ATTENDING the Governor for a day activities in Austin last Tuesday was quite an event for a country editor. Senator Tom Creighton, as you know, of the 22nd District is the president pro tempore of the Texas Senate and, as such, is 3rd in line for the governorship. And in keeping with tradition, both Gov. John Connally and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith were out-of-town for a day to let him hold office.

The event opened with the "swearing in" in the reception room of the governor's office. The huge room was packed with people.

The Governor then began receiving folks in the inner-office. Constituents from throughout the big district were present in good numbers to pay their respects.

CISCO's delegation came in at 11:30 a. m. Two gift boxes were extended by Chairman Richard Moore. The first was the huge pair of gloves from Boss Manufacturing Co. The photographers had a field day when the Governor put them on.

The Mineral Wells group presented the Creightons a color television and other items, and one of them remarked later in the day: "You Cisco people got more publicity with a pair of cotton gloves than we did with a \$600 television set."

The other Cisco package contained a handsome gavel made by R. W. Merket.

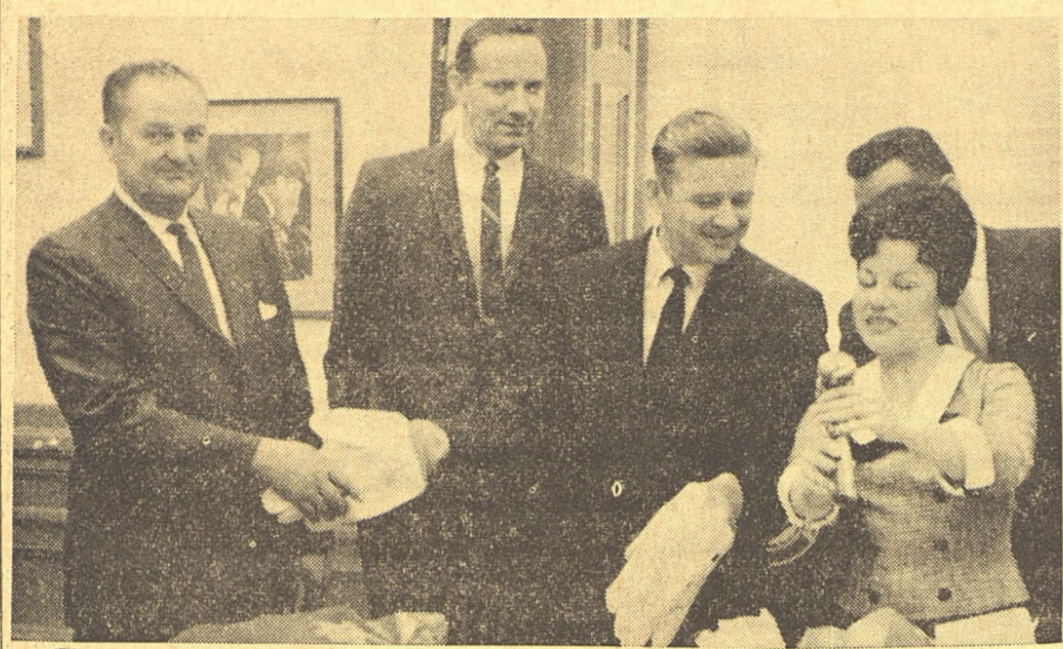

Creighton Is Honored As 'Governor For Day'

AUSTIN — Delegations from Eastland County took part here Tuesday, April 20, in the program that honored Senator Tom Creighton of the 22nd Senatorial District on the occasion of his serving as Texas Governor for a day.

As the Senate president pro tempore, Sen. Creighton took over the state's top office April 20 as both Gov. John Connally and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith were out of the state. And delegations from most of the 10 counties, including Eastland, that comprise his district were in Austin to pay their respects.

The day began as Sen. Creighton was given the oath of office as Governor by Judge Ernest Belcher of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This was followed by a press conference in which Mr. Creighton told interviewers that his present plans called for "working very hard to be a good senator." He had been asked if he would

Gov. Creighton and family went to the executive mansion at noon for a luncheon honoring them. They returned to the office at 2 p. m. for two more hours of receiving visitors.

The popular young senator and his family from Mineral Wells were honored at a dinner Tuesday night at the Commodore Perry Hotel. Some 700 persons turned out to hear addresses by H. L. Irsfeld, superintendent of schools at Mineral Wells, "Tom — Citizen of the Community"; by Lester Clark, Breckenridge oil man, "Tom — Citizen of the District"; and by Sen. Galloway Calhoun of Tyler, "Tom — The Senator."

Mr. Creighton was presented for a talk — a brief statement of appreciation for the many honors given him during the day. Dr. H. A. Zappe of Mineral Wells presented several gifts to the Creightons — a color television, luggage, oil paintings, and so forth.

Mr. Creighton is serving his second 4-year term as a member of the senate. At 38, the young lawyer has won many honors, and friends have predicted many more in the years to come.

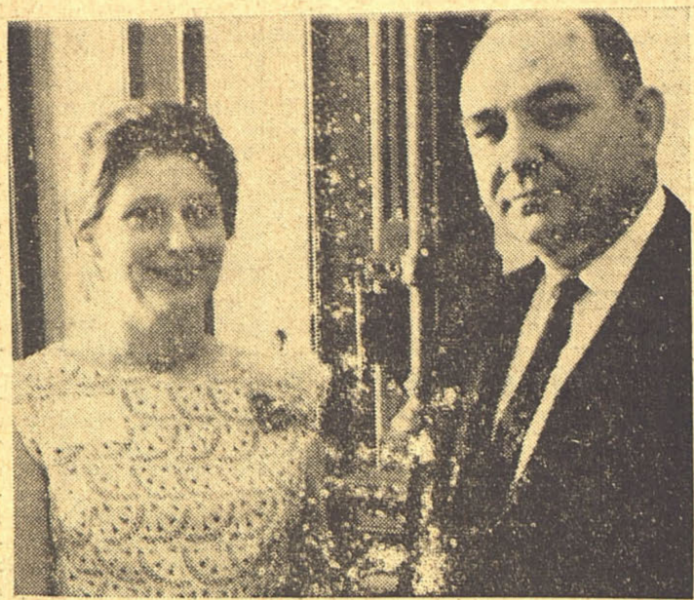

Pair Arrested, Charged With Series Of Thefts

The arrests of two 18-year-olds has brought to an end a siege of petty thefts and burglaries which have plagued Eastland County for the past three months, according to Sheriff L. E. Sublett.

The two white youths, one of Cisco and the other of nearby Callahan County, were arrested over the weekend and charged with theft over \$5 lodged against both. Both are free on \$500 bond each and additional charges are expected to be filed, Sublett said.

The pair reportedly raided service stations, and other businesses, being careful to keep their loot value small at each stop, precluding stiffer felony charges.

Some 19 used auto radiators, 20 used batteries, boomers, chains, hand tools, gasoline, three motor blocks are among the items taken by the youths.

Careful observation and assistance by the Cisco Police Department working in connection with the sheriff's department, resulted in the arrests. The two had been selling the goods in Eastland and in Abilene.

The two youths were tried in Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis court in Cisco on charges of petty theft. They each paid a fine of \$103.50.

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Letters TO THE EDITOR

Editor: This area I reside in is a hard area to cope with all around at any time.

I have to contend with farmers and floaters who sell their services for \$1.25 to \$1.50 per hour. It seems as if the better man is the cheap one — which of course is a very great fallacy on the part of the property owner. Quality, years of service and durability doesn't seem to count. I can't understand what property owners think about, but people don't appreciate a good painter nor do most paint companies.

Their "golden angel" is the weekend painter or the "do it yourself" person and most of these paint companies have forgotten the people who have made them what they are today.

As of now I have discontinued purchasing from a company in a nearby city which I occasionally did when there was need for immediate service and for these reasons: They have wholesaled to everybody so that it is practically impossible to use their products with any profit for the painter. I am wondering if they care what is happening to their former painter friends.

I am particular, and I know my trade well.

I have spent 30 years in the trade, 20 years of which no one ever thought of painting his house or barn, because they knew and were educated to the fact that a satisfactory job had to be done with good paint and a good painter.

I have been very proud of the jobs that I turn out, and so are my customers, but with some of these newcomers and particularly the young folks, it is always "too high" dollarwise. Every painter today in rural communities is working for far less than he did during the depression days as far as wages go, except maybe some of the union boys in the larger towns.

Everyone wants a high wage and don't want to pay much for services that they themselves desire.

Maybe some day property owners will realize that quality can not be put in a paint bucket for nothing, and will stop buying some of the cheap paint offered them.

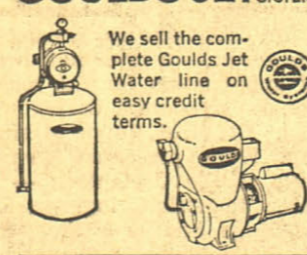

EASTLAND COUNTY has 23,200 acres of wheat and small grain planted according to a report issued by the Texas Employment Commission. Of the total, 4,200 acres is in wheat; 15,000 acres in oats; 1,000 in barley; and 3,000 in rye. There are 4,490,811 acres of wheat and small grain seeded in the state, the report shows.

THERE'S A REPORT to the effect that some 1,400 school students in Eastland County would be eligible for "no-string" grants under the recently signed federal education program. These are youngsters whose parents earn less than \$2,000 annually, and could mean some \$285,000 increase in the county's economy if the program is adopted here. We haven't been exposed to a lot of information on the topic yet — but have an idea we will be soon. Many Texas counties, Lubbock for instance, have turned thumbs down on the program.

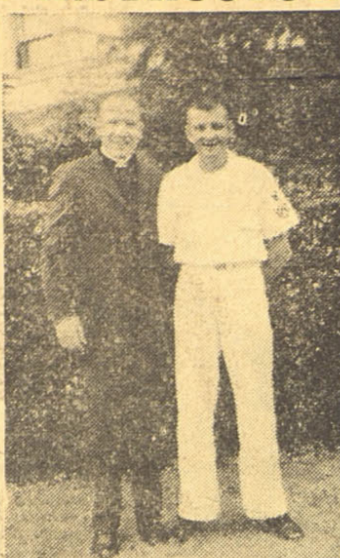
SON OF CISCOANS NAMED SONAR SCHOOL INSTRUCTOR

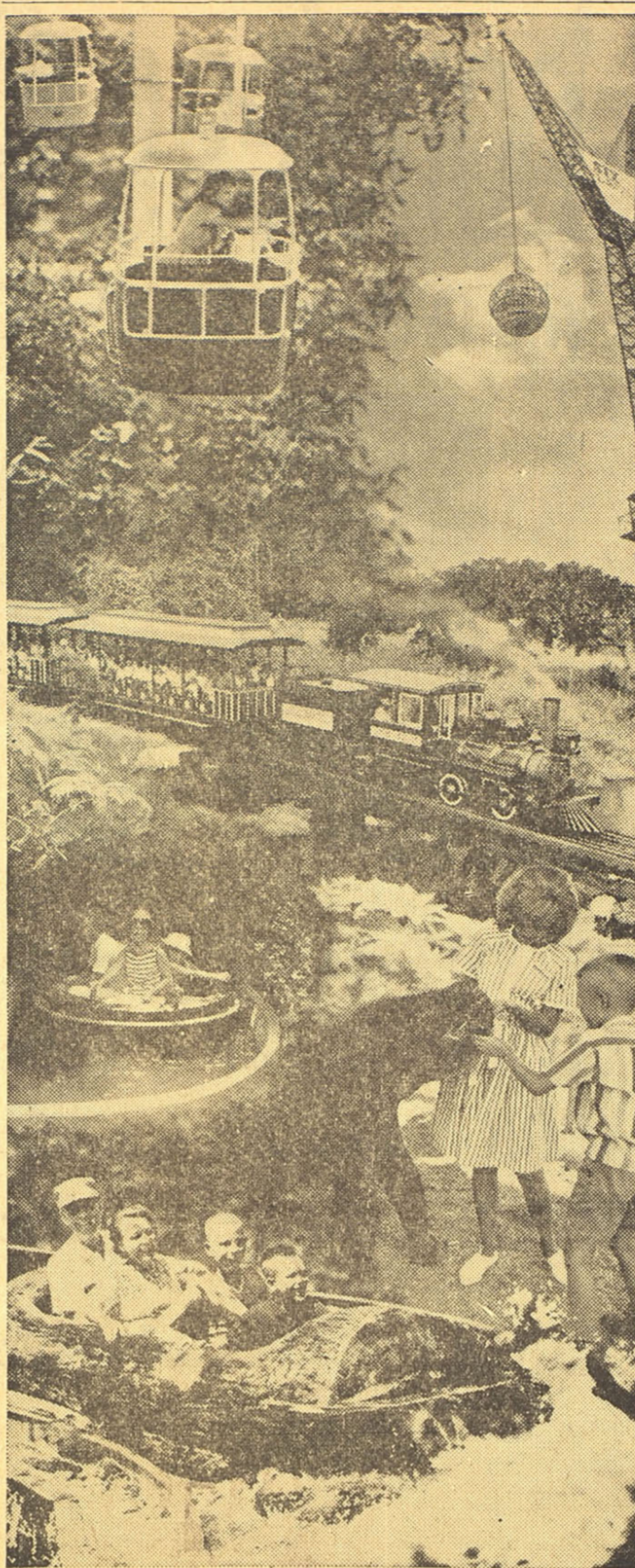

Miss Martha Graves, Director of Home Life and Family Education at Cisco Junior College and an authorized First Aid instructor for the American Red Cross, instructed the CJC Vocational Nurses class Tuesday afternoon on ways to check for injuries. Using a film by the American Red Cross, gudeposts to determine extent and kind of injuries were explained by Miss Graves. Circumstances surrounding the injuries, information from spectators of the victim, and one's own physical check-up of the victim were points stressed. The instructor cautioned student nurses to check first for injuries that need immediate treatment, including serious bleeding, breathing difficulties, or poisoning; next for surface injuries, and then for internal injuries.

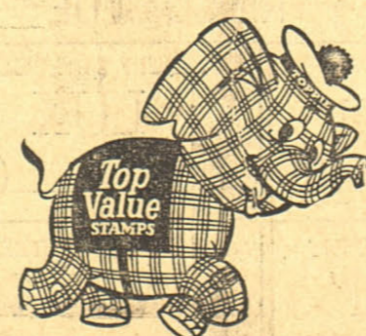
