SENATE PASSES THE EDUCATIONAL BILL

PROVISION MADE FOR TEACHING OF GERMAN IN UNIVERSI-TY OF TEXAS.

passed the educational bill carrying appropriation of \$7,772,116 with no material changes in the figures as agreed upon by the senate commit-tee. The clause prohibiting the use of money appropriated for the teach ing of any Germanic language was ing of any Germanic language va-struck out and provision made for an adjunct professor of German in the university at a salary of \$2,000. Another professor will be used to teach German, but will be paid out of the contingent fund by the board of regents.

The senate appropriation is more than \$600,000 less than that voted by

The bill authorizing the attorney general and the board of prison com-missioners to use every effort to hold for the state its option to purchase the Blue Ridge farm as recommended by the investigation committee was finally passed.

The senate finally passed the bill relinquishing to the surface owner of surveyed lands on which the state has reserved the mineral rights fifand permitting leaseholders to con-solidate up to sixteen sections for purposes of developing.

The bill requiring livestock com-mission merchants to give graduated bonds from \$20,000 and upward was finally passed

The most important measure acted on by the house, aside from passing in counties of 100,000 population.

Smally the educational bill, was the commission of appeals.

The house adopted an amendment cutting the time of extension to one.

cutting the time of extension to one year, limiting the life of the com-mission to June 1, 1921, instead of 1, 1922, as provided in the Dean The bill carries an appropriation of \$56,000 for salaries and ex-penses through Aug. 31, 1921.

The house passed to third reading the senate bill making an appropri-ation of \$15,000 for a wool and mo-hair scouring plant at the A. & M. college.

The house adopted unanimously the concurrent resolution inviting W G. McAdoo to visit Dallas and deliver an address during the state fair of

Texas this fall.

The house went on record in a determined fashion against permit-ting any wholesale changes in the tick eradication law passed by the thirty-fifth legislature.

The house bill to provide for a uniform tread for all vehicles used on public highways, was killed in

the committee.

The agricultural committee killed in committee the house bill which sought to fix a uniform ginning price of 30c per 100, giving the commis-sioner of warehouse and markets the power to fix the plice of bagging and

The two prison reforms bills by Mr. Nordhaus, providing for a classi-fication of prisoners in the peniten-tiaries into groups for their selfbetterment, and for a woman on the prison commission, were reported fa-vorably by the penitentiary commit-

House bill to create a \$50,000,000 state bond issue to pay to Texas sol-diers a bonus of \$300 for war ser-vice was reported favorably by the house military affairs committee, with but one recorded against the bill.

The senate indefinitely postponed a bill permitting the raising of sa

Austin, Texas .- The so-called cotton corporation bill, has been finally passed by both branches of the legis lature. The bill authorizes the organization of corporations to handle bills of exchange acceptances and ware house receipts on cotton and other southern farm products, making such paper commercial paper by the backing of the corporation. State banks may hold stock in the corporation.

Speaker Thomasson told the house that he has been reliably informed that the legislature will be in se 30 days and no longer. He added that the general appropriation bills must be passed and said it will be his policy to insist upon the house working on those bills until they are disposed of, so far as is in his power.

The house refused to adopt the senate resolution appointing a committee to bring back to Texas the corner stone of the old capitol building, nov owned by a resident of Denver. Colo

The senate finally passed the bill providing that 25 years' continuous possession of a land title will give a clear title, with a committee amendment cutting out the clause permit-ting an ex parte affidavit of possession of title to be made as sufficient evi dence of possession

The Hertzberg bill, requiring per sons possessing personal property on which they have given a mortgage to notify the mortgage holder if the property is moved, and providing fine or imprisonment for the failure to so no tify, was finally passed by a vote of 1 to 11, with an amendment requiring that the terms of the act be placed in the mortgage.

A bill making it a misdemeanor for a person to keep a dog who runs, wor-ries or kills sheep and providing as penalty a \$100 fine or six months imprisonment or both.

A bill covering the governor's recommendation that legislation be enacted converting Rusk prison into an insane asylum for both white and negro in-

vote 27 to 0, the Texas senate adopt a resolution, offered by Senator Hertzberg of Bexar county, express-ing "confidence in the integrity and trustworthiness of Governor W. P. Hobby," and that the proposed introduction of a resolution in the lowe house calling on the governor to resign, "would be unfair, unjust and un warranted." PRESIDENT WILSON VETCES

DAYLIGHT SAVING REPEAL RID. Secretary of State Lansing Embarks. ER IS CAUSE FOR ACTION OF PRESIDENT.

Washington.-The daylight saving law has been rescued from repeal by President Wilson's veto of the agricultural appropriation bill.

At the same time the president also vetoed the sundry civil appropriation bill, because, he said, by restricting funds, it crippled the work of rehabilitating and restoring dis-abled soldiers and sailors to civil life.

The latter veto apparently accepted by congress without contest and the sundry civil bill went to committee to

be reframed.

Veto of daylight saving, however, was not accepted so readily, although the prevailing opinion was that a necessary two thirds vote to repass it over the president's head probably would not be mustered. Republican Leader

Chairman Vaughan of the agricultur-al committee, will move the repas-sage of the bill, with the daylight saving repeal intact, over the presi-dential veto.



TREATY RATIFIED BY GERMAN ASSEMBLY

OPENS WAY FOR LIFTING OF EC-ONOMIC BLOCKADE BY THE

Weimar-The resolution ratifying the peace treaty has been adopted by the German national assembly by a vote of 208 to 115.

The text of the ratification resolution, as introduced in the national assembly, consisted of two clauses, reading as follows:

"The peace treaty between Germany and the allied and associated powers, signed on June 28, 1919, and the protocol belonging thereto, as well as the agreement relating to the occupation of the Rhineland, signed the same days, are agreed to. This law comes into force on the day of its promulgation."

Most of the ministers were pres ent at the meeting of the national assembly when ratification of the peace treaty took place and there was a full attendance of deputies.

Dr. Hermann Mueller, foreign minister, in introducing the government bills, explained that the hastening of the ratification order would about the lifting of the blockade are about to enter upon a forty years' march through a desert," he said. "I can find no other term for the path of suffering which fulfillment of the treaty prescribes for us.

Dr. Peter Spahn, leader of the Catholic center party, said: agreed to the treaty under hard com-pulsion, to have ourselves from anarchy and to preserve the father-land from internal ruin."

The committee said that many persons fail to realize that war savings stamps can be redeemed at any postoffice for their face value, plus interest.

Foreign Oil Holdings Confiscated.

Washington — Confiscation by the Mexican government of the property of the Scotish-Mexican Oil company, a British company, with several American stockholders, the first actual confiscation under the Carranza decrees which have been the subject of protests from Great Britain, Holland, France and the United States, was reported by the state department.

Police Drive Against Habitual Idleness

Dallas—Men who have imitated small boys by going fishing to avoid work, will find that there is no rest for the wicked, because the chief of police of Dallas has announced that the police will patrol the creeks and the lakes just the same as the drug store corners and the parks to find habitual idlers.

President Approves Bills.

Washington.—President Wilson has signed the army, navy, deficiency and District of Columbia appropriation bills and the resolution cancelling the act under which the telephone, tele-graph and cable companies were taken over during the war.
