Turkey is still the number one favorite for this special holiday.

Turkey is one of the highest protein, lower calorie meats available. Also, it is always a more economical buy.

As you get ready for your Thanksgiving meal, there are several ways to thaw a turkey correctly and safely. This method of thawing will take 2 to 21/2 days for a 12 to 16 pound turkey.

Another method to thaw the frozen turkey is in cool water. You will want to change the water frequently. For a 12 to 16 pound bird, this will require 6 to 7 hours.

The goal of turkey cookery is to have the meat completely done but still juicy and tender. Set the oven at 325 degree F. for roasting a

One of the frequent questions asked is "how long do I allow to cook a turkey?" The only positive way to test doneness is with the use of a properly placed meat thermometer. When the thermometer registers 185 degree F. the turkey is done.

The traditional "doneness test" used by many experienced cooks is a "feel" test. Turkey is done when the thickest part of the drumstick feels very soft when pressed between protective fingers, and the drumstick moves easily up and down as the leg joint gives readily, or breaks.

Not only does left over turkey mean money to your pocketbook, but left over turkey meat provides endless possibilities for future family meals. Left over turkey meat can be stored in the freezer up to 3 months.





On October 22 Dr. Vermillon lectured to the class on 'Epileptic Seizures' at the Eastland Memorial Hospital.



### Solution To Crumbling Clippings

Are those old newspaper clippings that you've been holding on to for so many years turning yellow and threatening to crumble?

Experts at the National Archives, who have the same problem suggest the following method of preserving old newspapers: Mix two teaspoons of magnesium carbonate and a quart of club soda in a large plastic

dish. Sandwich the clippings between two pieces of screen or Pellon, a material sold in most fabric stores. Soak for 30 minutes. Mop up excess liquid with blotting paper and allow to dry overnight on more blotting paper. After using this preservation technique, store the clippings in a well-sealed flat plastic bag. They should keep forever.



"We recognize that this program-belongs to the taxpayers," .McMorries stated, "and we want to be as ac-

and attempt to answer all questions." Will a property owner have an opportunity to see his values before they become final? Yes. A letter will be mailed to each owner in about April 1982, stating a time and place where an owner can meet with the appraiser. At this time, he can review the values put on his. proerty and also review the values placed on other properties. Then if an owner feels his property is not valued equitably and desires, he can ask for a recheck of the property. If the appraiser finds that an error has been made, he will correct the values; if the appraiser feels the value is. equal to other compareable properties, he will tell the owner. Then if the owner Mr. McMorries has desires he may meet later with the local Board of Equalization comprised of

equal and uniform values,

local property owners. Will taxes be increased as . . a result of re-appraisal? No, not necessarily. In fact, some properties may reduce. in 'value: All will depend upon the facts found relative to value in the jurisdictions. The intent of the reappraisal program is not to raise taxes, only to equalize taxes. McMorries stated, the Constitution and laws of the State require an equal and uniform tax base. It is unlawful and morally wrong to tax a property worthy only \$10,000.000 the same as a property worth \$30,000.00. The only thing the reappraisal program will do is to provide the jurisdiction with an equal and uniform tax base . and the total results will not be known until about October, 1981.

When the appraiser calls at your home or business, he will ask some questions but unless the owner desires he will not need to enter the home. If the appraiser feels that there is a need to make an inside inspection of a home, he will then ask permission to look at the inside of the improvement. He will not need to go into every room of the residence; the living area and the kitchen will tell the appraiser what he needs to know about the residence, under no circumstance will the appraiser enter a home unless an adult male is at home and permission is granted.

Will there be a permanent record card provided on every parcel of property? Yes, there will be a permanent record card provided the entities on each and every parcel of real estate in the district. The card will show a scaled drawing of all improvements that has any value and the dimensions of each building; it will show the type of construction, concrete foundation, brick exterior, etc.; it will provide the square footage of each building and the schedule cost and depreciation. The schedules will be prepared based on local information The land values will be shown by either a front door. or per acre value. These records are public records and each owner may see his

neighbor's appraisal card. The appraiser will not know what value will be finally.placed on the property when he is making the irspection. The appraiser is only gathering information classifying the land, measuring the building and classifying them for use in calculating the tinal yame of the property.

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



**GALLANT LITTLE SURVIVOR**

It is fortunate that some people among us overflow with talent and energy. It is even more fortunate when such people turn abilities into blessings for others. Mrs. E. Roy (Edith) Townsend of Eastland has long been recognized as such a person, and a review of her life gives an amazing glimpse of service to Country and community.

For few people, in Eastlamd County or elsewhere, have filled the role of Edith Townsend, R.N., in Red Cross and

Health Care work. A widow of an Eastland Doctor, E. Roy Townsend, Mrs. Townsend can look on service as a Registered Red Cross Nurse in World War I, and her later work assisting her husband and working as an Anesthetist throughout this area. In Eastland County she was given a National Appointment for Red Cross Directional work, and led in this for 35 years. She assisted County Committees, worked in Blood Donation Drives, in surgical dressings work, and a knit-

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ting program in World War II. She directed First Aid Programs, and projects involving Shepherd Air Force Base and Bowie Camp and Hospital.

Mrs. Townsend is one of four Eastland women to have her name inscribed in the Golden Book of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs-honoring her as an outstanding pioneer Clubwoman of the State. She served the Clubs in various ways; including two terms, 1935-37, of the Thursday Afternoon Study Club of Eastland. She was a member of the Women's Clubhouse Board, and President of the Eastland-Callahan Counties Medical Auxillary. As a Chairman of the Nurse's Scholarship Fund of the Women's Club. she helped a number of young women go into Nurse's training. During this time she also assisted in much Civic, Charitable and Church work.

Frailer now, with her dark hair netted with silver, she still enjoys meeting people of the community. 'I loved helping people, and I loved nursing,' she smiles.

Nursing, for Mrs. Townsend, has been a life-long love, something first aquired in her 'Yankee Days' far from Eastland County. She was born Edith Shaw on Nov. 25th, 1893, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. In early 1917 she graduated Beil's Beil Draperies

America declared war against Germany in April, 1917, and Edith was called by the International Red Cross to work with a British Expeditionary Force-No. 16. She left Texas in June, and sailed with the first Unit of Registered Red Cross Nurses to go overseas to

She met an attractive young Army Doctor, E. Roy Townsend, when she stopped in San Antonio to get shots before going overseas. E. Roy, son of a pioneer Eastland family, was a graduate of Missouri College of Physicians and Surgeons at St. Louis, Missouri.

France.

Edith decided it was a happy coincidence to find this same Doctor going overseas on the ship with her. By the time the ship reached England, the young people wished they didn't have to be seperated by their assignments. Dr. E.R. Townsend was designated as a Flight Surgeon, and stationed with General Karl Spatz at the American Headquarters on the outskirts of Paris. Edith was sent to a British Field Hospital at Le Port, Normandy, (Northern France). This was called a Casulty Clearing Station, and she learned what war was really like when the wounded poured in to the tents and shacks the Nurses worked in.

'They always came by night,' she says. 'They couldn't be moved in the daytime-too dangerous.'

She and Dr. E. Roy Townsend exchanged two or three letters per week. Finally they managed to meet long enough to be married-in Paris, April 11, 1918. The groom wore his Officer's uniform, and the bride her high-necked, navy blue Nurse's uniform. But nothing could dim their smiles, even if the marriage had to be kept secret - due to Army regulations.

It was nine months before they saw each other again, and Edith wore her wedding ring on a chain around her

The Townsends faced their war experiences without becoming either shocked or bitter. Mrs. Townsend does remember that a Field Hospital involved lots of hard, bloody, and dangerous work. Many nights a bugle would sound the alert for enemy attack, and the Nurses would have to head for the trenches regardless of whether it was raining or snowing.

'I was young and strong, or I never could have made it,' Edith chuckles,

She vividly remembers Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1918. The Nurses took off their aprons, used them for flags, and sang and danced with

The Townsends, with their marriage still unannounced, returned to America on seperate ships early in 1919. After his discharge in
