

Increased Texas Highway Funding Helps Protect Roads This Winter

Thanks to a boost in transportation funds, many Texas roadways greeted this winter's first major storm safely begins early each year, when districts order their winter wrapped in a new coat of protective asphalt. "This approach provides for preventative maintenance on a statewide basis at a level that will preserve the system," Rogers said.

The seal coat program is a bit like waxing a car, Rogers said. A thin (one-quarter inch) layer of liquid asphalt is spread on the roadway to protect the surface. While the asphalt is hot, a layer of fine rock chips is spread over it as filler. The rock chips sink into the asphalt, making the layer thicker and helping it adhere to the road surface.

When precipitation and freezing weather occur, the roadway is more resistant to the harsh elements. Without such maintenance, highways are subject to weathering at a more rapid rate, which results in driving hazards such as potholes.

Such hazards not only create a burden on taxpayers in repair expenses, but damage can occur to vehicles from the uneven surface. The Road Information Program in Washington, D.C., estimates that driving over bad roads costs the average driver an extra \$210 annually.

"You don't have to score a direct hit on a pothole to subject your vehicle to considerable punishment," said Donald S. Knight, TRIP's executive director. "The constant day-today pounding can damage brake, steering and suspension systems." But dollars spent on road maintenance can reduce


"Thank goodness that doesn't happen very often," said Turner.

In the Childress district, which sprawls throughout 13 counties in the lower Panhandle area, crews work out of 16 warehouses to clear over 2,000 miles of roadways. At least 1,000 miles are considered primary arteries for snow-removal purposes, according to Terry Keener, district maintenance engineer.


Clearing of roads is done according to the amount of traffic, with Interstate, US and state highways given prime consideration, Keener said.


But Texans needn't worry that a siege of storms will find the department unprepared. Whitten said that, should a district run out of sand and salt supplies, more can be ordered on an emergency basis.

"I think we're prepared quite well this year," Whitten said. "Considering the size of the state, we don't get too many emergency orders due to running out of supplies."

Texas Oil & Gas... **Gas Pricing Proposal Bad News for Texans**

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) is proposing a change in the way the natural gas industry handles pipeline billing procedures. If adopted, the proposal to require "block billing" of natural gas could have a very negative effect on certain segments of the industry as well as the Texas economy.

"Block billing" would divide interstate gas, for example that gas produced in Texas but sold elsewhere, into two "blocks," i.e., categories. Block 1 would be composed of low-priced "old" gas, while Block 2 gas would consist of the remainder of domestic gas production. The blocks would be billed separately, thereby forcing abandonment of the current averagepriced billing procedure.

The proposal would keep Block 1 gas at current, below market prices and would allow only existing out-of-state customers access to it. This would force pipeline companies and producers to compete for new customers solely with Block 2 gas.

Combined with transportation rules recently adopted by FERC, the prices paid for Block 2 gas would be forced down quickly. In most cases, prices for this gas now are above market average prices and prices in the short-term markets.

'Block billing' would not produce a competitive, free market. Rather, this set of regulated-market distortions would result in a new form of market discrimination against Texas producers and consumers.

These dictated prices inevitably would produce new average prices below what a free market would produce. And, indeed, some out-of-state consumers would enjoy lower gas prices for a short while. But, the price cuts would come at the expense of gas producer income.

As gas producers see their income dwindle, they will be forced to cut operating costs to stay in business. Failure to generate capital for exploration would mean a cutback in drilling, thereby lessening available supplies of natural gas, with the inevitable upward pressure on prices and more dependency on imports.

But, what does this proposal mean to Texas, source of one-third of U.S. natural gas production? Comptroller Bob Bullock estimates that "block billing"-along with other FERC rules already adopted-would cost over \$2.5-billion in income annually to Texas' 6,000 gas producers, with a related annual loss of as much as \$200million in state severance taxes; reduce drilling starts by three-percent a year, and generally further aggravate problems of an ailing industry which is vital not only to this state's economy but to the security of our nation.

State Comptroller Sends

\$56.9 Million In Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$56.9 million in local sales tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Houston's check for \$9.2 million was the largest, bringing total payments this year to \$150.3 million, up 3 percent over last year. Dallas' payment was \$7.7 million for a 1985 total of \$112.4 million, a 13 percent increase.

San Antonio received \$3.5 million, pushing 1985 payments to \$56.2 million, up 13 percent over last year. Austin's check for \$2.6 million brought total payments this year to \$44 million, an 18 percent increase.

Fort Worth's payment was \$2.3 million, bringing this year's total to \$34.1 million, up 11 percent. El Paso's December check for \$1.4 million pushed total payments to \$21 million, 15 percent over 1984 payments. Bullock also sent checks totaling \$26.4 million to the state's five Metropolitan Authorities. Transit Houston's MTA received \$10.6 million for total payments of \$173.1 million in 1985. Dallas' DART check was for \$10.5 million, bringing 1985 payments to \$155.1 million. Austin's Capital
