## Citizens For Better Gov't. Hold 2nd Meet

The second organizational meeting of Citizens for Better Government was held at 7 p.m. November 17 with 30 persons in attendance. The following officers were elected: Audie Wagley, chairperson; Bonnie Moss, first vice chairperson; Sue Taylor, second vice chairperson; Marilyn Abbott-Smith, secretary; Lou Schurpo, treasurer; Luke Harrison, first sergeant at arms.

Temporary chairperson, C.W. Guthrie, spoke briefly to this group stating that some persons in town felt that the group would become a purely political organization. One member of the group responded that "we do not consider ourselves political, and we do not support any candidate for any election." Other members voiced the following concerns: "We merely wish to have our laws followed exactly as written and that we stand for the truth"; the group stands furthermore for exactly what the name implies citizens for better government.

The motion was made, seconded and voted upon that at least four officers and 15 citizens would be required to constitute a quorum for transacting business. The old business finished, temporary chairperson, C.W. Guthrie, turned the floor over to Audie Wagley. It was also decided that a reporter would be required to publish notices of meetings, state problems and solutions to the city's problems. It was also decided that places for future meetings would be announced in The Cisco Press, the Abilene Reporter News and on KERC radio prior to such meetings.

A by-laws committee was appointed to assist the officers in drawing up a visible set of by-laws. That committee consists of Brenda Harrison, Vernon Smith, Ellen Justice, C.W. Guthrie and John Moss.

It was the general consensus of the group that they wanted to become and remain a visible, long-lasting group that would be of help to the citizens of Cisco in working with all facets of government and that they planned to continue to work with government for a long time.

In other business brought before the group the upcoming revenue sharing meeting was discussed. Members of the group made the following suggestions for usage of revenue sharing funds: general street repairs; library; clean up blind intersections around town; clean sewer drains and maintain them, especially in the downtown area; a public softball field; support for girls softball team. The group voted to send Marilyn

Smith as the group's representative to the council on November 20 to present what citizens for better government want revenue sharing used for. All members were urged to attend the revenue sharing meeting and bring a friend so that citizens can pour ideas into what they want their money spent on in Cisco.

The next meeting will take place on December 1, 1980, so watch the newspapers and listen to KERC for announcement of place of meeting.

Long range objectives and immediate goals, or steps for "getting there," he said, should be constantly reviewed and revised if they are to

be realized. The club should regularly "assess how we are doing or evaluate the necessity of our service" to the community, he said, and he presented a number of concrete ideas as to how such a program could be carried out.

"No goals, no challenges, no evaluations equal extinction," he declared, and quoted Solomon in Proverbs 29:13 in emphasis of his point: "Where there is no vision the people perish."

"Ninety species of life have ceased to exist just during our lifetime," he reminded. "Rotary doesn't have to be one of these." The answer, he suggested, is to find community needs that Rotary can meet and be challenged by them.

He advised (1) being aware of open classifications in the club's roster. (This refers to a peculiar characteristic of Rotary Club structure which is based upon member representatives of the various businesses and professions in its community. Membership is conceived of in a context of representation, for toward club government, but to expand Rotary ideals of service among the various fields of community activity); (2) select "strategic persons," not merely bodies, for membership; (3) emphasize how Rotary "enhances the values and quality of community living. (4) be aware of new businesses moving into the community; (5) provide temporary "courtesy" memberships to prospects as a method of acquainting them with Rotary ideals and values; (6) develop a program of Rotary Anne (wives of members) activity in support of club objectives; (7) provide welcome packets for new residents and "orientation" packets for new members; (8) exchange information and ideas with other clubs in the area.

By setting workable goals, he said, it is possible to achieve a long range objective of making a club a growing and vital part of the community life.

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## Lions Hear Community College Week Program

Community or junior colleges have a mission of growing importance in the areas they service, Dr. Norman Wallace, president of Cisco Junior College, said in a Community College Week program talk at the weekly luncheon of the Lions Club here last Wednesday noon.

Dr. Wallace said the community college's mission includes (1) providing the first two years of academic studies leading to degrees, (2) developing a vocational education program that will

qualify people for jobs, (3) offering a continuing education program of community service courses, and (4) providing counseling in the educational field.

Texas has 45 community colleges on 55 campuses and their enrollment totals 48 percent of all students and 60 percent of all freshman and sophomore students, Dr. Wallace said.

The colleges offer a total of 150 different types of vocational programs, he said. Cisco Junior College provides its students with 23 different vocational courses, he added.

The junior college is relatively new in the United States, having no background of European influence, Dr. Wallace said. These schools were started in the USA of necessity. The 1980s will see a tightening of

controls as education expands, Dr. Wallace said.

Cisco Junior College provides higher educational opportunities for some 2,500 people each year, working in four centers -- Cisco, Abilene, Clyde and Graham. Tax dollars pay for only three percent of CJC's expenditures, Dr. Wallace said.

"Our facilities are better than adequate," Dr. Wallace said, "and our faculty is better than most junior colleges. Our school is fully accredited by all accrediting agencies and, I believe, is a very definite credit to our community and to the junior college program."

Lion Clyde Fisher was program chairman and introduced Dr. Wallace.

**Texas Sesquicentennial Commission Plans Contest**

Preparations for the birthday are being kicked off with a state-wide contest to devise an official logo -- a simple and readily-identifiable symbol, or trademark, of the Texas Sesquicentennial.  
The logo contest is one of the first activities of the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission. Created by the 66th legislature in 1979, the Commission is charged to "coordinate celebrations of the 150th anniversary of Texas' independence as a Republic and progress as a state." These celebrations will highlight the "historic, economic, cultural, environmental and social aspects of Texas."

During the planning stages of the Sesquicentennial, the Commission functions as a clearinghouse of information between state and local levels. The Commission will also work to encourage state, national, and international participation, to develop standards for sanctioning local groups, and to plan for the creation of commemorative products, such as stamps and medallions.  
The Commission publishes a special newsletter of the Sesquicentennial, the *Texas National Dispatch*. The *Dispatch* is a revival of a newspaper published in the early days of the Texas Republic at Washington-on-the-Brazos, and will be available free of charge.  
The contest to develop a visual symbol, trademark, or

logo, of the Sesquicentennial is open to all Texans. Contest rules are as follows: (1) Only one entry per person; (2) All are eligible except Commission members, staff, and their immediate families; (3) Designs must be submitted on

one side of a plain, white 8 1/2" x 11 paper; (4) Entrants' names, addresses, phone numbers, and school affiliations (if any) are to be printed on the back; (5) All entries must be postmarked no later than San Jacinto Day, April 21, 1981 and the

winner and runners-up will be announced on May 5, 1981 in Austin.

The librarian's staff and librarian are continuing to inventory book materials that were not completed last year. They are now on the last section, the 900's which include biographies, geographies and history books.

Eddie Santos, second year staff member has been checking all books against the inventory cards. Mary Lou Shrader, Michelle Jobe, Penny Stout and Tracy Reeves have checked circulation files, lost files and overdue files in order to account for books not on shelves.

We placed 225 new books on the shelves at the beginning of this school year. At the end of the last school year many new current paperback were ordered. At the time of this writing 352 books besides many pamphlets and other types of non-book materials are in circulation.

Several new books of current interest are in our library collection. "A State Is Born: The Story of Israel" was written by Burt Hirschfeld. He writes in his author's notes, "It seems to me that the creation of the State of Israel was a historical and human imperative. A variety of personalities, attitudes and beliefs, forces and events shaped the Jewish people over the centuries and gave purpose. Modern Israel is the result, an ancient nation born again." The author continues, "I have tried to tell the story of that nation and those people."

"My Country, the Story of Modern Israel" was written by one of Israel's most eloquent spokesmen, Abba Eban. He begins the account with the climatic moment on May 14, 1948, when the State came into being and traces his nation's dramas in every facet of its history to its tensions and terrors, of Israel's wars and perpetual frustration that has characterized this nation's search for a lasting and meaningful peace with its neighbors.

The quote, "First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen," originally said of George Washington can be equally spoken of David Ben-Gurion. Cisco High School Library offers its readers his biography, "Ben-Gurion and the Birth of Israel" by Ben Conway.

Anyone wishing to gain an insight into the nation of Israel, its significance in today's world should find these three books most informative and thought provoking.

## Homemaking Hints

By Janet Thomas

When the pilgrims arrived on American shores, they found a land well developed with wild game, especially turkey. Because of the bountiful supply, these majestic birds were chosen by the settlers for their first thanksgiving table.

Turkey is still the number one favorite for this special holiday.

Turkey is one of the highest protein, lower calorie meats available. Also, it is always a more economical buy.

As you get ready for your Thanksgiving meal, there are several ways to thaw a turkey correctly and safely. This method of thawing will take 2 to 2½ days for a 12 to 16 pound turkey.

Another method to thaw the frozen turkey is in cool water. You will want to change the water frequently. For a 12 to 16 pound bird, this will require 6 to 7 hours.

It is never recommended to thaw a frozen turkey at room temperature, unwrapped.

The goal of turkey cookery is to have the meat completely done but still juicy and tender. Set the oven at 325 degree F. for roasting a turkey.

One of the frequent questions asked is "how long do I allow to cook a turkey?" The only positive way to test doneness is with the use of a properly placed meat thermometer. When the thermometer registers 185 degree F. the turkey is done.

The traditional "doneness test" used by many experienced cooks is a "feel" test. Turkey is done when the thickest part of the drumstick feels very soft when pressed between protective fingers, and the

drumstick moves easily up and down as the leg joint gives readily, or breaks.

Not only does left over turkey mean money to your pocketbook, but left over turkey meat provides endless possibilities for future family meals. Left over turkey meat can be stored in the freezer up to 3 months.

### RECIPE FOR THE WEEK TURKEY OR CHICKEN PARTY CASSEROLE

- 4 oz. noodles (2 cups)
- 1 10-oz. package frozen broccoli
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon prepared mustard
- ½ cup slivered almonds, toasted
- ¼ tsp. pepper
- 2 cups milk
- 1 cup grated processed American cheese
- 2 cups cooked cut-up turkey or chicken

Cook noodles in boiling salted water, drain. Cook broccoli until just tender and drain. Dice broccoli stems, but leave flowerets whole. Melt butter or margarine in saucepan, stir in flour, salt, mustard, pepper and milk. Cook and stir until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and add cheese, stirring until it melts. In greased casserole or baking dish, arrange noodles, broccoli stems and turkey or chicken; cover with cheese

sauce. Arrange broccoli flowerets on top, sprinkle with almonds. Bake uncovered at 350 degree F. for 15 minutes or until bubbling hot. Serves 4-6.

## Solution To Crumbling Clippings

Are those old newspaper clippings that you've been holding on to for so many years turning yellow and threatening to crumble?

Experts at the National Archives, who have the same problem suggest the following method of preserving old newspapers: Mix two teaspoons of magnesium carbonate and a quart of club soda in a large plastic

dish. Sandwich the clippings between two pieces of screen or Pellon, a material sold in most fabric stores. Soak for 30 minutes. Mop up excess liquid with blotting paper and allow to dry overnight on more blotting paper. After using this preservation technique, store the clippings in a well-sealed flat plastic bag. They should keep forever.

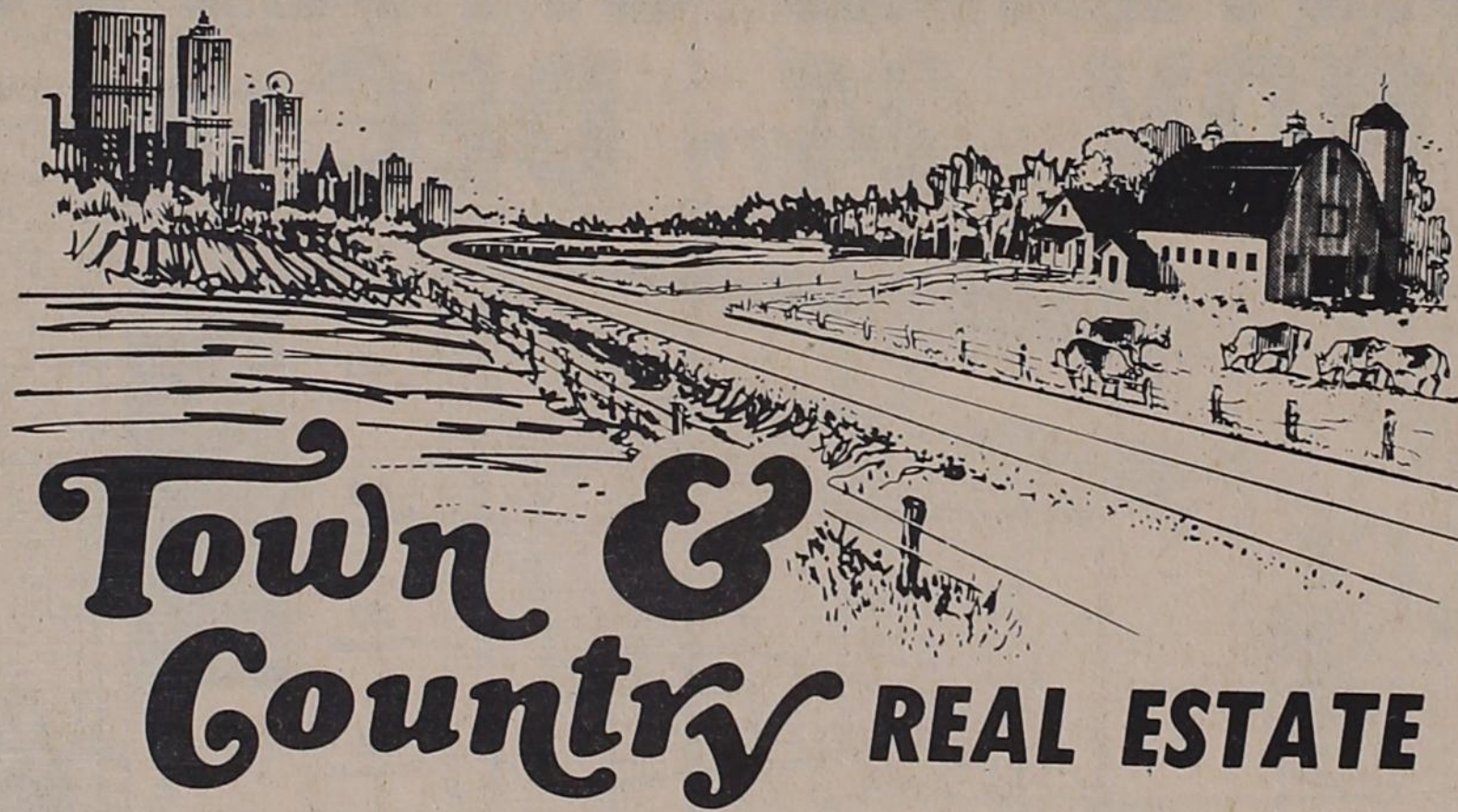

## Re-appraisal Of Property Is Mandatory

Pursuant to Senate Bill 621 enacted by the last regular session of the Texas Legislature, it is mandatory for all Taxing entities within the state to do a re-appraisal of the properties in each county by 1982 and Senate Bill 621 requires a review of the values in each entity in each county within the state every 5 years thereafter. Additionally, the law requires the Agricultural Value on agricultural lands be reviewed each and every year and the possibility exists that the agricultural value on farm and ranch lands could change yearly. The law also requires two values on all agricultural lands, the market value and the productivity value.

In view of the rising cost to do re-appraisals, due to the demand for experienced firms and the inflation factors relative to cost, the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Re-appraisal District decided it would be a wise move and a savings to the taxpayer to proceed with the re-appraisal as required by Senate Bill 621, where the program would be implemented in early 1982. McMorries and Company has been employed and awarded a contract to do the re-appraisal of all of the properties in Eastland County for the tax year 1982. This company is also employed to do Board County, King County, Dickens County, Crosby County, Briscoe County, Hall County, Floyd County, Lynn County, Cochran County, Hutchinson County, Cottle County, Castro County, Coke County, and Hockley County, and for 22 years has done from 85% to 90% of the re-appraisal work done in the West Texas area.

Mr. McMorries has assured us the values will be reasonable, that equity will be obtained in this re-appraisal program, and that the program will meet all of the requirements of the State.

The contract price is a turn-key total not a percentage of the value or a commission; in other words, McMorries and Company will be paid only the contract price and the company will provide all labor and materials to complete the job.

There will be many questions asked throughout the program: What is the company supposed to do in this re-appraisal program?

The company will inspect each and every parcel of property in the county, each improvement of value will be measured and graded, con-

sideration being given for the type of construction, age, condition, location etc., all rural lands will be inspected and graded by the use of an 8 grade classing system of the type used by the Soil Conservation Service, cultivated and pasture lands will be noted on soil maps on each tract of land, and irrigation will be a consideration in the final value.

Will the appraisers see all owners? The appraisers will attempt to talk to all owners, the appraisers will definitely inspect every parcel of property, however, in our 22 years in the business, we find it impossible to see every owner when enumerating the properties," McMorries stated.

In case the appraiser does not get to talk to the owner when he comes by to measure and classify the property, what can the owner do to insure he is getting fair and equitable consideration? When the appraiser calls at home or business, he will have a business card showing the company name and the appraiser's name, the appraiser will present the business card to the person answering the door, this is for identification purposes, the appraiser will state his name and business, ask some questions about the improvements, land or irrigation, then ask permission to measure and inspect the improvements and property. In the event the owner is not at home, a card will be left in the door. In the event the owner wishes to talk to the appraiser, he may call the Tax Office, leaving his name and phone number, the appraiser will within a few days return the call, and if the owner desires, will make an appointment to come back and talk to the owner.

"We recognize that this program belongs to the taxpayers," McMorries stated, "and we want to be as accurate as possible. We definitely will work with the property owners to insure equal and uniform values, and attempt to answer all questions."

Will a property owner have an opportunity to see his values before they become final? Yes. A letter will be mailed to each owner in about April 1982, stating a time and place where an owner can meet with the appraiser. At this time, he can review the values put on his property and also review the values placed on other properties. Then if an owner feels his property is not valued equitably and desires, he can ask for a recheck of the property. If the appraiser finds that an error has been made, he will correct the values; if the appraiser feels the value is equal to other comparable properties, he will tell the owner. Then if the owner desires he may meet later with the local Board of Equalization comprised of local property owners.

Will taxes be increased as a result of re-appraisal? No, not necessarily. In fact, some properties may reduce in value. All will depend upon the facts found relative to value in the jurisdictions. The intent of the re-appraisal program is not to raise taxes, only to equalize taxes. McMorries stated, the Constitution and laws of the State require an equal and uniform tax base. It is unlawful and morally wrong to tax a property worthy only \$10,000.00 the same as a property worth \$30,000.00. The only thing the reappraisal program will do is to provide the jurisdiction with an equal and uniform tax base and the total results will not be known until about October, 1981.

Will properties be valued at its cost when purchased or when built? No, the law requires that all properties be valued equal and uniform in accordance with the current market value of the property as of January 1st of the year. In this case, January 1, 1982. As an example: a home built in 1935 with 1000 square feet of living area cost \$3,500.00 when built in 1935; however, today it would sell on the market for the sum of \$12,000.00. Therefore, the property cannot be legally valued at its original cost. Take a home built today that cost \$30,000.00. It would be unfair to value this home at more than \$30,000.00 when it would only sell for \$30,000.00, and leave the home built in 1935 at the \$3,500.00, when it would sell for \$12,000.00 on the open market in Eastland County. The same percent of market value must be built into the schedules of value to be used in the re-appraisal program to insure equal and uniform values as required by law.

Will 100% values be used as the tax base? Yes, the 100% appraised value will be used as the tax base. The new law requires all jurisdictions to use 100% assessment ratio by the year 1981.

Will the appraisers be qualified? Yes, no appraiser will work on this job that has not evidenced at least 5 years of experience in the mass appraisal business and will be no less than 30 years of age.

Will all property owners be given the same considerations? McMorries stated that it did not make him any difference who the property owner was, how much money he had or how much property he owned. Every owner will be given the same considerations. That is, being fair and reasonable in all considerations to obtain just and equal values regardless of the circumstance or pressures. "We have no axes to grind. Every taxpayer looks the same to us and no property owner will be given

special consideration. We must take this position to insure that equity is the end result of the program."

The appraisers will begin the field work in early December 1980. When the appraiser calls at your home or business, he will ask some questions but unless the owner desires he will not need to enter the home. If the appraiser feels that there is a need to make an inside inspection of a home, he will then ask permission to look at the inside of the improvement. He will not need to go into every room of the residence; the living area and the kitchen will tell the appraiser what he needs to know about the residence, under no circumstance will the appraiser enter a home unless an adult male is at home and permission is granted.

Will there be a permanent record card provided on every parcel of property? Yes, there will be a permanent record card provided the entities on each and every parcel of real estate in the district. The card will show a scaled drawing of all improvements that has any value and the dimensions of each building; it will show the type of construction, concrete foundation, brick exterior, etc.; it will provide the square footage of each building and the schedule cost and depreciation. The schedules will be prepared based on local information. The land values will be shown, by either a front door or per acre value. These records are public records and each owner may see his appraisal card and also his neighbor's appraisal card.

The appraiser will not know what value will be finally placed on the property when he is making the inspection. The appraiser is only gathering information classifying the land, measuring the building and classifying them for use in calculating the final value of the property.

McMorries stated that he and his employees welcome

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## GALLANT LITTLE SURVIVOR

It is fortunate that some people among us overflow with talent and energy. It is even more fortunate when such people turn abilities into blessings for others. Mrs. E. Roy (Edith) Townsend of Eastland has long been recognized as such a person, and a review of her life gives an amazing glimpse of service to Country and community.

For few people, in Eastland County or elsewhere, have filled the role of Edith Townsend, R.N., in Red Cross and

Health Care work. A widow of an Eastland Doctor, E. Roy Townsend, Mrs. Townsend can look on service as a Registered Red Cross Nurse in World War I, and her later work assisting her husband and working as an Anesthetist throughout this area. In Eastland County she was given a National Appointment for Red Cross Directional work, and led in this for 35 years. She assisted County Committees, worked in Blood Donation Drives, in surgical dressings work, and a knit-

ting program in World War II. She directed First Aid Programs, and projects involving Shepherd Air Force Base and Bowie Camp and Hospital.

Mrs. Townsend is one of four Eastland women to have her name inscribed in the Golden Book of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs—honoring her as an outstanding pioneer Clubwoman of the State. She served the Clubs in various ways; including two terms, 1935-37, of the Thursday Afternoon Study Club of Eastland. She was a member of the Women's Clubhouse Board, and President of the Eastland-Callahan Counties Medical Auxillary. As a Chairman of the Nurse's Scholarship Fund of the Women's Club, she helped a number of young women go into Nurse's training. During this time she also assisted in much Civic, Charitable and Church work.

Frailer now, with her dark hair netted with silver, she still enjoys meeting people of the community. 'I loved helping people, and I loved nursing,' she smiles.

Nursing, for Mrs. Townsend, has been a life-long love, something first acquired in her 'Yankee Days' far from Eastland County. She was born Edith Shaw on Nov. 25th, 1893, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. In early 1917 she graduated

from Nurse's Training at prestigious North Philadelphia Hospital. There she also became a lifetime Registered Red Cross Nurse by examination and interview. On the night of her graduation the hymn used as a theme became her lifelong favorite: 'Jesus Calls Us, O'er The Tumult'. It was a most appropriate song for the experiences Edith would soon face.

In Feb., 1917 Edith accepted a position with the U.S. Army at a Post at Eagle Pass, Texas. It was a time of trouble along the Mexican Border, and an impending war in Europe. America declared war against Germany in April, 1917, and Edith was called by the International Red Cross to work with a British Expeditionary Force—No. 16. She left Texas in June, and sailed with the first Unit of Registered Red Cross Nurses to go overseas to France.

She met an attractive young Army Doctor, E. Roy Townsend, when she stopped in San Antonio to get shots before going overseas. E. Roy, son of a pioneer Eastland family, was a graduate of Missouri College of Physicians and Surgeons at St. Louis, Missouri.

Edith decided it was a happy coincidence to find this same Doctor going overseas on the ship with her. By the time the ship reached England, the young people wished they didn't have to be separated by their assignments. Dr. E.R. Townsend was designated as a Flight Surgeon, and stationed with General Karl Spatz at the American Headquarters on the outskirts of Paris. Edith was sent to a British Field Hospital at Le Port, Normandy, (Northern France). This was called a Casualty Clearing Station, and she learned what war was really like when the wounded poured in to the tents and shacks the Nurses worked in.

'They always came by night,' she says. 'They couldn't be moved in the daytime—too dangerous.'

She and Dr. E. Roy Townsend exchanged two or three letters per week. Finally they managed to meet long enough to be married—in Paris, April 11, 1918. The groom wore his Officer's uniform, and the bride her high-necked, navy blue Nurse's uniform. But nothing could dim their smiles, even if the marriage had to be kept secret—due to Army regulations.

It was nine months before they saw each other again, and Edith wore her wedding ring on a chain around her neck.

The Townsends faced their war experiences without becoming either shocked or bitter. Mrs. Townsend does remember that a Field Hospital involved lots of hard, bloody, and dangerous work. Many nights a bugle would sound the alert for enemy attack, and the Nurses would have to head for the trenches regardless of whether it was raining or snowing.

'I was young and strong, or I never could have made it,' Edith chuckles.

She vividly remembers Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1918. The Nurses took off their aprons, used them for flags, and sang and danced with joy.

The Townsends, with their marriage still unannounced, returned to America on separate ships early in 1919. After his discharge in

Feb., 1919, Dr. E. Roy decided he wanted to practice medicine in his home town of Eastland. The young couple arrived in the town in June, 1919, and found it in the middle of an oil boom.

'I felt like quite a Yankee,' Edith smiles.

Edith threw herself into the new life with characteristic energy, and began to make friends. She and Dr. Townsend became charter members of the Presbyterian Church in Eastland. In later years, during a time when the Presbyterians had no resident Pastor, Edith began attending the Methodist Church and placed her membership there. She returned to her family and friends in the north only long enough to take specialized training as an anesthetist at North Philadelphia Hospital. She completed work for her Texas State License in this speciality at Hendricks Memorial Hosp., Abilene.

In the midst of these activities Edith did not neglect relatives who needed her attention. She kept several persons who needed special care in her home on Seaman Street. Her Mother-in-law, Mrs. Edwin D. Townsend, lived in Edith's home for some time during her final illness.

As the years went by Edith became a very important part of life in Eastland County. The American Legion members treated her with great respect, eloquently referring to her as: 'The Rose of No Man's Land'. And her nursing skills were still being used in many situations—consoling patients in an operating room, weighing babies in Red Cross programs, and assisting her husband. Somehow she found time for Club and Civic projects.

When Doctor Townsend became County Health Officer, both he and Edith became even busier. Eventually there was another World War.

'How I wanted to go back and help!' Edith declares.

But her Eastland County medical work and Dr. E. Roy's failing health made this impractical. So she served through the Home Front work of the Red Cross.

Edith worked a heavy schedule until her 65th birthday, when she began to slow a bit. In 1964 Dr. Townsend died, which was a loss to all of Eastland. Afterward there were many changes for Edith, including a move

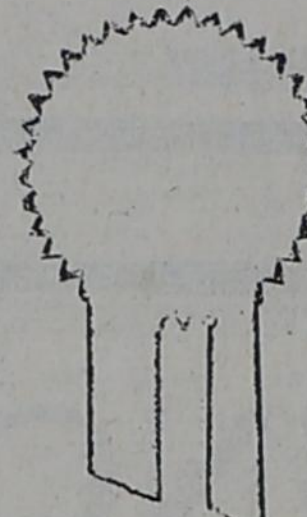

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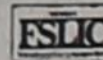

Otis Engineering Inc. from Parker, Colo., No. 5 J.S. Hart is a planned 4,500-foot wildcat.

It will be drilled three miles northeast of Cisco on a 235-acre lease.

Site is 1,650 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 58, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Staked as a proposed

4,000-foot wildcat one mile west of Carbon was Command Energy Corp., Fort Worth, No. 1 Virgil Simpson. Location is on a 160-acre lease, spotting 2,173 feet from the north and 467 feet from the east lines of Section 46, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Q. I've set up a household filing system, but I'm not sure it covers the types of information I should keep. What should my files include?

A. Here is an example of a basic and manageable filing system that may help. You may want to vary it according to your special needs. Segregate the following types of information in your household files and keep them in a safe place in your home:

- Insurance (policies, forms, records)
- Medical records and documents
- Banking (bank statements, used and unused checkbooks and savings account books)
- Paid bills
- Unpaid bills
- Record of possessions (description, serial numbers and even photographs of your valuable possessions — keep a photocopy in a safe deposit box)
- Licenses (requiring yearly renewal)
- Copies of important documents (passports, automobile titles, stock certificates, life insurance policies, birth certificates — keep the originals in a safe deposit box)
- Guarantees and warranties
- Wills (keep a current copy in a safe deposit box)
- Instructions leaflets
