GOOD ROAD MEETING TONIGHT

Bankhead Marketing Association Began Functioning This Morning as Sales Manager Out on First Trip

W. S. Jarrett, the new sales manager for the Bankhead Poultry Marketing association, has moved his family to Cisco and has taken up the work by starting on his initial trip this morning of collecting eggs from the members of the marketing association. His first trip took him into Stephens county, where he will stop at the homes of members going and coming, visiting Gunsight, Breckenridge, Caddo and all intermediate points. What eggs are not disposed of while on the trip will be brought to Cisco, where all surplus eggs will be concentrated and placed in storage just as soon as the storage vaults are ready.

BAND AND DRUM CORPS OF CISCO HIGH STUDENTS

Cisco is soon to have a real band. This band will be composed of high school students and will be known as the chamber of commerce High School Band. Any boy or girl in the high school is eligible for the band. Instruction will be free to the students. The Chamber of Commerce provides the instructor. A drum corps to be composed of high school boys will be one of the features of the band. This corps will be organized immediately, and it is hoped to have them ready in time to take them to the Mineral Wells convention. This corps and band will be the official representative of Cisco at all conventions, athletic contests or other occasions both in town and out, and it is planned to make the band and drum corps as famous in their line as the Lobos have become in athletics. Plans are under way to give credit in school work for the work done by the band. This and the drum corps are expected to prove popular courses by boys and girls in the high school.

CHASTISING OWN SON, STABBED HIS AGED FATHER

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 6.—The police today are searching for "Grandpa" Davis, 76 years of age, who stabbed his son, Millard, aged 23, when the boy was chastising his own young son. Millard says he will not prosecute his father. He is fatally injured.

PRELIMINARY TO CLEAN UP WORK STARTS

Mrs. Philip Pettit, one of the leaders of the clean-up campaign, calls on all committees appointed on the campaign to at once get together and make an inspection of their districts before the campaign begins. All streets should be inspected and those that are in an unsightly condition should be reported to the city hall at once. Any refuse heaps or piles of rubbish in lots and alleys should be reported to the city hall, and any unsanitary conditions such as weeds, damp places or pools of water should be reported to Dr. Gregory, city health officer. Places so reported will receive the attention of the proper city officials and they will be taken care of before the main drive actually begins.

Mrs. Pettit declares that the city should be placed in the best possible condition before the conventions meet in Cisco. The West Texas Historical association meets here April 18, and the Texas firemen hold their state convention here in May. Cisco should be spick and span for both occasions. Committees have already been announced in the Cisco Daily News. 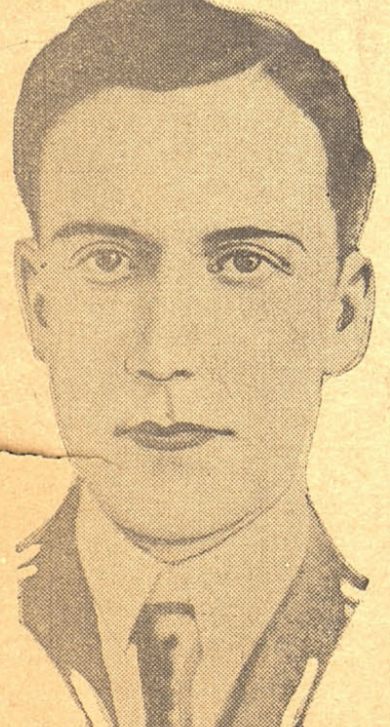
COMANCHE CONTRACTS FOR CITY GAS SUPPLY

COMANCHE, April 6.—The city authorities have announced that the Comanche Gas Association has been given the contract to supply the city of Comanche with gas from the Sipe Springs field in the northwestern part of Comanche county. The city is to distribute the gas, and will begin the construction of mains within six days. It is planned to have the system ready to give the consumers gas service by Oct. 1.

COMANCHE TO VOTE ON ADDITIONAL BONDS

COMANCHE, April 6.—The city council has ordered an election for May 7 to issue an additional \$50,000 for water improvements. This amount is to supplement the original issue of \$75,000, which will be used to construct a lake and to extend the present water system.

PROBE SOURCE OF ARSENIC IN M'CLINTOCK KIN

CHICAGO, April 6.—Investigation of the source of arsenic poisoning found in the bodies of Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock and Dr. Oscar Olson is to take place at the inquest when it is continued. Doctors are to be called to prove they did not give the medicine containing mercury compounds. William Sheherd is still being held in jail.

FORMER HOME OF FRANK E. HARRELL DAMAGED BY FIRE

Early Sunday morning the alarm was turned in from 409 West Second street when the ten-room residence owned by F. E. Harrell was found to be burning. The damage was confined to the second story and roof of the building and is estimated at about \$3,000. The loss is covered by insurance. This building was formerly occupied by Mr. Harrell as his home. The fire is said to have started from some undetermined cause in the ceiling above the first floor. The building was occupied at the time by L. R. Hamby and family on the lower floor, and the McQuay family were living up stairs.

WANT LAWS TO TAKE AMERICAN BOOZE VESSELS

WASHINGTON, April 6.—In another thrust at the rum row the department of justice has prepared to ask congress to enact legislation to make liquor carrying American vessels liable to seizure inside the eighteen mile limit. Through treaty agreements foreign vessels can be seized in this zone, but no statute provides for the capture of American vessels.

DR. FRED COOK LEAVENWORTH PRISON DOCTOR

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., April 6.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook became number twenty-three thousand, one hundred and eighteen at the Leavenworth penitentiary today. The famous explorer arrived at the office of Warden W. A. Biddle at 11:05 this morning, and shook hands cordially with the warden. He was assigned to duty as prison doctor in the hospital, as physicians are very scarce at the prison. Shortly afterward he was strolling in the prison yard with Seymour J. Cox, who was connected with him at Fort Worth.

WAR SECRETARY BETTER

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Secretary of War Weeks, who suffered a slight stroke of cerebral paralysis a few days ago, is reported much better today, and practically out of danger. His recovery was in doubt for several days.

Judge S. W. Pratt and Col. Ben McClintock, who will hold the city election Tuesday, have oiled up the voting machinery and announced that everything will be in ship shape for the battle of ballots when the clock strikes eight tomorrow morning. Robert W. Mancill and A. A. Michael have been selected as helpers and at least two others will be named to aid in the work.

The only contest scheduled for tomorrow is the aldermanic race between Crigler Paschall, Judge L. H. McCrea and F. J. Huey. But two commissioners are to be elected, hence one of the above named gentlemen is predestined to go down in defeat.

Interest in the mayor's race waned considerably when Judge Eugene Lankford withdrew his name last week, thus leaving the field to J. M. Williamson, the present mayor. However, Mr. Williamson's many friends are expected out in large numbers tomorrow in order to give him a nice complimentary vote.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—Dorothy Ellison, the young matricide, was pale and wan as she appeared in court today to aid the state in proving that she is sane, contrary to the efforts of the attorneys who are working in her defense. She wishes to take the stand to prove she is sane, it is said.

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MORE FREAK INSURANCE

Figures, statistics and the invariable law of chance may now show conclusively that things will turn out a certain way nine times out of ten or 999 times out of 1,000, but they can't show in advance precisely when the tenth or thousandth time, which is the exception, will occur.

STRONG FOR DOCTORS

When it comes to choosing school trustees, the people of Cisco seem to have a marked predilection for doctors. This is probably because the latter are usually good men and active in the affairs of their community—always ready to serve others.

Among the present school board members are Dr. D. S. Rumph and Dr. F. E. Clark, and while Dr. Rumph will retire at the regular organization meeting Tuesday night, Dr. E. L. Graham and Dr. C. C. Jones—elected Saturday—will be inducted into office at that meeting, thus increasing the number of doctors on the board to three.

Letters addressed to St. Petersburg, Russia, have been returned to the postal authorities marked "Country and City Unknown."

WISDOM FOR THE AGES

A distinguished attorney and statesman, feted on the fiftieth anniversary of his admission to the bar, gives these rules for arriving at old age in good health:

- 1. Avoid all excesses.
2. Cultivate regularity and punctuality.
3. Don't give way to the emotions; especially, don't let any antagonism become permanent.
4. Don't get grouchy, or don't begin to think that society was much better when you were young.
5. Work to uplift humanity and to upbuild the state, so that you may feel you have done some good in the world.
6. Cultivate variety.

All excellent! But will they do any good. Normal youth scorns advice and has to learn from its own experience. Then, after it learns, it has little time left to apply the lesson. That is, unless there are other lives, as some think, and the flower of experience can be carried over.

SUGAR FOR THE ENGINE

A French girl feeds her automobile sugar to make it go, as her prototype of a former generation often did with her horse. She is credited with making a new motor fuel, with sugar as a basis, of such potency that it drives a gas engine more efficiently and cheaper than any other fuel yet discovered.

It is just as well to accept this statement with reservations. No doubt motor fuel can be made from sugar, because the chemical basis of sugar is carbon, which is also the basis of alcohol and gasoline. And it is not necessary to regard gasoline as the last word in explosive power, even though it is marvelously adapted to the gas engine and one pint of it, as Steinmetz declared, contains the energy of a lightning stroke.

We may find a new liquid fuel, sooner or later, superior to gasoline. But the chances are against any such sugar-miracle as this, in practice, even if it is chemically possible, with sugar anywhere near its present cost.

QUARTER TONE MUSIC

A piano has been invented which plays quarter tones like the normal instrument. Whether this is the start of a new musical development or whether it will remain a freak instrument is hard to tell.

The music of the last two and a half centuries is based on the scheme of twelve tones to the octave. The major and harmonic minor scales, seven tones in each, have sufficed the composers of "The Messiah," "Seigfried," "The Afternoon of a Faun," and those wild moderns who revel in what critics called "diseased chords of the seventeenth."

The division of the octave into twenty-four tones increases almost beyond measure the possibilities of harmonic and melodic structure. Viols, of course, and the human voice, can follow these possibilities. Their owners will need special training, but their structure is already capable of any division. Most other instruments, like the piano, would have to undergo marked changes.

One thing is certain—it would be a long time before the human ear, in the western world, at least, would enjoy

the new music. It would sound too much like that favorite piece of the Oriental potentate, which turned out to be the period of preliminary tuning before the concert began.

ONE FAMILY FORTUNE

The Gould fortune, greatest of its time, left by Jay Gould as a principality might be left by the founder of a dynasty, has been dissipated in a single generation. Unwise management lost it, aided and abetted by family division and thriftlessness.

Matrimonial troubles accompanied financial troubles, as they so often do where large fortunes are concerned. The Gould name is no longer important in Wall street. It is rapidly losing its importance on Fifth avenue.

There is a natural sentimental regret for this, especially as regards the passing of a family with a distinguished name. But as far as the fortune is concerned, there need be little regret. It is good, in a democratic country, for great accumulations of wealth to melt and spread among many heirs and creditors instead of remaining to perpetuate and increase the power of one family. At least, it is good if we believe more in democracy than in aristocracy.

DINNER STORIES

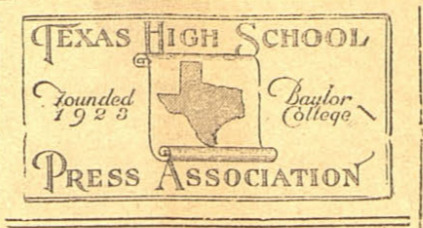

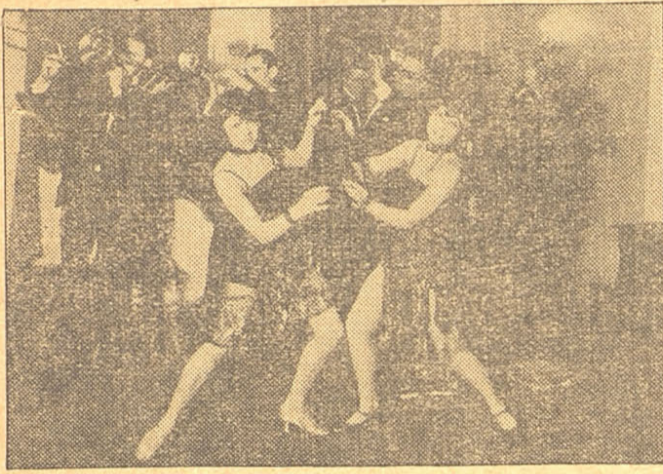

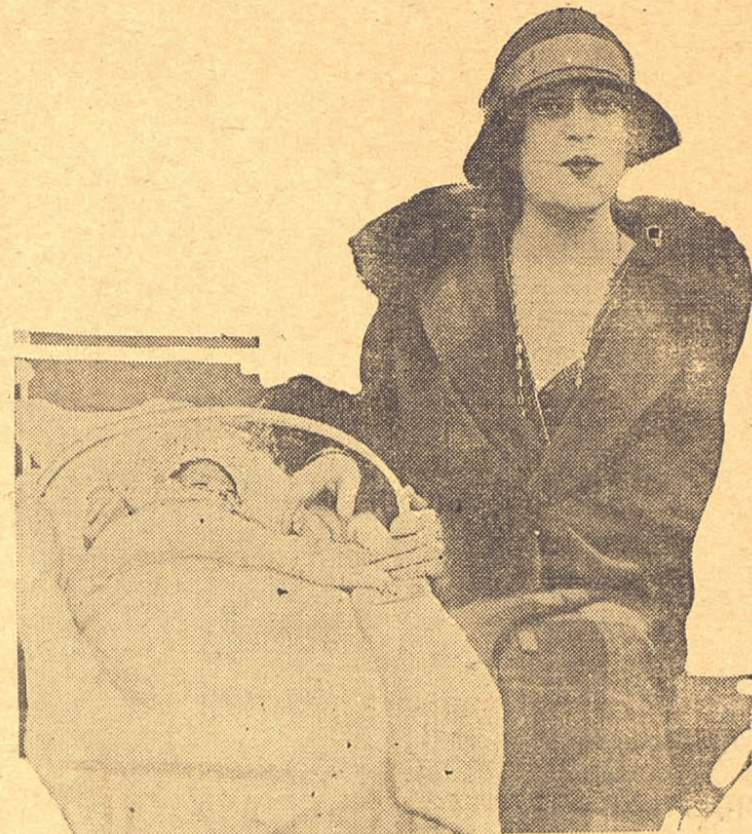
Convicted of Ancient Murder
