Townspeople Flee Homes as Swollen Rivers Threaten

SAN ANTONIO, July 7. - Residents of Three Rivers, located near the junction of the Nueces and Frio camped today under temporary shelter on Murray hill as flood-waters from the Frio crept nearer the town, according to advices here.

The Frio river level reached 32 feet early today. An additional eight-foot rise was predicted which would cause the swollen stream to spill over into the town. Less damage was expected from the Nueces river. The bulk of the flood in the Nueces was many miles upstream and probably will not reach the town until Saturday.

Cotulla was in greatest danger from the Nueces floodwaters today. Throughout a tedious night men watched at the Holland-Texas dam, 12 miles down stream from Cotulla, ready to patch any breaks in the

THOUSANDS OF ACRES FLOODED.

CUERO, July 7. — Thousands of acres of fertile river bottom farm land in DeWitt county were inundated today as the swollen Guadalupe river, rushing toward the Gulf of Mexico, surged over lowlying fields and valleys.

At daybreak the river was 24 feet above its normal stage and still rising though there was no immediate danger, residents of the low sections were warned to be on the alert. toms were abandoned.

HEROIC RESCUE

Winford Reynolds, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Reynolds, of Cisco was drowned yesterday afternoon while swimming with a companion. Rayford Richardson, 17 in a tank on the Dr. C. C. Jones farm, three and a half miles east of

Young Richardson performed feat of heroism in his efforts to remove his chum from the water. Twice he dived in 12 feet of water to lift the boy from the bottom of the tank to the surface Finally, almost too exhausted to swim, he reached a small tree standing out of the wa-ter where he held the body until help arrived.

The victim was removed to the Green Funeral home about 3:45 pm. where Drs F. E. Clark and E. L Graham, hastily summoned, worked or a hour with lungmotor and the Schafer resuscitation method to revive him. Funeral services will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon from the East Side Baptist church where the Rev. O. A. Inseperable

Broken-hearted young Richardson old a News representative this norning the details of the tragedy During their school companionship at Cisco high school the two boys had been inseperable. Young Rey nolds was a member of the junior class during the term just closed and would have entered his senior year next fall. He was one of the most popular students at the school He was for four years employed by the Daily News as a carrier boy, leaving that employment two years

early in the afternoon with Buford 12, and Wendell, 10, brothers of Ray-ford. Reynolds had learned to swim last summer and not being a strong wimmer was keeping in shallow water holding to a cable reel that was floating about. The two smaller boys stood on the shore Rayford warn out to a large tree which stood n shallow water at the edge of the deeper part of the pool. He climbed nto the tree and was diving from the branches for the amusement of he other boys. Winford, clinging to the cable spool, waded out to the ree and lifted himself to a perch in the branches to watch his chum

Dived Twice

Rayford dived a couple of times and then started swimming to the shore. He looked back and saw Win-ford descend to the water and take hold upon the floating spool. He was kicking water, apparently disporting himself. Suddenly Rayford saw the spool spin. He heard Winford cry "Help, Chub, help." He turned and swam furiously for the scene several yards away. Bubbles were breaking the surface near the pool and without waiting even so ong as to snatch a breath, young Richardson dived at the spot.

Twelve feet below he picked the body of his chum from the floor of the tank and struggled with it to the surface trying to swim with it The spool had floated away. He was o exhausted with lack of breath and with the exertion of furious swimning and diving that he could not old to his chum. They both went down and the limp body of young Winford slipped from his grasp. Young Richardson came up, filled his lungs with air and plunged to the bottom again. Again he brought the body to the surface, swimining with all his might and again vent down. But he held on. A slender sapling stood out of the tank nearby. By dint of superhuman effort young Richardson was able to each the trunk which he grasped around, holding Winford above the arface.

Ran for Help

Meanwhile Buford, obeying Ray-ford's shouted instructions, ran to the home of John Evans, tenant of Dr. Jones, on the Eastland highway unimoning both Evens and his brother Lloyd, who hastened to the scene.
