Rene Descartes preached that good sense is, of all things among men, the most equally distributed;—"for every one thinks himself so abundantly provided with it, that those even who are the most difficult to satisfy in everything else, do not usually desire a larger measure of this quality than they already possess.

And in this it is not likely that all are mistaken, he

"The conviction is rather to be held as testifying that the power of judging aright and distinguishing Truth from Error, which is properly what is called Good Sense of Reason, is by nature equal in all men; and that the diversity of our opinions, consequently, does not arise from some being endowed with a larger share of Reason than others but solely from this, that we conduct our thoughts along different ways, and do not affix our attention on the same objects."

It is easier to prove that the diversity of our opinions is due to the circumstance that some men are endowed with a larger share of reason than others, than to support Descarte's argument.

But the greatest minds, as they are capable of the highest excellencies, are open likewise to the greatest aberrations; and it is usually true that those who travel very slowly make far greater progress, provided they keep always to the straight road, than those who while they run, forsake it.

It often happens that persons of noble character and great mental gifts betray a strange lack of worldly wisdom and a deficiency in the knowledge of men; with the result that it is easier to deceive or mislead them; and that on the other hand natures of the commoner sort are most ready and successful in making their way in the world.

The reason for this, it can be deducted is that, when a man has little or no experience, he must judge by his own antecedent notions; and in matters demanding judgment, an antecedent notion is never on the same level as experi-

With the commoner sort of people, an antecedent notion means just their own selfish point of view.

This is not the case with those whose minds and characters are above the ordinary; and as they judge other people's thoughts by their own high standards, the results do not always tally with their calculations.

It is a hardship, of course, to make children go to school until they're 16. But considering the occasional behavior of "homo sapiens"-which is what the evolutionists are polite enough to call man-a thoughtful onlooker sometimes feels that the school age might profitably be raised to 50.

Swimming instruction to children in wholesale lots has been undertaken by the school board of Toronto, Ont., this summer. In the six weeks from July 20 through Aug. 28, free swimming lessons are given at two of the city high school pools. Expert swimming teachers have charge of the classes. As every new pupil enters he is registered and handed a card on which is stamped the dates of attendance for instruction.

As soon as a pupil learns to swim he will be dropped out of the class and his place taken by some other beginner. It is estimated that 2,400 youngsters will be reached by this method and that most of them will know how to swim before the six weeks are up.

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

The news of the explosion of one thousand quarts of nitro glycerine which wrecked the Independent Torpedo company's store room Monday recalls the explosion which destroyed the torpedo plant in Cisco In Monday's instance, no lives were lost, while the Cisco disaster was fatal to two, and others were injured. The following account of the explosion comes from Ranger.
