AT COURT HOUSE

EASILAND, March 13. -Payment of more-than \$311,000 in county road script, which has been outstanding since the failure of the Security State Bank in this city the second of last August, was began in the office of the county highway department on the third floor, of the court house this morning.

The county commissioners' court came out this morning with an announcement that payment on this script would begin Tuesday morning, March 14, but all claims which are being presented to the county highway department today are being settled.

The payment of the script at this time, it is stated, was made pessible through a loan negetiated by G. A. Davidson, of the Fleming-Stitzer Roadbuilding company. It was evident that the county road bonds would sell easter after the payment of all outstanding script, and that there would be less trouble in carrying out the readbuilding program which has already been started. In addition to the script, it is announced, all other claims against the Floming-Stitzer company are being settled at the office of the county highway department.

The turning lose of more than three hundred thousand dollars in Eastland county at this time will prove of innumerable benefit to the business interests, it is thought.


