Don Shepard Is Named New Chamber Manager

Don Shepard, a resident of the Cisco area for more than three years and a land owner in the surrounding area of Nimrod since 1968 has been employed as manager of the Chamber of Commerce to succeed Ronald Scheuren, according to an announcement by President Bill Austin, Jr.

Mr. Shepard who lives with his family near Nimrod took over his new duties Thursday, August 8. His employment was approved at a CofC board meeting Tuesday.

Mr. Scheuren, who had served as manager since January resigned his position to accept a new job in Temple.

The new CofC manager moved to the Cisco area from Odessa where he was a manager for an industrial contracting firm for one year. Before that he was with the Texas Youth Council for 11 years where he did a "little bit of everything". He was the recreation director and the superintendent for the West Texas Children's Homes in Pyote.

His wife Janice, is a teacher at the Cisco High School. They have two children at home, Krista, a

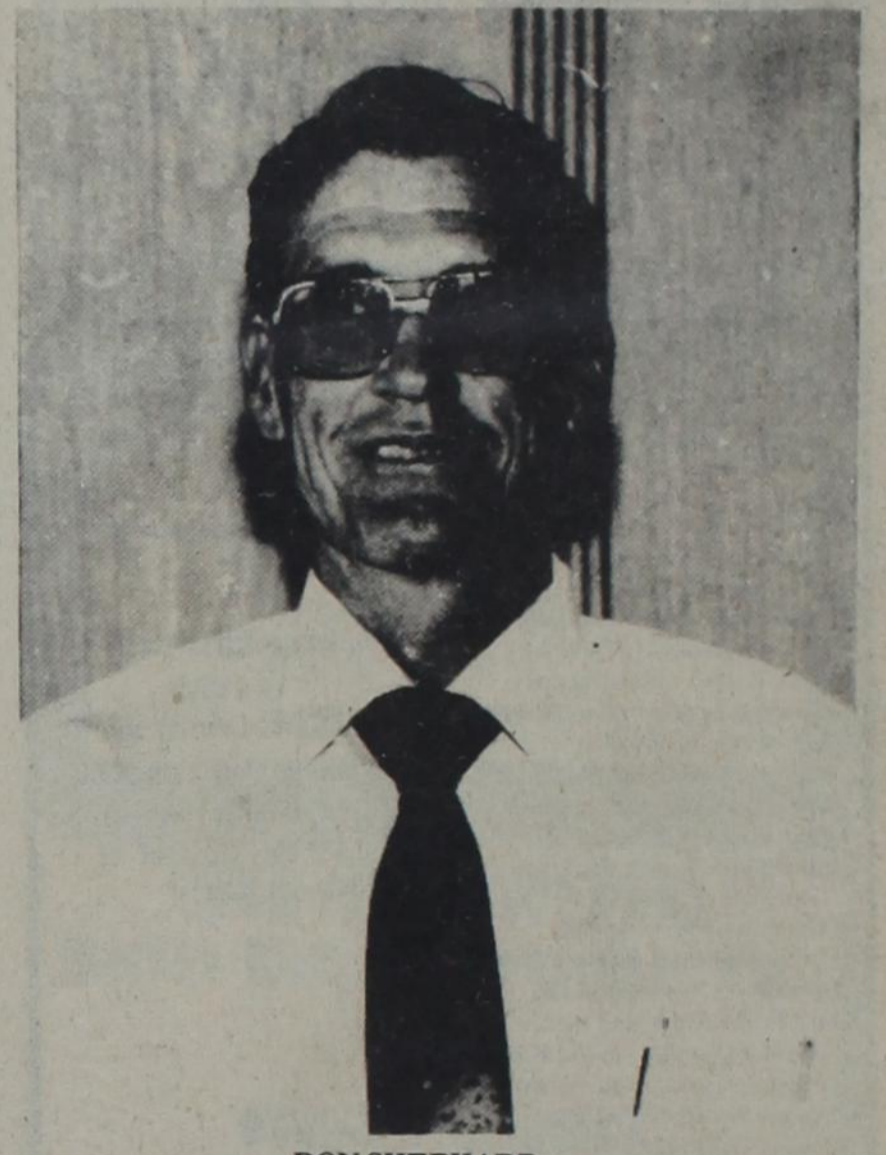
sophomore at Cisco High School, and Brent, a 5th grader at the Intermediate School. They also have two older daughters, Kim, who is married and has one son and lives at Buna near Beaumont, and Kari who lives in Houston where she is employed by Texaco.

Don and his wife Janice were the chaperones for area high school students who recently made a trip to Europe this summer. They attend First Baptist Church in Cisco.

Mr. Shepard farms and ranches on his land and he also owns S & S Enterprises, a water well pump service and water conditioning service, that he operates from his home.

When asked what future plans he has for the Chamber, he said, "I have been viewing Cisco for a number of years and have watched the spurts of growth and the decline of businesses in our town and I don't have a pie in the sky vision for overnight growth, but with everyone helping, we will help bring new industry and see growth in Cisco."

He said he wants to emphasize shopping in Cisco, because that is what keeps a town going. "It takes a cer-

tain amount of money to run a town, and the town will receive that money either from sales tax or from land taxes.

"When someone shops in another town, they are in reality helping that other town to grow and expand. But if everyone will shop at home, they will help Cisco grow."

Homemaking Hints

As fall approaches, you may be considering some new additions to your wardrobe. The new fashion trends for this coming fall and winter are many. Fall '85 is a season of dramatic shapes, vivid colors and sweatey textures. Skirt lengths range from microminis to full maxis, and women will have a wide range of styles from which to choose.

This season's fabrics are especially rich in both color and design. Inspired by the success of "Amadeus" and "The Jewel in the Crown," the mood is one of dramatic opulence. Courtly brocaded silks and Indian paisly prints are typical of this trend that recalls luxurious materials of times past. Other sumptuous weaves include tapestries, plaids and vintage bathrobe damasks. Oversized florals are big news in prints. These various patterns and textures can easily be combined. One fashion expert suggests wearing tartan pants with a paisley shirt and tie topped off with a tailored damask dressing gown/coat for a look of affluent whimsy.

Prints and pattern will be combined this fall in another way. One pattern will often be superimposed over another in the same fabric—a delicate paisley print overshadowing a bold plaid, for example.

Colors are dramatic and jewel-like. Peacock blue and pretty mauves add a touch of femininity to tailored shapes. Hot brights in outrageous pink, purple and orange promote punkish glamour in junior wear. Bold reds, turquoise and electric blues will make their mark as will sophisticated naturals like pearl, oatmeal and antique lace.

Skirt lengths are flexible, while shapes tend to be broad at the shoulder, varying in fullness below the waist. One noteworthy look that will be seen is the large wooly top worn over skintight pants anchored down by stirrups. Even classic jeans are brought up-to-the-minutes with the timely addition of stirrups. Another fashionable plus is the big skirt. Bold shoulders are often dramatized by belted waists.

The sweater is an all-important staple available in textures and patterns to match any mood. The excitement is in the variety of lively pattern given to the simple, generally classic, shapes. Patterns may appear as jacquards, prints and intarsias. Appliques, oversize geometrics and cartoon images are also making a showing. Nature themes abound in the guise of animals, flowers, sea shells—even spiders and other insects. Baroque motifs, especially the scroll and paisley designs, are the

newest in stylized modern versions, Nordic designs are other options for sweater lovers who prefer the traditional.

The silhouettes are simple with the collarless cardigan and the pullover, the favorite shapes for the variety of patterns available. The classic shapes are stretched out, widened or layered. A long top is especially dramatic when paired with a long swinging shirt.

Yarn spinners are blending fibers into interesting combinations such as acrylic and mohair; acrylic and silk; lambswool, angora and nylon; acrylic, nylon and wool; cotton, acrylic and wool. I would like to suggest that care label instructions be followed because of the variety of fibers being combined. To prevent snagging of knits when washing, close a zipper or fasten any hooks and eyes, and turn the garment wrong side out. When drying, remove sweaters when still damp. Do not overdry since overdrying can cause shrinkage and a build-up of static electricity.

Another fall trend encourages the fashionable woman to play with proportions. She can match a super-long, narrow cardigan over a leggy mini, or wear a tiny vest over a voluminous skirt. Layering is the key that balances various lengths and styles resulting in an electric yet pleasing melange that is the epitome of this year's chic.

Career dressing calls for mixed pattern suitings. Contrasts in color, texture and print provide a silhouette that is elegant and clean-lined.

Coats are loose and full, often in wrap styles that complete a layered look. Sweater coats are in and so are bulky knits of all sorts.

Even designs are sleek and form-fitting. Shiny and brocaded fabrics have replaced beading for sparkle

while gowns are adorned with ruffles and shirring around the hips for a look of languid elegance.

Recipe For The Week

Canned spinach? It provides plenty of Vitamin A. You'll find canned spinach convenient because it doesn't have to be cooked or thawed—just make sure all the liquid is drained off before combining spinach with other ingredients.

SPINACH FETTUCCINI
1(14-ounce) can spinach
1(8-ounce) package medium egg noodles
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
¼ cup butter or margarine
¼ cup whipping cream
1 cup grated Parmesan cheese
Coarsely ground black pepper

Drain spinach in a colander; place on paper towels, and press until spinach is barely moist.

Cook noodles according to package directions; drain well. Saute onion and garlic in 1 tablespoon butter until tender; stir in spinach. Cover and simmer 3 minutes.

Add ¼ cup butter to warm noodles, tossing gently until butter melts. Add spinach mixture, whipping cream, and cheese; toss gently. Sprinkle with pepper. Yield: 8 servings.

1. Never start a meeting without an agenda.
2. State the purpose of the meeting at the beginning and read the agenda.
3. Keep the meeting moving.
4. Speak clearly. Be sure you are heard.
5. Prevent general hubbub. Don't let the meeting break up into a series of private conversations.
6. Talk to the whole group, not to any individual.
7. Keep the speaker talking clearly and audibly.
8. Sum up what has been said and get a decision, if the meeting has been called for action as well as information.
9. Recommend committee study, when discussion shows the meeting is not coming to an agreement.
10. Keep control of the meeting, without cutting off discussion.
11. Don't argue with any speaker. The chairman is the umpire, not a contestant.
12. If you have a comment, get another chairman to preside while you participate.
13. Don't squelch the troublemaker.

14. Be aware of the physical comfort of all-temperature, light, draft, thirst.

15. Before closing the meeting, check results. See that something is not omitted that should be said or done.

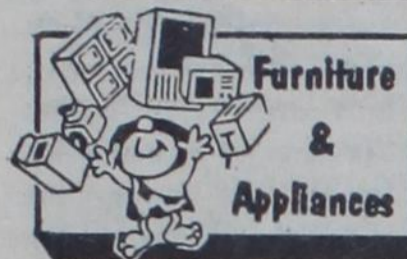

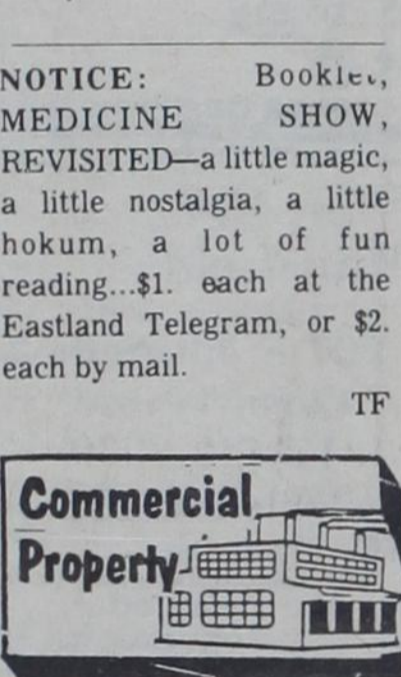

Mixed Drink Tax Nets \$12.3 Million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$12.3 million to the 221 counties and 422 cities as their share of the state's 12 percent mixed drink tax collected during the second quarter of 1986.

The Texas Legislature raised the tax from 10 to 12 percent in 1984.

Bullock said the state collected \$51.3 million in mixed drink taxes for the second quarter at the increased rate, compared to \$40.9 collected during second quarter in 1984 at the old 10 percent rate.

Eastland County's total tax revenue was \$11,044.69, and the county's 12.5 percent remittance of that amount was \$1,380.59.

The City of Eastland received \$280.78 of the \$2,246.20 collected, and City of Ranger received \$572.12 of the \$4,576.93 collected locally.

Drilling Bits

Eastland County's Adams Field gained two new producers when Richey & Co. of Ft. Worth completed the No. 1 L.K. Daniels & the No. 1 Ora B. Jones four miles south-southeast of Ranger.

The wells indicated ability to pump oil at the combined rate of 114 barrels per day. Total depths were 3,530 and 3,410 feet, respectively. Production will be from perforations in the Lower Duffer Formation, ranging from 3,283 to 3,432 feet into the wellbore.

The operations are in a lease in the S.N. Mathias Survey, A-376.

Northridge Corp. has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Ranger Field, Eastland County. The No. 2 C.F. Hamor showed potential to pump 46 barrels of oil per day, along with 53 barrels of water.

Drillsite is in the Ben Willis Survey, A-1212, four miles west-northwest of Ranger.

The well will produce from an interval in the Black Lime West Formation, 3,398 to 3,424 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling

depth was 3,894 feet.

B&B Operating of Odessa has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 W.D. Brown, a 3,100-ft. developmental well at a drillsite three miles north-northwest of Gorman, Eastland County. Location is

in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-199. The well will be in the B&B Field.

Two 1,900-ft. wildcat wells are planned by Circle Exploration of Odessa at drillsites five miles west-northwest of Desdemona, Eastland County. The loca-

tions are in a 203-acre lease in the Davis S. Richardson Survey, A-414. Wells' designations are the Nos. 1-A and 2-A Watkins.

At a location one mile north of Scranton, H.L.M. Oil has finalized a new oil producer in Eastland County's Scranton Field.

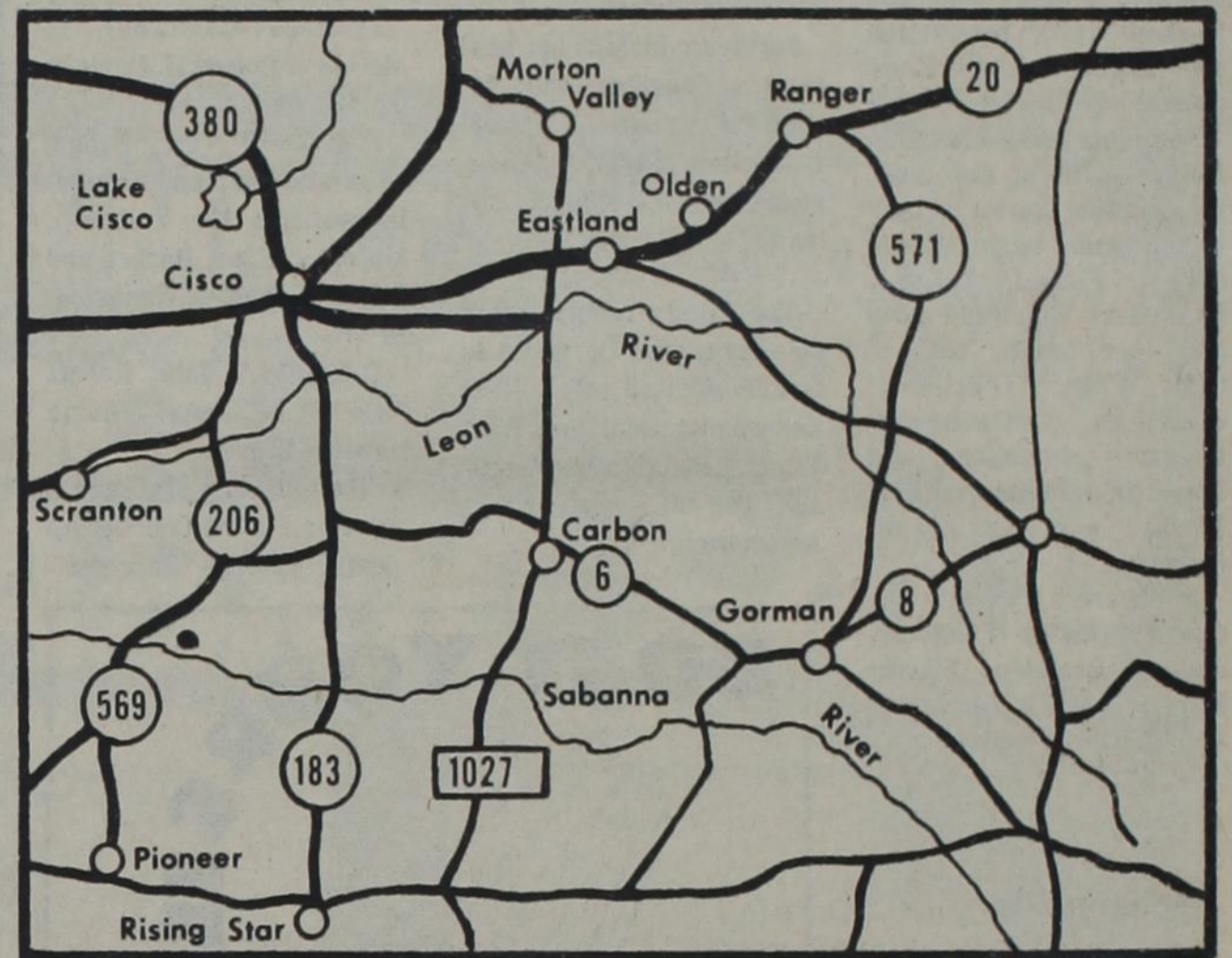

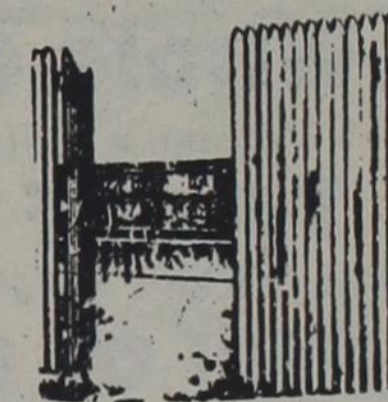

CHILD ABUSE
SEX AND THE CHILD
Semantics need a little attention here. Words sometimes get a long way from their original intentions.

When you overhear, "What a bitch!", the first thing to pop into your mind is not the female, tri-color winner at an American Kennel Club show.

"Gay" is a word I really mourn as I believe it is far from an accurate picture of the lifestyle it has come to describe.

"Sex" is another casualty along the reading road. My idea of "sex education" for a small child is that s/he ought to know the difference between "he" and "she", but the nuances of sex should not greatly concern of a child.

Unfortunately, the uniformed are the most likely to be the harmed.

Sex is here to stay. If it doesn't, we don't. Whether an evolutionist, or a creationist, you will agree that sex is the means of continuing life.

The question is not if we cope with it, but how...we make that "how well."

How do we teach our children to take care of themselves while they are small without turning them into the kind of adults who think of sex as an unmentionable or as a commodity with a common market value?

How can parents wait "until children can understand" when 10 percent of sexually abused children are under five years old...that's 10 percent of documented cases.

Texas Department of Human (Resources) Services reports that in the United States, the chances are that one out of our females will be sexually assaulted before the age sixteen.

That's bad—no, it's evil. As far as I know, the meaning of "evil" has not been fouled up and "bad" is sometimes used to mean exactly the opposite. It is anything but good to look at a schoolroom of children and know that one out of every four of the little girls will experience the perversion of ecstasy...85 percent of the time by someone they know.

Nor are our sons exempt from danger from such abuse. Before the age of 13, 30-46 percent of ALL children are likely to be assaulted in some way.

You keep poison out of reach of baby fingers, don't you? You are cautious about the matches, and fire is a no-no, isn't it? Keep up the good work, but your youngsters are more likely to suffer a sexual assault than to be poisoned or hurt in a fire.

The effects of sexual abuse are long-lasting and apparently self-propagating. The sexually abusing adult.

The concerned parent has to define and follow a fine line to provide the child with means of self-protection, yet not create a bias that will prevent a satisfactory adult life.

Is it not possible that many of our modern relationships and marriages end in a split or divorce because one, if not both, of the participants spends more time as a defensive individual than as half of a team?

Parents are role models, and when children are accustomed to demonstrations of physical affection among family members, it's a little hard to get across the suggested point that, "even 'nice' people sometimes do mean things."

It is not difficult to make lists to do provide protection and preparation against abuse. TDHS suggestions, among others, include: "Provide specific definitions and examples of sexual assault. Include information about sexual assault when teaching safety. Prepare children to deal with bribes and threats as well as possible physical force."

Why would a child try to keep sexual abuse a secret?"

Sad to say, the younger child is, the less likely he is to be believed. As children grow older, in addition to fearing they won't be believed, they add other fears: loss of parental love, parents will

be jailed, they (the children) will be blamed, sent to foster homes, rejected. They fear retaliation, disease, what people will say, and the girls fear pregnancy.

My opinion is still that children are everybody's business. You may not be your brother's keeper, (I'll grant that as a moot point) but you'd jolly well better keep a sharp look out for his kids!

The next column will deal with some tips on abuse and prevention. But this series of columns only scratches the surface. Inform yourself. Children can help protect themselves but they can't do it all.

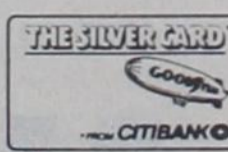

County Commissioners Work On Budget For 1985-86

Eastland County Commissioners spent most of Thursday, Aug. 1 in sessions aimed at working out expenditures, revenues and budgeting for the County.

All officials, with the exception of the Eastland County Co-op Dispatch, have turned in amounts proposed for 1985-86. The Commissioners hope to resolve the final budget in August for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1. Still unresolved are any deficits from the Sheriff's Department.

Present at Thursday's called meeting were Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, was absent due to illness. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

Judge Bailey shared a letter with the Court from Texas Assistant Attorney General Dwight Martin, State & County Division, County Affairs Section. The opinion dealt with the County paying overtime to employees under new Supreme Court rulings. The letter said, in part:

"A special problem arises owing to the peculiar structure of Texas County government... Article 3912k gives to the Commissioners Court the power over all aspects of most County employees. But at the same time, Commissioners Court has no power to set working hours for elected officials or their

employees...

"To allow the various elected County Officials to work their employees at will for as long as they desire would be to give to each County official the power to destroy the County budgeting process... The proper approach to budgeting of overtime hours is similar to the approach used in budgeting other necessities of office..."

Judge Bailey outlined the possible revenue to the County for 1985-86, noting that Steve Thomas, Chief Appraiser of the Eastland County Appraisal District said that a tax rate of 20 1/2 cents per \$100 of assessed property value would bring revenues within 3 percent of those received the last fiscal year.

Declining oil revenues in two of the school district were cited as a possible loss of revenue. Relocation of business and other factors could cause a reshuffling of valuation in other areas.

Judge Bailey mentioned several bright spots, including deep gas wells north of Olden, and possible revenue from water flooding in the old Ranger Boom Field. But he stated that unless Congress acts quickly, there will be no more revenue sharing funds for the County.

"We can't count on it," he said. Various County Depart-

ments and their projected budgets were considered. A number, such as the County Extension offices, were commended for the type of work they do. The Commissioners reviewed the contributions the County makes to Libraries, the MHR Center, and a number of other agencies.

Budgets for the J.P. offices in the County were discussed. Judge R.G. Lyerla appeared before the Court, requesting a raise for his office. He explained that the major increase was for salaries for himself and his clerk, and this was due to the heavy workload involved.

He said that his office was handling a number of small claims cases, including all of the Texas Electric cases for Eastland County. He said that he had received as many as 29 cases at one time.

He asked that his clerk's salary be raised to "An amount comparable to others", and that this salary be raised 10 percent.

In other business, Richard Robinson, Pct. 1 requested the loan of a vehicle from his

Precinct to supplement the transportation of surplus foodstuff. Central Texas Opportunities had notified the County that cornmeal, flour and possibly powdered milk were in Ft. Worth, with the refrigerated items in Brownwood.

These must be transported at a certain time for distribution to qualified people. Robinson said that around 1,900 families were receiving these foodstuffs in the County.

His request for loan of the

vehicle was approved. Judge Bailey mentioned that Steve Thomas of the Eastland County Appraisal Office had indicated a wish to move the Tax office from beside the Commissioners Courtroom (on the east end) into the suite of offices being

vacated (on the second floor) by the A.S.C.S. office on the west end.

The Tax Appraisal office has outgrown its quarters, Judge Bailey said, especially since it is now collecting taxes for Cisco Junior Col-

lege and the Cisco Independent School District.

The Commissioners appeared favorable toward such a move into the A.S.C.S. office.

The meeting was dismissed until 1:15 p.m.

Court Reviews Fair Labor Act

In the afternoon meeting of the Eastland County Commissioner's Court County Judge Scott Bailey reviewed some of the background of the Fair Labor Standards Act, which was ruled on favorably by the U.S. Supreme Court in Feb., 1985. "There is legislation now in Congress," he said, "To

remove local governments from this Act, due to the special problems created for them." But it would be unwise to hold out much hope for such relief, he said.

On Oct. 15, he stated, the Labor Department will begin enforcement of the Law, in which employees can ask for overtime pay go-

ing back to April 15.

Sheriff Don Underwood then discussed various aspects of the case with the Court. He outlined how the pay of the Sheriff's Department employees had been affected by the County 28-day pay plan, which had been implemented in an effort to comply with technicalities of the new law. He explained that he did not agree with this manner of handling the situation.

It was explained to him that figures were already in the computer when objections to this plan were last made, and the County had the choice of going ahead and running the payroll or being late with checks for everyone.

"All necessary corrections for overtime will be taken care of during the next pay period," he was told.

"I still don't believe the Commissioners can set a salary for these employees without negotiation," the Sheriff said.

He then requested that the Judge call the Attorney General's office in Austin for a clarification.

After adjournment the Commissioners and Judge Scott Bailey went into the Judge's office and place a call to Asst. State Attorney Dwight Martin, who had sent the letter referred to during the morning session of the Court.

After being questioned on specific problems the Assistant Attorney General requested a few moments to think about them before calling back. He had several opinions on management however.

He said that it bordered on official misconduct for any official to knowingly spend more than has been budgeted in his account.

On the other hand, he said, the Commissioners Court had the responsibility to investigate the needs of each Department and budget a reasonably adequate amount for the carrying out of each office.

Commissioners waited for the call which followed this one.

In the last call the Assistant Attorney General said that there needed to be an understanding with the people involved - but he considered that the County already had that - since these employees had worked right along before the new law was enacted.

He felt like they would get half-time rather than time-and-a-half pay for hours over 86 for a two-week pay period. He referred the group, however, to Frank Carmichael, of Abilene, Federal Investigator of the U.S. Wage and Hour Division, for final interpretations of the new law.

The County has already

been consulting with Mr. Carmichael on the proper handling of the matter.

Judge Bailey stated that County Officials would continue to work with him.

The court will meet next on Aug. 12.

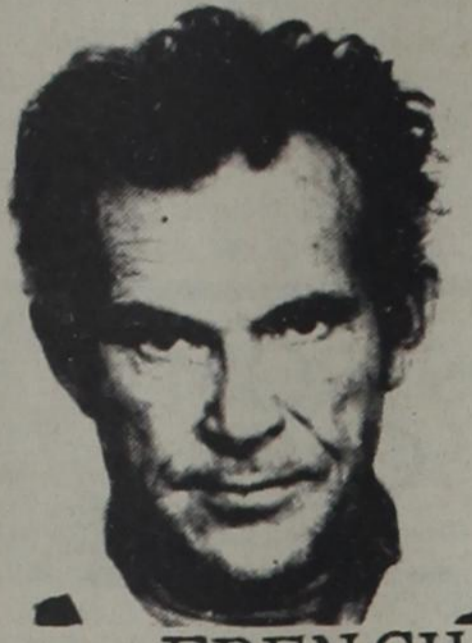

Texas Most Wanted



FRENCH

LA PORTE, Texas -- George Walter French can't say that the criminal justice system hasn't given him a chance to turn his life around.

French, who will turn 51 years of age on August 15, 1985, has been in and out of prison most of his adult life.

Law enforcement officials cite the fact that he has been arrested 31 times and has a total of 10 convictions on charges ranging from burglarly, larceny, forgery and fraud. Out of those 10 convictions, he has been sent to the Texas State Department of Corrections just twice.

His latest conviction occurred in 1978, when he was sentenced to 20 years in TDC for felony theft over \$10,000. He was paroled in January, 1985, after serving about one-third his sentence.

Now his is in hot water with the law again.

French is wanted on a warrant out of Harris County for burglary of a building.

Detectives with the La Porte Police Department say that on April 19 someone broke into Thermal Industrial Insulation and took about 50 company checks, a check writer and a typewriter. Several of the stolen checks were then passed in Harris County.

On April 24, George French's son, Michael, a Kerry

Lee Hodge were arrested by the Pasadena Police Department for possession of dangerous drugs. However, George French and two unidentified females escaped the police dragnet and fled to Beaumont, Texas, where at least one more stolen company check was cashed.

This week French has been selected for the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the capture of French.

French is described as a White Male, 6-3, 220 Pounds, with curly red hair and brown eyes. He is missing the tip of his left index finger.

Detectives say French was last seen driving a 1980 blue Chevrolet Malibu four-door, with Texas license plates VFG-634. They warn that French may be armed with a .410-gauge shotgun and said that he will not go back to prison.

Anyone with information about French's whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program.

In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities. Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

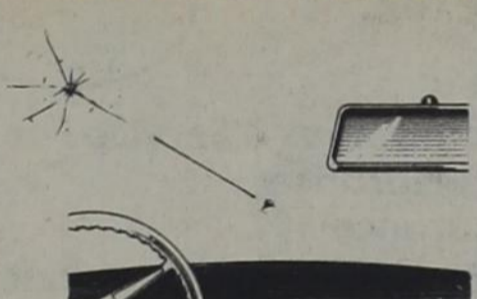

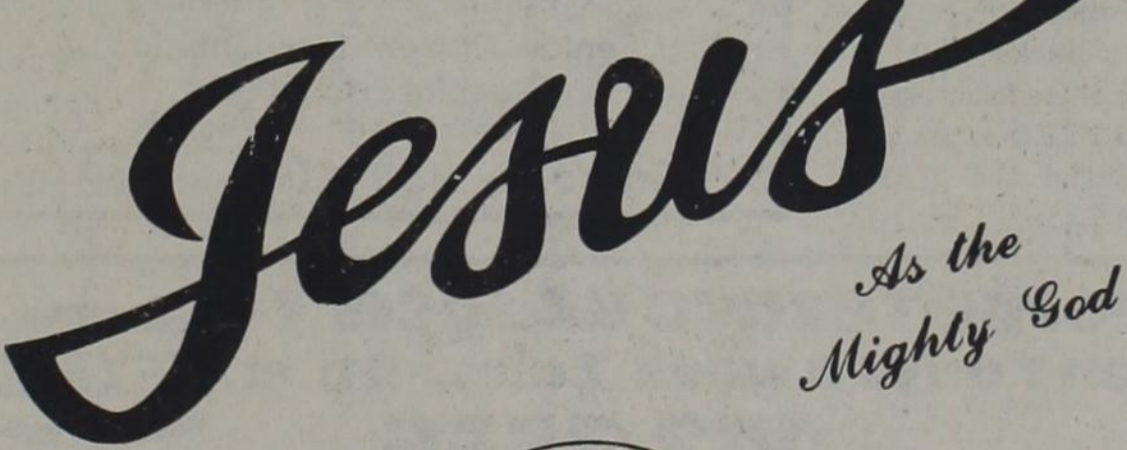
