Mrs. Gomer Williams Claimed By Death

The old pioneer citizenship of Cisco is fast passing on. Mrs. Gomer Williams, who with her husband were among the first settlers of this city, died last Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, in a hospital in Fort Worth, where she had been under treatment. She was 75 years of age.

The body was brought here for burial, and services were conducted at the First Presbyterian church Monday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, by the pastor, Rev. B. C. Boney.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams made their home in Cisco for many years, during a great part of which time Mr. Williams was postmaster here. He was claimed by death here nearly a year ago.

Deceased is survived by two sons, Stuart L. Williams, of Pasadena, California, and John D. Williams of Oklahoma City. Two sisters, Mrs. J. L. Cunningham of Fort Worth and Mrs. R. M. Hurt of Dallas, and two brothers, D. T. Evans of Fort Worth and J. A. T. Evans of Odessa, also survive.

Let's Get Down to Business

It looks very much like our little neighboring town of Rising Star is going to beat us to relief from the awful gas burden. However, they said nothing about relief in regard to water and light bills.

And as we hear that some high powered crude oil engine salesmen have been working on our city commissioners, it sounds like maybe we might get some relief on the water and the street lighting system anyway.

Which of course listens good to the citizens of Cisco.

At the same time we have been informed by parties that seem to know what they are talking about that the crude oil engine is not what Cisco wants or needs. The crude oil engine will only give relief in regard to water and street lights, and we need relief from our high gas rates as well.

The crude oil engine will have to be continually "wet-nursed" along, by hauling fuel to it continually. When you get gas piped to a natural gas engine your worries are over.

Natural gas can be bought not a great ways from the lake at 4 and 5 cents per thousand.

Twelve feet of natural gas will develop one horse power hour, or 1,200 feet for 100 horse power hours, which will pull all of Cisco's load. Do a little figuring. At 5 cents per thousand, using 1,200 feet per hour equals 6 cents per hour for your 100 horse power engine. Six times 24 is \$1.44 per day for fuel. Now say it will cost 56 cents per day for oil to lubricate this engine. This gives you more power for \$2.00 per day than you are getting from the utility company for \$56.66 per day. We get this \$56.66 from a commissioner who stated that the utility bill went to \$1,700 per month, and \$1,700 divided by 30 gives you \$56.66 per day average.

Now let us say from 1,300 water taps in this town that the city

collects \$3,000 water rent, which is a small estimate, plus \$1,700 utility bill would equal \$4,700. That amount less \$2 per day, or \$60 per month would leave \$4,640 saved. Some saving!

Now these figures bring us back to this thought. What went with that "Bunch of Business Men" that was scoring Mr. Burnett about the suggested cutting of the water bill in half? Certainly a one-eyed mule could see that no "group of business men" ever wrote that article, and if they had it isn't impossible that Mr. Burnett might be able to present a suggestion or two that the whole group hadn't thought about.

Now, after getting this natural gas to the lake to supply the power engines it would only take a little more 2-inch gas line to bring this cheap gas on into town.

Then the city authorities can bargain with the utility company to distribute this gas; if the utility company doesn't want the business that way, we would suggest writing to the mayor of Amarillo who can probably give the address of a company that will build a distributing system and distribute our gas at small cost.

These figures are accurate from the engine and horse power standpoint, and the engine builders will back them up. The receipts for the water and power are approximate.

We are proud of our city officials, and it is gratifying to know that they are busy trying to work out something for the good of Cisco. We heard of a preacher one time who was unwilling for Bob Ingersoll to figure out his future. We believe that the city commissioners of Cisco will be unwilling for the utility company to figure out Cisco's future. Stay in there and pitch, city dads! Cisco citizenship is behind you!

Another U. S. Highway Designated for Cisco

The American Association of Highway Officials, which makes the federal designation of highways, in a meeting at Chicago Tuesday designated the Canada-to-Gulf highway. That portion of Highway 23 which extends from Vernon through Cisco and Rising Star will be a part of this highway. This makes the second U. S. highway for Cisco, the other being the east and west highway known as the Bankhead.

The action of the highway officials Tuesday makes the newly designated route subject to the federal aid provisions, which assures that work will be steadily pushed on the improvement of this road, making it and keeping it an excellent thorough fare.

Announcement was also given out this week by the Texas Highway Commission that at their next meeting which is to be held soon contract will be let for the pavement of Highway 23 from Cisco to the Callahan county line. The county has finished their part of the agreement in making ready this stretch of road for the topping. This is more good news for Cisco, as it will no doubt furnish labor for a number of men while the work is in progress, and when completed will give an excellent highway from our city north by way of Lake Cisco. It will add to the attraction of that wonderful outing spot which is becoming more popular with visitors from far and near.

W. E. McWhorter died suddenly at his home here Tuesday morning, heart trouble being given as the cause. He had been feeling badly since the day before, but did not think it serious. Early Tuesday morning he became suddenly worse, and death came before a physician could reach him and do anything for him.

Mr. McWhorter had made his home in Cisco for many years, having been engaged in the grocery business at 710 West 10th street for quite a long while. He was 64 years of age. Smart, pastor of the East Side Baptist church conducting. Interment was in Oakwood cemetery.

Deceased is survived by his widow and five children: Mrs. J. B. Brooks and Miss Bobbie Grace McWhorter of Cisco; Mrs. Sam Kennedy of Abilene; Mrs. C. P. Marlow of Peacock; John McWhorter, editor of the Edinburgh Review, of Edinburgh, Texas; and Ray McWhorter of Edinburgh.

A REAL GRAIN CROP

But after all in this respect the farmer is much better off than he was a year ago when his efforts brought disappointment because of the drought. This year he is at least assured of plenty of feed for his stock. And his

wheat can be made into flour with which to feed his family, and that's more than some had last year. And what helps the farmer helps everyone else. Remember that.

THE HEIGHT OF THE RIDICULOUS

We make no claim to being very smart, but what strikes us as the "extension of the limit" in ridiculous absurdity is for a city situated as Cisco is, sitting in the middle of an unlimited gas field, passing out her hard earned money for big gas bills to have it served to them ready for use. Now really, folks, can you imagine anything more foolish than for the citizens of this town to pay out all they can rake and scrape for gas and power bills, a big portion of which is pure profit which goes to fatten the coffers of some big utility corporation, when the same service could easily be had for a small fractional part of the present cost—and the people keep a big slice of those profits in their pocket. You don't think it can be done? Well some other places have done it, and are doing it, which are not so favorably situated as is Cisco. We'll pause for a few minutes while that "soaks in."

Mule Sense

Muleshoe Journal: A court in Alabama has been called upon to decide if a mule kick is an accident.

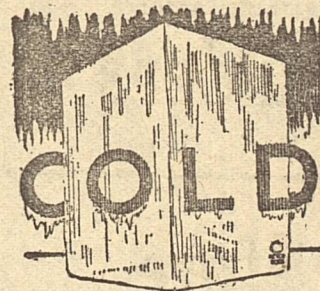
