88TH COURT ENGAGED IN DAMAGE SUIT

Murder Charge Grows Out of Cisco Man's Slaying

Murder trial of Mary Lou Howell, charged in connection with the fatal shooting of L. F. Threet, aged Cisco rancher, August 15, 1934, was postponed in 88th district court at Eastland today until December 18.

The court is now engaged in trial of a damage suit which is expected to occupy two or three days more.

Attorneys for the defense filed motion for continuance of the case to await outcome of Miss Howell's appeal from a 20-year sentence on conviction of a robbery with firearms charge in connection with the case.

Clifford Doggett, Cisco, is under sentence of death after conviction on a charge of murder in the same case. Elmer Van Cleave, also charged, is yet to be tried.

Threet was fatally shot in his pasture, nine miles west of Cisco. A small calibre bullet pierced his head. The state charged robbery as the motive for the shooting.

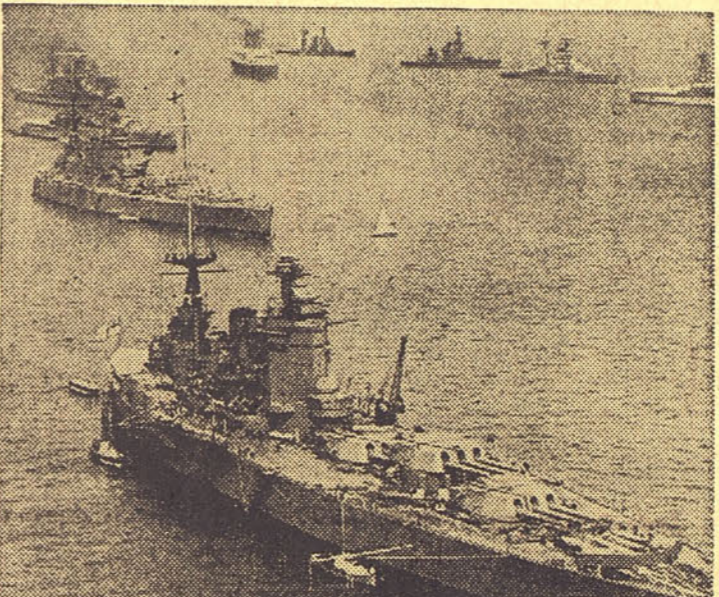
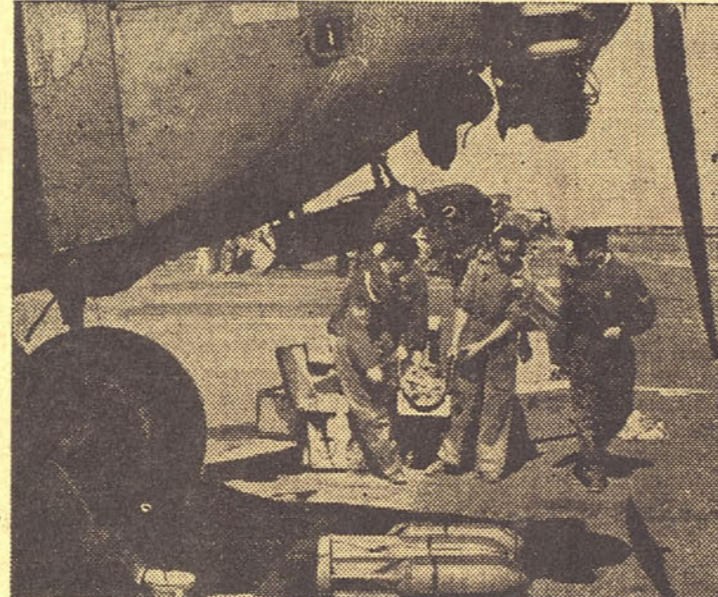

New Hauptmann Case Evidence Reported Found

NEW YORK, Dec. 5. (AP)—The Evening Journal said today that a source close to Governor Harold Hoffman of New Jersey revealed that the governor had obtained new information which might save Bruno Hauptmann, "or at least delay his execution indefinitely."

It was said that it was reported this information may become the basis for the "most shocking story ever brought before the American people."

Governor Hoffman revealed that he had visited Hauptmann in his cell about a month ago, but said it was only "a casual visit."

ENGLAND IS PREPARED TO 'PLAY PART'

Fascist Sources Say Oil Embargo Means Fight

(By Associated Press) Sir Samuel Hoar, foreign minister of Great Britain, today warned Japan against aggression in North China, and made overtures to Italy to end aggressions in Ethiopia.

He pleaded for a settlement basis of the Ethiopian War.

(By Associated Press) Sir Samuel Moore, British foreign secretary, gave the British stand for the oil embargo today when he told the house of commons "we are prepared to play our part."

Paris diplomatic sources said that Great Britain and France had given Mussolini their "last word" in peace suggestions before the impositions of the oil embargo.

Premier Laval is reported to have given the Italian ambassador, Cerruti, an ultimatum late yesterday.

Fascist sources promptly gave new assurances that the oil embargo means "fight."

Italy has sought to reduce gasoline consumption and to obtain more oil to forestall the motor fuel shortage. Italy has also sought to develop substitutes and new oil sources.

It was learned that the British battle cruisers Hood and Renown, which were rushed to Gibraltar recently, will go to the Atlantic for exercises.

A royal Italian decree has imposed official secrecy on Italy's financial situation.

NORTH CHINA ISSUE AGAIN

ALLIES FIGHT FOR LAVAL

PARIS, Dec. 5. (AP)—In a tumultuous session today the chamber of deputies and allies of Premier Laval sought to prevent his overthrow in the decisive voting tomorrow by warning against the weakening of his prestige in the midst of the Italo-Ethiopian situation.

Several hundred demonstrators have presented to the minister petitions demanding autonomy.

PEIPING, China, Dec. 5. (AP)—Revival of agitation for North China autonomy and the sudden renewal of Japanese army activity in this area has threatened to block Nanking's effort to retain its hold on North China by the broad program of reforms.

It was learned that the Japanese army had warned General Ying-Ching, war minister of the central government, to leave North China immediately. He was told that his continued presence would complicate the situation.

Centennial Dress

THE Cisco chamber of commerce will be charged with responsibility for arranging an exhibit to be included in the west Texas section of the Texas Centennial exposition at Dallas in 1936. According to advance information the amount of space available for the individual community exhibit will not be large. The effort, therefore, must be to emphasize quality rather than quantity. Regardless of the handicaps, Cisco should endeavor to produce the best exhibit that is possible. The community is more fortunate than the average smaller Texas city by reason of its location on a transcontinental thoroughfare which will be used by a major portion of those who visit the centennial during the year. It will be easier, for that reason, to attract attention to the city, but most of the work of doing so must be done at this end. It is essential to advertisement, but advertisements cannot sell the prospect once he is brought into the store. Goods and quality must do that. Whatever centennial program is adopted locally should take this fact into consideration.

CISCO will be in competition with numerous other Texas communities in this respect. Says the Texas Weekly:

ALREADY, many communities or cities of Texas are taking advantage of this opportunity, and that is why we say there will be a 254-ring circus on exhibit in this state in 1936. No matter where the visitor may care to travel he will find celebrations reminding him that Texas is celebrating the

hundredth anniversary of its independence and emphasizing that it has much reason to celebrate. The big show will not be confined to the great central exposition at Dallas. The city of Houston will stage a ten-days celebration in April in commemoration of the Battle of San Jacinto; in August, it will observe the anniversary of its own founding. San Antonio, with a wealth of Texas history back of it, will be in an almost continuous celebration throughout the year. Fort Worth, "where the West begins," will spend more than one and a half million dollars in putting on a fat stock show, which will run throughout the summer, featuring the rodeos and wild west shows that visitors will expect to see in Texas.

"Nor will the gaps between the large cities be unfilled. Wherever one may travel, it will be with a sense of adventure waiting around a turn in the road, and it will be impossible to forget that all Texas is in a holiday mood, every community striving to outdo all others in showing what it has to offer in the way of entertainment and interest. County fairs, old settlers' reunions, annual round-ups—all will be tied in with the Centennial celebrations. Huntsville, the home of Sam Houston, will celebrate the birthday of the Father of Texas on March 2nd; a featured pageant and a massed chorus of thousands of Texas school children singing patriotic songs will be repeated several times through the summer for the edification of the revolving groups of visitors. Port Aransas will stage a tarpon rodeo, and in Midland there will be a Western Fair which will thrill attendants with a sense of being in the Old West."

Keep On Selecting Them

EVER and anon up rises some academic critic with a sincere protest against the process of selecting mythical football teams. This practice, says the critic, puts too much emphasis upon winning and does the unselected players the injustice of not giving recognition to their contributions to the game. That may be true, but the fact is essentially the reason why selections of the sort are healthful to the sport. The abstract ideal of a game for the love of it is a fine theory that has to be reduced to the practicality of reaching for a standard. The love of the game must come from striving against odds, otherwise there is no game. There must be a goal to lope for and fight for, and the fact that such a reward exists somewhere hurts neither the sportsmanship nor the idealism of the youth. He cannot measure his efforts against something he cannot appreciate. The average youth may flounder about in a sea of idealism, but to give any practical value to his efforts, to help him shape his judgment and give concertness to his thinking there must be a tangible something against which he can organize his abilities.

THE prospect of selection on an all-American or all-sectional team is a hope that spurs many boys to efforts that develop those instincts invaluable in life. If they lose, they learn to "take it" just as they learned to "take it" in physical and mental combat on the gridiron. If they win, the reward spurs them to great efforts, if they have learned anything at all from the sport.

THERE can be too much emphasis on football, or any other sport, it is true. But there can also be too much emphasis on the academic side of the youth's development. A sound body and a sound character developed in sportsmanlike competition, offering rewards that are tangible, is essential to sound living. Take away the reward and you take away the incentive. So let the authorities, recognized and self-instituted, go on paying this tribute to the youth of the land by singling out those whose play has earned them distinction.

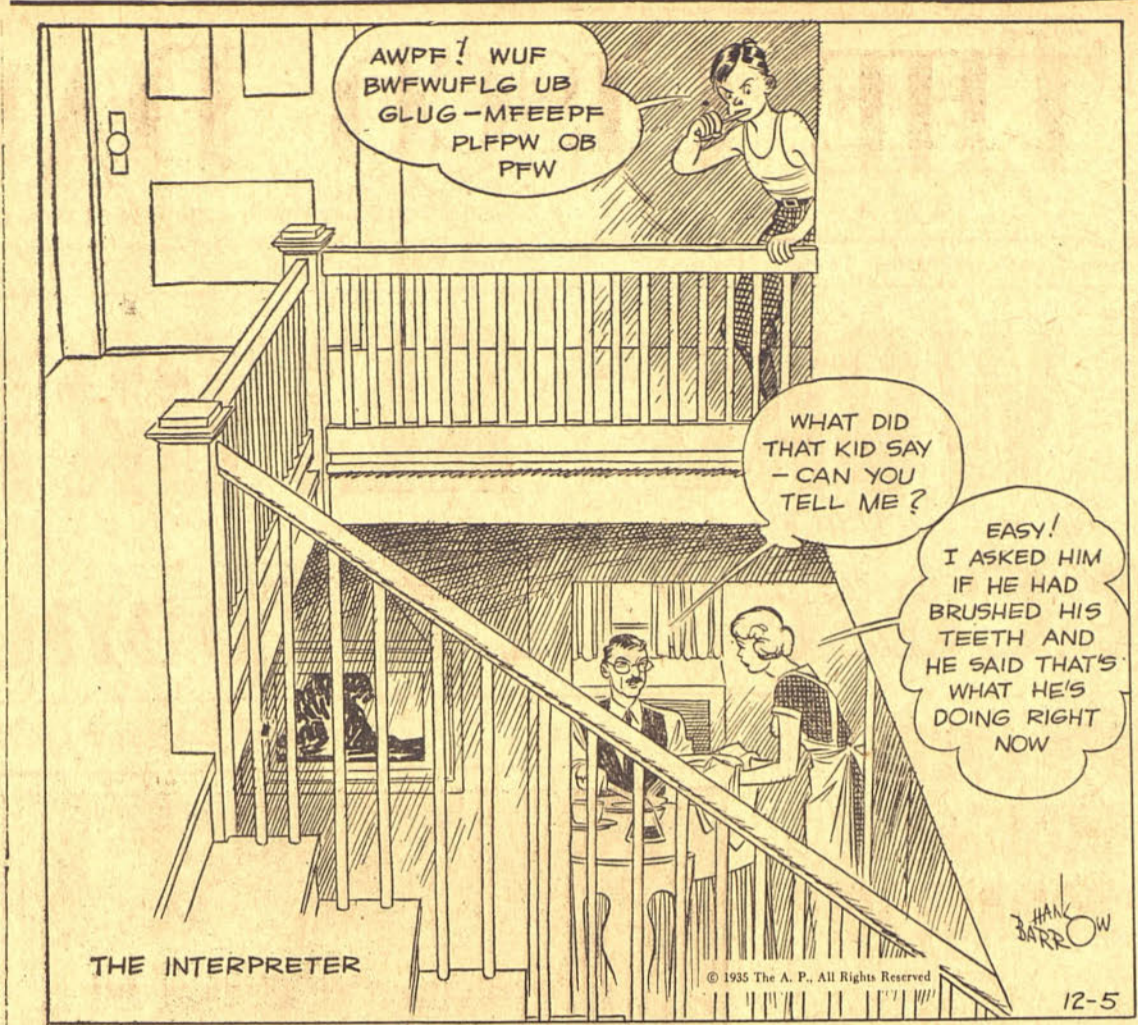

WTCC Is Preparing to Participate in Texas Centennial in Big Way

Under the leadership of its regional chamber of commerce, west Texas will participate next year in the Texas Centennial — in a big way. The plan has been announced by Ray H. Nichols, WTCC president and chairman of a newly-informed exhibit committee acting for the regional chamber; other members being P. G. Haines, chief of vocational agriculture for the state department of education; Max Bentley, of Abilene; and D. A. Bandeen, WTCC manager.

The committee's first announcement said: "The use, for exhibit purposes, of about one-fourth of the vast agricultural building, now farthest advanced in construction on the Centennial grounds in Dallas, has been tendered to the West Texas chamber of commerce by the central exposition authorities. The space tendered occupies more than 6,000 square feet. It is our plan to divide this into ten spaces of equal size, 36x8 feet, for the showing of ten related parts of our unified regionwide exhibit, each part to be sponsored by one of our ten administrative districts, and each dealing with one phase of west Texas life.

"In addition, we will allot space to each one of our 195 affiliated towns where, on panels, serving as a background to the region-wide exhibit, they may tell their own individual stories to the estimated 10,000,000 persons who will visit the Centennial during its six months.

"Each panel will occupy a space two feet wide, and by six feet high. If the towns were to buy it the cost to each would be \$72, at prevailing costs for exhibit space in the Centennial; but the west Texas chamber of commerce will defray that cost, the town's only expense being the preparation of its own panel. Subject matter to be depicted on the panels is not to be necessarily limited to agriculture. Towns may choose their own subjects for exploitation — anything and everything having to do with agricultural, industrial and commercial development and growth."

President Nichols has sent details of the plan to the WTCC's directorate. The director in each affiliated town has been appointed chairman of his local Centennial exhibit committee, and has been asked to in turn appoint three of his fellow townsmen to serve with him. The committee's job is to get up its town panel.

The WTCC director for Cisco is J. E. Spencer and he will accordingly be local chairman, naming three others to serve with him as a centennial exhibit committee. These were to be named by President Chas. Hale of the Cisco Chamber this week.

The ten related exhibits will be prepared by district committees—one for each of the ten districts. These will be appointed, with final details worked out, in a series of district meetings to be conducted by President Nichols and his general Centennial exhibit committee. Nichols said the time and place for the district gatherings will be announced within a week.

"Working through their regional chamber of commerce, the citizenship of west Texas will present to the millions of Centennial visitors an intelligent, truthful, integrated and stirring picture of what we were out here in years gone, what we are today, and what we expect to be in the future." Nichols said. "The West Texas exhibit will not be historical except as our yesterdays bear direct relation with our today

related picture of what the section has to offer the prospective investor and homeseeker. The subjects tentatively selected, one to be sponsored by each district, are:

Cotton: To show present west Texas production and cost of production, compared with the state and nation. To show past development and future possibilities. To show by-product development and possibilities.

Wheat and Grain: To show comparative present west Texas production and cost, and quality of production past development and future possibilities; marketing and milling possibilities.

Wool and Mohair: To show comparative present west Texas production; past development and future possibilities; marketing and processing possibilities.

Cattle: To show magnitude of our open range country, give idea of range life and purposes of range; give comparative figures on west Texas cattle production.

Diversification: To show the poultry and dairying resources of west Texas, with growth and possibilities. Pecans will be included in this exhibit, since west Texas produces 92 per cent of the total crop of the state.

Fruits and Vegetables: This exhibit will present the watermelon and cantaloupe as majors, showing present production and possibilities; also showing all deciduous

fruits and all vegetables that are grown in west Texas profitably.

Grain Shorghums: This exhibit will show how west Texas has become the leading grain producing section of the nation; show possibilities for expanding the industry; show cattle feeding volume and possibilities.

Agricultural Development: In this exhibit will be portrayed the fact that west Texas during the last 20 years has had the most remarkable agricultural growth of any section in the history of the United States. Also to be shown are the number of acres in the past put under the plow; the increasing population of towns in addition to the wealth caused by farm development; and the acres still subject to the plow.

IRRIGATION: This exhibit will portray the various west Texas projects, both now operating and in the making, with production and possibilities.

Urban and Rural Living: Here will be told the story of west Texas' unexcelled climate, resulting in ideal farming, living and health conditions. The exhibit will also show recreational facilities and cultural and educational advantages within the territory.

On the important question of financing the west Texas exhibit the committee makes this statement: "Construction and lighting of booths are costs that will be borne by the West Texas chamber of commerce through the Dallas Centennial exhibition. The West Texas chamber will assume the cost of manning the complete exhibit. The cost of assembling, preparing, installing and decorating the district exhibit will be born by the district organizations. The cost of the community panel exhibits will be borne by the respective participating communities.

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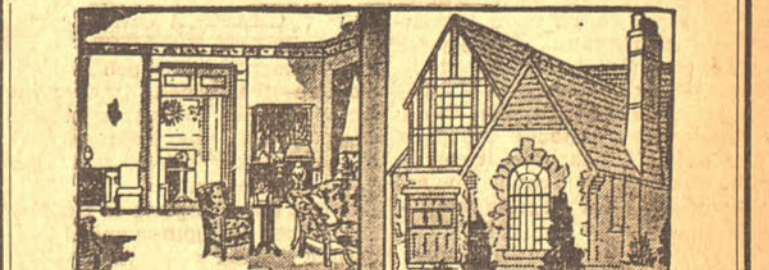

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

Children Thinner Among Ranks of 'Depression Poor'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Children of the newly poor, whose standards of eating, housing and clothing went downward with the depression, lost weight between 1928 and 1933 until the average child between six and ten years weighed two per cent below normal, the United States public health service reports.

Charts made by the health service show that the loss in weight among the children of the "depression poor" was more than the two per cent below normal, since they weighed well above normal before 1928.

Weighed 5,400 Youngsters
Health officials, in their attempt to discover the effect of the

depression on children, weighed a group of 5,400 youngsters going to school in Birmingham, Cleveland, Greenville, S. C., Pittsburgh and Syracuse. They picked those between 6 and 14 years of age and kept track of those ages between 1928 and 1933.

They studied children in three types of families; first, those whose living remained comfortable through the depression years; second, those families which always had been relatively poor; and last, those whose income dropped during the test period.

They found that 15 out of every 100 children belonged to the fortunate group which suffered no marked change in the manner of living; 40 children in every 100 came from families which always have been classed as poor; and 45 in every 100 were in the group which felt the depression closing in about them, changing the food they ate, the clothing they wore,

and the quarters in which they lived.

Menace To Future Generation
It was those changes in the manner of living which undoubtedly brought the decline in the children's relative weight, says the bureau of labor statistics in its labor bulletin.

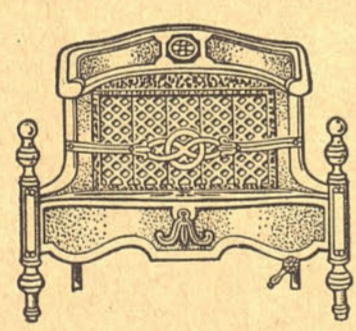

He expressed the hope of bringing the entire budget within \$500,000,000 of balancing for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

NORTH CHINA ISSUE AGAIN

PEIPING, China, Dec. 5. (AP)—Revival of agitation for North China autonomy and the sudden renewal of Japanese army activity in this area has threatened to block Nanking's effort to retain its hold on North China by the broad program of reforms.

It was learned that the Japanese army had warned General Ying-Ching, war minister of the central government, to leave North China immediately. He was told that his continued presence would complicate the situation.

Several hundred demonstrators have presented to the minister petitions demanding autonomy.

Finds Baby That of Unwed Servant

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 5. (AP)—Rush H. Linbaugh, the special commissioner who heard the evidence in the "gift of God" baby case, declared today that the infant was the child of Anna Ware, an unwed servant girl, and not the son of Mrs. Nellie Tipton Muench, a former St. Louis society matron. He recommended the child's return to Miss Ware in his report to the St. Louis court of civil appeals.

ENGLAND IS PREPARED TO 'PLAY PART'

(By Associated Press) Sir Samuel Hoar, foreign minister of Great Britain, Thursday warned Japan against aggression in North China, and made overtures to Italy to end aggressions in Ethiopia. He said that the North China situation might be harmful to Japanese prestige unless there was a quick clarification of attitude. He said recent events lend color to the belief that Japanese influence is being exerted to shape Chinese internal political developments in administrative arrangements.

He pleaded for a settlement basis of the Ethiopian War.

(By Associated Press) Sir Samuel Moore, British foreign secretary, gave the British stand for the oil embargo Thursday when he told the house of commons "we are prepared to play our part."

Paris diplomatic sources said that Great Britain and France had given Mussolini their "last word" in peace suggestions before the impositions of the oil embargo.

Premier Laval is reported to have given the Italian ambassador, Cerruti, an ultimatum late yesterday.

Fascist sources promptly gave new assurances that the oil embargo means "fight."

Italy has sought to reduce gasoline consumption and to obtain more oil to forestall the motor fuel shortage. Italy has also sought to develop substitutes and new oil sources.

It was learned that the British battle cruisers Hood and Renown, which were rushed to Gibraltar recently, will go to the Atlantic for exercises.

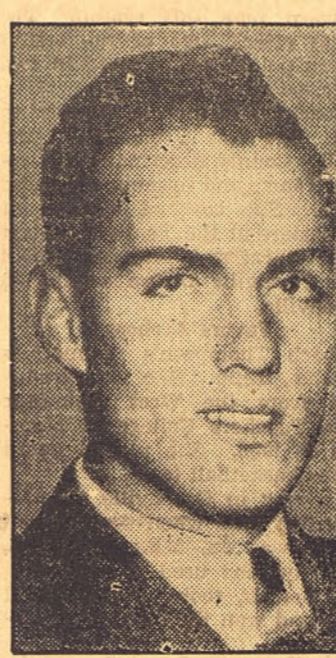
A royal Italian decree has imposed official secrecy on Italy's financial situation.

HOWELL CASE POSTPONED TO DECEMBER 18

Murder trial of Mary Lou Howell, charged in connection with the fatal shooting of L. F. Threet, aged Cisco rancher, August 15, 1934, was postponed in 88th district court at Eastland Thursday until December 18.

The court is now engaged in trial of a damage suit which is expected to occupy two or three days more.

Attorneys for the defense filed motion for continuance of the case to await outcome of Miss Howell's appeal from a 20-year sentence on conviction of a robbery with firearms charge in connection with the case. They indicated a plea of former jeopardy would be made.

Clifford Doggett, Cisco, is under sentence of death after conviction on a charge of murder in the same case. Elmer Van Cleave, also charged, is yet to be tried.

AUSTIN, Dec. 6. (AP)—Gov. James V. Allred today refused to interfere with the execution early Friday morning of Pierson Cantrell, convicted for the slaying of Frank Guy, 70-year-old Edge-wood farmer, whose beaten and shot body was found in a crude grave in Wood county near Mineola.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 5. (AP)—President Cardenas today promised to give Mexico's 16,000 rural school teachers arms to protect themselves as they spread socialistic education throughout the country.

The teachers had demanded guarantees of safety against the rebels who killed and mutilated many teachers recently.

Girls Test Value Of Classwork in Economics Dep't

(Editor's Note: Following is the first of a series of articles on the home economics department of the Cisco high school, written by Miss Francis Bowen, director).

By MISS FRANCIS BOWEN On Friday, November 22, the girls taking home economics at Cisco high school were greeted with the announcement that they would do independent classwork Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday before Thanksgiving, while their teacher attended the ninth annual State Homemaking Conference in San Antonio.

In the beginning classes—with a total of 79 girls—a short exercise on writing of lunch menus was taken up. After this, the girls made menus that were suited to their family's needs and to their own ability as cooks. Girls were encouraged to try out new recipes and to plan menus different from any planned as a class project. There, during the Thanksgiving week, these beginning girls served at least one luncheon to their family without any help from the other members. Reports on their "home practice" Monday, December 2, indicated that the girls are becoming such accomplished cooks that they can make successful light bread on their first trial. "Beginner's luck," you say? Perhaps so; but the girls say "plain good cooks."

The second year girls worked the 3 days in class planning dinner menus more ambitious than those planned as a class or group project. They also completed work on their first home project reports.

The third year girls—by the way, the class this year is the largest Cisco has ever had—did work that is harder to explain than the others. They are studying "family and community relationships." The girls scored themselves by a personality score card that had been set up the previous Thursday and Friday. Then they made a definite plan for improving their personality so that they will be better members of their own home and community.

Although this unit is a short one of four weeks, the work in personality development will continue throughout the entire year. Classwork Monday began with a discussion of what the girls considered essential in choosing a life partner. Considerable interest was shown and plans are being made to get the high school boys' opinion of what he wants his wife to be.

The girls have shown their ability to work independently in their own classroom—now the big test comes—can these girls transfer their classwork to their own homes and make themselves better and more worthy members of the family group?

Spending of AAA Tax Money Seen Also as Issue

By STEPHEN J. McDONOUGH
WASHINGTON, Dec. 1. (AP) — Many government attorneys see much more than legality of the AAA processing tax hinging on the supreme court's forthcoming ruling on that measure.

Spending of tax money requires, theoretically at least, a specific grant of power authorized by the constitution; but the only clause of that document they can find which gives the AAA that power is the "general welfare" provision for improving the condition of the entire country.

It was under this clause, the attorneys say, that the Louisiana and Alaska purchases were made, that agricultural extension is carried on, that relief is given the unemployed, that the Tennessee valley authority is operating, and that the public health service, Smithsonian Institution, and other old-time government agencies, are continued.

One Argument

Thus, it is argued, if the supreme court should declare the AAA processing taxes, as such, unconstitutional, rather than merely the method of levying them, some doubt will be cast on the legality of these other activities.

Lawyers for receivers of the Hoosac Mills corporation, plaintiff in the test case asking repayment of processing taxes on cotton, are expected to argue that the levies are unconstitutional because the constitution does not specifically provide for them and also because congress unlawfully delegated its tax rate-making powers to the secretary of agriculture.

The government's petition to the court asking for a hearing of the case declared, on the other hand, that the act "represents the final decision of congress that federal assistance was and is needed to restore the normal functioning of the agricultural life of the nation and that such restoration was and remains vital to the halting of the disastrous period of depression which has threatened the country's very structure."

Millions Affected

It added that congress adopted the law after several years of considering the necessity for farm relief and recently had approved its administration, adding that "the

provisions challenged in this case directly affect thousands of taxpayers, indirectly affect millions of consumers, and involve hundreds of millions of dollars of internal revenue.

Approval of the AAA by congress at the last session in passing the amendments to the act, which attempted to forbid suits to collect taxes already paid, was questioned, however in a supreme court ruling of November 25 which directed eight southern rice millers to pay the levy on rice into a special depository instead of the treasury pending a decision on constitutionality of AAA.

Amendment Again

Many government officials have declared privately their belief that a ruling of unconstitutionality on AAA by the court immediately would result in a demand for an amendment to the constitution if the decision were based on irregularity of the taxes as such.

However, if it should hold only that the delegation of the taxing power to the executive branch of the government is unconstitutional, as it did in the case of code-making under NRA, then collection of processing taxes could be continued, they believe, because of the redefinition of tax rates at the last session of congress.

REALITY FIRM IS ROBBED

FORT WORTH, Dec. 5. (AP) — Two robbers, one with a sawed-off shotgun, the other with a pistol, held up and bound three men in the City Realty company's office above a crowded down-town street, and fled through the crowds with over \$180 Saturday morning.

John Reagan, operator of the realty firm; Dr. E. A. Sibley and Frank Lanham were in the office on the second floor when the men came in. They were bound, hand and foot, and their lips sealed with adhesive tape during the robbery.

She's been coaching the game several years and had her Central Wildcats right in the midst of the fight for the city's elementary school championship.

Taking over a squad of green youngsters who had little opportunity to show their ability because they had no coach, Miss Thompson led her gridders to five victories, one defeat and a tie in the first seven games of a 13-game schedule.

She's A 'Bear'

"I just love to coach," she says. "Although we haven't the best team to be found in this section, our boys are all fighters." They have a girl mascot.

Miss Thompson drills her proteges in straight football for the most part, but has introduced the forward pass this season. The aerial attack, one of the team's strong points, has figured in two victories.

Coaching football is not new to her. She was a teacher at the Shelby County Reformatory, Bartlett, Tenn., and organized a team there. She coached a team of youngsters at the Tennessee State Agricultural and Training School near Nashville before coming to Greenville.

Favors Archery

Coach Thompson's home is Trimble, Tenn. She was graduated from the West Tennessee State Teachers College at Memphis in '30. She played guard on the basketball team.

Arriving in Greenville at mid-term last year when the baseball season was on, Miss Thompson, who says she used to play first base herself, took her Central team and won the city championship.

Of all sports she prefers archery. In 1931 she won the flight championship for members of the Memphis Archery Club. She is also fond of target shooting and has played some golf.

Low Caste Hindus Abjure Old Faith Shocking Gandhi

NASIK, India, Dec. 5. (AP) — Symbolizing their decision to leave the Hindu fold, a large gathering of youths from the depressed classes publicly burned sacred Hindu books here.

Including a copy of the laws of Manu, the ancient Hindu law-giver, and others upholding the doctrine of untouchability, the books were thrown on a pyre to the accompaniment of "funeral orations" and with dramatic solemnity.

Resolutions were passed that holy places nor give money to untouchables should neither visit Hindu priests.

A sensation was caused recently when Dr. Ambedkar, their leader, exhorted a mass meeting of the depressed classes to abandon

Hinduism and adopt "any other religion which gives you equality of status and treatment." He said he had decided to change his religion.

When informed of Doctor Ambedkar's speech, Mahatma Gandhi said it seemed unbelievable, but if true it was an unfortunate event, especially when untouchability was on its last legs. He said a change of faith would not serve the untouchables' cause.

Dispatches from Coromandel in the interior hillsides of Minas Geraes state, Brazil, say a diamond unearthed there weighing 141 carats was sold to Joaquim Aguiar, industrialist, for 495 contos (about \$30,000, and is valued at 1,200 contos (about \$72,000). Other large stones are the Orloff diamond, 194 carats; Pitt diamond, 187 carats, and Kohinoor diamond, slightly over 106 carats.

Tom Loughran, Touring Europe, Finds The Opposition Too Easy

LONDON, Dec. 5 (AP) — Tommy Loughran, by completely out-pointing and outclassing young Maurice Strickland of New Zealand, has acquired the gentle worry of who and where to fight on his current European tour.

His fight with Strickland was easy; so easy that London sports writers could do no more than gather up their adjectives of praise and hope for a more worthy opponent for the old maestro with the educated left.

Loughran, by supreme artistry, bluffed, out-manuevered, and outboxed a husky puncher, and left the ring with his hair parting still intact.

Too Easy For Loughran

Said Tommy himself: "It was easy; a little too easy. Strickland is young and he showed himself bewildered. It really wasn't fair to the spectators. I'd like to meet someone with more experience."

Loughran now hopes for more bouts in Europe, for he doesn't intend to start home for a while yet, but the English sports writers have been quick to point out that there won't be any rush of challengers. There is a talk of a match between the Irish-American and Len Harvey or Jack Petersen, leading English heavyweights.

It's Loughran's first experience with British fight fans and he has no complaints, he declares.

"I've been treated royally. I like boxing before the English public. They're sporting. In fact I think the English boxing public is more fair-minded towards a foreigner than is the American."

Tommy, the 'Woman-Hater'

There is, however, the reputation he has acquired in England as a woman-hater. A published interview, in which the handsome Tommy explained the sheer inability of a successful fighter to mix boxing and love affairs, is partly responsible.

"But I'm afraid they sort of framed me," sighs Loughran. "When the young lady reporter showed up to talk to me, she trembled visibly; so much so that I had to ask whether she was frightened. Some of my good friends, it seems, had been putting in some very good words as regards my attitude toward the fair sex."

Plans for future fights for Loughran include one or two in Germany and Belgium, providing someone can be found who's willing to take a boxing lesson a la Loughran.

Back on the Job; Burns Are Healed

Clarence Tune, full time fireman of the city fire department, was back on the job this week after an absence of about ten days due to a gasoline burn that blistered both of his hands.

But his hurts have healed, and except from being a bit tender, the blisters have peeled off nicely, and he has recovered without a scar.

While priming an automobile motor the gasoline ignited from sparks from the engine, painfully burning both hands. He was given emergency treatment at once, and upon examination it was found that the burns were not deep, hence his speedy recovery.

Sister of King of England Dies Today

LONDON, Dec. 5 (AP) — Princess Victoria, 67 years of age and sister of King George of England, died Tuesday, causing cancellation of the state ceremonies upon the occasion of the opening of parliament.

The dead princess was the favorite granddaughter of the late Queen Victoria. She was never married. Besides the king of England, a sister, the reigning queen of Norway, is a survivor.

War Rumors Boom Spanish Insurance

MADRID, Dec. 5 (AP) — Sharper realization of the uncertainty of life, due to war scares, is believed by experts to be responsible for recent increases in the sale of life and property insurance in Spain.

Not since the World War have insurance companies here seen such a boom. There are 24 domestic and 15 foreign companies in the country.

Statistics for nine months of 1935 show 143,321 persons insured for a total of 2,197,753,000 pesetas as compared with 120,280 holders of 1,883,047,152 pesetas worth of life insurance for 1930.

There was also a sharp increase in fire insurance sales, thanks to published accounts of the destructive power of new incendiary bombs.

A Japanese embassy spokesman also said the outlook was promising for a settlement of the North China differences.

Decline in New Charters Granted

AUSTIN, Dec. 5. — In comparison both with the previous month and the like month last year, there was a decline in the number of new charters granted Texas corporations during October, according to reports to the University of Texas bureau of business research.

A total of 97 new charters was granted during the month, a decrease of 3 per cent from the preceding month and 12.6 per cent from October last year. Total capitalization, \$1,057,000, was down 33.7 per cent from the month before and 10.4 per cent from the corresponding month last year.

Groups showing substantial increases in number of new incorporations chartered were manufacturing, real estate - building and merchandising, while the oil, transportation and miscellaneous groups showed sharp declines.

Onion Smuggling To United States Irks Spaniards

VALENCIA, Spain, Dec. 5 (AP) — Smuggling of onion seeds to the United States has been protested by the Valencia Onion Growers association.

Exportation of Spanish onion seed was prohibited by decree a year ago after growers here had protested that American crops, grown from these seeds, were causing onion exports to the United States to decline sharply.

Despite the decree there has been a heavy contraband exportation of seeds, the Spanish growers said in their petition for restrictive measures.

They said that the Spanish embassy in Washington reported discovering, labeled as bird-seed, 8,030 pounds of contraband onion seeds on one ship reaching New York from Valencia.

CHICAGO, Dec. 5 (AP) — At a pre-Christmas novelty review here a 10-inch Christmas tree with 16 glowing, pinpoint stars for table decoration attracted attention. All 16 stars derive their light from one tiny bulb inside the base of the "tree," glass reflectors "relaying" the rays.

Animals Popular
Animal cards hold their own, with cats definitely smarter. Dogs—particularly wirehairs and scotties—reappear prominently on the card counters. There are penguins, polar bears, elephants and photographs of glass antelopes, seals for those whose fancies run that way.

"Noel" is the thing to say this year, though many customers are expected to settle for a "Merry Christmas." The card-writers eschew "Xmas."

Colored prints from "Alice in Wonderland" and "David Copper-

field" are shown in the supposed-smart collections.

Fruit comes into its own in this year's cards, while blue is the color predominant.

Flippancy Missing
Flippancy, noted generally through last season's cards, is absent from the current stocks. They feature poinsettias, silhouette figures of gentlemen tipping their beavers to dainty creatures in pantalettes.

Although subdued, the religious motif is apparent, showing principally the standard Three Wise Men and Mother and Lamb scenes. Hunting vistas in red, silver, and black also are popular, with ice skaters on frozen ponds, rosy-cheeked cherubs, and plum puddings receiving a substantial play.

China's Travel Laws Balk Jap Traders

NANKING, Dec. 5. (AP)—Japanese who wish to go places and do things in China complained to the Japanese embassy here that the Chinese government has closed a large part of the country, to travelers on the grounds that travel is "unsafe" in those areas.

This has frustrated the efforts of Japanese firms to send salesmen into the interior.

The embassy, carrying these complaints to the Chinese ministry of foreign affairs, insisted that Japanese citizens be given the right to travel freely.

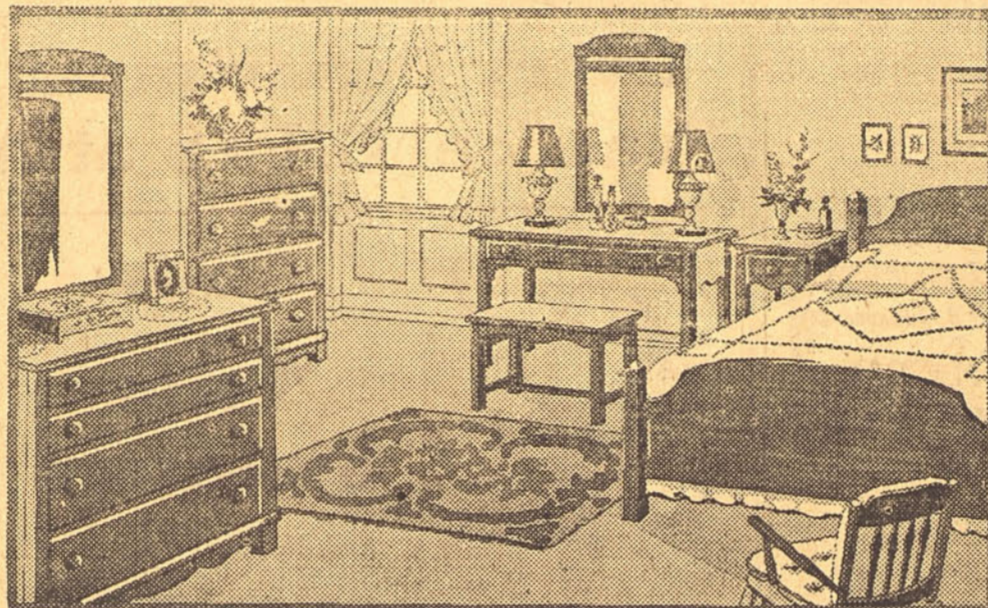
The Chinese government pointed out that bandits and commu-

The Nation's Ace Golfers Await Tee-Off in Miami Biltmore Open

By JOHN McKNIGHT
MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 5. (AP)—With a title worn previously by six of the sport's greatest figures at stake again, the top flight of the professional and amateur golf brigade tees off here December 14 in the sixth annual \$10,000 Miami Biltmore open.

Among the contenders is Sam Parks, Jr., national open champion. Keen competition and the tough, tricky course renders the task of would-be selectors of favorites difficult.

First to win the event, which paid only \$2,500 after 36 holes its initial year, were Walter Hagen and Henry Ciuci, who tied at 143 in March, 1931. Al Espionsa and Denny Shute, with 144's halved the runner-up money. John DeForest was low amateur, his score 161.

Sarazen Holds Record

A \$10,000 tournament in March, 1932, was won by Gene Sarazen, with the record 72-hole score of 287. Hagen and Paul Runyan, with 288's, were runners-up. Ralph Redmond, at 303, was low amateur.

In November, 1932, Denny Shute emerged with the third title, his score 291. A stroke behind was John Revolta, current P. G. A. champion. Low amateur was Curtis Bryan, at 319.

Willie MacFarlane went blazing through four rounds using 288 strokes to capture first honors in December, 1933. MacFarlane established the course record of 67 strokes that year. Revolta again was second, registering another 292. Johnny Goodman, blond Nebraskan, took amateur honors with 304.

The tournament was divided into two sections last year, the "Bombers" competing for \$7,500 and the "Pursuit" flight seeking \$5,000 in prize money. The "Bomber" division was restricted to the low qualifiers in the P. G. A. tournament and the low 30 in the National Open. Other eligibles played in the "Pursuit" flight.

Olen Dutra's 292 took the "Bomber" crown. Orville White was runner-up with 295. Mike Turnesa won the Pursuit division at 204. The runner-up was Abe Espinosa, with 299. Amateurs' honors were won by James Milward's 315.

This year the tournament reverts to the open-field system of only one money division.

A course of many tricks, dog-legs, water hazards, traps, headwinds confronts the field. A winding creek flanks several fairways and guards the approach to several greens.

The first major stumbling block

on the out-going nine is the fifth hole, par 4, 440 yards, a right-angle dog-leg.

First of the water holes is the seventh. Water is on the left and traps and bunkers to the right. The lake guards a green flanked by sand traps.

The part 4,290 yard ninth is bounded by water on both sides of the fairway. A short, accurate pitch must be made to an elevated green.

Par usually claims a stroke from the unwary at the eleventh, par-4, 435 hole. Two full woods down a fairway where a cross-wind prevails from the right must be straight to avoid rough on each side of the narrow fairway.

The 145-yard, par-3 fourteenth hole has traps to right and left of the green and out-of-bounds to the rear.

The fifteenth hole, par-5, 550-yard challenge, foils many. It is difficult to reach the green in two shots on this double dog-leg. A small lake has its shore almost at the edge of the green.

Par for the course is 71.

Peanut Producers Must Share Benefit Payments With Tenants, Says Warning

EASTLAND, Dec. 5. —Peanut producers who do not pay share tenants or share croppers their proportionate rate of government benefit payments are subjecting their contracts to cancellation and repayment of all money to the comptroller of the United States.

This was the information received by County Agent C. Metz Heald after inquiry to E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, in charge of the peanut program, at College Station.

"You will note that the contract provides that producers are required to pay their share tenants or share croppers their pro-rata part of the benefit payment. In cases where the producers refuse to make this payment to their tenants or share croppers, the contract is subject to cancellation and the producer must then pay back all of the money to the comptroller of the United States," Miller wrote.

"Wherever you have sufficient evidence that the producer has tenants or share croppers who are entitled to peanut benefit payments you should require them to fill out and execute PN21 and their refusal to do this, would of course cancel their contracts."

PN21 is a receipt form to be signed by share-tenants and share croppers certifying that they have received their share of the peanut benefit payment. Within 30 days after producers receive their checks these forms must be properly signed and returned to the county agent.

TWO PILOTS DIE IN CRASH

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5. (AP)—Two Mitchell field, Long Island, army fliers, First Lieutenant Harry Geoffrey, of Minnesota, and Major George Rice, of Wyoming, were killed Wednesday when their plane crashed on a hillside near Bolling Field. Officials said the plane crashed while the pilot was seeking low altitude preparatory to landing.

O'Brien to Make Race for Collector

EASTLAND, Dec. 5. (AP) — C. H. O'Brien, for several years an employee in the tax collector's office at Eastland has announced that he had definitely decided to be a candidate for the combined office of tax assessor and collector for the coming year and would make a formal announcement shortly after the first of January.

Bodyguard for Late Father of J. T. Berry Dies

A few months ago the Cisco Daily Press carried a story about the promotion of the original townsite of Amarillo, by the father of Mayor J. T. Berry, in which it was shown that the senior Berry was associated with the late Clabe Merchant, founder of the city of Abilene, in which promotion Colonel Berry was also interested.

While at Amarillo, Mr. Merchant employed a famous frontiersman, J. P. (Jim) Flores, as bodyguard for Colonel Berry. Flores died at Amarillo Tuesday, at the age of 92 years. The Abilene News Wednesday carried the following sketch of the well known frontiersman, who, by the way, was an uncle of Mrs. Henry Brenham, well known former Cisco woman:

AMARILLO, Dec. 3.—J. P. ((Jim) Flores, 92-year-old Confederate veteran and one of Amarillo's earliest residents, died here today after a lingering illness.

Despite infirmities which had confined him to a wheel chair for many months, Flores joined his southern comrades in a final reunion at the forty-fifth annual meeting of the United Confederate Veterans here last September.

Flores served throughout the war between the states, and later became bodyguard for a land baron, a peace officer, a ranchman and a Buffalo hunter. He came to Amarillo 48 years ago on the first train that ever puffed into the new cow-town.

The nonagenarian was survived by his widow, three sons and a daughter. Funeral services had not been announced tonight.

Flores worked in Callahan, Taylor and neighboring counties for John and Clabe Merchant. The latter, one of the founders of Abilene, sent Flores to Amarillo with orders to guard Col. Berry, who was promoting the new Amarillo townsite. Berry had worked with Merchant in establishing the town of Abilene. Flores' life history was one of the most colorful of any of the earlier-day frontiersmen who are alive.

U. S. Builds Toward Naval Treaty Limit as Parley Meets

By LLOYD LERBAS
 WASHINGTON, Dec. 5. (AP) — The Washington naval limitation treaty, around which discussions will revolve at the London naval conference December 6, came into force on Aug. 17, 1923, and will end on December 31, 1936, as a result of its denunciation by Japan.

The Japanese, long dissatisfied with the total tonnage allowed the Japanese fleet — and strongly opposed to the 5-5-3 ratio which they consider detrimental to their national pride — took advantage last year of treaty provisions to give formal notification to the United States and other signatory powers that they no longer would be bound by its limitations after 1936.

In Agreement Effort
 The London Conference is a renewed effort — through discussions of all possible angles of naval affairs — to reach an agreement under which some kind of naval limitation will be followed after 1936. Unless an agreement is reached there will be no international understanding on sea strength.

During the naval holiday that followed the Washington conference the United States lagged far behind in the construction of even sufficient new ships to build up to the total tonnage permitted in the different categories of ships.

The Vinson Bill, however, designed to provide funds for a navy of full authorized strength by 1942, has provided the necessary stimulus to insure the building of a powerful fleet.

Still 54 Ships Short
 Ships now under construction or appropriated for, plus under age vessels in commission, leaves the United States still 54 vessels short of the desired goal.

Every effort will be made to sign contracts for their construction and have them slide down the ways for active service by the end of 1942.

A summary of treaty provisions as affecting the United States navy shows:

Battleships
 A capital ship (battleship) is a war vessel (not an airplane carrier), whose displacement exceeds 10,000 tons or which carries a gun with a caliber exceeding 8-inch bore.

The treaty provides that any battleship built for replacement after it has reached the age of 20 years cannot be more than 35,000 tons. The United States, without naval bases sufficient for long range action, stands for battleships of that size, while other sea powers desire the size to be lowered to 30,000 tons.

An aircraft carrier is in excess of 10,000 tons designed for the specific and exclusive purpose of carrying aircraft, with equipment for launching and landing planes. Aircraft carriers are limited to 27,000 tons (except that 2 of not more than 33,000 tons may be built for replacements), guns of not over 8-inch caliber, and not more than 10 guns exceeding 6-inch caliber.

The United States is limited to 135,000 tons in aircraft carriers.

Heavy Cruisers
 A heavy cruiser is of less than 10,000 tons displacement and carries guns above 6.1-inch caliber.

The United States is limited to 180,000 tons in heavy cruisers.

Light Cruisers
 A light cruiser is of less than 10,000 tons and carries guns of less than 6.1-inch caliber.

The United States is limited to 143,500 tons in light cruisers, and now has 10 of 70,500 tons, all under age.

Destroyers
 A destroyer is a war vessel of not more than 1,850 tons, and with a gun not larger than 5.1-inch caliber.

The United States is permitted 150,000 tons in destroyers, but not more than 16 per cent of the tonnage can be employed in vessels of more than 1,500 tons.

The American navy has 213 destroyers of 241,105 tons, but most were built before or during the World War and only 8 of 11,075 tons are under the age limit.

Submarines are limited to 2,000 tons displacement and cannot carry guns heavier than 5.1-inch caliber.

The United States is limited to

52,700 tons. It now has 84 of 70,202 of which 41 are to be scrapped leaving 43 of 45,600 tons, sixteen of 21,600 tons are being built.

Scanning New Books

By JOHN SELBY

For once there is no puzzlement over the book of the week, although this is the busy season, presses are stuttering under their load, and at least a hundred books have gone over the desk in seven days.

The book of the week is the new Columbia Encyclopedia (Columbia University Press). This volume, and the effort has produced a heavy but not too unwieldy book. Inside it are nearly 2,000 pages, about five million words, more than 52,000 articles — and not a single paragraph.

In order to save space, paragraphs are eliminated from even the longest articles, which run to 6,000 words. Illustrations were omitted for the same reason. Duplication of material is practically non-existent, but elaborate cross indexing has made it possible to follow out many subjects to the bitter end.

The book contains every incorporated town in the United States with 1,000 or more population. Every Biblical proper name is there, and because the world moves very swiftly, or at least changes nomenclature with the ease of a snake sloughing a skin,

these are a lot of articles on subjects not found in previous encyclopedias. Heavy water is one of them. Babe Ruth is another.

Eight years were spent on the book by the compiling staff, guided by the editor, Clarke F. Ansley. It is said to be the first original one-volume encyclopedia made in America, and the first encyclopedia prepared and published at an American university.

Moldah.
 "The Garden Murder Case," by S. S. Van Dine (Scribners): the erudite Philo Vance, whom Ogden Nash wanted to kick in the "pantz," does some more unraveling; all about horse racing on the side.

"The Street I Know," by Harold E. Stearns (Farnum): autobiography by one of the bright young men who fled the slow-witted

United States only to find Paris just about as boring.

"Tongues of the Monte," by J. Frank Dobie (Doubleday, Doran): in which Mexican folk tales, and living Mexicans, are made understandable by a man who loves both; a fine and rich book.

"Manhattan Reporter," by Morris Markey (Dodge): compilation of Markey's pieces from the New Yorker files; first rate reporting, amusingly varied table of contents.

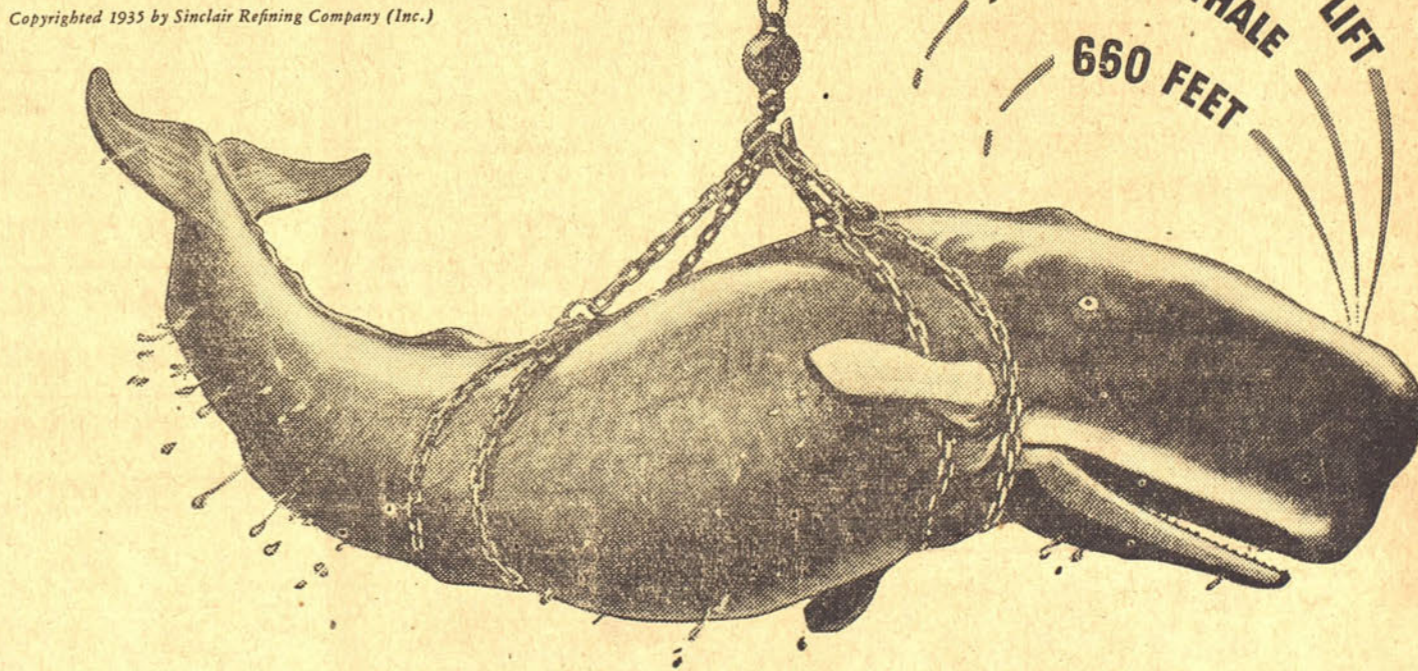

BREWER WELL AT 400 FEET

GORMAN, Dec. 5. — The well of Brewer et al on the Payne tract is now down to more than 400 feet and has been placed on beam.

On the Johnson tract the well of Hoffman and Page is down to about 2,000 feet and making hole right along. About ten more days will be required to get to the pay.

On the Stone tract Roth and Faurot have the well to better than 2,000 feet. They got off to a good start and have made rapid progress.

On the Hampton lease, the well being drilled by Martin and Case is now being drilled by the tools which were lost there about two weeks ago. They fished for them several days and then decided to drill by and go on down.

The Lusk well was given 2,000 gallons of acid last week but failed to respond, due to a faulty seat for the casing. They plan now to pump cement up and around the casing for several hundred feet in an effort to stop this part of their trouble.

The original well on the Gowan was given another acid treatment last week and responded satisfactorily.

MILD BOOM AT BAIRD

BAIRD, Dec. 5. — The E. P. Campbell well on the Dr. H. H. Ramsey land in the northwest part of Baird is causing a great deal of interest. The well is standing 700 feet in oil. The sand was found at 1,260 feet, and as soon as the five inch casing is run the well will be drilled in.

The well has created an interest with outside oil men, parties from Ranger, Coleman, Abilene and Cisco having been in Baird this week purchasing all available leases.

If the well proves to be as good as expected, a real townsite boom will take place, as a number of drilling contracts have been entered into, drilling to commence within thirty days after the completion of the Campbell well.

E. G. Johnson has a good show of oil at 916 feet on the A. G. Hobbs No. 1.

Sam Henderson has spudded a well on the Louis Taylor, located near Rowden.

Ungren & Frazier have made a location for a test on the Dee Davis land, located about 5 miles north of Baird.

J. H. Vise of Dallas is drilling

at 914 feet on the Mrs. Louie M. Williams ranch, located about 9 miles northeast of Baird.

L. E. Lockhart has spudded in a well on the Mrs. P. L. Sherill farm located about 2 miles north of Clyde.

R. F. St. John is drilling at 1,100 feet on the Henry Kniffen No. 2, located in the Barclay pool about 2 miles north of Clyde.

ECTOR TEST REGISTERS HEAVY FLOW

FORT WORTH, Dec. 5. — In-iber which may lead to the largest natural producer in Ector county was seen in the performance Friday afternoon of the Gulf No. 3 Goldsmith, in the south extension to the new pool.

The well was opened Friday afternoon for the purpose of drilling deeper, and during that period made 90 barrels of oil.

While part of its performance was subject to discount as due in part to accumulation, the fact that it is coming from a pay streak 100 feet higher in the pay section than the offset, and the further fact that the flow seemed to be as strong at the end of the period as the beginning led observers to believe that it may set a new performance record for the pool.

The well is in section 22, block 44, township 2 south, T. & P. Railway survey, and is west offset to the Phillips and Pure No. 2 Clyde Cowden, which made 900 barrels natural flow on tubing.

Hickok City of Cisco, No. 1, immediately north of Cisco was

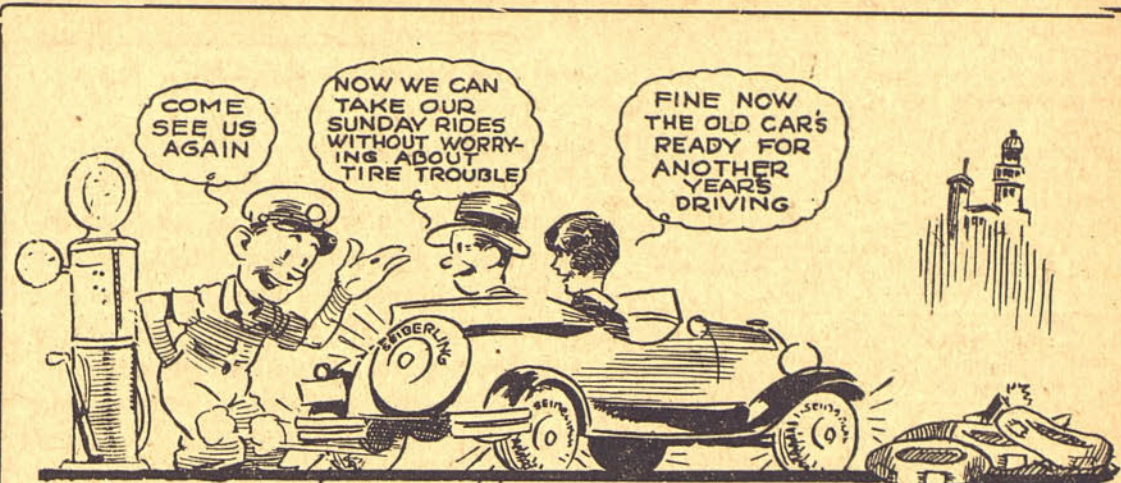
drilling Saturday at 3,293, expecting the Lake sand at 3,390.

Section 39, B1.12, T. and P. survey, seven miles southwest of Albany, Saturday was under-reaming 8-inch from 1,113 to 1,222.

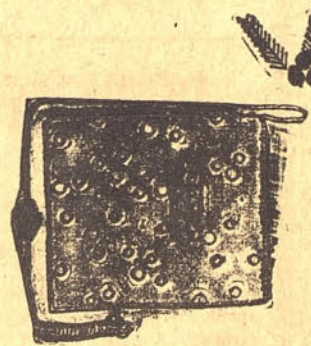

Centennial Dress

THE Cisco chamber of commerce will be charged with responsibility for arranging an exhibit to be included in the west Texas section of the Texas Centennial exposition at Dallas in 1936. According to advance information the amount of space available for the individual community exhibit will not be large. The effort, therefore, must be to emphasize quality rather than quantity. Regardless of the handicaps, Cisco should endeavor to produce the best exhibit that is possible. The community is more fortunate than the average smaller Texas city by reason of its location on a transcontinental thoroughfare which will be used by a major portion of those who visit the centennial during the year. It will be easier, for that reason, to attract attention to the city, but most of the work of doing so must be done at this end. It is essential to advertise, but advertisements cannot sell the prospect once he is brought into the store.

Goods and quality must do that. Whatever centennial program is adopted locally should take this fact into consideration.

CISCO will be in competition with numerous other Texas communities in this respect. Says the Texas Weekly:

ALREADY, many communities or cities of Texas are taking advantage of this opportunity, and that is why we say there will be a 254-ring circus on exhibit in this state in 1936. No matter where the visitor may care to travel he will find celebrations reminding him that Texas is celebrating the hundredth anniversary of its independence and emphasizing that it has much reason to celebrate. The big show will not be confined to the great central exposition at Dallas. The city of Houston will stage a ten-days celebration in April in commemoration of the Battle of San Jacinto; in August, it will observe the anniversary of its own founding. San Antonio, with a wealth of Texas history back of it, will be in an almost continuous celebration throughout the year. Fort Worth, "where the West begins," will spend more than one and a half million dollars in putting on a fat stock show, which will run throughout the summer, featuring the rodeos and wild west shows that visitors will expect to see in Texas.

"Nor will the gaps between the large cities be unfilled. Wherever one may travel, it will be with a sense of adventure waiting around a turn in the road, and it will be impossible to forget that all Texas is in a holiday mood, every community striving to outdo all others in showing what it has to offer in the way of entertainment and interest. County fairs, old settlers' reunions, annual round-ups—all will be tied in with the Centennial celebrations. Huntsville, the home of Sam Houston, will celebrate the birthday of the Father of Texas on March 2nd; a featured pageant and a massed chorus of thousands of Texas school children singing patriotic songs will be repeated several times through the summer for the edification of the revolving groups of visitors. Port Aransas will stage a tarpon rodeo, and in Midland there will be a Western Fair which will thrill attendants with a sense of being in the Old West."

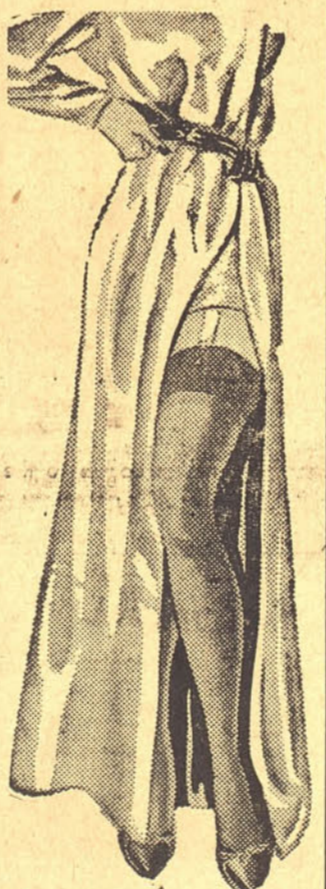

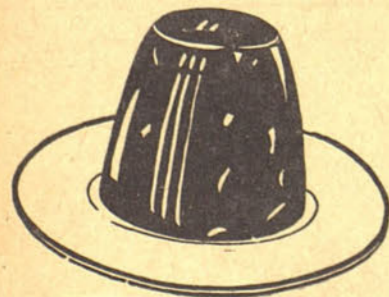

The Judge's Corner

By R. W. H. KENNON

FATE OF PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSION IN JEOPARDY

The fate of the public safety commission is in jeopardy by reason of the animosity that has come to the surface, engendered it seems, by petty feuds between the ranger and highway patrol service. It was the discharge of Captain Tom Hickman that brought these differences to light, and was the inspiration that caused the ambitious young legislator, Sam Hanna, of Dallas county, to offer a resolution to investigate the public safety commission.

The new state constabulary act was hailed as an ideal vehicle through which to suppress crime, but its efficiency is being badly handicapped by the legislative body. No organization, whose powers are to control the body, can function for the weal of the state if constantly hampered by legislative investigations and its orders criticized by those who know nothing of the workings of the body. The public safety commission, if it functions for the eradication of crime, must necessarily have the power to enforce its own orders, and that too, without fear of legislative interference. The commission decided that Captain Hickman's discharge was for the "benefit of the service," and that should have been final.

Why the Commotion?

But why all this disturbance of the organization because one member has been discharged? When did Captain Hickman attain such prominence that the constabulary of the state depends upon his retention in the service? So far as can be ascertained the deposed ranger has been more of a spectacular figure before the public than a law enforcement officer. When the Cisco Santa Claus bank robbery was staged a Cisco Ranger Hickman came to Cisco but did little to apprehend the robbers. Most of his time was spent in motoring over the highway between Cisco and Eastland, and when real men finally captured the robbers in Young county Hickman was busy, and wired the state press "we have captured them." As a matter of fact, I am informed, Hickman had about as much hand in the capture of the bandits as did Sam Hanna, author of the resolution to investigate the commission.

A witness testified in the investigation at Fort Worth this week that "Hickman was a splendid rodeo man," and so far as achievements in running down criminals this correctly states his accomplishments.

"Don't Hamper With Orders"

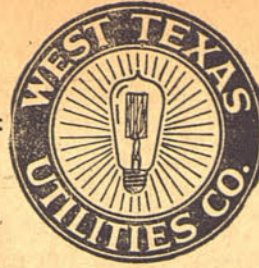
But whether Hickman's reputation as a criminal eradicator is the best in Texas is not the point I wish to emphasize. The public safety commission was created for the purpose of more effectively ridding the state of major criminals, and to do so the commission must not be hampered with restrictions. Probably one of the most sensible statements ever issued was that of Admiral Clark, while taking his ship around the Horn during the Spanish-American war, when he wired the navy department: "Don't hamper me with orders." The admiral was on the scene of action, knew what and how to do it, while the navy department officials were in Washington and did not understand the situation. So it is with the public safety commission. If that body is to function as it was intended it must not be hampered with orders.

On the whole it seems to me that the investigation was untimely, unwise and not for the benefit of the service.

I believe that if this service will ever be effective as an anti-criminal agency there must be an entire new deal. Matters that have developed during the investigation probably disqualifies the executive officer as the head of the commission, and for the good of the service there should be a new commission named and a thorough house-cleaning of both the ranger and highway patrol service, especially all those who have been nursing petty grievances against others, whether officers or privates, in either branch of the service, should be relieved "for the good of the service." Then for God's sake quit hampering the commission with orders or resolutions for investigations.

NOD IS GIVEN UPON 10 MORE COUNTY JOBS

Treasury warrants for more than half a million dollars worth of WPA work in Eastland county, embracing 10 projects, were issued at Washington Saturday, according to a dispatch from the Associated Press to the Cisco Daily Press. Start of these projects awaits orders of State Administrator H. P. Drought at San Antonio. Drought may select from the list such as he may wish to start.

The list includes \$150,000 worth of lateral "farm - to - market" roads in Precinct No. 4. This is in addition to lateral road projects already ordered under way under the direction of County Commissioner Arch Bint. Most of this money will be spent in the construction of roads that serve the Cisco rural trade area, giving the people of these areas better connection with the Cisco markets. The ten were included in a large number of such projects for which treasury warrants were issued at the national capital. This issuance is almost coincident with

the administration's final removal of the FERA as a direct relief agency and the substitution of work relief projects.

List of Projects
Precinct No. 2 received an appropriation of \$180,450 and Precinct No. 2, \$159,000.

The projects now eligible to start are:
Eastland County — To improve roads, federal funds, \$10,846.
Rising Star — Construct roadway, bridges, sidewalks and culverts, \$860.

Ranger — Construct community center for public schools, \$9,353.

Eastland — Construct two culverts, improve Main street, \$1,448.

Gorman — Improve streets, curbs, gutters and drains, \$3,900.

Precinct No. 4 — Improve roads, \$150,150.

Precinct No. 2 — Improve roads, drains and parks, \$159,000.

Precinct No. 1 — Improve roads, \$180,450.

Ranger — Remodel community hall and dormitory, \$1,632.

Rising Star — Improve five miles of streets, \$14,490.

Gun-Toters Mostly Out-of-Town Men

CHICAGO, Dec. 5. (AP) — It's the visiting gunman — not the native son — that gives Chicago police their greatest worry in warring against illegal firearms. The detective bureau announces that approximately two-thirds of those arrested for illegal gun carrying during the first 10 months of the current year came to Chicago from other cities and towns.

Arrests for the period totaled 785, of whom only 284 were born in Chicago. Police took 805 guns from those arrested and discovered that 20 were wanted for murder, 164 for robbery, 115 for assault, three for manslaughter, 23 for burglaries, 15 for larceny, one for extortion, and six for statutory charges.

During the first ten months of 1934 police nabbed 957 gun toters and seized 1,101 weapons.

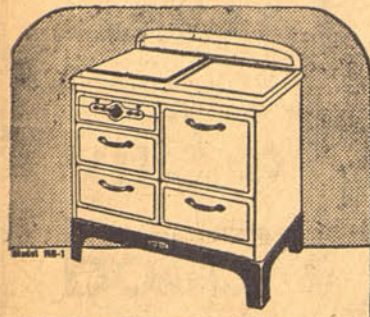

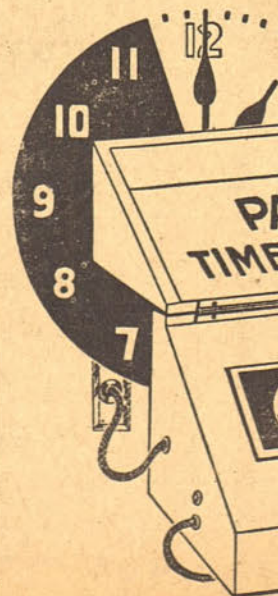
