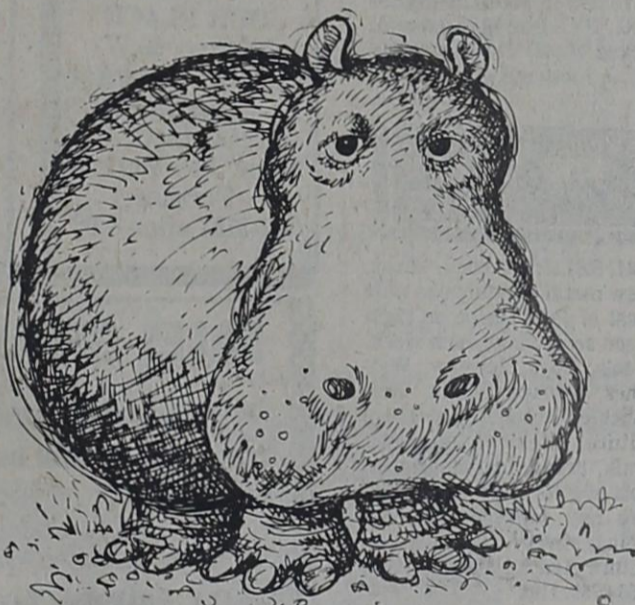

For the bride's going away outfit she wore a rust and beige jumper trimmed in lace. She wore a corsage from her bouquet.

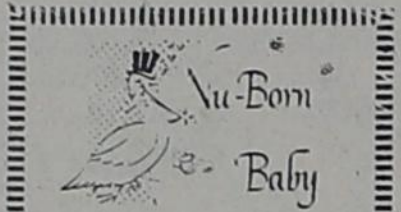

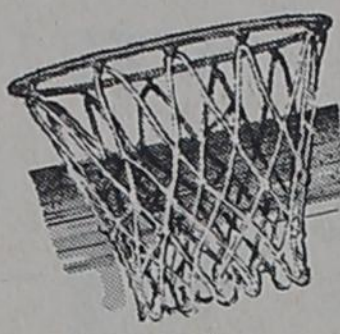
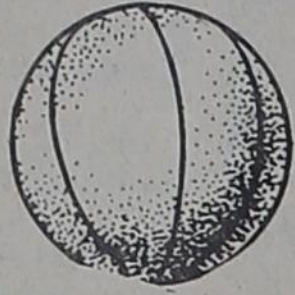

The County Fair was an exciting event in Eastland County. There were more participants and more visitors at the Fair last week than ever before. So many people, organizations and groups worked and contributed to make it a good fair. We would like to thank everyone and list all the names, but if we tried to do this we would surely leave some important group or individual out. Therefore, let's say a big "thank you" to everyone who had any part in the success of the Fair.

Unwanted brush has long been a problem on rangeland in Eastland County. In the past, burning of this brush has been discouraged, but things have changed and in recent years there has been considerable research done in burning as a range management tool.

Some of the things that make burning more attractive in the county is the high cost of other brush control practices, and possible restrictions of chemicals for ranch use. Prescribed fire may be cheaper than other methods, but the risk is high when used by inexperienced personnel.

The basis for prescribed burning including rancher experience, benefits, and procedures for safe and effective use will be discussed in a symposium to be held in the Stevenson Memorial Center, Junction, Texas on October 23.

There is no charge for attending the meeting. Junction is a good distance from Eastland County, but it will be worth the trip for ranchers who are considering burning to control brush. Contact our office for a copy of the program if you are interested in attending.

It will soon be time to select landscape plants that you plan to put out this year. You might avoid a lot of pruning later on by selecting dwarf varieties. Over grown shrubs require a lot of extra work. Dwarf compact, low-growing plants can be the answer to landscape maintenance problems.

Many of the larger, old standards now come in dwarf models. The versatility and adaptability of dwarf plants add to their popularity. Dwarf plants are best used in small, detailed areas where they will be seen at close range, such as patio and entrance areas. We advise against using dwarfs for background plantings or in areas where they might be overgrown by larger shrubs or annual flowers.

Pruning is almost eliminated when dwarfs are used, but they do need room to spread and grow. One variety we recommend for use as a low hedge or container is the Dwarf Yaupon Holly. Another suggestion is Wheeler's Dwarf Pittosporum which has the same qualities as regular Pittosporum but grows only a fraction of the size.

An attractive specimen is the Dwarf Nandina. It produces a small, compact, densely-foliated plant. The plant has green foliage during late spring and summer which turns brilliant scarlet and bronze in winter.

Rock Cotoneaster is ideally suited for planting in rock gardens where its branches can rest on the ground or a

Homemaking Hints

President Carter has proclaimed this week as National Consumer Education Week, to focus national attention on the benefits of consumer education in helping Americans to improve their lives - learning to become better shoppers, understanding how the market place functions, and developing participatory skills in government and corporate decision-making.

In time of inflation and unemployment it becomes increasingly more important to sharpen our skills as consumers. Following are several brief ways to be a more alert consumer.

The money you save through careful shopping can be lost if foods are not properly stored once they leave the grocery store. Foods that need refrigeration should always be put away quickly.

All too often, consumers will spend a great deal of time and effort shopping for

the best deal on a home, automobile or other major purchase. After finally deciding on the purchase, however, some people take the first loan offered, rather than shopping around for financing.

The price of over-the-counter drugs (those that can be bought without a prescription) can vary greatly in price for nearly identical products.

Homemakers can cut food costs by comparing prices, using a shopping list, buying extra food when prices are lower. Also check food labels before buying, shop at one store, plan menus before shopping, and read labels for nutrition information.

The Eastland County Extension Service office has free pamphlets and information available on a wide variety of consumer topics. For example, you can request a bulletin on how to seek consumer redress or

how to choose a microwave oven or how to grow your own garden. Begin your consumer education today.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Individual Pizza Pies

- 1 (6 Oz.) can tomato paste
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- 2 or 3 drops red pepper sauce
- 1/4 tsp. Thyme
- 1 (10-biscuit) can refrigerator biscuits
- 1/2 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 cup grated mozzarella cheese

Combine first 6 ingredients. Mix well, on floured board, roll each biscuit to a thin circle 4 inches across. Cover with thin layer of uncooked ground beef. Spread with tomato paste mixture and sprinkle with cheese and oregano. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and bake in 425 degree F oven for 10 minutes or until meat is done. Serves 10.

Keeping Cool And Conserving On Energy

The summer heat wave had people in Texas steaming in more than one way. Air conditioning, almost a necessity, has been the prime cause of high energy consumption and record-breaking utility bills.

How can people reduce their energy use and still maintain some degree of comfort?

One way not only cuts down on energy consumption, but adds value to commercial and residential property. It's called precision landscaping.

Precision landscaping is merely placing trees, shrubs and other vegetation with energy conservation in mind.

According to Ann Holland, an urban forester with the Texas Forest Service, the proper placement of trees and other plants around homes and businesses can make a big difference in cooling requirements during the hot summer months, particularly in urban areas.

"Cities are warmer than the surrounding countryside. Surfaces such as asphalt, concrete, glass, steel, and roofs absorb solar radiation but lose it quickly. The result is higher temperatures and discomfort for city dwellers," Holland said.

Trees moderate city temperatures by controlling solar radiation. The crown or canopy of a tree intercepts the sun's radiation and cools the area it shades.

"Trees are nature's air conditioners. One isolated tree, with adequate moisture, can transpire up to 90 gallons of water each day. That's equivalent to five room-size air conditioners, each running 20 hours per day," she said.

It's easy to prove that temperatures under a tree are cooler. Just stand in full sun for five minutes and then move into a nearby shade. You'll feel the difference!

Recent studies show that the temperature of a shaded wall can be as much as 15 degrees cooler than a similar, but unshaded wall; and that shaded houses use 25 percent less energy than unshaded houses.

"This means that shade helps air conditioners operate more efficiently, yielding 10 to 20 percent reduction in utility bills."

How do you get maximum benefit from shade? Precision landscaping, or simply locating trees where they will do the most good.

To find the best location, place a 24- to 36-inch stake in the ground where you plan to plant a tree. Watch its shadow during the day. If the shadows do not indicate positioning to the desired part of the house or building, keep moving the stake until the right location is found.

Since the sun is at different angles during the year, summer is the best time to select and mark the locations.

Make sure there's plenty of space in the air and on the ground for future growth. Stay clear of utility lines, paved surfaces and other trees.

Soil conditions, climate and availability should be considered before selecting a species. Native species are adapted to local conditions and have a better chance of living to maturity than species from other regions.

The Texas Forest Service recommends deciduous species - those which lose their leaves in winter. These trees, such as oaks, allow the winter sunlight to hit building surfaces and warm the air, but also block or screen the scorching Texas summer sun.

The best time to plant trees is during their dormant period-usually from December through February. Local nurseries and landscape architects can help select species and provide planting tips.

IWU Reflections In Perspective

On the tiny - 1/2 mile by a mile and a half - island of Das eighty miles off the coast of Abu Dhabi in the Persian Gulf, we were faced once with a labour problem. It was discovered quite some time later that an element had infiltrated the ranks of the labour force on the island for the purpose of stirring up trouble. Trained in Iraq and in Egypt, and coming from other Arab states nearby to Abu Dhabi, they were to disrupt the progress of the work.

Abu Dhabi was not at that time on the friendliest of terms with Egypt which was under the rule of Abdul Nasser who had proclaimed that he would see to the removal from the throne of power of every absolute ruler in the Arab world. Sheikh Shakbut bin Sulman al Nahayyan felt that he was included in that sweeping threat, and had nothing but unkind words for Mr. Nasser. And little, if anything at all, for anything Egyptian.

Sheikh Shakbut was about to become a petroleum-producing and exporting ruler. We were engaged in a tightly scheduled project calculated to put Abu Dhabi's first offshore oilfield "on stream", and anything which hindered the work was viewed very darkly by the Ruler. And a strike of the labour force on Das Island, a force of almost two thousand men would certainly amount to a hindrance. But a strike we had. On a Friday, the labour force struck. They couldn't have picked a better day for it, as Friday was the Day of Rest. Little was going on.

You've not seen a strike until you've seen one in an "emerging country". The strikers take the strike seriously. They not only refuse to work, they enforce the strike with sticks, staves and clubs to see that nobody else works. They dissolve all respect for supervisory authority. They take the position... "When we don't work—nobody works". And they have been known to become quite destructive. We had a considerable investment in plant on the Island. I climbed into a pickup and drove the less than half a mile to our plant site, just to check. Shouldn't have done that!

Just as I pulled up to the closed office of the "yard", Arabs appeared in swarms from only goodness knew where. I was somewhat roughly yanked from the vehicle, and one smallish man began working me over with a short length of reinforcing bar.

Hardly had the fun begun when one of their number charged into the melee tossing his fellows right and left and shouting Arabic... "No, No! This is Bill Sahib. Bill Sahib is a good man!" And, very gently, he helped me... others came to help him... into the pickup and drove me back to the staff camp, apologising all the way. His action and apology somehow lessened the pain of the one real good blow that had landed across by lower left jaw, leaving a profusely bleeding gash. Helping me from the pickup... not all necessary... he dashed across the hill to join the strike.

Now, one of the demands of the dissidents; when we were finally able to talk to their emissaries, was that they be allowed to talk to Sheikh Sayed bin Shakbot, the Ruler's eldest son and crown prince. Sayed was well-liked among the labouring class for his sternness, firmness, and his attention to strict and fair justice. They seemed to feel that they would have an ally in the young Sheikh.

Word was sent to the mainland. Sayed arrived aboard a huge "dhow", landed in the oil company's harbour and began to "hold court". Although no work was in progress, things had settled down somewhat on the Island. Freedom of movement was allowed, so long as no one made any attempt to do anything that could be interpreted as "work". Strangely enough, mess crews who were responsible for the preparation and service of food were exempt.

I drove down to the jetty to pay my personal respects to His Excellency. As I approached the gangplank to his dhow,

"UFO" Investigation Steps Up After New Sightings Reported

Apparently the "UFO" investigation will be stepped up after news "broke" on Wednesday evening late. Ken Chapman, owner of Ken's Motorcycle Shop, was startled around 11:00 p.m. while working late at his shop by an on-the-sight landing.

An interview was held with Mr. Chapman and the following is a recap of his story. He was working in the front part of his shop and as he turned toward the south a bright light lit up the surrounding area. As he ran toward the back door he suddenly heard a loud crash. When he reached the area behind his shop he was shocked to see the "UFO" which local Jaycees have been investigating.

Ken continued by saying that he was so startled that he couldn't move. As he watched the "aircraft", voices were heard coming from it. He stated that they were somewhat raspy sounding, as if they were speaking through microphones.

Before he knew what had happened the object suddenly lit up with all sorts of flashing lights and soared upward, veering toward the north. Minor damage was reported at the motorcycle shop, and there was no type of injury to anyone. Ken, being a Jaycee member, called other members immediately but by the time they arrived on the scene the "UFO" had disappeared from view.

While looking for clues behind the shop the Jaycees were surprised to find a pink slip of paper which had the words "WE WILL RETURN" printed on it on one side.

It is hoped that, perhaps, the "UFO" will make another appearance as very few clues have been discovered and it is not known why it continues to stay in the Eastland area.

There is no cause for alarm from Eastland citizens as this apparent landing was a failure and the general consensus is that "if anything was to be damaged in any way it would have already happened." Jaycees are requesting that any information concerning the "UFO" incident be reported immediately to them or to local authorities so that the mystery can be solved.

Sayed sent one of his retainers to meet and to accompany me. Named "Theyad" ("Truthful One"), he was one whom I knew.

Approaching me, rifle slung over his shoulder along with bandoliers of ammunition, with a kind face but with a fiercely bristling coal-black beard which contrasted starkly with his long white "dish-dasha" and head scarf (Shemagh), Theyad gently touched the scabby cut on my jaw. "My father", he said, "Did one of my people do this to you?" I replied that, in fact, one of them had laid hands on me in a manner not in the least lovingly.

Bristling and appearing to turn a couple of shades darker, Theyad then said, "Did you kill him? You have a pistol. I have seen you fire it. Did you kill the (unprintable)?"

"No, Theyad. I did not. He is a child. He is being led by an influence of evil. He did not know what he was doing. And I am certain that he has repented". Was my reply.

"But, my father. You are a friend of my Ruler, of Sheikh Sayed and of my people. You are a guest in my country. One of my people has spilled your blood. That brings disgrace to my country. Mention his name and I shall kill him. He should die."

I assured Theyad that the culprit had been forgiven for having acted under emotional stress, and that it was most certain the man had suffered the pains of the damned in his conscience. But had I mentioned the name of the coolie who had "spilled my blood", I am convinced that Theyad would have sent for the man and would have executed him on the spot.

Eye for eye and tooth for a tooth. Basic criminal justice. Simple as that. Spilled blood for spilled blood, then forget the whole thing. Not exactly the American way. But then, Abu Dhabi is no part of America.

The strike, incidentally, was settled. The project was almost completed, and completion could be affected with a greatly reduced labour force. Sheikh Sayed offered to take anyone who wanted to go to the mainland. Many accepted his offer. They were taken to the city of Abu Dhabi and placed in a barbed wire compound without a shred of shade against the midsummer sun. Those who were not able to prove they were native of Abu Dhabi were deported, and the locals were denied any employment for six months. It was quite some time before another uprising of labour occurred in Abu Dhabi. But I was also caught in the next one. I shall tell you about it. One of these days.

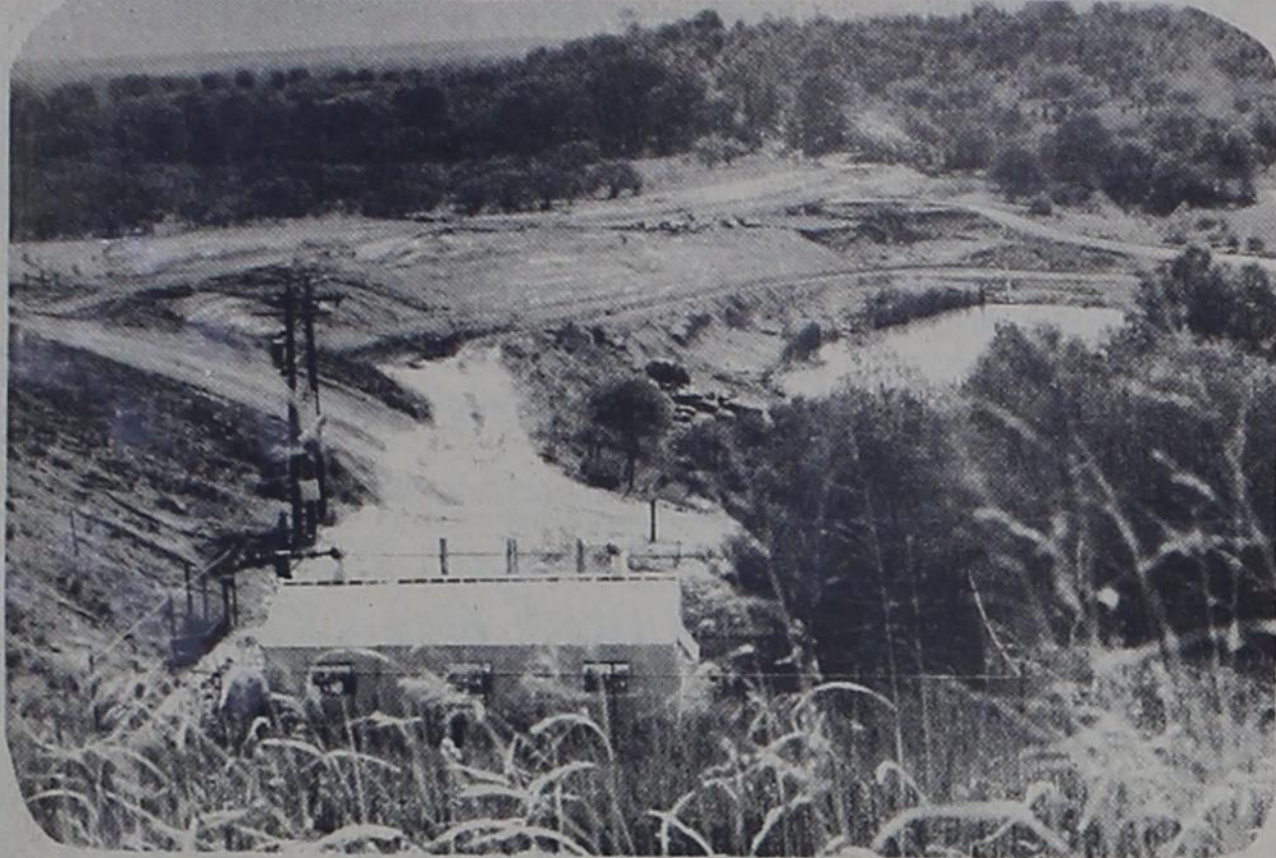

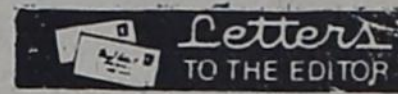

Fish For Ponds And Lakes Now Available

Fish for stocking ponds and lakes are now available through the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District. The District has made arrangements with a Fish Farm to supply the fish.

The fish can be ordered at either of the Soil Conservation Service offices in Comanche, Eastland or Dublin, or by contacting one of the District Directors.

The only species available this fall is channel catfish.

They are four to six inches long and are priced at .25 cents each. In addition to the channel catfish, minnows should also be ordered to stock with the catfish. These minnows serve as a source of food for the fish.

Either fathead or red horse minnows are available and are priced at \$5.00 per pound. Payment must be made before the order can be finalized.

The fish will be delivered to a central location depending upon where most of the orders originate. Each person who ordered fish will be

notified of the time and place of delivery.

No special container will be needed to carry the fish to the pond or lake. Instead, fish will be placed in plastic bags and filled with water and oxygen. This will eliminate the need for a special container because the fish will live for several hours so long as the bag is kept cool. The bags and oxygen will be furnished by the fish farmer.

The tentative scheduled delivery date is mid-November, therefore orders should be placed as soon as possible an no later than Oct. 30, 1980.

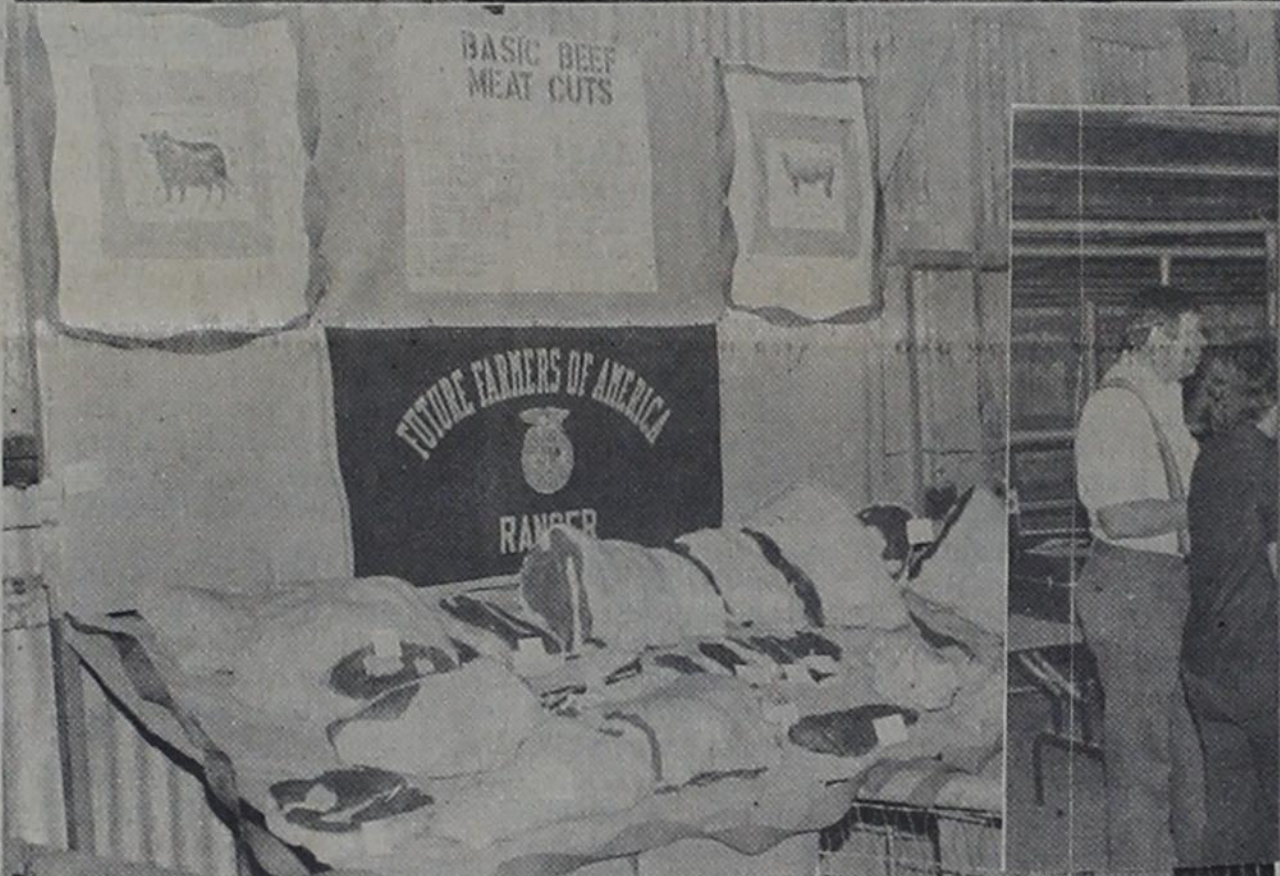
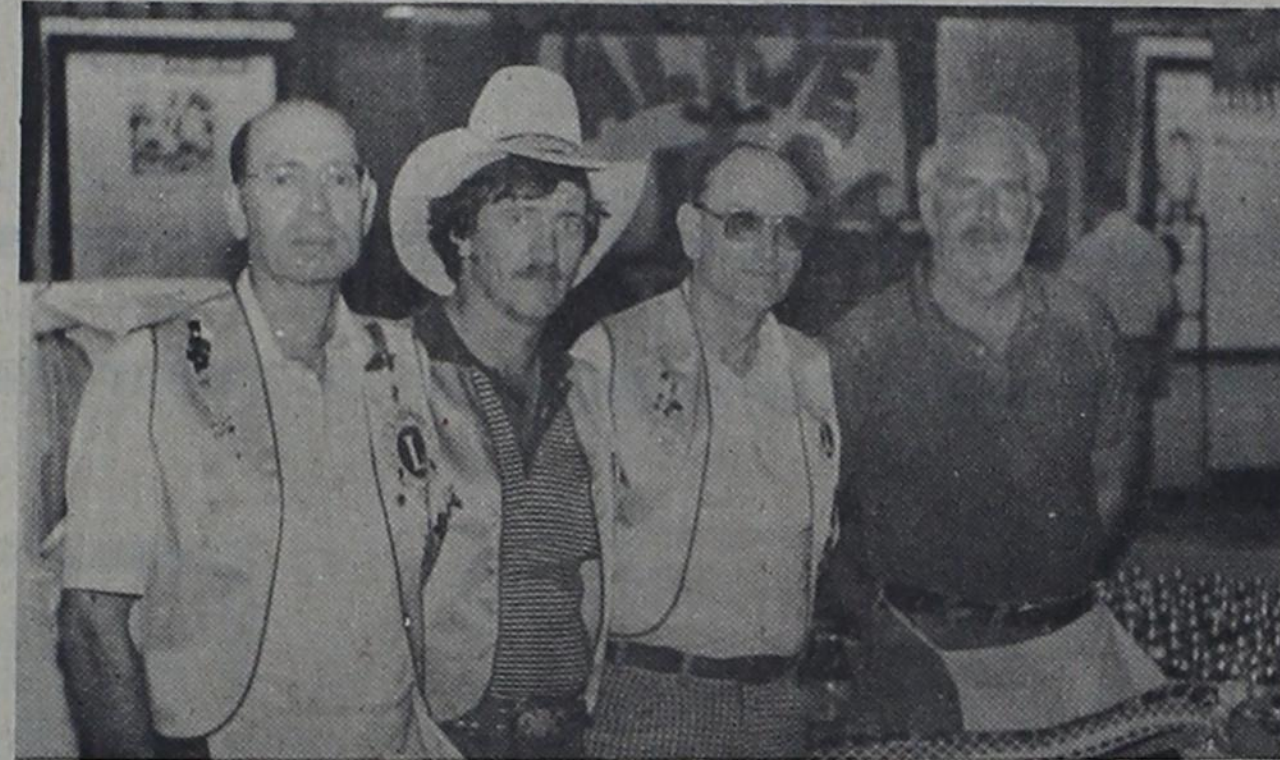

FACTS FOR ACTION

An estimated 4,240,000 have coronary heart disease. 638,427 died of heart attack in 1977—350,000 before they reached the hospital. Many thousands of these might have been saved if the victims had heeded the signals.

Delay spells danger. When you suffer a heart attack, minutes—especially the first few minutes—count.

KNOW THE SIGNALS

- Uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in center of chest lasting 2 minutes or more.
- Pain may spread to shoulders, neck or arms.
- Severe pain, dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath may also occur. Sharp, stabbing twinges of pain are usually not signals of a heart attack.

EMERGENCY ACTION

If you are having typical chest discomfort which lasts for 2 minutes or more, call the local emergency rescue service immediately. If you can get to a hospital faster by car, have someone drive you. Find out which hospitals have 24-hour emergency cardiac care and discuss with your doctor the possible choices. Plan in advance the route that's best from where you live and work. Keep a list of emergency rescue service numbers next to your telephone and in a prominent place in your pocket, wallet or purse.

BE A HEART SAVER

If you are with someone who is having the "signals," and if they last for two minutes or longer, act at once.

Expect a "denial." It is normal to deny the possibility of anything as serious as a heart attack—but insist on taking prompt action.

- (1) call the emergency rescue service, or
- (2) get to the nearest hospital emergency room which offers 24-hour emergency cardiac care,
- (3) give mouth-to-mouth breathing and chest compression (CPR) if it is necessary and if you are properly trained.

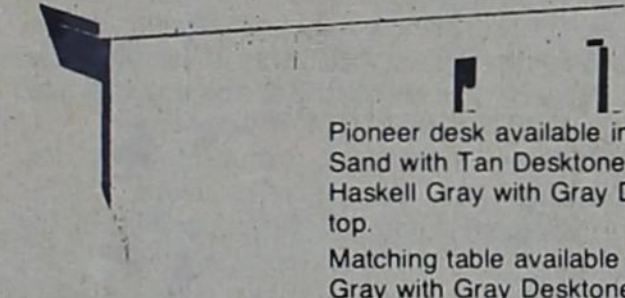

Circle Is Sign

A small harmless looking circle on a hip pocket is the first symptom of a major health-threatening epidemic. The circle, made by carrying a snuff can, is a more obvious symptom than a chewing tobacco pouch. But both show that the user is sucking on chemicals that can cause cancer, the Texas Medical Association says.

Bad breath, discolored teeth and white patches of skin called leukoplakia inside the mouth or throat are a few other signs of the epidemic that has spread to many groups of young people and adults.

Some people start using chewing tobacco and snuff as a replacement for smoking. But they merely are trading one set of health hazards for another, TMA says. About 6 percent of people with leukoplakia get oral cancer and everyone who dips or chews can suffer other bad effects. Chances of gum and tooth disease increase and users' teeth wear away quicker than non-users' teeth. Tobacco juice chemicals may slow wound healing, especially in the mouth. The juice also can irritate or cause stomach ulcers.

Other unhealthy effects come from the drug nicotine that is absorbed through the mouth lining or swallowed. Nicotine makes arteries smaller and speeds up the heart rate. Pumping more blood through a narrower opening may increase blood pressure which heightens the risk of stroke or heart attack. Pressure may increase even more because tobacco users may use too much salt since nicotine can dull taste buds.

The statue marks the grave of country-western singer Jim Reeves, who died in an airplane crash south of Nashville, Tenn., in 1964.

The memorial to "Gentleman" Jim Reeves, a native of East Texas, is four miles northeast of Carthage on the right side of U.S. Highway 79, en route to Greenwood, La.

A neatly painted wooden sign identifies the location for motorists. The sidewalk leading to the statue flares into the shape of a guitar; in its middle is set another emblem of the entertainment industry - a record.

Reeves, 40, died on July 31, 1964 - three weeks before his 41st birthday. Also killed in the plane crash was his piano player-road manager, Dean Manuel, 30. They were returning from a business trip to Batesville, Ark., when their single-engine plane crashed seven miles south of Nashville.

After Reeves' death his body was returned here to Panola County, of which he was a native. Born August 20, 1923, he was raised at Galloway in the southeastern part of the county and went to high school in Carthage, the county seat.

The 1952 hit, "Mexican Joe," was Reeves' springboard to national music fame. Other hits included "Four Walls" and "He'll Have To Go." A movie featuring him, *Kimberly Sue*, was released shortly before his death. It was filmed in South Africa.

Oklahoma Resident Buys Dwelling Here In Cisco

Mr. George Hogue of Norman, Oklahoma, is the proud owner of a nice brick v. dwelling located at 1200 West 10th Street. Mr. Hogue does not plan to move to Cisco at this time but, his mother Mrs. Louise Hogue, will make her home there and will be moving soon.

The life-size statue depicts Reeves wearing a dinner jacket, with his hands resting on a guitar. The inscription below the statue reads:

"If I, a lowly singer, dry one tear
"Or soothe one humble heart in pain,
"Then my homely verse to

God is dear,
"And not one stanza has been in vain."

The Jim Reeves Memorial was established by his widow and is maintained by funds from Jim Reeves Enterprises. Reeves' dog, a collie, also was buried here - three years after his owner died.
