HEALTH FACTS

The summer season always brings an increase in the incidence of dysentery, diarrhea

and enteritis, all of which are major menaces to the lives of small children, annually causing the deaths of hundreds of Texas youngsters.

The State Health Officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, declares that the chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk, water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the infants formula, and foods that have been improperly refrigerated.

"All foods should be clean and fresh, and all left-overs should be refrigerated so as to avoid spoilage. The utmost care should

be used in preparing the infant's formula which should, of course, be prescribed by a physician, and his recommendations as to sanitation precautions and correct refrigeration should be implicitly followed."

The State Health Officer warned parents especially of the danger of disease transmission by flies. Children in any home that is not free from flies, are in danger of contracting dysentery or other intestinal diseases which may be fatal.

"If dysentery or diarrhea symptoms appear in your child, call your doctor immediately," Dr. Cox advises. "His treatment of the disease is your best insurance such diseases are really a very serious threat to the child's life. Don't depend on home remedies for diarrhea or dysentery; consult a competent physician and let him institute the safest and best treatment which medical science has available, for combating these wasting diseases."

MATCH ROPING AT BANDERA STOMPEDE

Rodeo fans are eagerly awaiting the long postponed meeting of Toots Mansfield, World's champion calf roper, and Tony Salinas, South Texas title holder and Mansfield's leading contender, in the \$1000 purse 12 calf contest, one of the highlights of the Second Annual Bandera Stompe, May 13 and 14.

Site of the match will be the newly enlarged rodeo arena at Mansfield Park, Bandera, where Toots learned to ride and rope. The grounds are located on the edge of the famous Mansfield Ranch operated by his uncle, Ed Mansfield.

Supporters of the contestants have been digging back into the records for evidence to support their arguments. Salinas, who has won at numerous national rodeos, is tagged as the hard luck roper of the cowboy world. His South Texas followers believe that with everything being equal, Tony is capable of taking Mansfield's measure.

Based on the records, Mansfield is America's top hand with a rope. Six out of nine years he has held the World's Champion Calf Roper title. Seldom is he out of the money. Last season he won the Madison Square Garden, Pendleton Round-Up, Fort Worth and many other major rodeos.

Each night of the two day event Mansfield and Salinas will have six calves apiece. Best average time following the Saturday night rodeo will determine the winner of the \$1,000 purse.

In addition to the match roping event, one of the largest fields of top rodeo performers will be on hand for the Saddle Bronc riding, Brahma Bull riding, Steer Wrestling, Calf Roping and Ladies Event of the Bandera Stompe Rodeo, May 13 and 14.

CANCER CONTROL

Cancer control work in Texas during 1949-50 may be sharply curtailed and cancer education, service, and research in the state seriously retarded unless more Texans are given an opportunity to contribute to the 1949 drive for funds of the Texas Division, American Cancer Society.

This statement was made today by Karl Hoblitzelle, of Dallas, state campaign chairman for the American Cancer Society, when announcing the extension of the Society's April membership drive into May.

"We are still far short of our \$450,000 goal," Hoblitzelle said, "and, unless our campaign workers are allowed more time to seek contributions, cancer control work in Texas will be sharply curtailed."

"Our carefully-budgeted program indicates that \$450,000 is the maximum needed to advance the Texas fight against the nation's No. 2 killer, which this year will claim the lives of more than 7,000 Texans."

"Our cancer fight calls for funds to support research, professional education for doctors and nurses, information centers, and many other phases of cancer control, and funds are sorely needed to continue the work," the state campaign chairman said. "For this reason I am asking all our workers to continue their campaigns."

Hoblitzelle urged all Texans who have not yet contributed to do so by sending their donations to: "Cancer, Care of Postmaster, in their own city or town," or by sending them to their own county unit.

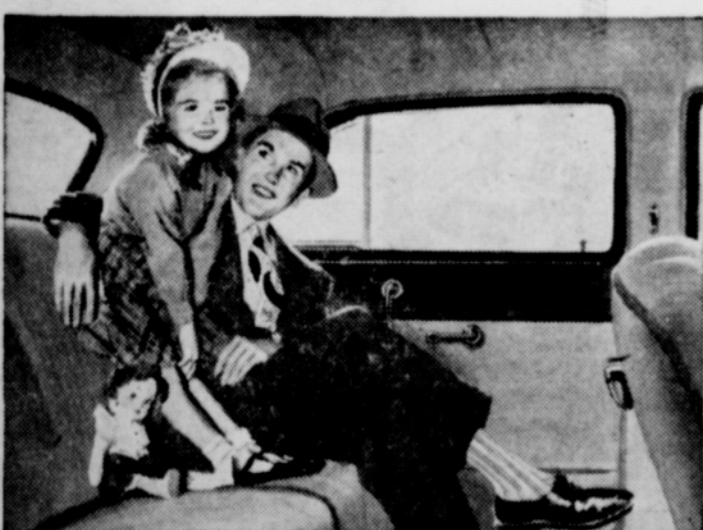
