CRAZED RANCHER KILLS SELF

Efforts of Mrs. George Langston Result in Call for County-Wide Peace Meeting in Eastland in May

REAGAN, JONES AND BERRY ARE NOW TRUSTEES

Mrs. George Langston, probably the most active woman in Texas in behalf of world peace and author of the peace pledge: "Before I speak or act in retaliation I will try a peaceful solution of every difficulty," has practically completed plans for a unique and highly interesting peace meeting, to be held in Eastland early next month. To this end the following call signed by County Judge Pritchard and others has been sent out:

To the citizens of Eastland county: Inasmuch as every nation on earth, including our own, is today seeking to outlaw war, and bring about international good will and understanding, we send you this call for a public discussion of the world court and the protocol of the league of nations at Eastland early in May.

To arouse interest, we suggest that each voting precinct and town in the county represent one single nation and have representatives appear in the costumes of its people, and that an award be made for the best representation, with honorable mention to second and third.

That as many of the nations of the earth be represented as possible, we suggest the following be adopted by those named, Eastland, England; Ranger, France; Cisco, Japan; Gorman, Italy; Carbon, Belgium; Olden, Germany; Desdemona, America; Rising Star, Poland; Pioneer, Russia; Seranton, China; Dothan, Australia; Nimrod, Greece; Dan, Horn, Denmark; Yellow Mound, Turkey; Mexico, Mexicans in the county; Cross Cut, Chili; Pleasant Grove, Brazil; Mangum, Switzerland; Okra, Spain; Colony, Holland; Jewell, Norway and Sweden.

After the reading of the minutes W. H. Morse stated he desired to enter an objection to the proceedings whereby the peace on the board held by him was declared vacant. The chair ruled the objection out of order for the time being.

However, after the minutes had been approved, Mr. Morse was told that the board would like to hear any statement he desired to make. He then formally objected to the action of the board in declaring his place vacant for the reason that he was still a resident of Cisco, and was at the time the board acted. He stated that the board exceeded its authority in appointing Judge J. D. Barker to succeed him. There was no action taken further on the matter, but President Rumph stated to the board that Judge Barker had failed to qualify, and instructed him to inform the board that he declined to accept the appointment as member of the board.

Before adjournment Dr. Rumph who has been a most efficient member of the board for the past three years, made a nice talk in which he said he wanted the new board to understand he was ready at all times to render any assistance possible while the new members are familiarizing themselves with their labors; that he would be glad to help. William Reagan responded, thanking Dr. Rumph for his courtesy and kindness and complimenting the retiring board for their good work during the past two years.

PLANS LAID IN MEET THURSDAY ROAD SOLUTION

"The county wide committee appointed to attempt a solution of the road situation in Eastland county met at Eastland Thursday night, when considerable progress was made," said R. Q. Lee, temporary chairman of the committee. "It was decided not to state just what was accomplished until the plans are further developed, but we believe that a solution will likely result. The plans discussed and tentatively agreed upon were turned over to a committee of seven, who will get these plans in concrete shape and report to the full committee next Tuesday. Further than this there is nothing yet matured, but we hope to have matters in such shape Tuesday that good will result from the committee's action. Fifteen of the committeemen were present."

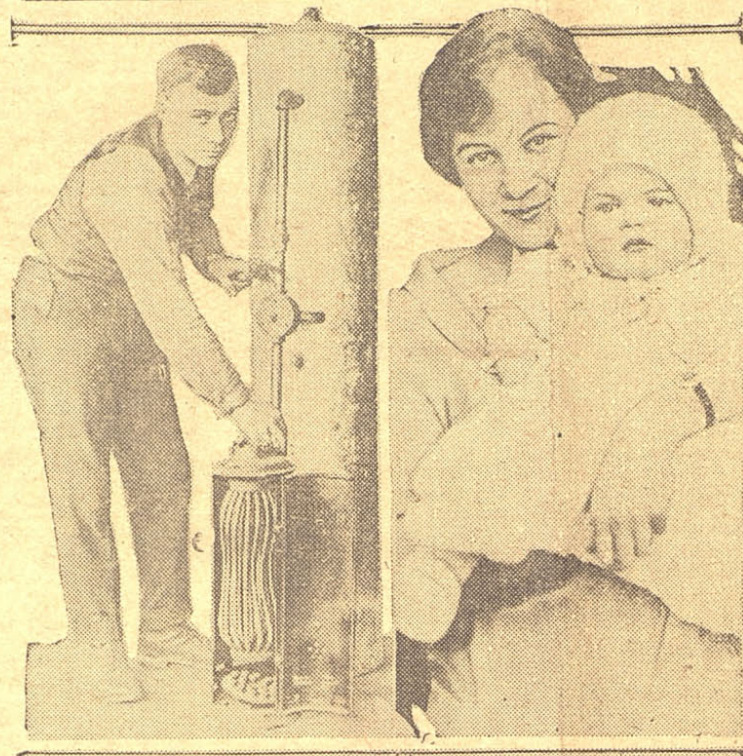

CONDITION OF BABE RUTH IS SOME BETTER

NEW YORK, April 10.—Babe Ruth, king swat of baseball, was slowly improving in St. Vincent's hospital this morning, and physicians were more hopeful. He staged a startling recoup of strength during the night. It is thought that his collapse yesterday was brought on by a heavy breakfast, including fried potatoes, he ate on the train. Ruth hopes to be in the opening game Tuesday.

Babe Ruth, Yankee slugger, suffered a slight concussion of the brain Thursday afternoon when he fell in the washroom of the car that was bringing him home to New York from Asheville, N. C., where he was taken ill last Tuesday. Ruth, unconscious, was rushed to the emergency hospital in the Pennsylvania station. Dr. J. M. Murphy, Pennsylvania railroad physician, and Dr. Edward King, Babe's personal doctor, who examined him as soon as the train reached the terminal, said he had received the concussion when he fainted in the wash room as the train was entering the Hudson river terminal at Manhattan transfer, New Jersey.

Paul Kritcheil, Yankee scout, who accompanied Ruth from Asheville, said the famous home run hitter had stood the trip north admirably and apparently was feeling better at the terminal where he entered the wash room to wash his hands and brush his hair preparatory to saying "hello" to the friends who were to meet him at the station. Kritcheil went to the Babe's compartment to get a comb. When he returned Ruth was on the floor unconscious. An ambulance that was waiting at the terminal took Ruth to St. Vincent's hospital where an examination revealed the concussion.

Mrs. Ruth, dressed in her Easter best, was at the terminal to greet her husband. On learning of his condition she was nearly prostrated.

COMMISSION CANNOT FARM OUT HIGHWAYS

AUSTIN, April 10.—In an opinion written by Assistant Attorney General Sutton and concurred in by Attorney General Dan Moody, it is held that the state highway commission is not authorized by law to enter into a contract for the erection and maintenance of mile posts, sign posts and highway markers on the state highways, under the terms of which the contractor would be granted the exclusive privilege of using such posts, and that the contract entered into by the department is "invalid for lack of authority in the state highway commission to enter into it, nor has it authority to lease the public highway for the private purpose of commercial advertising." The proposed contract was between the highway commission and H. Steckel of Houston, doing business under the firm name of Texas Road Marking system, by the terms of which he would be granted the exclusive privilege of erecting these mile posts and using them for commercial advertising for a period of six years. Steckel was to pay the commission for the privilege, \$1 for each mile post for the first year and \$2.50 for each succeeding year.

Neighbors Found Jack Richardson With His Throat Cut After Killing His Wife and Wounding His Son, 17

SWEETWATER, April 10.—Jack Richardson, a fifty-seven year old rancher, today ended his life by slashing his own throat after killing his wife with a shotgun and beating his son, George, seventeen, about the head with a hammer, and seriously injuring him. The boy fled from the house with his mother. The woman fell, and before she could rise, her husband emptied the shotgun in her body. The boy spread the alarm, and the neighbors came to the scene, and found Richardson dying with his throat cut. He was recently dispossessed of his ranch by mortgage holders, which is supposed to have caused his mind to become unbalanced.

250 PEOPLE AT COLONY LAST NIGHT

FOUR TRILLION GERMAN MARKS WORTH DOLLAR

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Billions of marks were pouring into the department of commerce today from all over the United States from mark holders who understood Germany had offered to redeem all marks held in this country. Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, declared the citizens of this country understood the government would cash the marks. Unless the holders have four trillion marks it is useless to send them in, as four trillion marks are worth one dollar.

NEW JUDGES OF 11TH COURT OF APPEALS NAMED

As forecast by the Daily News of Tuesday, Governor Ferguson late Thursday afternoon announced the appointment of three judges of the new eleventh court of civil appeals at Eastland. The judges who will preside are William Pannell of Stephenville, chief justice; Thos. B. Ridgell of Breckenridge, and John B. Littler of Big Spring, associate justices. Each of the new judges will receive a salary of \$5,000 per annum. They are to serve until the next general election when this court will have to be elected by the people. Their terms will be for two, four and six years.

Judge Ridgell is the present mayor of Breckenridge and is well known in this section of Texas. He has made a splendid executive of that city and is recognized as one of the strong members of the Breckenridge bar. He is a cousin of G. A. Ridgell of Cisco. Judge Pannell is a lawyer of recognized ability.

In speaking of John B. Littler, Judge S. W. Pratt of Cisco, stated this morning that he has known Judge Littler intimately for the past twenty years, and that Governor Ferguson had made a good appointment in her selection. "I know of no lawyer in West Texas better qualified for the appointment. He is a good lawyer, capable jurist and a splendid citizen. I have just written Judge Littler," Judge Pratt said, "and suggested that he come to Cisco and see what advantages we have as a home city before deciding on his place of residence. Cisco is only a ten-minute drive from Eastland for him." He was county judge of Howard county as long as he wanted the place. He is also well known to Judge D. K. Scott and Judge B. W. Patterson."

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SEARCH AND SEIZURE

Automobilists might as well reconcile themselves to being stopped occasionally on the road by prohibition officers and having their cars searched for liquor.

Chief Justice Taft, announcing the decision, admits that it would be intolerable and unreasonable if prohibition agents were authorized "to stop every automobile on the chance of finding liquor," but holds that they may be stopped by competent officials who have "probable cause for believing that their vehicles are carrying contraband."

HIGH PRICED LEASES

KAUFMAN, April 10.—Leases and royalties near the Penn well on the Gardner tract in Henderson county near the Kaufman county line soared to new high levels on favorable reports from the well at midnight Tuesday. A small 12-acre tract that a week ago was holding out for \$75 an acre was leased for \$6,000 today. It is reported that more than \$70,000 has changed hands in oil deals in the town of Kemp since 2 p. m. Tuesday. Oil scouts and others interested have crowded to well for the past twelve hours.

Mayor C. E. Coombes Re-Elected Over Judge E. M. Overshiner as Mayor of Abilene; Eastland-Ranger Results

City elections in the several towns and cities surrounding Cisco were without unusual incident, and in most places little or no opposition was made. This was practically true of all neighboring cities with the exception of Abilene, where the present incumbents were vigorously opposed but the opposition availed little, as the returns showed the re-election of Mayor C. E. Coombes, over his opponent, E. M. Overshiner, by more than two to one, receiving 1,457 votes to Overshiner's 568.

In Eastland, where they have the city manager plan, three commissioners were elected, there being six candidates for the positions. John H. Harrison, Green G. Hazel and O. P. Morris were elected. A total of 428 votes were cast, each of the successful candidates receiving 306 votes.

In Ranger the vote was also light, there being only a total of 402 votes cast in the election. Mayor R. H. Hodges was re-elected, receiving 392 votes. The four commissioners of Ranger elected were Colonel Brashier, 396; Raymond Teal, 395; Dr. C. O. Terrell, 391; F. A. Brown, 273.

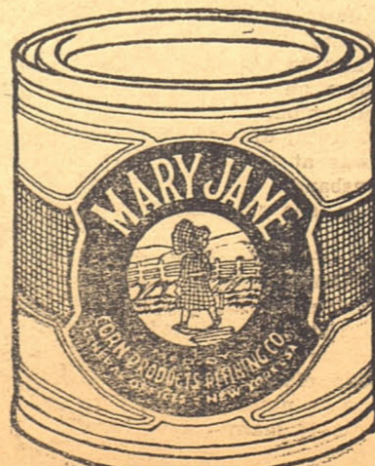

Mr. Kleiman reports that he is just concluding the most successful sale in the history of his store. Kleiman advertised extensively in the Cisco American and aggressively advertised his sale throughout the country for fifty miles in every direction from Cisco. Customers thronged here from long distances. One man from Comanche county came in and bought a suit and other merchandise. He said that he was in Cisco for the first time in 40 years, that he was hearing of Cisco as a good trading point and came in to see for himself. He also bought considerable goods from a Cisco grocer and from a local drug store while here. Another man who lives fifteen miles north of Breckenridge came in and while here purchased two suits of clothes and other dry goods as well as supplies from druggists and grocers. He declared that the good roads made him closer to Cisco than he used to be to nearby small towns before the roads were built, and he was so elated with the treatment he received from Cisco merchants that he planned to return to Cisco at least twice monthly to do his trading. A lady came in from near Brownwood, bringing with her a National catalogue. She made out a bill of goods and checked the local prices against the mail order prices and found that she saved almost 15 per cent by trading in Cisco, and in addition did not have to pay postage and wait two weeks to get the merchandise.


