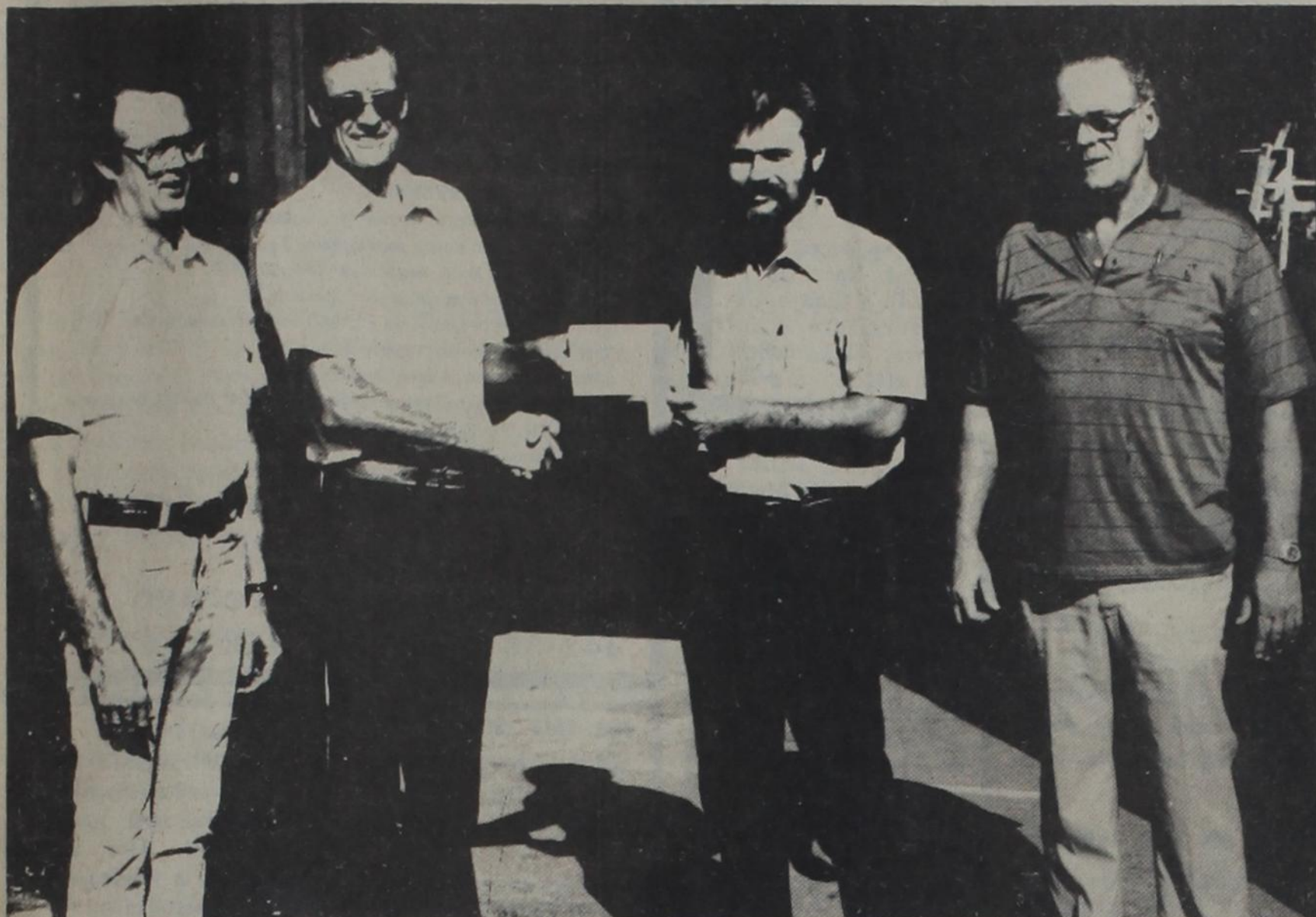

## Preparations Complete For Opening Of School

Preparations are complete for the opening of the 1985-86 school year for students of the Cisco Public School system on Tuesday, Sept. 3, according to an announcement Friday.

Students of Cisco Junior and Senior High School will gather in the auditorium at 8:10 a.m. Tuesday for an assembly hour, Principal Jim Puryear announced. Supt. Ray Saunders will introduce new faculty members, and Principal Puryear will make announcements concerning the schedule and activities.

Students will meet their first classes after the assembly period. School buses will make their initial run early Tuesday - in time to transport the students to their respective schools.

Supt. Saunders reported that enrollment during the past two weeks indicated that the school population would show an increase for the new year. There was a possibility, he added, that another 4th grade teacher would be needed.

March 24-28 - Spring break.

May 30 - School year ends. "We are looking forward to a good year," Mr. Saunders reported. "Our buildings and facilities are in good condition and in readiness for use. We are making every effort to get our building program off the ground to improve facilities for the lower grades."

## City Crews Busy Flushing Dirty Water Lines

City crews were busy on Thursday and Friday of this week flushing out water lines to try and help remedy the recent problem of dirty water in Cisco, according to City Manager Mike Moore.

The sporadic cases of dirty water are being caused by accumulations of silt and rust in water lines throughout the years, which is being knocked loose since the lines are now free-flowing throughout the city.

The city recently installed 17,500 linear feet of eight and six inch water mains throughout the city and replaced 32 old valves which were broken shut. With the new valves in place, former dead-end lines are now free-flowing lines and the water is able to move through them in either direction. This free-flowing ability, once the silt and rust are out of the lines, will keep the water fresher because it is constantly moving.

City Manager Moore said it will take some time to work all the dirt out of the water, but the city hopes the flushing of lines will hasten the cleaning of the water. The city started flushing lines near college hill and planned to work southward throughout the city.

He said the situation of dirty water seems to be worse in the areas of the city where the dead-end lines were formerly located.

Plans called for the group, headed by Dr. Tim Boersma of Cisco, to leave Cisco at 4:30 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 31, in the Wayne Webb motor

home and the First Baptist Church van for Meacham Field in Fort Worth. They were to board a flight for Houston where they were to board an airplane at 1 p.m. for the three-hour flight to Honduras.

Making the trip were the Rev. and Mrs. Ronnie Shackelford, Jeff Holloway,

Neil and Debbie Henke, Charles Copeland, Rick Roark and Joe Gosch, all of Calvary Baptist Church, and Vernon and Helen Orr and Ronnie Webb of the First Baptist Church.

The Rev. Doyle Combs, Hamilton minister and president of Christian Missions Evangelism, Inc., also was making the trip.

Dr. Boersma reported that a campaign to raise \$3,000 for use in providing medicines for use in the medical phase of their mission had been successful.

"Thanks to the caring and generous people of this community, our budget was over subscribed," Dr. Boersma said.

Each member of the mis-

sion team underwrote his or her own expenses, leaving all contributed funds for use in buying medical supplies.

During the week in Honduras, a group of the team will work at a 40-acre tract recently donated to the Baptist mission in Honduras. Plans call for a school, residences, a clinic, a landing field for airplanes and other facilities to be built there.

The medical team will work among underprivileged people in a small mountain village, paying particular attention to treating children for stomach worm problems, Dr. Boersma said. The group expected to arrive back in Cisco around 9 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 7.

# Area News Briefs

## BAIRD

Two more steps have been taken to make Callahan County closer to having its own Soil and Water Conservation District. The County has been divided into two Districts, split along the Callahan County Divide, with only two Directors from the County in the two governing bodies. About 25 farmers and ranchers met at the Courthouse Aug. 22 to decide if they wanted to form the new District. It was mentioned that the Central Colorado District in Coleman released Callahan last month, but the Lower Clearfork seemed to have reservations. On Aug. 26 John Doyle Isenhower, Callahan Director in this Division, met the Clearfork group and made the motion that Callahan be released. The motion passed. The next step will probably be a State hearing, to see if this is what the farmers and ranchers really want.

The First Methodist Church of Baird has a new minister, Rev. Daniel Moore. The Pastor, his wife Janice and their two sons come from Morton, Texas, where the Moores taught school for the past three years. This is Rev. Moore's first appointment as a minister. About two years ago he decided to enter the ministry, and has taken various courses since. The Moores first learned of Baird when they were caught here in a storm on the Interstate several years ago.

The "Save Our Depot" Fund is progressing, and the Restoration Committee now has the money for a new roof. They are searching for title to match what is already on the building, since the Texas Historical Commission cannot certify the depot as a historical site if anything about it is changed. It must be put back just as the original - not remodeled. More items have been donated for the Flea Market so that this project may continue.

## CISCO

W.K. Boyce assumed his duties this week as minister of the I-20 Church of Christ. The new minister and his wife and three children come to Cisco from Jefferson City, Mo., where he served the Church of Christ for seven years. Mr. Boyce is a native of Midland and his wife, Patricia, is a native of Austin. "We are pleased with the opportunities in Cisco and are looking forward to life in this community," Mr. Boyce said.

The annual book fair and bake sale sponsored by the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital Auxiliary will be held in the Laguna Hotel Lobby on Friday, Sept. 20 and Sat., Sept. 21. Persons wishing to donate books are asked to drop them by the Chamber of Commerce office. All donations and support will be greatly appreciated.

Part of the metal roof of the City's water reservoir at College Hill collapsed last weekend. City Manager Mike Moore says that necessary repairs may cost between \$50,000 and \$150,000. Water Department workers were able to make temporary repairs, and the reservoir was drained and re-filled.

Work is coming along nicely on restoration of the Mobley Hilton Hotel, reports Mayor Eris Ritchie, who heads the local corporation that owns the historical structure. The last portion of Scranton Academy, one of the oldest landmarks in Eastland County, burned at Scranton Aug. 23. Only rock walls remained of the old dormitory after the blaze was extinguished. The fire apparently started in the early afternoon from a blaze which spread from a road nearby. The Putnam and Cisco Fire Departments attempted to save the structure, but were unable to do so.

Eastland County Lawmen and citizens gathered at Siebert Elementary School Thursday night to honor an outstanding lawman and citizen for Eastland County.

Ninety-first District Court Judge Jim Wright presided as master of ceremonies and welcomed all who were in attendance. After introducing all the departments of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Judge Wright introduced Cecil Funderburgh, Gorman Chief of Police, who presented the Citizen of the year award. Drs. Limneo Aquila and Nimfa Aquila, affectionately known as "Dr. L and Dr. N" of Gorman were recipients of this year's Citizens of the Year Award.

Chief Funderburgh told the crowd of about 140 that the doctors were born in the Philippines and came to Eastland County in 1979. He said they had helped revitalize Blackwell Hospital in Gorman. "They are always on call when needed," he said.

The Drs. Aquila have been involved in the community with memberships in the Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club. They also have served as sponsors of the St. Jude Bike-A-Thon.

Judge Wright then introduced Terry Simmons, associate editor of the Eastland Telegram who presented the Lawman of the Year award.

The recipient of the 1985 Lawman of the Year Award

began his law enforcement career in the 60's when asked to fill the unexpired term of an official who had died. He had just prepared to retire from 30 years of the automobile business in Eastland. Since that time he has run for office and remained undefeated.

His easy going manner and soft spoken voice have kept him from ever having to use his gun. He is known to say "I can talk straighter than I can shoot."

He has served many positions in the county courthouse as bailiff in the J.P. court and Ninety-first District court. He checks on cruelty to animal cases, keeps litter off county roads and serves warrants.

The 1985 Lawman of the Year was in the line of fire several years ago in the courthouse and was shot. Although he was seriously injured he refused to pro-

# Sheriff Discusses Wage Rule

The afternoon session of Commissioners Court on Aug. 26 focused mainly on the 1986 Operating Budget and Amendments, and other budgetary matters.

Sheriff Don Underwood appeared before the Court,

stating that he had just lost a Jailer due to the new pay scale. This scale had been set by the Commissioners Court in an effort to comply with new Wage and Hour Rulings by the Supreme Court.

The Sheriff suggested that an emergency situation be declared so that he could hire a replacement for the Jail as soon as possible.

Judge Bailey replied that the Department could hire

someone immediately on a temporary basis, but under present regulations the Department would have to advertise before securing anyone on a permanent basis.

Underwood described how

the new rulings have caused the pay to fluctuate. The salary for Jailers, he indicated, should remain around \$1120 per month.

Commissioner Richard Robinson agreed with Underwood about the pay scale. "I think the way they are being paid is rotten," he told the Court.

"I would like to request, that you give serious consideration to the new personnel requested in my 1985-86 operating budget," the Sheriff added. He explained that this would give some relief concerning overtime pay, along with improving other matters. "The morale of my people is zilch," he said.

There was some discussion of this proposed budget, which is projected at \$378,633.

Joe Cooper, a Cisco resident who works with the Parents Against Drugs (PAD) organization, spoke to the Court, stating agreement with the need for more money for law enforcement. He presented the Court a letter from the Cisco Chapter of PAD, and attachments listing what five other similar counties spend on law enforcement. According to these figures, Eastland County spent \$13.66 per citizen on law enforcement last year, while other counties spent around \$22.57.

He said that Eastland County had ample funds to appropriate more money for law enforcement, and stated that \$1.2 million was held by the County at this time.

The Commissioners advised him that certain funds could not be transferred, and other money could be spent only in certain ways.

One Commissioner questioned the Sheriff about a

certain prisoner sentenced to Huntsville more than a year ago, but who is still in the Jail.

Underwood replied that the man was a cook - that arrangements had been made between the District Attorney, the previous Sheriff and the prisoner in which the man could stay in Eastland.

Walton, who was in the Courtroom, spoke up. "The prisoner lied. I never made an agreement with a Jail bird."

Underwood answered that he should have checked with him on the matter before believing what he was told.

In other matters, Judge Bailey brought up some of the provisions of HB 128, a recently enacted measure which has set up new regulations under which Fire Departments can leave the cities where they are stationed to fight fires elsewhere.

It was decided to seek legal counsel on preparing contracts so that the Regular and Volunteer Fire Departments may be able to provide the type of service they have offered in the past.

A called meeting of Commissioners Court was set at 10 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 29. At this time the Commissioners hope to firefighting contracts ready for consideration. Another item of business will be the appointment of Election Judges for 1986.

Don Mayfield, former football player at Southern Methodist University and general manager for the past eight years of Mayfield Paper Company in Abilene, told Rotarians about his new Camp "I Can", south of Buffalo Gap, which he called "a beautiful isolated Colorado type mountain retreat."

The new camp offers a special 5-day stay for teenagers to increase their awareness of their strengths through challenges, physically and mentally, Mr. Mayfield said. The program is designed to "leave teenagers with the knowledge of three strong friends they can depend on in any situation - themselves, you (parents) and me," he said.

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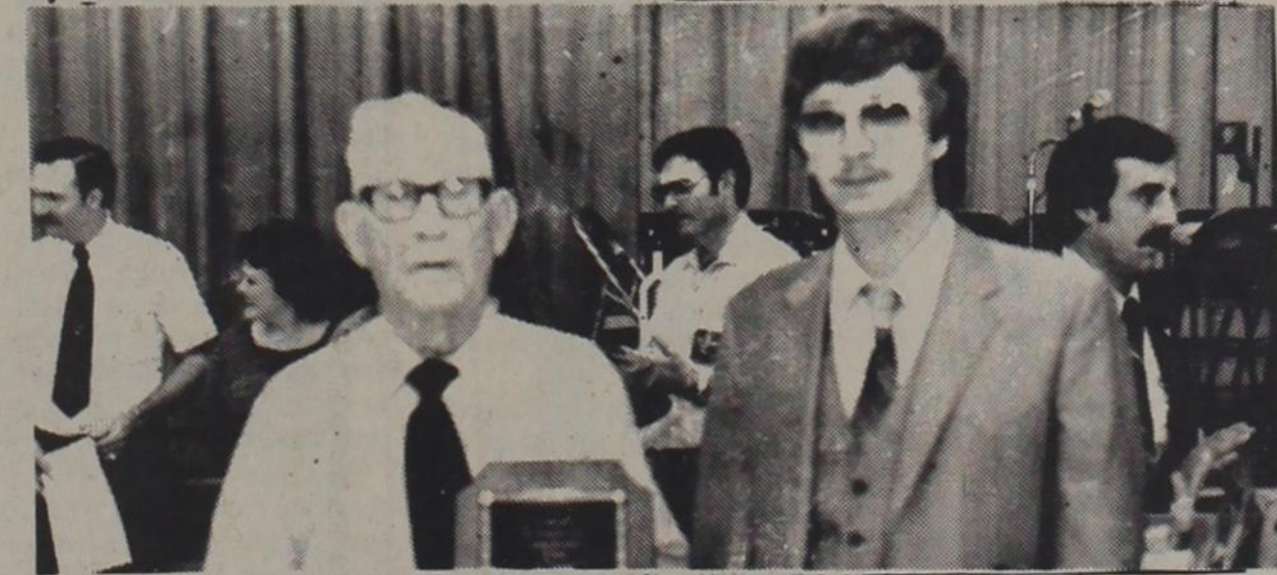

## County Commissioners Discuss Rural Fire Needs

In a called meeting Aug. 29, the Eastland County Commissioners Court discussed the current state rulings on City Fire Department providing services to other towns and rural areas.

Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided. Among the Firemen present were Jack Graham, Eastland Fire Chief, Darrell Fox, Ranger Fire dept., Mack Stubblefield of Carbon and Gene Foster of Gorman. Roy Underwood, Eastland City Manager, was among the City and County officials present.

The commissioners had been informed at a previous meeting that under House Bill 128 Fire departments would not be able to leave the cities with liability to fight fires after Sept. 1, unless they have a contract with the County.

At the beginning of the meeting Judge Bailey announced that the situation in regards to the City of Cisco had been temporarily remedied, but they would like to have some kind of contract in the future. (Another spokesman later clarified this by saying the City of Cisco wanted a contract by Oct. 1).

A discussion followed, with various people and the Court bringing out interpretations of the new rulings. The question before the court was how much of the Firefighters liabilities and responsibilities would the County assume?

District Attorney Emery Walton brought the latest information from his office, a ruling which seemed to differ from what the Court had previously been informed. Under current law, he said, State Statute 2351 A-5 says that Commissioners Courts may contract with an unincorporated area to furnish

Fire protection. Fire Departments may go outside the City limits, and it authorizes Counties to pay for Fire Protection contracts out of the general funds.

"We're looking at insurance," Jack Graham, Eastland Volunteer Fire Chief, said. "The companies say they do not have to pay liability if we go outside the city. It's time the County started assuming some of the liability for fires outside the City Limits."

Roy Underwood appeared to agree with Graham, saying that "It's not fair for the

people of Eastland to take the full liability. There should be Mutual Aid Agreements."

He mentioned that this liability matter was even far more reaching than fire protection, and should also include the County assuming a part of the responsibility for police protection out of the City. "But the city of Eastland does not want to make waves," he said. "We can go ahead until Oct. 1."

Gene Foster of Gorman explained some of the difficulty in the geographic situation there-how the Gorman Fire Department provides Fire Protection in Comanche as well as Eastland and Erath Counties, and in three towns around. "We're going to have to contact other counties to work out anything," he said.

Judge Scott Bailey brought up the idea of an Intergovernmental Contract to cover the County, something similar to the contract with the Eastland County Dispatch. He mentioned that the County could have a contract with each City.

Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, suggested that the Commissioners look into the possibility of such a contract, discussing an appropriate policy with an insurance agency. October 1 was named as a target date. Although Cisco was reported to be covered "no matter where the firemen go", Robinson said that the policy might as well cover everyone. "The cost will be the same," he explained.

The open meeting adjourned, with the Court going into Executive Session to discuss pending litigation against the County.

## Gordon Spot

It is time to spray your pecan trees to control the pecan weevils. This is one of the most destructive pests of pecans. The adult weevils, which look much like a cotton boll weevil except that the pecan weevil is slightly larger, comes from the ground in late summer to lay eggs in pecans. The weevils emerge from moist soil sooner than from dry soil. I have already seen weevil damage in year trees that have been watered.

The weevils puncture a hole in the pecan and deposits eggs. The eggs hatch larvae which then eats the kernel as it grows. The larvae are cream-white grubs with reddish-brown heads. They group about 3/5 inch long at maturity.

When the larvae mature they chew a hole in the shell about 1/8 inch wide and drop to the ground where they construct an earthen cell. After eight or ten days pupation is completed in about 3 weeks, but the adults do not emerge from the soil until the next year in late summer or early fall.

Weevils must be controlled in the adult stage while on the pecan tree, but preferably before they begin laying eggs. The recent showers may cause weevil emergence even in dryland orchards.

Carbaryl (Sevin) has been shown to be an effective labeled insecticide for pecan weevil control. Its residual has been found to remain active for 8-12 days following application. The trees should be sprayed to the point of run off. If weevils continue to emerge a second or third application of insecticide may be needed at two week intervals.

It's not too early to start planning a fertilizer program for winter wheat production.

Fertilizer requirements will depend on a number of factors.

For producers who plan to follow wheat with wheat, fertilizer recommendations will depend upon fertilizer rates applied to the previous crop

and yield obtained. Also, fertilizer carryover may have been higher than normal due to heavy rust infestations which plagued 1985 wheat production and reduced the crop's ability to utilize much of the applied fertilizer.

These factors and other unusual circumstances influencing the nutrient status of the soil indicate that a soil test should be a sound investment at this time, the agent explains.

Producers who have not yet made a final decision to plant wheat this fall, but wish to leave the door open to plant corn, grain sorghum or cotton this spring, can submit a soil sample now and request fertilizer recommendations for all cropping alternatives. Resulting fertilizer recommendations then can be used to assist

each person in making cropping decisions.

The Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratories at Texas A&M University and Lubbock are ready to assist wheat producers in making these economically important decisions. Although new automated laboratory procedures and computerized integration and reporting of soil test results have improved speed and precision, soil test recommendations can be no better than the quality of the soil sample analyzed.

Therefore, it is important to collect soil samples which are truly representative of the field being tested, the agent says.

A composite soil sample should consist of 10 to 15 sub-samples randomly collected with a probe or shovel and thoroughly mixed together before taking the composite sample. To sample the soil, remove the top inch and collect the soil samples to a depth of six inches.

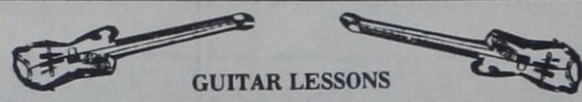

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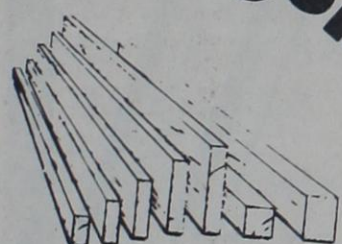
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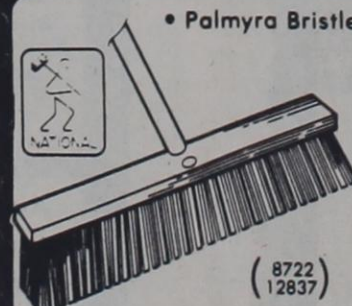

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# County Commissioners Discuss Fire Department State Rulings

In a called meeting Aug. 29 the Eastland County Commissioners Court discussed the current state rulings on City Fire Departments providing services to other towns and rural areas.

Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

Among the firemen present was Jack Graham, Eastland Fire Chief, Darrell Fox, Ranger Fire Dept., Mack Stubblefield of Carbon and Gene Foster of Gorman. Roy Underwood, Eastland City Manager, was among the City and County officials present.

The Commissioners had been informed at a previous meeting that under House Bill 128 Fire Departments would not be able to leave the cities (with liability) to fight fires after Sept. 1 unless they have a contract with the County.

At the beginning of the meeting Judge Bailey announced that the situation in regards to the City of Cisco had been temporarily remedied, but they would like to have some kind of contract in the future. (Another spokesman later clarified this by saying the City of Cisco wanted a contract by Oct. 1.)

A discussion followed, with

various people and the Court bringing out interpretations of the new rulings. The question before the Court was how much of the Firefighters liabilities and responsibilities would the County assume?

District Attorney Emory Walton brought the latest information from his office, a ruling which seemed to differ what the Court had previously been informed. Under current law, he said, State Statute 2351 A-5 says that Commissioners Courts may contract with an unincorporated area to furnish Fire protection. Fire Departments may go outside the City limits, and it authorizes Counties to pay for Fire Protection contracts out of the general funds.

"We're looking at insurance," Jack Graham, Eastland Volunteer Fire Chief, said. "The companies say they do not have to pay Liability if we go outside the city. It's time the County started assuming some of the Liability for fires outside the City limits."

Roy Underwood appeared to agree with Graham, saying that "It's not fair for the people of Eastland to take the full Liability. There should be Mutual Aid Agreements."

He mentioned that this Liability matter was even more far-reaching than Fire protection, and should also include the County assuming part of the responsibility for Police protection out of the City. "But the City of Eastland does not want to make waves," he said. "We can go ahead until Oct. 1."

Gene Foster of Gorman explained some of the difficulty in the geographic situation there - how the Gorman Fire Department provides Fire Protection in Comanche as well as Eastland and Erath Counties, and in these three towns around. "We're going to

have to contact other Counties to work out anything," he said.

Judge Scott Bailey brought up the idea of an Intergovernmental Contract to cover the County, something similar to the contract with the Eastland County Dispatch. He mentioned that the County could have a contract with each City.

Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, suggested that the Commissioners look into the possibility of such a con-

tract, discussing an appropriate policy with an Insurance Agency. Oct. 1 was named as a target date.

Although Cisco was reported to be covered "no matter where the Firemen go", Robinson said that the policy might as well cover everyone. "The cost will be the same," he explained.

The open meeting adjourned, with the Court going into Executive Session to discuss pending litigation against the County.

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
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# Drilling Bits

## COMMISSION FINES KILGORE OPERATOR \$63,000 FOR WELL PLUGGING VIOLATIONS

The Railroad Commission fined Robert Loveall of Kilgore a total of \$63,000 this week for failure to properly plug 31 wells on three leases in Nacogdoches County.

Many of the wells had been inactive and unplugged for months. Commission rules require operators to plug oil or gas wells within 90 days after they become inactive. Loveall did not appear at a Commission-called hearing to consider the violations.

Two other operators also failed to appear at Commission hearings on plugging violations and received administrative penalties Monday.

They included Sabine Exploration, Inc. of Hawkins, \$11,000 for three wells on the Harold Verner lease, Red River County; and Franklin Operating of Wichita Falls, \$6,000 for two wells on the Carter lease, Eastland County.

Agreed settlements were reached with five other companies for well plugging violations. H.R.L., Inc. of Abilene agreed to a \$1,000 penalty for an unplugged well on the E.B. Webb lease in Coleman County. Other penalties included Thomas and Kidd Oil Production Co., Inc. of Denver City, \$500 for one well on the Kirk lease, Parker County; Guaranty Petroleum Corp. of Corpus Christi, \$500 for a well on the Willie Gonzales, Jr. lease, Frio County; Reed Operating Co., Inc. of Ft. Worth, \$500 for a well on the Henderson lease, Palo Pinto County; and Fuses Unlimited of Abilene, \$500 for one well on the C. Stephens lease, Jones County.

A new producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's H&T&C Survey, A-946, with Trinity Exploration Co. as the operator.

Located four miles north-northeast of Cisco, the wildcat is designated as the No. 7 Bar-H-Bar. On an 18/64 in. choke, it indicated ability to flow 89 barrels of oil per day.

The well bottomed at 4,010 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Mississippian Formation, 3,911 to 3,958 feet into the wellbore.

Eastland County gained two new wildcat producers when Circle Exploration completed the Nos. 1-A and 2-A Williams ten miles southeast of Eastland.

The No. 1-A well showed potential to flow gas at the rate of 330,000 CF per day on a 5/16-in. choke. The absolute open flow rating was 525,000 CFD.

The No. 2-A well flowed 330,000 CF gas per day on a 16/64-in. choke. It was given a 3,400,000 CFD rating on absolute open flow.

The wells will produce from intervals in the Frye Formation, ranging from 520 to 557 feet into the hole.

The two new producers are in a lease in the McLennan CSL Survey, A-368.

The No. 2 Bledsoe, a 3,600-ft. wildcat well, is scheduled to be drilled in Eastland County's H&T&C Survey, A-1803. G.H.F. Oil of Granbury is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 160-acre lease four miles east-northeast of Romney.

Gra-Tex Drilling of Ft. Worth has revealed plans to drill two 1,800-ft. developmental wells in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 240 acres leased, with drillsites in the H&T&C Survey, A-735. The ventures have been designated as the Nos. 5 and 6 Cecil Self. Drillsites are one mile northwest of Carbon.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 1 Suartez-Edwards, a 3,500-ft.

developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operation will be located five miles south-southwest of Nimrod in a 32-acre lease in the Moses Allen Survey. The operator is Nen Energy of Clyde.

At a location nine miles west-southwest of Gorman, Proco Operating has finalized a new oil producer in Eastland County's Kaizer Field.

The well is designated as the No. 2 McCollum, pumping oil at the rate of 50 barrels per day, plus 100 barrels of water.

Location is in the T&NO Survey, A-530. Bottomed at 3,140 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Caddo Formation, 2,480 to 2,520 feet into the wellbore.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 51 J.C. Carr "499", a developmental venture of Enre Corp. Drillsite was three miles north-northeast of Cisco in the Eastland Regular Field. Spudded July 24, the well bottomed dry at 950 feet.

Sun Exploration & Production has filed for permit to drill the No. 14 S.E. Reynolds, a 3,500-ft. developmental well four miles north-northwest of Victor, Eastland County. It is in a 72-acre lease in the Sarah Robinson Survey, A-667, Desdemona Field.

Two 4,500-ft. developmental wells are planned by Richey & Co. of Ft. Worth in the Richey Field, Eastland County. The locations are in a 320-acre lease in the R.A. & A.C. "Pace" Surveys. Drillsites are nine miles north-northeast of Cisco. The ventures have been

designated as the Nos. 1 V.C. O'Conner & 1 V.C. O'Conner "A".

Isom Energy & Resources has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the Barton Field, Eastland County. The No. 2 F.L. Merrill showed potential to flow 130,000 CF gas per day on a 12/64-in. choke. The absolute open flow rating was 170,000 CFD.

The operator has a lease in the ETRR Survey, A-1894, one mile east of Pioneer. Bottomed at 2,560 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Lower Caddo Formation, 2,401 to 2,406 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 1 Woods Unit has been finalized by Ridge Oil.

State offshore leases produced 145,866 barrels of crude oil during June, down from 154,576 barrels in May, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Buddy Temple.

Gas well production from state leases amounted to 8,023,320 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) in June, against 7,885,667 Mcf in May.

Casinghead gas production totaled 428,527 Mcf in June, compared to 406,739 in May. Casinghead gas is natural gas produced from oil wells.

Condensate production from state leases amounted to 31,004 barrels in June, against 33,782 barrels in May. Condensates are liquid hydrocarbons produced from gas wells.

In June, offshore crude production made up about 0.2 percent of total estimated crude production in Texas. Offshore gas well production was approximately 2.3 percent of the estimated state total.

Offshore production in state was reported in June from 50 oil and 446 gas wells.

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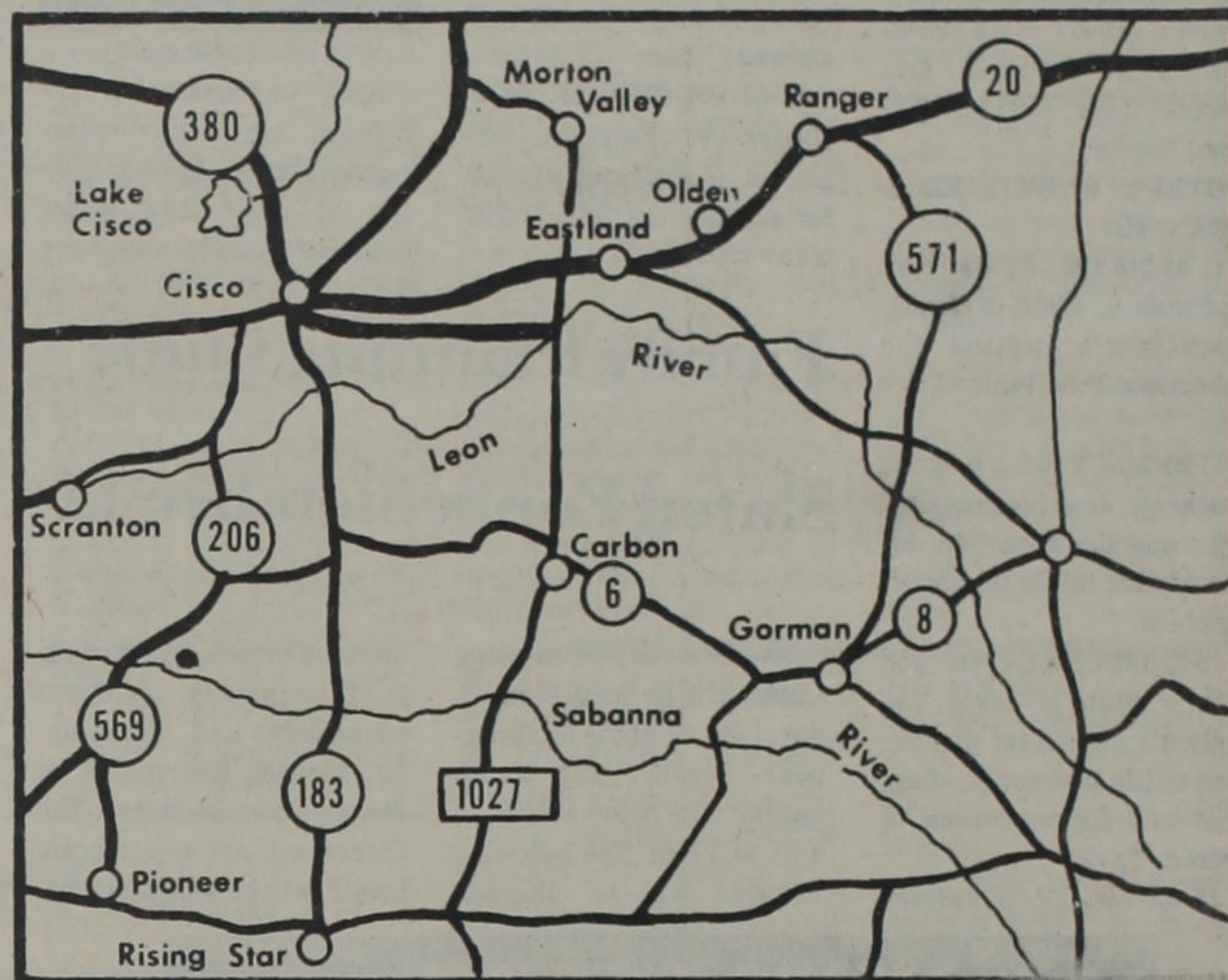

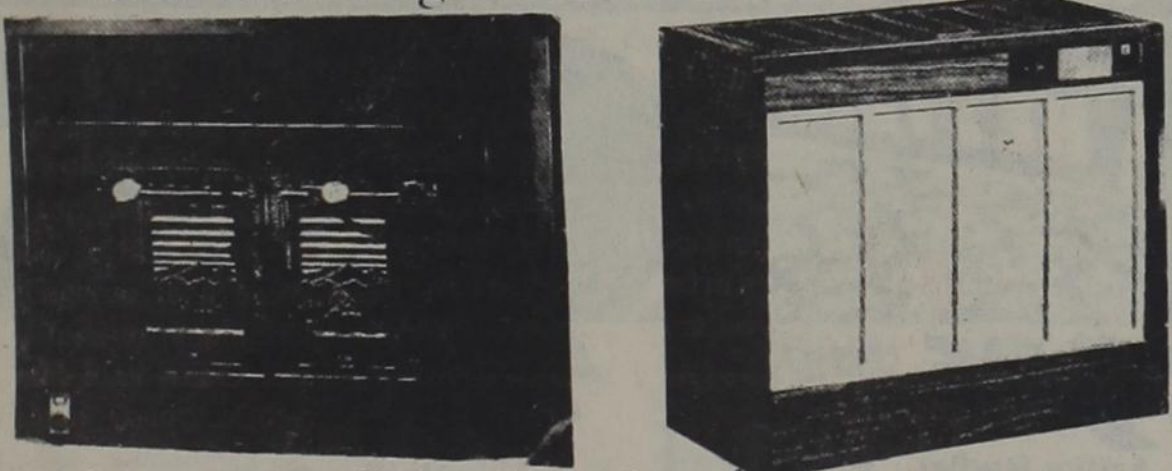

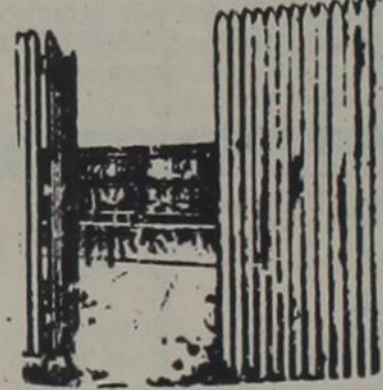

## Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Every day you read in the papers of attacks on Social Security and Medicare. It seems there is a misunderstanding in regard to the cost of the Social Security. It is one of the few programs of the federal government that is paying its own way at the present time. Medicare is a different problem!

But now health planners are paying increasing attention to the special problems of people age 75 and older. They require special services and increased care as they move up the age ladder. The census bureau reports that those past 75 will increase to 30 million by 2030, compared to 10.7 million in 1982. The share of the population that is aged 75 or older will almost double to 10 percent.

The number of persons age 65 or older will increase 24 percent between 1980 and 1990, a rate similar to that which prevailed between 1960 and 1980. Because the

U.S. has higher fertility and mortality rates, a somewhat smaller share of its population is aged 65 or older than is the case in countries in Europe.

The Cisco City Council approved some revisions in the final draft of the 1985-86 budget for the city and approved an agreement for leasing a hangar and hiring a Fixed Base Operator for Cisco Municipal Airport, at the regular council meeting.

The revisions in the budget draft authorized a five percent cost-of-living increase for city employees to become effective April 1, 1986. Council members Joe Besselaar, Bill Roberts, Roy Dennis, Brad Kimbrough, and Linton Bateas voted in favor, while Bobby Ingram voted against the matter.

In the second revision, which takes \$20,000 from oil and gas royalties to be added into the general fund, all council members except Kimbrough voted for the matter. Kimbrough voted against.

An agreement between the city and Mr. and Mrs. Archie Brixey was approved by the council for the leasing of Cisco Municipal Airports' Hangar No. 1 and naming Mr. Brixey as Fixed Base Operator for the airport. The agreement is for a period of five years.

Mr. Brixey is a licensed, certified, aviation mechanic and will run a mechanic shop inside the hangar, as well as taking care of his duties as Fixed Base Operator at the city. Mr. Brixey will also be painting airplanes and maintenance work on them.

Among his duties as FBO, Mr. Brixey will mow and maintain the airport grounds, operate the airport lighting system and maintain the lighting system in a "good and proper manner." The city will furnish materials used in the maintenance of the lighting system.

Mr. and Mrs. Brixey will live on the airport grounds and will be available there 24 hours a day.

Council members reviewed the status of the proposed new wastewater treatment facility project and EPA construction grant application. Mr. Moore said some of the terms of the grant call for customers to pay for the water they use.

The Texas Department of Water Resources informed City Manager Moore that they have "reviewed, approved and transmitted" the application "to the Environmental Protection Agency for final concurrence and grant offer execution." The proposed scheduling of the facility calls for the completed construction by the end of September in 1986.

In new business, the council approved an ordinance establishing the tax levy for the 1985-86 budget year of Cisco at 55 cents per \$100 evaluation. The item was declared an emergency and went into effect immediately.

The Council also approved an ordinance providing for an amendment of the existing ordinance to increase sanitation collection rates by a flat rate of \$1.00 per customer. The new rates become effective September 1.

The Tuesday approval was for the first reading and the second reading will be held at the next council meeting.

The first reading of an ordinance updating service credits for the Texas Municipal Retirement System was approved. The new credits will decrease the city's cost from 3.51 percent per employee to 3.22 percent.

A final ordinance, approved on its first reading, called for the vacating of a 20 foot easement in the Oakcrest Addition of Cisco. Mr. Moore said the easement had been asked for, but contractors working for the city laid a utility line on the other side of the property, therefore, the easement is not needed.

Mr. Moore said another land owner has agreed to give the city an easement on his property so they may have access to the line.

A group of citizens attended the meeting to discuss whether softball may be played on the baseball field at Cisco City Park. City Manager Moore said the city has had an agreement with the ABC Baseball Club that they would be responsible for the field and its upkeep.

However, he said learned the city has a written contract with the Girls' Softball League for the upkeep of the Whitley Softball Field in north-

west Cisco. He recommended the city make a written contract with the

ABC Club for the baseball field. He said then it would be up

For viewers to receive the stereo signal, they must have a stereo-capable television set and be located in an area in which a television station transmits a stereo signal.

The weekly, half-hour series to be broadcast in stereo are *Punky Brewster*, *The Cosby Show*, *Gimme a Break*, *Family Ties*, *Silver Spoons*, *The Facts of Life*, *Cheers*, *The Golden Girls* and *227*.

NBC executive Michael J. Sherlock said other NBC programs may be added to the stereo lineup in the near future.

said other NBC fall series may be added to the stereo lineup, and the 32nd Annual *Miss America Pageant* on Sept. 14 will also be transmitted in stereo.

Currently, *The Tonight Show* starring Johnny Carson, *Late Night with David Letterman* and *Friday Night Videos* are transmitted in stereo.

NBC presented the first network stereo telecast of any program on July 26, 1984 when it transmitted *The Tonight Show* starring Johnny Carson in that format. The most recent All-Star Baseball game from the Metrodome in Minneapolis was also broadcast in stereo.

At present, three NBC Television stations and 27 NBC affiliates are equipped to transmit in stereo, covering more than one-third of United States television homes.

Sherlock said other NBC programs may be added to the stereo lineup in the near future.
