#### Changing to Works Progress Jobs

Following the appropriation of \$4,000,000 by congress work relief, President Roosevelt established the Works Progress Administration, which is, in a great measure, to replace the old Federal Emergency Relief Administration.

Fifty-five men and women, attending a meeting at Eastland yesterday, heard relief officials say that there would be no "leaf raking" projects in the WPA, but that the work would be of a useful and constructive nature, with the government furnishing labor and perhaps some truck and team hire, while the local governmental unit furnishes materials and all the truck and team hire it can.

The federal government is anxious to make the change from the FERA to the WPA, and the Texas relief is gradually being shifted from FERA with headquarters at Austin to WPA with headquarters at San Antonio. State officials are said to be anxious to make an "example" of Eastland county by having it come in with its projects as early as possible.

There is very little to work on as yet, except the broad definition of WPA projects as laid down by Mr. Roosevelt and others. In order to rush the projects through as early as possible, County Administrator H. E. Driscoll and R. F. Boston, relief construction head, have advised cities of the county to work up their projects at once, with the local units furnishing all the money they can, and to send them in for approval. Where there is any doubt as to what the WPA will approve, the county relief officials plan to make test appli-

At present Cisco itself plans no WPA projects, the two major jobs contemplated coming under the highway department and costing more than the maximum WPA amount of \$25,000. Present projects are being completed under the FERA. But there are several projects which are being submitted by county officials, such as secondary roads.

#### Early Applications for Canning

Some time ago the relief commission of this county established five canneries——at Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Rising Star, and Gorman. At present all of these canneries except that at Eastland are running two shifts a day to take care of the fruit and vegetables raised in the territory around them. If the demand justifies it, relief officials have dicated, the Eastland cannery output up by adding another shift, and a third shift may become necessary in some of the other places.

There is an important point to remember in the matter of getting vegetables and fruits canned. Make your applica-

Some persons have complained that when they took their vegetables to a cannery they were told that they could not be served for at least ten days. Seeing a dead loss through spoilage facing them, they applied to the county for cans to take care of the vegetables.

The relief commission yesterday urged all persons who intend to have vegetables canned to make their applications as early as possible, so that the canneries will be able to take care of the vegetables at a definite time, when they ripen,







In an interview, Dr. Verne declared Louvre experts are still con-vinced that the model who posed for the enigmatic portrait was Lisa Gheradine, third wife of the Florentine patrician Francesco

Zanobi del Giocondo. "There is documentary evidence that Da Vinci worked on the portrait of Giocondo's wife for four years, beginning in 1501, because he called in musicians to play and buffoons to crack jokes during hours of posing," explained

MENOMINEE, Mich., July 8. —Efforts to identify the water-soaked hulk in Les Cheneaux island waters, believed to be that of the Grif fon, first sailing ship to play the Great Lakes which mysteriously disappeared in 1679, will be resum-

John Beattie, veteran diver of DeTour, Mich., has offered his services free in an attempt to learn more of the Griffon, built by the French explorer La Salle 256 years

The ship last was seen at the site of the present Detroit harbor, Washington Island, Green Bay, where it was loaded with valuable furs. La Salle sent the ship on its return voyage under the command of Luc, a sailor. The explorer remained to probe into the secrets of the "strange" surrounding coun-

In letters to friends after the ship was never seen again, La Salle expressed the belief that Luc betrayed him, stole the furs, and scuttled and burned the ship. Some historians, however, believe the ship sank in a storm, carrying all hands down with it.

Efforts to raise the hulk in Les Cheneaux waters were abandoned in the winter of 1933-34 because of financial difficulties. It was found that a large hole had been made in the bottom near the stern and that the upper part of the craft had been burned.
