Ron Scheuren Says:

Cisco's Attitude Is 'More Positive'

Ron Scheuren, who ended nearly seven months as manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce on Friday, told The Press that "I believe our community has a more positive attitude than I found last Jan. 1st. Mr. Scheuren resigned to accept a position with a

Belton radio station that serves the Temple-Killeen market region. He is due to begin work there Monday.

"I very sincerely appreciate the work of community leaders and committee members during my time as manager of the Chamber of Commerce,"

Mr. Scheuren said. "I consider the past six months a rewarding experience, and I will always appreciate the cooperation of our people in making my stay interesting."

Mr. Scheuren spent Friday cleaning out his desk. He met with two committee

chairpersons.

Mrs. Helen Orr, chairman of the civic club planning committee, met with the CofC manager to discuss plans for the groups project of the year - removing and repainting and replanting the planter boxes over town. The committee hopes to

Pat Starr and Elizabeth Ann Perry Peacock were arrested soon after the indictments were returned.

Two men, Charles LeFlore and Thomas LeFlore, were convicted on murder charges in the case and are serving sentences of 65 years and 50 years, respectively. The five new indictments resulted from the appointment of Attorney Bill Hart as a special prosecutor and the special grand jury.

Mrs. Debra Garcia of Cisco was kidnapped and murdered in November, 1981.

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
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Eastland Gymnasts Meet Mary Retton

With baseball strikes, boycott's in our olympics and other shows of discontent, so now it appears that some of these actions are carrying over into the sport of fishing.

The Bass Anglers Sportman Society has run into a few snags recently concerning the official sponsorship of its tournaments.

Due to an agreement between Walt Disney World and Mercury Outboards, the \$845,000 megabucks tournament scheduled for October, has been cancelled. This event would have pitted the top 10 anglers from a field of 225 at the lakes of Florida's Disney World. The Anglers would have been fishing out of identical boats rigged with Evinrude outboards. But the agreement between Disney and Mercury prevented the use of Evinrude motors thus causing the cancellation.

But a problem in the making of an even larger impact is the upcoming Arkansas River Bass Classic. A recent edict from Mr. Ray Scott, president of the bass society, that anglers who endorse products other than those manufactured by the official sponsors will not be allowed to wear insignias, patches or other trademarks of the competition on their hats or clothing during the upcoming classic.

Many of the top tournament pros, who are currently in Las Vegas on Lake Mead, held a meeting this week to discuss how they will react to this brash statement. Early, it looks like many anglers such as Jimmy Houston, Paul Elias, Larry Nixon, Rich Clunn may refuse to participate. Touring pros are expected to make some announcement at the upcoming American Fishing Tackle Manufacturers Association trade show in St. Louis in August.

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Summers here are usually hot and dry, and that means homeowners must give careful attention to watering their yards and gardens.

Let me suggest some tips on getting the most from irrigation water so as to keep plants and lawns healthy while keeping water costs down.

1. Practice slow, deep watering to allow roots to penetrate deeper so that plans become more stress-resistant.
2. Soaker hoses and drip irrigation systems work well on trees and shrubs. It's more efficient to water at night or early in the morning because evaporation is less. However, night-time watering can promote more disease problems.
3. Too much water can be as detrimental or even worse than not enough. The rate at which water is applied should be no more rapid than the rate at which the soil can absorb it. Never fertilize landscape plants when soil is dry. It's best to water the area one day, apply fertilizer the next day, and then water again. Fertilizer will do no good unless it is dissolved and moved down into the soil.
4. Shrubs and trees near foundations, under eaves or on southern and western exposures need frequent watering because they often get less benefit from rainfall and have to deal with heat reflected from walls.
5. Plants on mounds or slopes suffer from drought stress more easily than those on level areas, so these require more frequent watering.
6. Use an organic mulch of pine bark, chopped straw, hay or similar material to reduce irrigation needs.
7. Treat water as a valuable resource. Use it to water plants when needed

Spotlights and Sidelights

It's wet blanket time. However, this particular blanket is not likely to even get wet, and this is the problem.

"Water Is Topic at Special Called City Commissioners' Meeting."

That was the headline for the Eastland Telegram for July 14. It brought to mind O'Brien's recent query of what is the present status of the proposed GM Saturn plant.

As I would like to see the Saturn plant located here despite the attendant upheaval in housing, schools and life-styles, I am curious about Saturn's current status, too.

When I advocated location of the plant here, I acknowledged special efforts would be needed to provide enough water, but I believed such efforts would suffice.

After reading the report of the commissioners' meeting, I think Eastland can kiss hopes of the Saturn plant goodbye.

Why spend any kind of time and energy—not top mention money—on a campaign for big business and/or industry if the water supply is inadequate...and

close to inadequate for those already using the system?

There's a business axiom which always holds true as far as I know: "To make money, one spends money."

There is another adage that applies here. It is more elegantly expressed in the Bible, but do you understand what it means to say, "There as has, gits?"

If Eastland doesn't have enough water to function without domestic problems, it jolly well doesn't have enough to maintain any heavy industry so it's not likely to "git" any to maintain.

It is all very well to promise new industries that we will have such and so if locations here. "We do have..." is a much firmer foundation.

Eastland has so many advantages to offer prospective businesses that it seems short-sighted not to push them to the fullest extent.

Without a superb water supply, forget it. No field representative is going to feel kindly toward a place that hasn't done it's homework on as basic a need as water.

Before Eastland goes a-wooing a big business, some money—all right, lots

of money—needs to be spent.

There's no need to begin fretting about where the money is coming from until we decide if we want to spend it.

There are any number of people in Eastland who do not want the changes something like the Saturn plant would bring. They are taxpayers, too, and votes count.

Change is a fact of life. Wanted or unwanted, changes come about. My own idea is to maintain local control of local changes as far as possible, but regardless of whether any new business of industry comes to Eastland, we need an unthreatened source of water.

Bond issues don't get passed unless taxpayers vote "Yea" instead of "Nay."

It might be a good idea to be sure the majority vote is in favor of major changes, but don't go spouting off that this is a democracy. It isn't. The United States is a republic.

If we don't have enough water to supply our present needs, how can we advocate adding to those needs before we take steps to meet them?

Good Marks Go To Emergency Veterans Job Training Program

A report evaluating the Emergency Veterans' Job Training Act has given good marks to the year-long employment and training program.

The evaluation, conducted for the Veterans Administration by Centaur Associates, Inc. of Washington, D.C. said employers were generally favorable to their assessments of the program.

The emergency job training program was enacted by Congress in August 1983 to provide stable and permanent employment for Korean conflict and Vietnam era veterans who have been unemployed for long periods of time. Under the program, the government reimburses an employer for training costs in an amount not to exceed 50 percent of a veteran's starting wage, up to \$10,000.

More than 27,000 veterans have taken part in the program according to the report. It shows that nearly two-thirds of the participating veterans have been trained in structural work occupations, machine trades, professional, technical and managerial positions. Clerical sales and service occupations represented additional areas in which a significant amount of training was provided.

Those who completed the program had an average hourly wage of \$6.77 and

earned an average \$33 per week more than persons who had applied for the program but had not participated. According to the report, the earnings difference is due primarily to the fact that employed participants typically worked about five hours per week more than nonparticipants.

The report notes the following significant findings:

Employers tended to select the most employable among the veterans certified for program participation.

The completion rate for veterans in the program is estimated to be 44 percent.

The direct cost of training per participant is estimated to be \$3,000. The report also pointed out that the program has been well managed by the VA and the Labor Department which have joint responsibility in implementing the law. The report notes that start-up of the program was a sizable accomplishment given the short time that agency personnel had to plan and carry out the activities.

Waco VA Regional Office Director, Stephen L. Lemons, reports that in Texas 17,246 veterans and 3,165 employers have been approved under the JOBS program. This has resulted in job placements for 2,057 veterans statewide. The deadline for initiating par-

ticipation and starting a job training program is September 1, 1985. Interested employers should contact their local office of the Texas Employment Commission.

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CJC Accepting Applications For LVN Program At Cisco

Cisco Junior College is now accepting applications for the September 1985 Licensed Vocational Nursing program at Cisco.

In accord with certification requirements, applicants must make application in advance and pass a pre-entrance physical and

examination. The twelve month program will hold classes in Cisco with clinical work in the E.L. Graham Hospital in

Cisco and the Eastland Memorial Hospital in Eastland on a rotating basis.

Satisfactory completion of the program entitles the student to a certificate from the college, and qualifies him/her to take the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiner's examination.

A prospective student must be at least 17 years of age and must be in good physical and mental health. Students must be high school graduates or have successfully taken the GED examination establishing high school equivalency. The

GED examination is given on the CJC main campus in Cisco.

Employment opportunities for a Licensed Vocational Nurse are very good, the demand for LVN's far surpasses the supply.

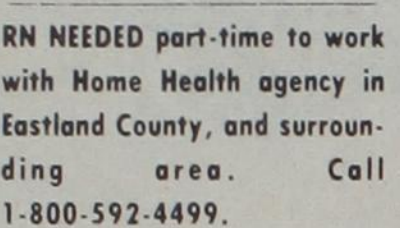

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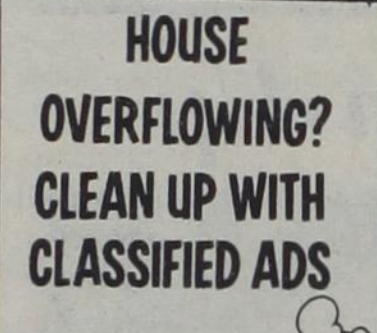

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Quality Of Cisco Water Meets Requirements Of State

The quality of Cisco water is in very high and it meets all requirements of state testing agencies for an official approved rating, City Manager Mike Moore told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk last Wednesday noon at their weekly luncheon.

The excellent water quality has resulted from the building of a new treatment plant at Lake Cisco, the installation of new main lines and cleaning and repair work for storage facilities, Mr. Moore said.

New six and eight inch main lines over town have been installed in recent

weeks and are currently being sterilized and tested before being placed in service during the coming week, the city manager said. The water tower in south Cisco has been completely cleaned and painted, inside and outside, and is back in service.

Painting work on the water tower was delayed several weeks when the contractor ran out of paint and was unable to match the colors being used. This problem has been solved, Mr. Moore said, and the work is due to be finished soon.

The tower will be equipped with 2500-watt lights and the town's name will be visible to motorists on I-20 day and night, Mr. Moore said. The ladder used to climb the tower will be equipped with a gate to prevent unauthorized personnel from climbing it, he added.

The water treatment plant, which was completed some eight months ago, has been operating with only a few minor "in warranty"

changes in equipment, Mr. Moore said.

Although there are considerable new water lines over the city, assuring adequate pressure throughout the system, the city still has a good many older water mains and feeder lines.

A total of 42 new water cutoff valves have been placed on main water circuits over town to enable the water department to cut off only a small area when there is a water line break, Mr. Moore said. These valves are ready to go into service very soon, he added.

Mr. Moore told Lions that the city street department has started a summer paving program that will continue into November, weather permitting. Avenue L, from 8th Street to I-20, was the first project. Paving equipment has now moved to the northwest part of town where a number of streets will be seal coated and paved.

Next, the department will

move to East Cisco for considerable work. Improvements for streets in the Thrift Mart area are also slated for seal coating this summer, the city manager said.

The work is being financed largely by money obtained by the city in oil and gas royalties, Mr. Moore reported. Priority on the paving work has been determined by the amount of traffic and public need of streets, he said.

The planned new water

sewage treatment facility in progressing on scheduled, Mr. Moore reported (see story elsewhere).

The city manager reported that work was going forward on preparation of the 1985-86 city budget as the new fiscal year will begin Oct. 1. He said the city has enjoyed a 75 per cent success rate in efforts to have delapidated buildings torn down and moved. The police department, he added, is working on having junked cars removed from city streets

and vacant lots.

Mr. Moore said work needs to be done to cut weeds and grass on vacant lots over town. Several letters go out each week to property owners to urge their cooperation, he added. If the

city cleans up property, a bill goes to the owner.

Lion Earl Ray was program chairman and introduced Mr. Moore.

Edward Kirk of Abilene,

cousin of Lion Truman Kirk, was a guest at the luncheon.

President Jerry McBeth reported that the club's earnings from sponsoring the July 4th carnival will be about \$1,600.

Grant Approved For Waste Water

A federal grant covering 55 per cent of the cost of a new Cisco Waste Water Disposal System has been given tentative approval by the Texas Department of Water Resources, according to a report by City Manager Mike Moore.

The grant, which is expected to amount to between \$300,000 and \$350,000 will come from Environmental Protection Agency funds left over from the financing of projects last year.

Word of the availability of left-over money for the Cisco project was received recently. Plans for the local project were then filed with the water resources agency. The plans were returned with suggestions for minor changes to meet EPA standards for final approval expected soon.

Engineers Jacob and Martin of Abilene, working with the city on the project for several years, made the suggested EPA changes and the plans are now in Austin for action, the city manager said.

The city has land purchased from Frank Wilcox north of town for the facultative Legume/Stabilization Pond treatment plant. Three ponds covering some 25

acres of ground will be used for natural treatment (no chemicals).

Under the new plan, the present sewage plant will become a pump station to forward residue to the No. 1 pond of the new plant. The fluid will move progressively into the No. 2 and finally the No. 3 pond before being discharged into a creek as potable water.

Mr. Martin hopes to have the "go-ahead" from Austin by the end of July in order for bids to be called for next month. The city's time table provides for actual construction work to begin by Jan. 1, 1986.

Engineers have estimated that the total cost of the project, including engineering, legal and right-of-way, at \$903,700. Actual cost of the plant has been placed at

\$635,000 and ERA funding for this sum in the amount of 55 per cent is expected, Mr. Moore said.

Local voters approved a \$875,000 bond issue to finance the waste water facility. Of this sum, the amount of \$475,000 would be revenue bonds. The city has issued \$100,000 in warrants sold to the First National Bank against the bond issue to finance the land purchase and legal and engineering work, Mr. Moore reported.

The Farm Home Administration has agreed to purchase the bonds at seven and one-fourth per cent interest, and Mr. Moore hopes that with the grant and a "good" project bid the city will be able to finance the new plant with the use of revenue bonds and the grant money.

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


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Kauai Might Be the Most Hawaiian of the Islands

island call, Kauai, our farthest western point, the early morning coming into the little harbor was especially nice.

The early-riser usually had first coffee on the deck and when early dockings were scheduled, it was a treat to watch the bright,

young deckhands skillfully tossing land lines to shore, and scurrying around with giant lines, making fast the ship at the wharves. We learned that most live in Honolulu and consider the shipboard work ideal. Our cabin steward did so much time on the ship.

Touching Kauai, we are looking forward to a break from the sea since we'll be here two days - it was a pretty choppy cruise last night.

Capt. Wu's quote for the day is appropriate anywhere: "We are the travelers in the wilderness of this world; and the best we can find in our travels, is a friend."

Kauai is known as the "Garden Isle" of the Hawaiian Islands. It is also the most primitive, much unaccessible except by helicopter.

We took the shuttle into Nawiliwili and beyond to the old Coconut Grove Plantation, which has been transformed into a unique shopping village, hotel and resort area. We also photographed the coastline including the beautiful beaches.

That evening we did the very traditional luau bit, and like most first-timers found it "some good, some bad" - and probably wouldn't do that part again. We were bused from the ship to the same Plantation area where the typical outdoor Hawaiian meal was served under a protective covering - a la tabernacle, on the grounds of the major hotel.

True to touch every bit of lore, you're greeted with a shell necklace, a kiss and the syrupy-sweet mai-tai, and seated in rows facing a stage area. After everyone is seated, you're invited to set outside and witness the opening of the baked pig pit, where an old timer demonstrated the ceremonial cooking of the pig under tea leaves, and he showed that they also included green bananas and taro. He complained that nowadays the health department required them to use stainless steel and wouldn't let him feed the tourists on the beaches like he used to. I think I'd go for the stainless.

buffet tables, we found a wild assortment: roast pork (presumably from the nearby pit), beef teriyaki for the non-porkers, fish, the bananas (fair), taro (Not so fair), and of course the infamous Hawaiian Poi sauce (not fair at all - and with no redeeming quality that we could ascertain).

Would you believe a dessert of coconut pudding, done up in a gelatin format? It was all and all a good meal, with friends.

Afterwards there was the traditional Hawaiian floor show with native singers, native dancers (yes, the

hulled) and native drummers. The lead singer was extremely good and the dancers, we guessed, were probably from his wife's dancing school.

To many visitors, Kauai is the only true Hawaii of today. Certainly as the view the majestic cliffs towering waterfalls, you begin to experience the mystery of the islands. It's almost as if the benevolent Kings and Menehune (Hawaii's Legendary Elves) are watching you. Here, where the Wailua River flows, are vast tropical jungles and lush greenery.

Our "floating island" observation gave us a view of the contrasts of Hawaii's natural beauty, from the jag-

ged lava rocks and barren volcanoes to the big island to the lush tropical foliage of Kauai's rain forests.

There are few truly native Hawaiians today, but as a whole the people are cordial, friendly and have a "hang loose" attitude, and when they tell you "We'll be there in ten minutes and you know full well it will take an hour, they'll add "Of Course, that's Hawaiian time."

In Honolulu, we'd learned that Robert Louis Stevenson had lived there and loved it, and on Kauai we learned that Mark Twain has characterized Hawaii as "The loveliest fleet of islands that lies anchored in any ocean." (Next: Bali Hai)

County Judge Bailey Attends Aging Meeting

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey, Chairman of the Citizens Advisory Council of the Texas Department on Aging, attended a meeting of this group at the Wyndham Southpark Hotel in Austin July 8, 9, and 10.

A number of organizations

interested in aging were at the meet, Judge Bailey reports.

Several items under discussion, beginning with a planning session for the "Silver Haired" Legislature. There were also reports and discussions on topics related to the health of senior Tex-

These will be finalized on July 29.

Gov. Mark White signed a law on April 11, which provides for this Legislature - an elected, bi-partisan body of citizens over 60 years old who will meet in the state Capitol biennially to propose, draft and vote on legislation the body has selected.

Election for the "Silver Haired" Legislature is expected to be in May or June of 1986. Eighty four representatives will be elected around the state, and 28 senators.

On Tuesday, July 9, a Conference Task Force was set up to take testimony and comments on the rules of the "Silver Haired" Legislature.

On the evening of July 10, a Banquet and Program was held to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the Older Americans Act, this was enacted in July, 1965 during the term of President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The Opening remarks were by Bob Gibbons, Chairman of the Texas Board on Aging. Introductions of a number of dignitaries and Closing Remarks were by Judge Scott Bailey.

The Judge, as he closed his talk, stated that whenever an Anniversary is celebrated there should also be a rededication. He called upon the crowd of state leaders to pull together and reaffirm the principals of the Older Americans Act. This, he said, was to see that each elderly person in the state had basic opportunities and needed services.

--WATER RIGHT--

When the weather turns dry, don't just turn on your lawn sprinkler and then gripe about your high water bill.

By watering, fertilizing and mowing your lawn properly, you can reduce your water

bill as much as 40 percent, says a turfgrass specialist.

"Conservation by the homeowner provides the only solution to high water bills and excessive water demands during our hot and usually dry Texas summers," says Dr. Richard Dubble with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In small cities where industrial demand for water is low, lawn watering may account for as much as half of all the water used during summer months. Even in larger cities, lawns get 30 to 40 percent of all the water supplied by municipalities.

"Most Texas lawns use about 2 inches of water per week during the summer and most of this usually comes from irrigation," Dubble says. "However, as little as 1 inch of water per week can keep lawns alive and green."

Exactly what can a homeowner do to reduce his summer water bill?

"First, water your lawn only when grass starts to show signs of drought stress," explains Dubble. "Look for discoloration and wilting. If leaves roll up in the late afternoon and footprints remain after walking across the lawn, then water within 24 hours."

"Once you've decided that your lawn needs watering, do it right," he emphasizes. "Most homeowners don't water their lawns properly. They either water too often, causing grass to develop shallow roots and making it a prime target for insects, diseases, and temperature extremes, or they water too infrequently and apply too much water at one time, resulting in a lot of runoff."

"When watering, soak the

soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches," recommends the specialist. In heavy clay soils, watering for 15- to 20-minute periods may be necessary to prevent excessive runoff.

"Cutting back on lawn fertilization can also reduce watering," says Dubble. Applying fertilizer in the spring and fall will generally keep your lawn healthy. Fertilizing during the summer, especially when nitrogen fertilizer, will green up your lawn, but it will also increase grass growth and water use.

"Mowing less often and cutting your grass at taller heights also will help keep your lawn in better shape during hot, dry weather," adds Dubble. "St. Augustinegrass lawns do well when mowed at a 3-inch height, and bermudagrass lawns can be cut at a 2-inch height."

GRAMMAR, AS WROTE
 "I ain't never made but one mistake in grammar, and I seen it as soon as I done it then."
 The forgetting--double negative, spelling, verb tense--is a long-time example of what people are up against in learning to speak the English language.
 It's hard enough to learn to read it, but when it comes to spelling--oh, my sainted aunt! (A nice old gal, but I question sainthood.)
 We do have rules for grammar and spelling. We have lots of them. If you don't like one, try another.
 Many of our go back to the basics of Latin, courtesy of

William and Mary of Normandy. They brought the French language to Great Britain in 1066. French was the official court language, and if the local yokels didn't come up to scratch, they deserved what they got--more often, what they didn't get.
 French was superimposed--and there's a question: Should "imposed" be used rather than "superimposed?" My usual resolution for such a problem is to use another word,

so I will say that French was grated to (on?) the local Celtic sounds which in turn came as a heritage from the late Angles, Saxons and Jutes.
 Those three languages were Teutonic (Germanic), and anything more dissimilar to French probably would be Eskimo.
 Our English kin find fault with us for our use and misuse of the language structurally and orally. Also, we have added liberal sprinklings of Spanish, and

American Indian terms have crept into them their vocabularies to stay.
 Spanish also goes back to Latin roots as does the French we took unto our wordy selves. We not only use terms from other languages, we invent what we feel fits and refashion words to please us. The English purists need to look to their own word origins before casting aspersions on our language!
 Agreed, a changing language is a growing one, but "growing" does not necessarily mean "improving."
 For example: We start our youngsters learning "long"

vowels and "short" vowels when they learn to read. They have to learn other sounds for those vowels, too--look at the pronunciation guides in your dictionaries. Confusing?
 Yes, you have to learn sounds in other languages, too. There are five vowel sounds (maybe more--I've forgotten) in Spanish. You learn 'em and you use 'em; you use 'em the same way every time you see them.
 There's no combination of "au" to make "o" or using an "e" at the end of a three-letter word to make the short vowel between the two consonants long...so "mat" because "mate" and "tar" turns into "tare"...which sounds like "tear" which has

two meanings and two pronunciations for the same spelling...as do "read" and "read."
 Oh, (dear, deer)! (There, their, they're) so many words in our language already, why couldn't we have all different sounds for all the different meanings? At this late date, that seems a (vain, vane, vein) hope.
 So.
 Ain't we got fun!

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Drilling Bits

An unsuccessful developmental well has been written off as a dry hole in the Eastland Regular Field, one mile southwest of Rising Star. The well probed to a dry bottom at 1,145 feet total depth. Southern Oilfield Production Co. was the operator. The well had been designated as the No. 1 John J. Cooper.

Operating out of Odessa, J. Kent Kellum Oil & Gas has staked location for the No. 1 Bryson Heirs, a developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field, two miles north of Pioneer. With projected total depth of 3,000 feet, the venture is in a seven-acre lease in Eastland County's George Click Survey, A-52.

Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has revealed plans to drill the No. 1 Casey, a 3,800-ft. developmental well four miles northeast of Eastland in the Eastland Regular Field. The operation will be in a 40-acre lease in the HT&B Survey, Sec. 1, Blk. 1.

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
