

## Goodfellows Still Plead For Donations For Toys

The Goodfellows are still pleading for donations this week in order to be able to purchase more toys for needy families with children this holiday season. Most of the Goodfellows funds so far, have been spent for food baskets to be distributed to those whose applications were approved by the Goodfellows Board of Directors.

In order to buy some toys to be given out to the children of applicants on Christmas Eve, more funds

will have to be made available. This year's drive has not been near as successful as hoped for at the beginning of the season.

With the economy the way it is, there seems to be more persons in need this year and not as many able to help out financially. A number of applicants are out of jobs this season and what little money they have will go toward utility bills. There does not seem to be very much left over for holiday foods or toys.

If there is any way possi-

ble, you are asked to please donate to the Goodfellows. It doesn't matter how much you can give because anything is very much appreciated. If every person in Cisco could give at least \$1.00, then the Goodfellows would not have any problems in providing help to the applicants.

One lady writes about a friend who has one child (age 2 1/2). "This girl has just separated from her husband and gets no help. She has gone to work at the sewing factory and before she has time to get things together where she can make it, Christmas is here and the factory will be closed for about two weeks."

Another applicant is listed as living "on her father's social security check and what little the two children's dad sends to them from Dallas where he works. Her father is in his 90s. Both the grandson and granddaughter live with them and go to school. She has just enough money to pay bills and buy groceries."

A family of four writes, "I am working two or three days a week. My husband isn't working. He is sick. I have put in for food stamps. But I haven't got them yet. There is my two children ages 14 and 10. Another is at my mother's house to let her help feed him. He is 16 years old. We are really in hard shape now. He will come home when we get our food stamps."

An elderly couple writes, "Because the SSI checks do not cover bills and husband is disabled and can not get around without cane or walker. But myself the wife, doesn't get around without resting for couple of minutes. The bills are more than what we can get on our check. Beside that we had to buy groceries and buy repair things around the houses."

A couple with six children writes, "My husband was hurt on job. Since May 23, 1984, has been in hospital and now he's out and doctor released him and he's looking for work. There were only three of us then. But my step children are with me and their father and I need a little help on Goodfellows. We live in a small home. But manage to squeeze in. We really need your help. Thank you."

One woman, who lives alone, writes, "I am on a fix income and this help for winter will be appreciated as I'm making payment on refrigerator. With high blood pressure, my medication continues to go up."

A family of three adults writes, "We usually run out of money by the last of the month."

A friend writes about a local lady, "This lady is legally blind, lives on her own, has no family here. Her daughter, who is in her 60s and isn't well, lives in Fort Worth or Dallas. This woman lives on about \$400 a month, and I feel she could use this since she'll be alone on Christmas. She spends all Christmas alone. She is also a good Christian woman, and a sweetheart. She does have a little poodle that she saved from starvation years ago as a companion, named Lucky."

Another lady writes, "I'm a widow age 74 years under a doctor's care. I have only Social Security check which isn't enough to last a month."

An elderly couple says, "We are ages 87 and 84 living on a fixed and limited income. Any help you are able to give us is really a blessing."

A daughter writes, "My mother is 82 years old and

she don't get but a little SS check and SSI each month and her taxes and insurance all comes due this time of year and utilities all go up. So she won't have much Christmas. She lives alone and will appreciate a basket or anything you can help her with. And I will thank you too as I'm not able to help her much. Thank you for anything to help her Christmas be a little brighter."

All solicitation for funds is being made through The Cisco Press and everyone is urged to help families such as those above. All donations are tax deductible.

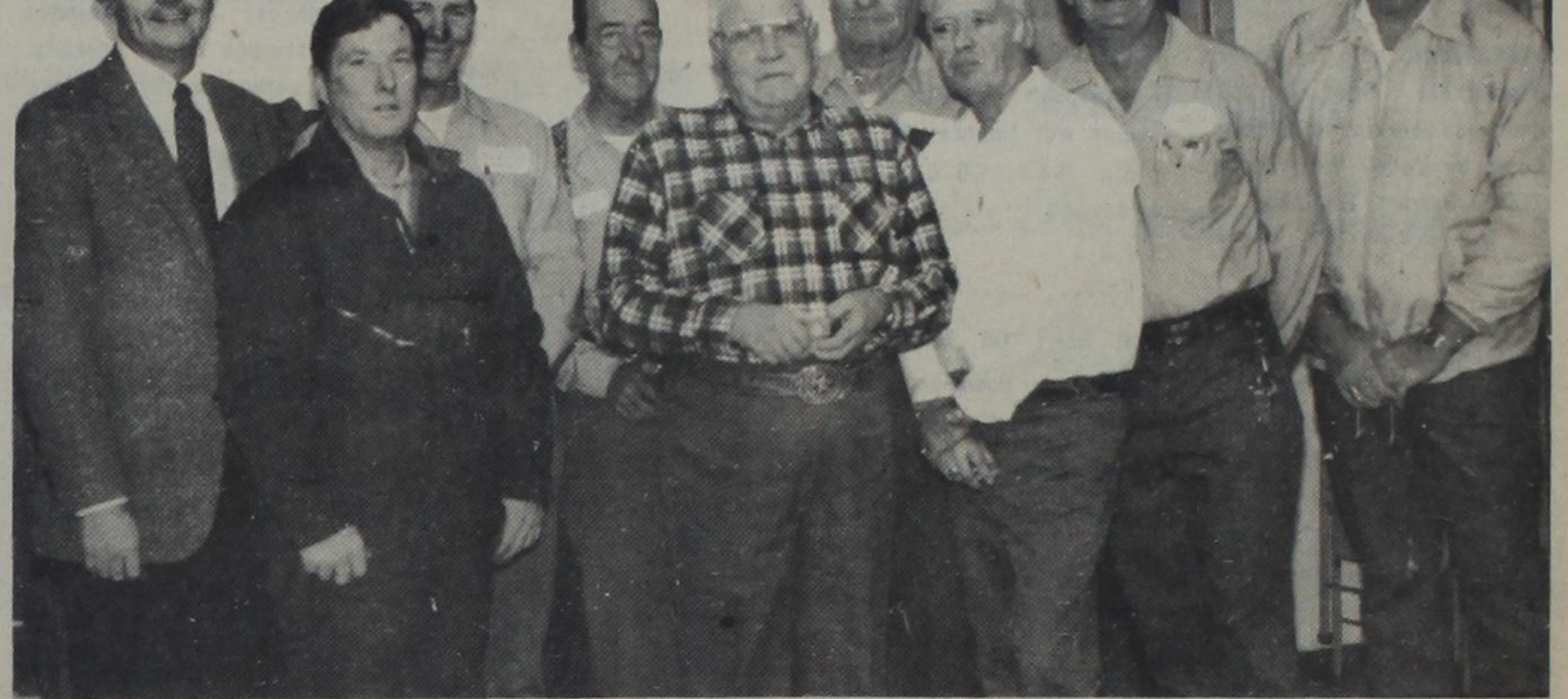

## Three Juveniles Arrested In Burglary Of Lake Cabins

Three juvenile boys ages 14, 15 and 16 were in custody after they were apprehended at Lake Cisco Monday by Police Chief Billy Rains and

Deputy Sheriff H.T. Fillingham on charges of burglarizing several cabins on the south shore.

Local police received a call Monday morning from Fred Smith of Abilene that his cabin on Lot 58 had been burglarized. Mr. Rains and Deputy Fillingham went to the cabin and met Mr. Smith. They noticed an automobile abandoned near the cabin.

Car keys found by Mr. Smith in his cabin turned on the ignition of the car and it was found to have been stolen from a parking lot in Abilene. While officers were looking at the car, Mr. Smith called the officers to report that someone was still in his cabin.

As the officers returned to the cabin, a youth ran out the back and Chief Rains ran after him. He soon caught the boy and found two others nearby. Mr. Rains and Mr. Fillingham then placed the trio in custody.

Investigating and ques-

tioning the youths, officers learned that four other cabins had been broken open. Items taken and recovered included radios, tools, food, some money, watches and the like. The recovered items were at the Cisco police station.

Randy Logan, county juvenile officer, took the three youths to the Juvenile Detention Center in Abilene where they were being held Tuesday. DPS Troopers Steve Foster and Richard Treece of Eastland assisted officers in transporting the youths.

Chief Rains said the investigation was continuing.

## Mrs. Smith Is Injured Dec. 14

Mrs. Wilson Smith of Cisco suffered painful cuts and bruises and her granddaughter, Christy, had minor bruises when the automobile in which they were riding was struck from behind by a speeding truck on I-20 in the Clyde area last Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. Smith was taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene where she received emergency treatment and was released. She entered E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital here Sunday to spend a few days. Christy, a student at Cisco High School, was not hospitalized.

A DPS trooper, who said he was chasing the truck, witnessed the accident and investigated the mishap. He reported that he clocked the truck at a speed of 72 miles per hour shortly before the accident.

The Smith car, a 1984 Buick Park Avenue, was demolished. It rolled over twice after the impact, and Mrs. Smith was thrown from the vehicle.

## Russell-Newman Gives Awards

Russell-Newman has some 135 employees in their sports wear manufacturing facility here. It was expected that the company would be hiring workers again after the plant reopens Jan. 2 for 1986, Mr. Laird said.

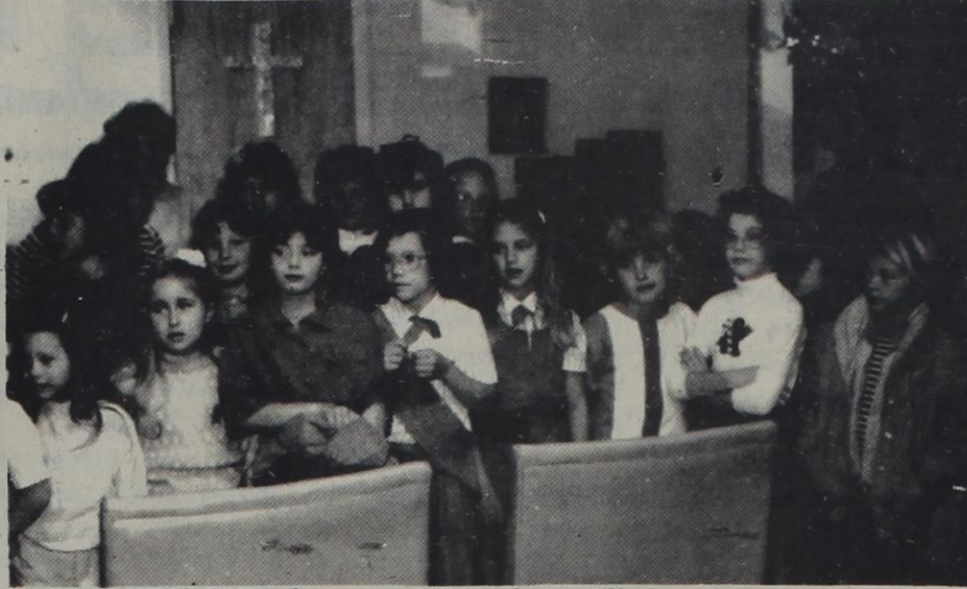

# Increased Texas Highway Funding Helps Protect Roads This Winter

Thursday, December 19, 1985

Thanks to a boost in transportation funds, many Texas roadways greeted this winter's first major storm safely wrapped in a new coat of protective asphalt. The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission approved the \$100 million preventative maintenance program earlier this year, in time to get the "seal-coats" down on hundreds of miles of state roadways before the winter storms hit.

Without the protective coating program, which had to be severely reduced in 1984 due to lack of funds, water seeps into the cracks of aging roadways. When it freezes, it expands, a process that results in potholes when the first warm days return.

The potholes are much more expensive to repair than taking preventative measures.

"Over the long run, preventative maintenance will return substantial dividends to the traveling public," said Billy Rogers, highway department design engineer. "It is expected to pay for itself many times over."

Rogers said this is the first time in several years that the department has been able to fund the program at the level required to provide adequate maintenance. Funding in previous years had been at only half the amount allocated for this year's program.

The present level of allocation will cover approximately 10,000 miles of the 73,000-mile highway system in Texas. Over a seven-year period, all roadways in the state will receive the seal coat treatment, a frequency that Rogers says will provide proper maintenance.

"This approach provides for preventative maintenance on a statewide basis at a level that will preserve the system," Rogers said.

The seal coat program is a bit like waxing a car, Rogers said. A thin (one-quarter inch) layer of liquid asphalt is spread on the roadway to protect the surface. While the asphalt is hot, a layer of fine rock chips is spread over it as filler. The rock chips sink into the asphalt, making the layer thicker and helping it adhere to the road surface.

When precipitation and freezing weather occur, the roadway is more resistant to the harsh elements. Without such maintenance, highways are subject to weathering at a more rapid rate, which results in driving hazards such as potholes.

Such hazards not only create a burden on taxpayers in repair expenses, but damage can occur to vehicles from the uneven surface. The Road Information Program in Washington, D.C., estimates that driving over bad roads costs the average driver an extra \$210 annually.

"You don't have to score a direct hit on a pothole to subject your vehicle to considerable punishment," said Donald S. Knight, TRIP's executive director. "The constant day-to-day pounding can damage brake, steering and suspension systems." But dollars spent on road maintenance can reduce expenses from such wear and tear for motorists.

"Without the increased funding for road maintenance and repairs since 1982," he said, "the average operating cost per vehicle undoubtedly would be much higher."

Added to the expense is the safety hazard, which is already a factor in icy weather.

Preparation for hazardous traveling on icy Texas highways begins early each year, when districts order their winter supply of sand and salt, according to Bryan Whitten of the highway department's purchasing office. Use of sand and salt varies with the diverse climate and terrain throughout the state, with each district ordering what works best in its area.

In the Amarillo district, a brine (saltwater) solution is used. Temperatures are so cold there that sand doesn't work well and dry salt just sits on the frozen surface without penetrating. Brine helps dissolve the ice.

Whitten said that although every district that experiences cold weather will prepare for winter storms, the highway districts in the northern parts of the state are the ones most involved in ordering large quantities of sand and salt.

"Most of the northern districts like to have their orders in stock by November," Whitten said.

This year, the nine coldest districts in the department have prepared for the storms with a combined 40,000 tons of aggregate sand, at a cost of \$500,000. In addition, 11,000 tons of salt, at a cost of \$53,000, is waiting for use on icy highways. These amounts will be added to some remaining stock from last year, Whitten said.

When a storm hits, highway crews work around the clock to keep roadways sanded and salted.

"As soon as there's any accumulation, we get out on the roads," said Jim Turner, maintenance construction superintendent in the Childress district.

Removal equipment in Turner's district includes 65 dump trucks, half as many salt and sand spreaders and 17 motor graders with snow wings. And in really severe weather, two ancient Snow-go machines are called into action, Turner said.

"One is an antique, really," he said. "It came from the old

air field out here in the forties."

Although the machines have seen many winter storm seasons, during heavy snow and drifting, they churn through the accumulation with an auger and blow the loosened snow aside. Then other equipment can reach the area to spread sand and salt.

"Thank goodness that doesn't happen very often," said Turner.

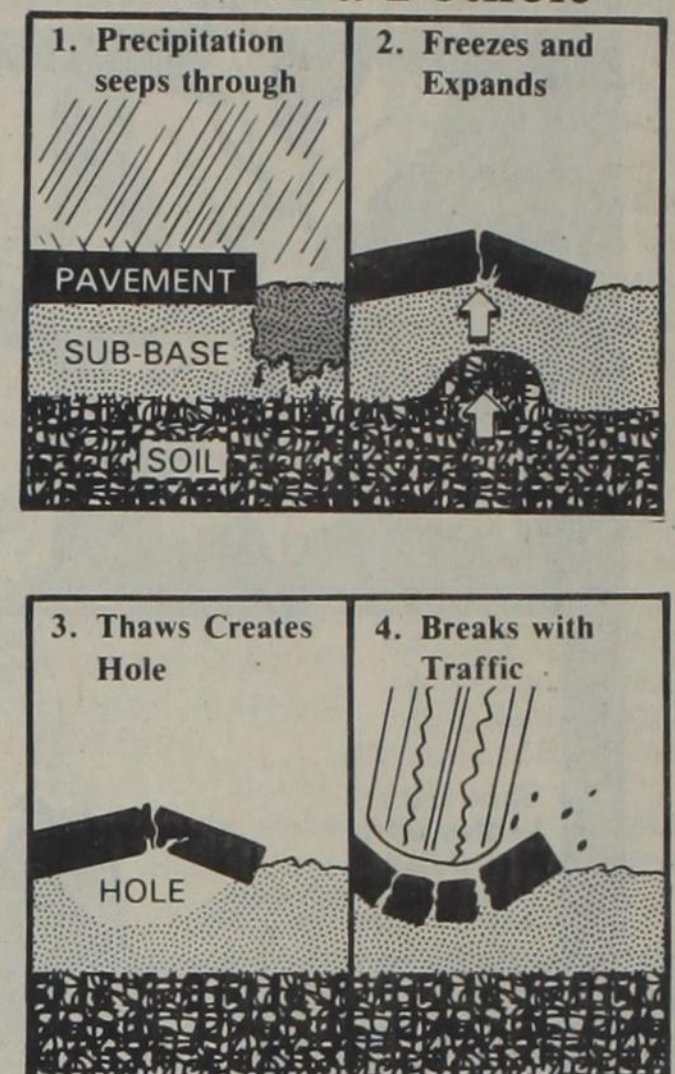
In the Childress district, which sprawls throughout 13 counties in the lower Panhandle area, crews work out of 16 warehouses to clear over 2,000 miles of roadways. At least 1,000 miles are considered primary arteries for snow-removal purposes, according to Terry Keener, district maintenance engineer.

Clearing of roads is done according to the amount of traffic, with Interstate, US and state highways given prime consideration, Keener said.

But Texans needn't worry that a siege of storms will find the department unprepared. Whitten said that, should a district run out of sand and salt supplies, more can be ordered on an emergency basis.

"I think we're prepared quite well this year," Whitten said. "Considering the size of the state, we don't get too many emergency orders due to running out of supplies."

## Texas Oil & Gas... Gas Pricing Proposal Bad News for Texans

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) is proposing a change in the way the natural gas industry handles pipeline billing procedures. If adopted, the proposal to require "block billing" of natural gas could have a very negative effect on certain segments of the industry as well as the Texas economy.

"Block billing" would divide interstate gas, for example that gas produced in Texas but sold elsewhere, into two "blocks," i.e., categories. Block 1 would be composed of low-priced "old" gas, while Block 2 gas would consist of the remainder of domestic gas production. The blocks would be billed separately, thereby forcing abandonment of the current average-priced billing procedure.

The proposal would keep Block 1 gas at current, below market prices and would allow only existing out-of-state customers access to it. This would force pipeline companies and producers to compete for new customers solely with Block 2 gas.

Combined with transportation rules recently adopted by FERC, the prices paid for Block 2 gas would be forced down quickly. In most cases, prices for this gas now are above market average prices and prices in the short-term markets.

"Block billing" would not produce a competitive, free market. Rather, this set of regulated-market distortions would result in a new form of market discrimination against Texas producers and consumers.

These dictated prices inevitably would produce new average prices below what a free market would produce. And, indeed, some out-of-state consumers would enjoy lower gas prices for a short while. But, the price cuts would come at the expense of gas producer income.

As gas producers see their income dwindle, they will be forced to cut operating costs to stay in business. Failure to generate capital for exploration would mean a cutback in drilling, thereby lessening available supplies of natural gas, with the inevitable upward pressure on prices and more dependency on imports.

But, what does this proposal mean to Texas, source of one-third of U.S. natural gas production? Comptroller Bob Bullock estimates that "block billing"—along with other FERC rules already adopted—would cost over \$2.5-billion in income annually to Texas 6,000 gas producers, with a related annual loss of as much as \$200-million in state severance taxes; reduce drilling starts by three-percent a year, and generally further aggravate problems of an ailing industry which is vital not only to this state's economy but to the security of our nation.

## 'Get Off Your Rocker' Featured In Magazine

CISCO RESIDENTS GET OFF THEIR ROCKERS AND WALK THE ROAD TO GOOD HEALTH  
GET OFF YOUR ROCKER!  
Last spring in Cisco about 30 people began walking and "got off their rockers." E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital introduced the exercise program to "promote health awareness and wellness," said Helen Orr, administrator.

The walking exercise program began in April, and the group now has 30 participants. They meet Tuesdays and Thursdays at the City Park near the Hospital and walk for 45 minutes. During the summer they met at 6:45 a.m. to beat the heat.

"As a community hospital we feel a responsibility to provide community service," Orr said.

The track is one-fourth of a mile, but walkers usually walk 1 1/2 or 2 miles each day. Mrs. Orr or Sharene Richardson, director, medical records, accompanies the group. After accumulating 10 miles each walker receives a t-shirt proclaiming, "I got off my rocker at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital." About 20 walkers have earned shirts.

Walkers range in age from the mid-fifties to 92 years. Participants are enthusiastic about the program.

"Since I live alone, it makes my day to walk with others," said Mary Redwine,

74. "Walking also helps my circulation."

The group agreed that Cisco may be small, but citizens find things to keep busy. Another walker, J.D. Yardley, 76, also enjoys the group exercise program.

"If I don't walk, I miss it when I'm trying to fall asleep. I walk every day, but with this group it's fun to go to Dairy Queen together to eat breakfast after walking," Yardley said.

## Stuart Case To Go To Higher Federal Court

County Judge Scott Bailey announced in the Commissioner's Court meeting Monday, Dec. 16 that the case brought by Raymond Stuart against Eastland County is being appealed to the Federal Court of Civil Appeals in New Orleans.

"We are very sympathetic with regard to your health

problems and hope you will recover to the greatest possible extent. We also understand your concern for the benefit that would be lost by your early resignation. As you are doubtless aware, we have met with the Commissioners Court and obtained their verbal commitment to create another position for you to fill until you are eligible for full retirement benefits.

"As such, we feel that every possible effort has been made to make your resignation as easy and com-

fortable as is possible under the circumstances.

"We must point out that our reasons for asking your resignation are many. Although we are sympathetic and understand that many of the problems are related to your physical inability, the fact remains that the problems still exist.

"During recent budgetary sessions Precinct 2 was totally unrepresented in Commissioners Court. Your attendance record during these crucial sessions as well as those bi-monthly sessions over the past two years has caused great concern.

"The condition of roads in Precinct 2 are well below the standard for surrounding counties as well as other precincts in Eastland County. Various instances have been noted where roads in our Precinct become impassable and remained so for periods up to three weeks. Specific requests from citizens in problem areas have gone unanswered for indefinite periods and in some instances were completely ignored.

"The condition of our road maintenance equipment has deteriorated to a point where something must be done immediately. Our roads are in such a poor state of repair that without or poorly functioning equipment cannot do the necessary work. We feel very strongly that that the need for reworking or replacement of some of this equipment should have been brought up during the last budget session. Due to your absence at said sessions, it

was not.

"There are countless instances which could be related in this petition, however, doing so would serve no purpose.

"It has become painfully

apparent that you are no longer capable of fulfilling your duties as precinct 2, county commissioner. With the greatest respect and appreciation for your past service to the county and

precinct, we are forced by the circumstances to demand your resignation within two working days of delivery hereof.

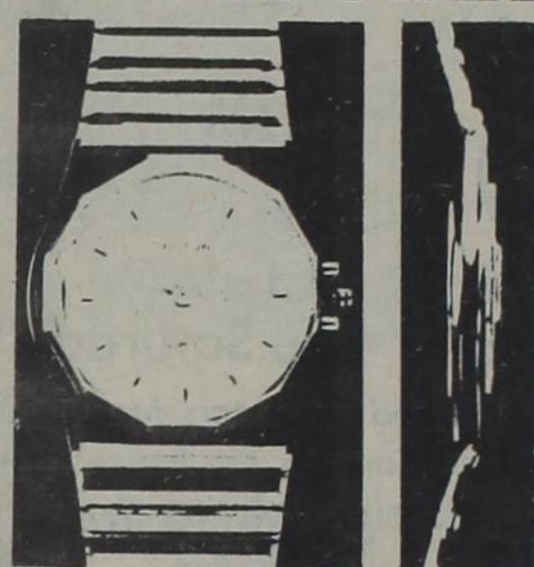

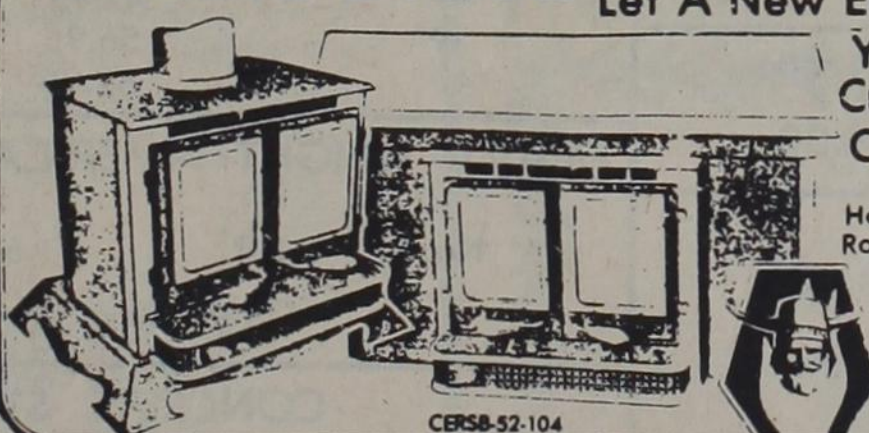

# Commissioners Decline To Appoint Precinct 2 J.P.

Eastland County Commissioners, in an hour-long meeting Monday, Dec. 16, declined to appoint a Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2. The vacancy was created by the resignation of Luther Maxwell of Ranger on Nov. 25.

Present at the session in the Courtroom were Commissioners Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. Commissioner Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, was absent due to illness. County Judge Scott Bailey presided. Also present in the Courtroom were County officials, several applicants for the J.P. office, and other interested citizens.

During the meeting two applicants for the J.P. position turned in resumes. They were Melvin Joseph Patenaude and Charles Pat Moseley. Their names were added to those of seven others who had applied for the job on Dec. 9: Zelma M. Tackett, Alfred Bush, Donna May Justice, Truman B. Miller, Howard W. Veal, Arie Sharpe, and Clyde Kerr.

In opening the discussion on whom to appoint to the office, L.T. Owens of Pct. 3 (Rising Star area) stated that he wished to "leave the office closed until time to run for it."

He said there were some good applicants for the position, but candidates will be filing for this office "in about two weeks", with a primary election in May.

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1 also spoke, stating that he would rather not make an appointment at this time.

"We have not had good results from the last two appointments, he said. "Our appointment would give someone an edge on the office. With no input from the Commissioner of Pct. 2 over there, I would rather that a majority of the people get to make a choice."

Judge Bailey told the applicants present that Joann Johnson, County Clerk, had the information on how they might file as a candidate. The opening date for filing is the first Monday in January, and the closing date is 6 p.m.

on the first Monday in February. Filing fee will be \$300. The winner of the election will take office Jan. 1, 1987.

Judge M.D. Underwood, a former J.P. of Pct. 2, then spoke to the Court. He said that he had been especially invited by Mrs. Jack Blackwell to come here.

He stated that he "couldn't pick one above the other" from among the nine applicants, but that he wanted to stress how really important the office is. "Many peo-

ple don't realize what they are getting into when they take this job," he said. "You are on call 24 hrs. per day."

C.B. Dill, Pct. 4, then spoke up, stating that he didn't think they (the people of Pct. 2) "should be out of a J.P. for a whole year." He said that he thought the Commissioners Court should review the situation after the filing deadline for the office, and if they can't come to an agreement then "after the first Primary".

He indicated that the voter's preference should be the guideline on the appointment. "We haven't had much luck in appointing people," he said.

Judge Bailey asked the Commissioners if they wished to close the applications for the J.P. office. He reminded the court of the importance of the office. Among other things, the J.P. records births and dates and performs marriages.

By unanimous agreement the Commissioners decided to close applications for the office. A possible appointment will be reconsidered at a later date.

# State Comptroller Sends \$56.9 Million In Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$56.9 million in local sales tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Houston's check for \$9.2 million was the largest, bringing total payments this year to \$150.3 million, up 3 percent over last year. Dallas' payment was \$7.7 million for a 1985 total of \$112.4 million, a 13 percent increase.

San Antonio received \$3.5 million, pushing 1985 payments to \$56.2 million, up 13 percent over last year. Austin's check for \$2.6 million brought total payments this year to \$44 million, an 18 percent increase. Fort Worth's payment was \$2.3 million, bringing this year's total to \$34.1 million, up 11 percent. El Paso's December check for \$1.4 million pushed total payments to \$21 million, 15 percent over 1984 payments.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$26.4 million to the state's five Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA received \$10.6 million for total payments of \$173.1 million in 1985. Dallas' DART check was for \$10.5 million, bringing 1985 payments to \$155.1 million. Austin's Capital Metro's fourth check for \$2.7 million brought yearly payments to \$12.6 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$2 million for a 1985 total of \$31.1 million. Fort Worth's MTA check for \$528,454 pushed payments this year to \$4 million in 1985.

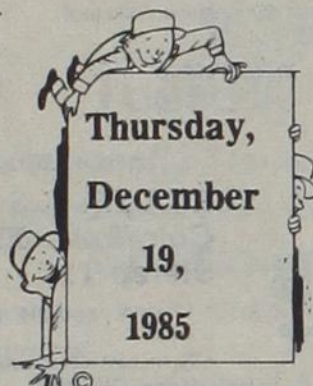

Engine overheating may be caused by low levels of crankcase oil, or low oil pressure, in addition to problems with the cooling system.

If a wheel drops off the road onto a soft shoulder, don't jerk it back right away. It's safer to wait a few seconds, let the car slow down gradually, then ease the car back onto the road. Turn the wheel so that the tread-not the sidewall-meets the pavement edge.

### DELAY IN JUDGMENT

The Scriptures leave no doubt that the Lord Jesus Christ will come to this earth again, "in flaming fire, taking vengeance on them that know not God" and who "receive not the love of the truth, that they might be saved" (II Thes. 1:8; 2:10). Nor will He forget His promise to give the twelve apostles thrones in His kingdom (Matt. 19:28).

There can be no successors to Peter and the eleven, for they themselves are to reign with Christ in glory. What is happening now is a parenthesis in God's prophesied program.

Delaying Christ's return to judge and reign, God chose another apostle, separate from the twelve, to bring a message of grace to this Christ-rejecting world. How great is His mercy and love!

And how are men saved today? How are their sins remitted? Must they come to some recognized authority and be "baptized for the remission of sins"? Some, still following Peter rather than Paul, say, "Yes." But let us see what St. Paul, by divine inspiration, has to say about this.

It stands in contrast, also, to the words of the so-called "Great Commission": "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). Does not this indicate that a change in dispensation took place with the raising up of Paul, that other apostle?

But what about the kingdom? Does some man on earth hold the keys? No, for both the King and His kingdom are in exile. When a sinner obeys God and receives Christ as His Savior he is "translated into the kingdom of His dear Son" (Col. 1:13), and "made accepted in the Beloved" (Eph. 1:6).

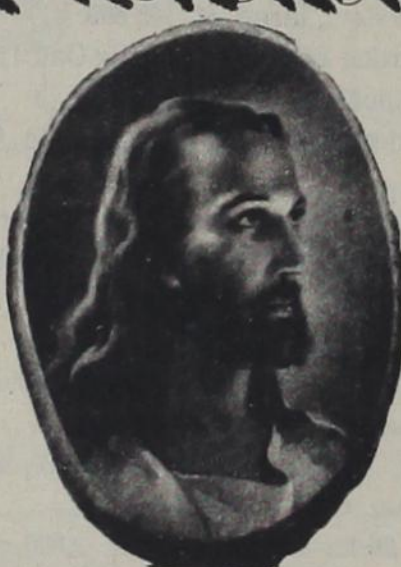
