A campaign for ridding the county of prairie dogs, jackrabbits and other small animals who do great damage to crops, particularly grain, sweet potatoes and truck is being carried on in this county by County Agent J. C. Patterson and the various vocational men in cooperation with the United States bureau of

F. W. Dawson, attache of the biological survey, is now in the county conducting poisoning operations against prairie dogs, several towns of which he has poisoned in the vicinity of Cisco. While here he and Mr. Patterson have also done experimental poisoning for jack-

A peculiarity of the rabbits is that uniform poisoning for them is not successful. In some localities they may be killed out with a particular type of bait which in another are being made to determine through boys vocational clubs of the county and the 4-H club boys just what types of ball will just what types of bait will be effective. These boys will put out various types and then check up on the results, the general poisoning campaign to be determined upon from these reports. The boys will be supervised in the experiments by


