

This area I reside in is hard area to cope with all around at any time.

I have to contend with farmers and floaters who sell their services for \$1.25 to \$1.50 per hour. It seems as if the better man is the cheap one
— which of course is a very great fallacy on the part of the property owner. Quality, years of service and durability doesn't seem to count. I can't understand what property owners think about, but people don't appreciate a good painter nor do most paint ompanies.

Their "golden angel" is the weekend painter or the "do it yourself" person and most of these paint companies have forgotten the people who have made them what they are to-

I am particular, and I know

I have spent 30 years in the trade, 20 years of which no one ever thought of painting his house or barn, because they knew and were educated to the fact that a satisfactory job had to be done with good paint and a good painter.


