property is Railroad Right-Of-Way, and the other belongs to individuals.

The usual Soil Conservation procedure in a situation of this type is to shape the gullies and seed the damaged area, so that it will not wash away if the river floods.

But, in the meanwhile - the good news is that the trees along the Leon are recovering, and things are looking much better.

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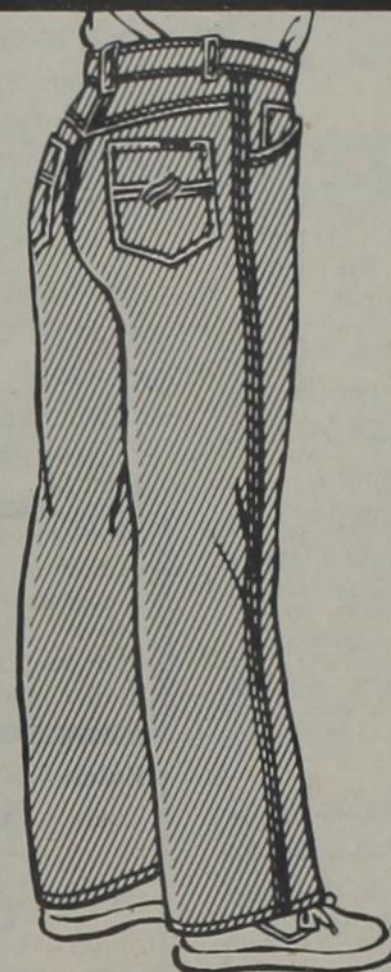
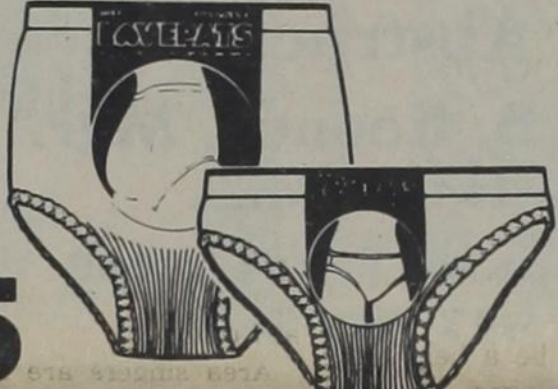
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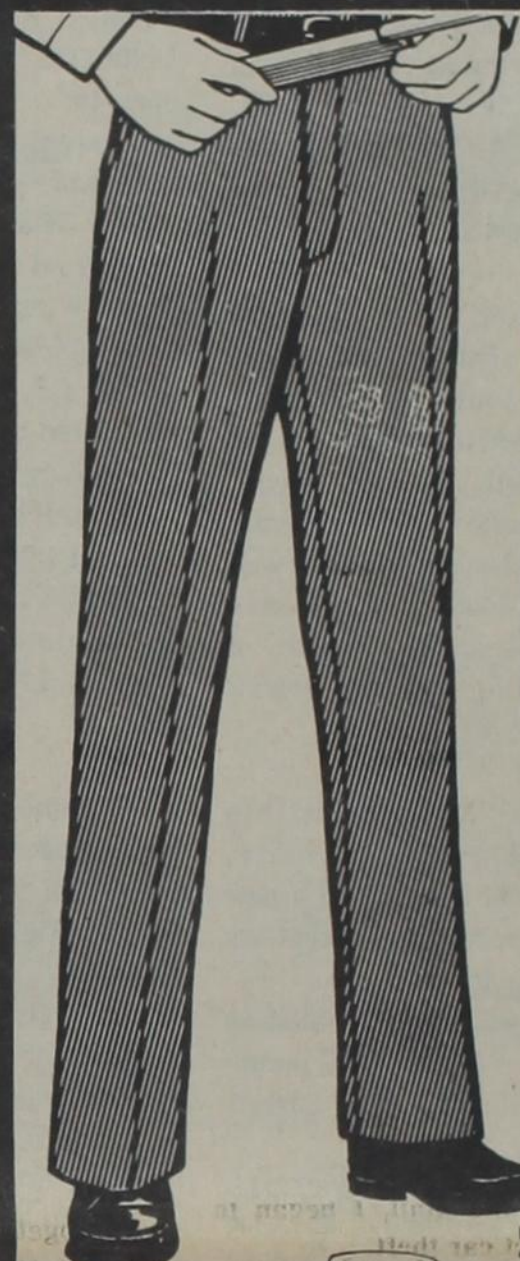

A wildcat gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County, with Jones Co. as the operator.

Located eight miles north-northeast of Desdemona, the well is in the M.J. Robinson Survey, A-1819. It is designated as the No. 1 Alice E. Allen Heirs.

On a 16/64 choke, it flowed 972,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 1,590,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 3,660 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Lime Formation, 3,131 to 3,137 feet into the hole.

Snow Oil Co. has filed first production figures on two new oil wells in the REB Field. Drillsites are five and six miles north of Eastland in the H&TC Survey, A-298 and A-967, Eastland County.

The No. 2 Germany "4" and No. 2 Germany-West will pump at the combined rate of 64 barrels daily.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 2 W. Parish, a 4,000-ft. developmental well in the Cameron Field, Eastland County. The operation will be located six miles east-northeast of Cisco in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-1022. The operator is Chase-Mann Petroleum of Fort Worth.

The No. 1 Van-Geem-Lewis Unit, a 4,000-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Eastland Regular Field. Northridge Corp. of Duncanville is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 40-acre lease one mile north of Eastland in the H&TC Survey, A-1347.

At a location within Breckenridge township, Ridge Oil has finalized a new oil producer in the Stephens Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Brown Unit, pumping at the rate of 49 barrels per day.

Location is in the LAL Survey. Bottomed at 3,350 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Caddo Lime Formation, 3,231 to 3,235 feet into the hole.

Stephens County's Regal Field gained a new producer when Trinity Exploration completed the No. 2 Crompton one mile southwest of Eolian.

## Consumers Concerned About Buying Poultry

Some Texas consumers are expressing concern about buying poultry labeled as "fresh", only to discover at home that it seems partially frozen, says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt.

According to United States Department of Agriculture rules, a poultry product may be labeled fresh as long as it

is not completely frozen, even though there may be a slight frozen crust on the surface, she says. Poultry is classified as frozen when it's held at zero degrees until it's frozen solid.

Most poultry plants now pack poultry in ice and hold it at 28 degrees F., or chill the birds with nitrogen. The results of these quick-chilling processes is a slight crusting of ice crystals on the surface of the birds.

"The surface feels frozen, but the inside is not, therefore the bird is still basically fresh," Hunt explains. These quick-chill techniques remove body

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# Uganda Missionaries In Cisco For Home Furlough

The Rev. and Mrs. Harry Garvin, pictured above, are veterans of some 15 years in Uganda and departed from that troubled country on August 8th - three weeks ago - for their new home in Cisco and extended home furlough.

The Garvins, who live two miles west of Romney, were in Kenya, near Uganda, when the government was overthrown a few weeks ago. They were there on business for the Baptist Mission Board and visited the Rev. Ronnie Bostick and family while there. Mr. Bostick grew up in Cisco and was a visitor here two years ago.

Despite the political unrest, the Garvins returned to their home in Uganda in the city of Soroti from Kenya. Their residence had not been disturbed. They had to go through several road blocks but were able to go in to participate in a church dedication before leaving for the USA. One mission home in the area was shelled and looted, Rev. Garvin said.

The Garvins are on official home leave until November and hope to remain until January. During the several months both Rev. Garvin and his wife, the former Doris Shott, will be speaking at assorted church programs throughout West Texas.

The Garvins were born and raised at Lueders and finished high school there. Rev. Garvin came to Cisco and attended Cisco Junior College in 1957 and 1958. He was a track star and captained the CJC track team in 1958. He went to Howard Payne University and graduated in 1961 and then went to Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary for a graduate degree in 1969. Mrs. Garvin attended Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, Arkansas A&M and the Seminary.

Rev. Garvin was ordained as a gospel preacher in 1958 at the Union Baptist Church in the Cook Community, south of Cisco. The Rev. Benny Hagan, pastor at Corinth Baptist Church, took part in his ordination. He spent 13 years as a minister in Arkansas and Texas before they entered the mission field in 1970.

During his 15 years as a missionary, Rev. Garvin has been in Uganda except for a short stay in Kenya. He speaks three languages. His work in Uganda includes organizing new churches and he has 45 to his credit. He also helps train native Uganda ministers.

During his years in Uganda, Rev. Garvin has worked with the Rev. Russell Pogue,

formerly of the First Baptist Church here, and the Rev. Jim Hooten, former Eastland and Cisco minister. The Garvins visited the Hootens just before the July 27th government overthrow.

The unrest that resulted in the government change was fostered by supporters of Edie Amin, described by Rev. Garvin as the world's No. 1 murderer since Adolph Hitler. He doubts that Amin will ever return to power in Uganda.

Word reaching the Garvins from Uganda indicates that conditions are still far from normal, he said.

The Garvin's home south of Cisco was built largely by members of local Baptist congregations who donated

labor and materials. "We're proud of our home and expect this community to be our home base for many years," they said.

The Garvins are the parents of six children. Their daughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. Rodney Burkman, live near their Romney home. A son, Burt, 28, is married and lives at Danbury, near Houston. Another son, Kenneth 24, lives at Little Rock, Ark., and works as a pilot. Deborah, 21, is a student at H-SU. Rebecca, 15, and Angie, 9, are students in the Cisco Public Schools.

In their numerous speaking engagements, the Garvins show picture slides made during their years in the mission field.

## Commissioners Meet Monday

The Eastland County Commissioners' Court met during the morning and afternoon Aug. 26, and went into an Executive Session at 3 p.m. after the public meetings. Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Comm. Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, was absent due to illness. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

The first item under consideration concerned Red. 329 in Pct. 1, with a report by Hattie Williamson. "It's back to the same old problem," she said, reminding the Commissioners that she had appeared before the Court a number of times about an access road to her home. The roadway has been maintained by the County for many years. Now the ownership of the road is apparently disputed by an individual who owns the land on each side of it.

After a discussion Judge Bailey stated that the Commissioners Court could not make a ruling as to the land ownership and control - that only the District Court could make a determination as to the title on disputed land.

"I've tried every way to settle this in some other manner, but I'm fed up - I'm going to Court," Mrs. Williamson stated.

Another problem concerning land use surfaced when Attorney Jimmy Browning and several other persons with Tarrant Oil and Gas Corp. appeared before the Court, petitioning for access to 273.5 acres of state property lying along the Eastland-Stephens County line north of Ranger.

The property is surrounded by the Hagaman ranch, a large land holding which begins north of the American Car Company, and includes a lake once used by the city of Ranger for part of its water supply.

Browning explained that Tarrant Oil and Gas Corp. had leased the mineral rights of the state land, but had been denied access to same. A road presently exists to the property, he said, and other individuals and companies have access. He asked the Court about procedure.

Judge Scott Bailey stated that in his opinion the road giving access to the state property was once a 3rd Class County Road, but was abandoned at the request of the Ranger Industrial Foundation and the Railroad Car Facility around 1977. He said he would research this matter further.

It was suggested that Tarrant Oil and Gas Corp. file their petition with Jo Anne Johnson, County Clerk, and publish same in the local

newspapers. Notices will also be posted, giving all interested parties a chance to appear before the Court. The Commissioners will take up the petition for access at a regular meeting at 10 a.m. Sept. 23.

In other business during the morning, Don A. Jones of Ranger was reappointed to the Board of Directors, Central Texas MHMR. This is a two-year appointment, expiring Aug. 31, 1987. Appreciation was expressed for the work of Mr. Jones in regard to MHMR.

Gilbert Meredith of Enserch Corp. brought a request for permission to cross County Roads 167 in Pct. 1 and 454 and 438 in Pct. 2 with pipelines. These are low pressure 12 in. and 8 in. gas gathering lines going to the Morton Valley Processing Plant. Approval was given.

Meredith explained that on May 22 the name of the Exploration part of Enserch Corp. was changed to E P Operating Co. and will be so known in the future.

The meeting adjourned for noon, and reconvened at 1:15 p.m.

## Rotary Hears Of City's Water Improvements
