

OBSERVATIONS FROM . . . The River Road BY VIOLA M. PAYNE

During his ninety-four vears as a Central Texas pioneer, as a Ranger Scout, Trail Blazer and driver, as a cattle Baron and sometimes a failure he battled Indians. outlaws, weather, other ranchers, nesters, and the State of Texas. Now his picture rests quietly in old books, with its steady, dark-eyed gaze. Since he didn't bother to take many photographs until he was old, these pictures usually show him with thick, white hair, unlike the heavy mane of dark hair from his youth. His face is resolute and handsome, and history has recorded the results of the projects and plans behind the light in his eyes. For in the era around the civil War, when Central Texas was producing its share of gunfighters. Goodnight stood on the side of the builders. He was dreaming of a cattle empire, and working to make his dreams come true.

Charles Goodnight was born in Illinois in 1836, and his father died shortly afterward. His Mother then married a man named Daughtery, and the family came to the Dallas area. The Mother and Step-father seperated, with the family split into different directions in East Texas. Charles Goodnight once described those days in a few words: "We were devilish poor; had to work all the time just for a living. I was on the frontier have been in school." But from

who lived in Waco. The boys were supposed to range some wild cattle west of that settlement up the Crosstimbers country north into Palo Pinto County. Before long Wes and Charles built up a herd of cattle for their share, but the conditions of the times were so bad that they had difficulty selling them. But this time the Sheek family had moved to Keechi Creek, in Palo Pinto County, and this became the headquarters of the ranching operation. But Indian raids became so deadly and plentiful that Charles Goodnight had to ride and fight more often than herd cows. When the U.S. Government recalled the soldiers from the frontier forts for the Civil war. Goodnight urged the men of Palo Pinto County to form home guards: Eastland and other area counties also

used this means of protection. Fort Belknap, near presentday Graham, Texas, was made the headquarters Fort for all Rangers who were supposed to protect the frontier. Charles Goodnight was made a Scout for their expeditions.

During this time Goodnight was with a group which recaptured Cynthia Ann Parker, the white woman stolen as a carrying a gun when I should - child by the Comanches. He later expressed regret over this episode, wishing he hadn't noticed "That Indian woman who had blue eyes."

About 1861 Goodnight met an attractive young schoolteacher on the Keechi, and set his head to marry her. He began a courtship which lasted for many years. But Goodnight was faced with financial as well as romantic problems as his stint of Ranger duty ended. When he returned home to round up his cattle, he had lost 4,000 of his herd. He had about 1,000 head left. "The stay-at-home fellows had the cattle," he recalled, 'And we poor devils had the experience.

But all the cattlemen had one thing in common-there was no cash market for their product. The cattle had to be trailed out of the State, to where the money

Goodnight had an inborn suspicion of doing things just like other people. He always thought of some different way to tackle a problem. He knew there was a market in an army post at Ft. Sumner, New Mexico, as well as the gold fields around Colorado. But the Comanches held all the territory west of the Palo Pinto, Eastland

County area. At last he decided to swing south around the Indians. hoping to dodge the main war fries, cole slaw, jello, bread, parties. He would use the trails to the old forts southwest, and the well-known water-holes as long as he could. From the North Concho river he would trail across the desert to Horsehead crossing on the Pecos, then turn up the river

He chose an older cattleman with trail experience as his partner-a friend named Oliver Loving. By May of 1866 they were rounding up their herd of 2,000 cattle to take out on this new trail. They had eighteen armed cowboys, including a black man named Bos Ikard, whom Goodnight described as "One of the best night herders I

Behind this group rolled the first real chuck wagon ever seen on the range-designed and built by Goodnight. Its wood was the strongest available, and its axels were of iron. It boasted a back lid which folded down into the cook's work table, with a food-storage compartment behind it. Its design has changed little for the chuck-wagons of this day, and some of its ideas have been successfully adapted into modern-day cam-


As Goodnight and Loving and their rugged cowboys rode out of Fort Belknap on a spring morning, they scarcely realized they were riding into immortality. The trail they were blazing would be named for them, and many men and cattle would follow. Oliver Loving would find death on the trail, but Charles Goodnight would find great fortune, cumulating with a ranch of more than a million. acres in Palo Duro Canyon, grazing a herd of more than 100,000 cattle at one time.

But on this day they simply felt the lure of vast, sunswept horizons, and the pull of a hard job which need doing.

"We didn't realize we were making history then," Goodnight commented later. "We just worked along from day to
