CANNING AND PRESERVING SUGAR RULES

This year, as was the case last year, the government grants a special allotment of sugar over and above the regular allowance in Ration Book One. This is for canning and preserving purposes,

Current rumor seems to have it

Just the opposite is true. OPA suggests that no one purchase or use sugar for such purposes until the fruit is on hand or is immediately available, and then only as is needed from time to, as the various fruits ripen. For instance, now is strawberry season. Buy and use only what you need for this. Wait until other berries come in to get sugar for them. Likewise, wait still longer until peaches and other fruits have pital since. arrived for what is needed for

Maximum amounts allowed as above are five pounds per person for preserving and twenty pounds per person for canning

And remember, this is all that will be allowed until next March,

Regulations are for no one to secure any of these special allowances without using for such ex-

act purposes, and not then unless actually needed. In canning one is required to use not more than one pound for four quarts of the processed fruit.

It will not be necessary to go to Eastland to get this special allotment of sugar, as it can be had at the Cisco chamber of commerce, provided you call on the days when some one will be there to attend to the matter.

NORTH AFRICA, May 8.—Eager American, British and French forces fanned out from newly-captured Tunis and Bizerte to clamp a stranglehold on fleeing remnants of the Axis African armies, paving the way for an invasion

In the climatic showdown the arrogant German and Italian forces-battered and beaten by savage Allied onslaughts - surrendered or fled without attempting a real last-ditch defense of either Bizerte or Tunis.

American and British armor pressed close on the heels of the Hitlerites as they fell back d any time. The Japs now have under terrific aerial bombardment. Thousands of prisoners were taken, many of them arriving in their own trucks to surrender and entered barbed wire enclosures. The Americans in one sector alone took 495 prisoners yesterday.

There is a very old Latin hymn about the crucifixion, called, from its first words, the "Stabat Mater." The first stanza says, in simple English, that "The mother, with sorrow in her heart and tears in her eyes, continued to stand by DENNIS, Pastor. the cross as long as her son was suspended there.'

Mother's Day this year finds thousands of American mothers in that place. They send cheerful, comforting letters and small gifts to their sons overseas. They hold heads high and keep on with appointed tasks. But anxiety lies like a lump of lead in the breast and tears are never far from the eyes. For some of them, the sword of the angel of death has already pierced the heart.

It is pleasant to be remembered by one's children. The flowers, the candy, the new gown, the dinner-getting are happy trifles in times of peace. They have little importance in this year of war. The emphasis is not on what Mother gets, but on what she gives. It is the high privilege of mothers who have sons overseas, of young mothers of the babes of fighting men, of all mothers everywhere, to be able to give strength and courage to their nation. In the precise old Latin language it is interesting to observe that "stabat mater" does not mean that "the mother stood there for a CANNON ROAR moment and turned away." "The mother continued to stand" is what it says.

It is the great happiness, the poignant satisfaction of mothers this year, that as long as the nation's sons are in danger, they may stand by.
