West Virginia Man Drowns Sunday Evening In Lake Cisco During Outing

A young employee of a transient electric contracting crew lost his life late Sunday when he drowned while attempting to rescue a child's toy at Lake Cisco.

The young man was Bradley J. Williams, 25, of Hurricane, West Virginia, an

employee of Osmose Construction Company, a wood preserving firm, working under contract for an area utility company. He lived at the J&M Motel and had been here a short time.

Mr. Williams had gone to the point area on the south

shore of Lake Cisco for an outing with two fellow workers.

A small boat belonging to a child, who was playing in the water, was noticed 100 to 125 yards out from shore. Mr. Williams swam to the boat and started back with it

when he went under in water some 20 feet deep.

Cisco firemen and police were notified at 7:54 p.m. and organized a search, which was coordinated by Detective Sergeant Tom Barrett and Fire Chief Richard Connell. The body

was located at 10:10 p.m.

Three certified divers Police Chief Billy Rains, Policeman Chris Keyes, and Jeff Cathy, all of Cisco — and eight boats took part in the search. A portable generator with lights was brought to the scene by Johnny Cagle of

Cisco. Luther Maxwell, justice of the peace of Precinct 2, Ranger, was a member of the Ranger Fire Department crew helping with rescue efforts and he conducted an inquest after the body was found, pronouncing the young man dead by drowning.

Also helping in the search for the body were Eastland Fire Department members, Eastland police, the Eastland County Sheriff's Department, Kenneth Payne of the Parks and Wildlife Department, DPS Trooper Steve Tone, and a group of Cisco police and fire department members.

The Cisco Fire Department's rescue unit with radio equipment was used as the communications center by the coordinators.

The body was taken to Cisco Funeral Home by Patterson Ambulance.

Sometime after midnight, authorities contacted the young man's parents in Thornville, Ohio. Mr. Williams' billfold showed that he had a Colorado driver's license and that he had worked for Osmose in Waco, Fort Worth, and Ranger during the past year.

Cisco Funeral Home placed the body on an airliner at D-FW Airport at 7 a.m. Tuesday for a flight to Hurricane, West Virginia. Funeral services were planned there with Chapman Funeral Home in charge.

Surviving the young man are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Williams of Thornville, Ohio, and one sister, Janice Haltswanger of Lawton, Okla. He was not married.

The 1985 season opens Sept. 5 with a junior varsity game with De Leon here and Sept. 6 with the Cisco varsity at De Leon.

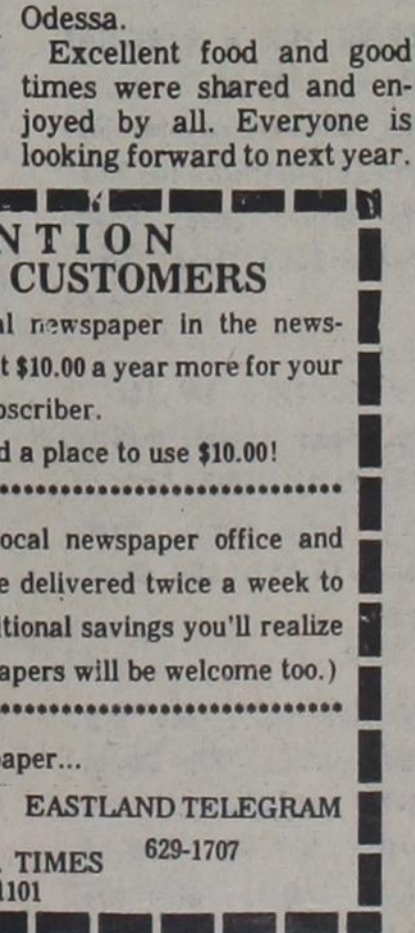
Local Man Arrested In Parking Lot

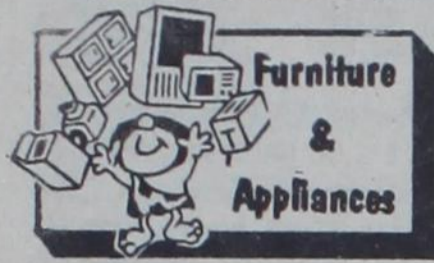

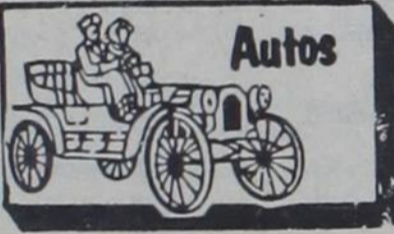

Back-to-school clothes this year for your youngster come in both classic and romantic styles. Others are down right trendy. In many ways, girls will be dressing like miniature adults. But they are still children, and their fancy clothes can easily get soiled during the course of a normal day. For this reason, I would like to suggest buying garments that are machine washable and dryable.

Trendy looks include the big shirt and stirrup pants. Both are basics that can be combined with short vests, miniskirts and shirt dresses. As in adult fashion, layering is the key for achieving the trendy look.

In general, tops of all sorts are oversized. Big vests, cardigans and pullovers are especially stylish. Often these precocious fashions are brought down to earth with such classic preppy touches as emblems, crests, brass buttons and skinny ties.

These symbols of affluent childhood appear most often on varsity-like sweaters and blazers. Other dashes of class-suspenders and cuffed pants--contribute to the boarding school look.

Vestiges of the boarding school classic, tartan plaids, have been updated and intensified with piled on plaids, stripes, checks and prints. They are the starting point for mixing and matching separates.

Pants are clean cut, with fewer pockets and zippers than in the past. The aim is a neat silhouette that layers easily.

Dresses are most romantic than last year's and no single shape is "it." Drop waists and fitted waists are both popular. Accents like belts and bows are common. Jumpers and split skirts are popular. But the real romance lies in the many prints and colors available.

3 to 4 teaspoons artificial sweetener
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 box powdered pectin
Crush peaches in saucapan. Stir in lemon juice, powdered pectin and artificial sweetener. Bring to a boil 1 minute stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Continue to stir 2 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars. Put on cap and screw-band. When cool, store in refrigerator. Yield 2 1/2 half-pints.

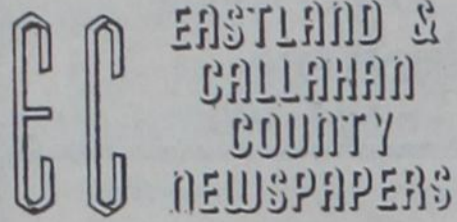

CHILD ABUSE

...DEFINITIONS...

"There's none so blind as he who will not see," but perhaps "he" doesn't know what he is observing.

Some definitions to be studied and given careful thought are in order. Why? Because.

The main "because" is that when you use the Child Abuse Hot Line number (1-800-252-5400), someone else will get a busy signal, so be sure you know what you are reporting.

The broad meaning of child abuse is the repeated mistreatment or neglect of a child.

The Texas Department of Human Resources further breaks this down into four areas, and I quote:

PHYSICAL - shaking, beating, burning, failure to provide adequate food or clothing.

VERBAL - excessive yelling, teasing, name-calling.

EMOTIONAL - failure to provide warmth, attention, supervision, normal childhood experiences.

SEXUAL - using a child in, or exposing a child to, sexual activities with or without the child's consent."

Physical abuse and neglect are the most easily identified of these four types of mistreatment defined, but even here true identification is complicated because accidents do happen. Personally, I do not believe I have missed a sharp corner in all my life; they simply reach out and get me.

Bruises, abrasions and contusions are much easier to see than the emotional or verbal abuses, though they probably were accompanied by both of the latter.

Inadequate clothing is obvious. A child of school age needing help has a better chance to get it than the preschooler. Absenteeism is frowned upon more than ever because the money the school is allocated depends upon the ADA (average daily attendance).

Hunger and illness get closer attention at school. The breakfast and lunch programs cope with the first, and the school nurse is available for the second. This does not absolve the individual from looking out for the youngsters who fall through the cracks in the system. Child abuse and/or neglect is against the law in Texas and so is "the failure to report suspected cases of mistreatment to a law enforcement agency and to the Texas Department of Human Resources."

Reports are held in strict confidence, and protection from civil or criminal liability is accorded the person reporting suspected child abuse or neglect.

So...why do child abusers so often go unreported? Part of the problem is the possibly overdeveloped human trait that says, "Don't get involved."

Too, despite the fact that child abuse recognizes no race nor socioeconomic levels, it does happen most often outside the "normal" social system.

"Children," reports the TDHR, "are most often abused by a parent or someone living in the child's home."

The report includes these things to check when considering whether to make a report of child abuse: Is the family living away from relatives, lonely, with few friends? Is there financial stress? Could a new baby, a recent move, or marital problems cause the parents to take out their frustrations on the children?

Statistics tell us that most abusive parents were abused while growing up. About 90% of them do love their children and hate themselves because they harm them. They want to stop. They swear to stop. Without help, they cannot stop.

The remaining 10% are sadistic mongrels (and I apologize to all the "Heinz 57" dogs I've ever known) who do not think it is wrong to knock their kids around like ten pins.

However, and this is a most emphatic "however," so please take note: The goal of the Texas DHR is to keep a family together and to make a home safe for the

Butter Blends Growing In Popularity

Americans eat more margarine than butter, but many still prefer the flavor of butter.

That's one reason for the growing popularity of new butter-blend and butter-flavored products, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

While the split between butter and margarine consumption was about half and half 25 years ago, margarine consumption is now about twice that of butter, says Marilyn Haggard.

Butter blends are so new that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has no consumption figures compiled. But preliminary figures from the National Cheese Institute show that the butter blends have cut more into margarine than butter sales. "Evidently, some consumers would like to afford the flavor of real butter and find the blends a more desirable substitute than pure margarine," she explains.

Now consumers can also choose "buttery" flavored oils and vegetable shortenings or artificially flavored seasonings, condiments and other foods such as butter flavored salt or syrup.

Snack foods and side dishes such as butter flavored pretzels and dehydrated pasta and rice products flavored with butter are also in the markets.

Butter-flavored granules are made partially with dried butter and designed to be reconstituted. The butter granules can replace butter in many recipes and provide the butter flavor with fewer calories, the nutritionist says.

"Label-reading is a must when buying these new butter flavored products," Haggard cautions. For example, one spread with the word "butter" in its name contains no butter. It's made of 75 percent soybean oil, but does list sweet cream butter-milk among the ingredients.

children.

They do not have the time nor the personnel to spend on spiteful reports from malicious neighbors. The "reporter" is safely anonymous, but the DHR workers "have extremely difficult jobs. To be effective, they must learn to cope with hostile, involuntary clients, hazardous working conditions, and with the stress of making life or death decisions."

How does your job description compare with that?

Child abuse reports were so numerous by 1979 that priority ratings for order of investigation were established. We expect to continue with this subject in the next column.

Born July 2, 1920, in Laurel near Strawn she married Andy Leflore on December 17, 1943 in Ranger. She was a member of the Assembly of God Church.

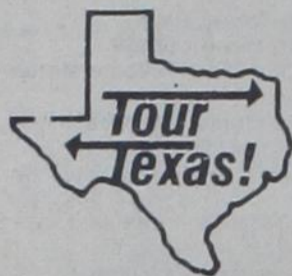

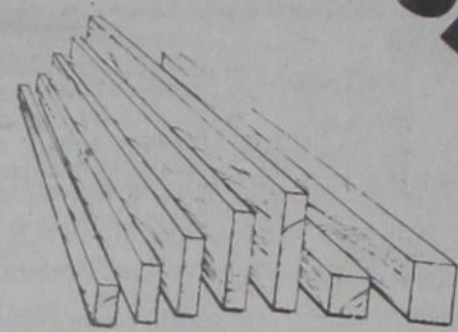

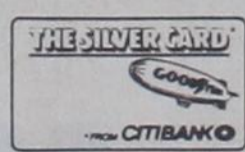

Do You Remember When?

Do you remember those slender-necked milk bottles which tapered down to a much larger circumference at the bottom? The stopper consisted of a cardboard disk about the size of a fifty-cent piece. In the middle of the stopper there was a small lift-up tab, except that the tab didn't always lift up. If the old thumbnail couldn't pry it up, then you resorted to some kind of a tool, usually a fork or a knife.

Occasionally, the tab would become shredded into uselessness, and then you began stabbing your weapon at the edge of the stopper, hoping to pop the stopper out. But the stopper was always too tightly wedged to surrender to your urgings. Instead of popping up, the stopper buckled downward on one side and shot up on the other side, leaving an escape route for the milk, which spurted out generously right in your face. Remember?

And remember the contents in the neck of the bottle? It was a rich cream which floated on top of the milk. You could pour the cream off for separate use, or you could have a really rich glass of milk by just rotating the bottle and mixing the cream in with the milk.

Do you remember the early cardboard milk cartons, the ones with the heavy wax coating? I remember as a kid how I used to rake my thumbnail up the side of these milk cartons, always intrigued as to how the wax coating would peel off in long spirals.

These waxed cartons were designed with a lift-out spout. Once again, a tool was sometimes required if you had a weak thumbnail. However, they didn't pose the same spurting hazard as the old milk bottles.

Do you remember the ice trucks? Or perhaps even the ice wagon? (I don't go as far back as the ice wagon). Do you recall the little square cardboard sign you placed in the window to let the ice man know what size block of ice you wanted?

Do you remember when motels were first known as "tourist courts"? Do you remember that extravagantly palatial motel - "Western Hills" - which was built on the west side of Ft. Worth on highway 80? Well, it really makes me feel old when I consider that many readers can't even remember when it was torn down.

Do you remember when cars had running boards? And when turning signals were first offered as an "extra" on a car? An extra you had to pay extra for.

Do you remember the fast Hudson Hornet? the rocket-nosed Studebaker? the big Packard? And the Kaiser

and Frazier automobiles? And the big-grilled Buicks? It seems that Buick kept that big-toothed grill, which looked like a giant set of chromed teeth, for more than twenty years.

Do you remember when the locomotive steam engine was the norm and its replacement - the diesel locomotive - was the novelty?

Do you remember when the cafes and restaurants first began advertising "Air Conditioned" on their front doors? (The air conditioning was evaporative coolers). And Kool cigarettes very cleverly capitalized on the new cool craze by posting a decal on their penguin logo on the entrance door to these eating places. The penguin beckoned the patrons in with this invitation: "Come on in. It's 'Kool' inside."

And how did we ever cook without aluminum foil, saran wrap, and paper towels? I can't even remember what I stuffed trash in before plastic bags came along.

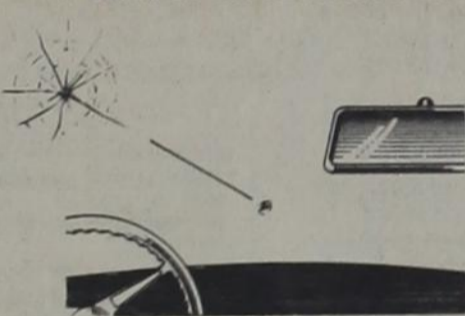

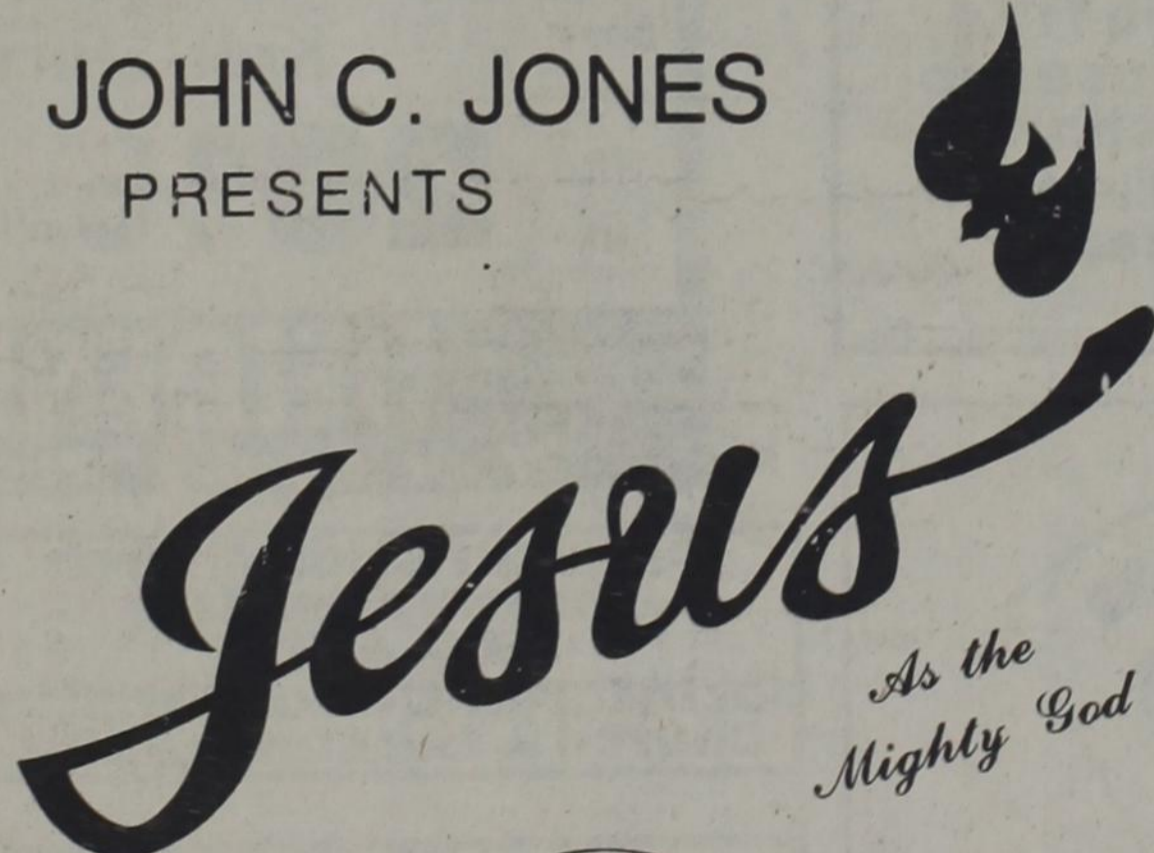

Significant Book From Judge Charles A. Loreto

Some books hold my interest only as long as it takes to scan through them. Others are absorbing enough for one slow reading. But when a book such as "In The Name Of Justice" keeps drawing me back over and over, I realize that I have found a significant publication.

This book, with the subtitle "With Compassion In Judging", was written by Judge Charles A. Loreto, former Chief of Justice of the New York Supreme Court. Photographs and cartoons accompany the text.

The volume was published recently by Todd and Hoenywell Press, Great Neck, New York, and has received enthusiastic reviews from Judges, educators and laymen.

Judge Loreto and his wife Rosalie (Leslie) have a home in Stony Brook L.I. New York and another in Eastland, where they spend a great deal of their time. Rosalie Loreto is a daughter of the late Judge W.P. Leslie of Eastland, Chief Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals for a number of years.

One of her brothers, the late W.A. Leslie, lived in Eastland, and Mrs. W.A. Leslie still resides here. Another brother, Charles Robert Leslie, lives in Houston.

"In The Name of Justice" has been called "The story of one man who endeavored to make a difference". Charles Loreto, born in 1902 in New York City, was the son of Italian immigrants. They taught him the value of high ideals, sacrifice and hard work, and he worked at the building trade to pay for his education in Columbia College and Columbia Law School.

Loreto was elected to the New York Municipal Court for 12 years, then was appointed to the New York State Supreme Court, First Judicial District, by New York Governor Averill Harriman. The following year he was elected to a full fourteen year term, serving on that Court as Justice from 1957 until he retired in 1972.

During his time Judge Loreto, usually acting as a trial Judge without a Jury, made some very important legal decisions. Many received national publicity, such as the Condemnation Proceedings for the World Trade Center, the Colossal Soybean Scandal, the National Professional Baseball Problem, the Battle Between the A.F.L. and C.I.O., and the Battle for Control of the Paderewski Foundation.

Other cases involved civil litigations, family law, and rulings in psychiatric and special criminal proceedings. In these matters, as well as the others, Judge Loreto demonstrated special insight into the issues involved.

His rulings generally won widespread approval, and were rarely questioned in any higher Court. I do not recall that any of his rulings were ever overturned. Many of the problems he dealt with still seem current, however, for they are human difficulties which keep resurfacing in various forms.

The book is not just for Judges and Lawyers - it is written on several levels. All the cases are arranged into short stories, and have a lively, informative style which holds the reader's interest.

It is also a book of psychology - a kind of textbook on human behavior. Behavior, many times, under the stress of litigation. But good humor, too, in interesting situations. Like the time the Musical Director of a Black Church refused to be fired, and the matter landed in Judge Loreto's Court. The whole Church landed there too! Judge Loreto says this was one of the quietest and best behaved groups he ever had before him.

For those interested in the workings of the Judicial System, Judge Loreto describes many of the pro-

cesses he used in arriving at decisions. This included his dependance on God for wisdom, and the ways his prayers for understanding were answered.

In many ways the book has a spiritual impact, for the Judge explores the meaning of truth, justice, mercy, and Divine knowledge. He is also concerned with basic human rights and the American system. Consider the comments Judge Loreto made on "Valuation" while he worked with the decision to condemn land, buildings, railroad and tunnels for the World Trade Center.

"To me, in this case, it would be unjust to award scrap value (of tunnels and railway). The Constitution, in protecting the property owner whose property is taken by a Government Unit, states it must make 'just compensation'. Previous formulas and Court pronouncements did not respond in this unique case for a just reward." (This decision was published in the New York Law Journal).

The Judge decided a number of Custody cases, and never failed to be concerned. He says: "When the family relationship has reached the stage of such a bitter strife, making the child the subject of battle between them, there is no doubt that the child has become emotionally and otherwise affected and hurt... The Judge soon becomes aware of the child's haunting sensitivity, that pierces his conscience."

Readers of the book "In The Name Of Justice" are bound to wish that the wealth of experience possessed by Judge Loreto can somehow be utilized in current situations. Perhaps his book will reach out and help serve that purpose.
