CHS Homecoming Preparing For Albany Friday

Cisco High School Homecoming activities were underway here this week in preparation for the bonfire and pep rally scheduled at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, October 10, at the Chesley Field parking lot.

A downtown pep rally will be held Friday, October 11,

at 4 p.m. on East 7th Street between Sears and Olney Savings, followed by the homecoming football game between the Cisco High School Lobo varsity and the Albany Lions, at 7:30 p.m. in Chesley Field.

Homecoming Queen will be introduced at half-time of

the football game. CHS students cast their ballots this week in the queen contest, but the winner's identity will not be revealed until the presentation ceremony, according to Principal Jim Puryear.

Seven high school girls have been nominated for the

Homecoming Queen and they are as follows: Frances Chamness, Mary Ann Jaramillo, Vickilea Morton, Robin Ritchie, Tami Roberts, Kay Scott, and Samty Sipe.

In the Friday night football game, the CHS Lobos will be hosting the Lions of Albany in a District 11-AA contest. Cisco and Albany are both 2-3 for the season and 1-1 in district play. Cisco Head Coach Doyle Walker said the game films show Albany to be a "pretty good team" this year. In their game last week against Coleman, Albany held the Bluecats to 19 points until the fourth quarter.

Coleman did not score in the second or third quarters. The final score was 34-to-6, in favor of Coleman.

Coach Walker said the game films show Albany to be pretty well-balanced. He said they "don't do anything fancy. They just line up and run right at you, making

three or four yards a run." Starting center for the Lobos, Dale Page, a junior, suffered a knee injury in last week's game against Ranger. Coach Walker said Page was to see a doctor early in the week, but there was a possibility he might be out for awhile.

Coach Walker stated that he was pleased with Cisco's defense in last week's game, which was won by Cisco 9-7, since they showed good improvement over their past games. He said both the offense and defense made some mistakes, but overall they showed an improvement.

In last week's game, the Cisco defense got a safety in the first quarter and the offense scored a touchdown in the third quarter. Ranger scored in the second quarter and led at half-time 7-to-2.

Cisco's Steve Abbott trapped Ranger quarterback Billy Grumbles in the end zone with 6:32 left in the first quarter to put the first points

on the scoreboard for either team. The safety gave the Lobos a 2-to-0 lead.

At the beginning of the second quarter, Ranger started a drive from their own 11-yard line. On the first play, QB Grumbles completed a pass to Rocky Masegee who carried it to Cisco's five-yard line before being tackled.

Three plays later, from the three-yard line, QB Grumbles hit Masegee again with a pass completion for the touchdown. The extra point kick by James Casey was good, giving Ranger a 7-to-2 half-time lead with 10:40 left in the first half.

In the second half of play, Cisco's Shelby Nixon recovered a Ranger fumble at the Bulldog's 27-yard line. Nine plays later, with the ball resting on Ranger's one-yard line, Cisco quarterback Shelby Nixon handed off to Kevin Kirk for the touchdown. The extra point kick by James Deadman

was good, giving Cisco back the lead with 7:28 left in the third quarter.

Ranger threatened to score again in the third quarter after they recovered a Cisco fumble at the Lobos 39-yard line. Four plays later, with the ball on Cisco's 19-yard line, Cisco's Brian Wagon intercepted a Bulldog pass to kill the drive.

Cisco had 109 yards rushing in the first half and 0 yards passing for a total of 109 yards. In the second half, they had 84 yards rushing and 14 yards passing for a total of 98 yards.

Ranger had 10 yards rushing and 110 yards passing for a first half total of 120 yards. In the second half, they had 44 yards rushing and 16 yards passing for a total of 60 yards.

Cisco's offense was led by Kevin Kirk with 20 carries for 103 yards. He was followed by Steve Abbott with 10 carries for 58 yards, Shelby Nixon with 14 carries for 32 yards, Brian Wagon with 1 carry for 0 yards, and Ronnie Scheuren with 1 carry for 0 yards.

The Ranger offense was led by Andy Marusak with 12 carries for 42 yards. Other rushers were Bubba Davlin, 4 carries for 12 yards; Ruben Gomez, 1 carry for 5 yards; Bill Ford, 5 carries for 1 yard; Mario Avila, 4 carries (-1) yards; and Billy Grumbles, 10 carries for (-5) yards.

In the quarterback battle, Cisco's Shelby Nixon completed 1 of 5 attempts for 14 yards, while Ranger's Billy Grumbles completed 6 of 17 attempts for 126 yards.

James Berry was Cisco's lone receiver with 1 reception for 14 yards. Rocky Masegee led the Bulldogs with 4 receptions for 110 yards. Other Bulldog receivers were Mario Avila, 1 reception for 6 yards, and

Dean Ishmael, 1 reception for 10 yards.

Cisco defensive standouts were Shelby Nixon, Roy Boykin, Brian Wagon, Trae Peacock, Steve Abbott, Bill White, Lonnie Pevey, Jeff Dennis, Bryan Nichols, and James Berry.

Standouts on the Ranger defense were Jackie Ishmael, Bubba Davlin, Jeff Graham, Andy Marusak, Darrell Lemaster, Rocky Masegee, and Sha King.

CJC Wranglers Win 33-To-14 Victory

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, who scored an impressive 33-to-14 victory over Henderson County Junior College's Cardinals in a conference game here last Saturday night, will have the coming weekend off and will utilize the extra time to prepare for an Oct. 19th game at Tyler.

Coach Rick Frazier reported that his Wranglers were off Monday but would go through tough work sessions Tuesday and Wednesday to review fundamentals. The big squad will be off Friday and Sunday for a well-earned rest after posting five wins in five starts. They will begin preparations in earnest for the Tyler JC game next Monday.

The Wrangler coaching staff will be in Corsicana Saturday night to see Tyler and Navarro County JC play. These two teams will be the next opponents for the Wranglers. Tyler ranks No. 8 in the nation.

The Cisco squad came through the Henderson game without injuries, the coach said.

"I can't say enough good things about our defense," Mr. Frazier said. "They held Henderson to less than 100 net yards on the ground and put up two goal line stands that would make any coaching staff proud."

The Wrangler offense moved the ball well, running up 252 yards on the ground and 146 in the air. Their opponents had 96 yards rushing and completed 19 of 51 passes for 261 yards.

Penalties continued to bother Cisco as they were flagged 14 times for 107 yards. Each team had four quarterback sacks. Top Wrangler defensive men included David West, defensive end; Mike Killian, linebacker; Tory Edwards, linebacker; John Buesing, linebacker; Eddie Washington, linebacker; Wayne Hutchinson and Clayton Patton, defensive backs.

David Smith, running back, was the big ground gainer. He carried the ball 16 times for 96 yards. James Dixon, running back, carried 12 times for 64 yards. QB Mark Pilling passed 17 times with three completions for 106 yards.

Henderson had 22 first downs, many of which came as the result of penalties against the Wranglers. Cisco kicked off to open the game and recovered a fumble

on the Henderson 33. On the first play, Pilling passed to End Robert Beauchamp for 33 yards and a touchdown. Late in the period, Wranglers punted and covered a fumble on the Henderson 30. When three plays failed, Raymon Hernandez kicked a field goal from the 35-yard line.

Early in the second quarter, CJC took a punt on their 15 and began a drive that saw Smith score from the five and Hernandez make an extra point.

Moments later, a Cisco pass was intercepted in mid-field and the Cardinals drove to the CJC two with QB Scott Williams driving over to score. David Krenik converted. The half-time score was Cisco 17, Henderson 7.

Early in the third period, Steve Royal took a pass and went 60 yards to Henderson's 20. Smith took the ball over in three tries. A pass for two points failed.

Late in the final period,

Cisco got the ball on Henderson's 39 when the line held for four downs. Smith circled for 11 yards, Randy Roe made seven and then 15 yards. Henderson drew a penalty to their 13. Smith drove into the line for seven yards and Pilling went over to score. Hernandez converted.

Living Fence Posts

From THE AMERICAN AGRICULTURIST, 1867

To make rail fences comparatively permanent, you must have self-supporting stakes, that is, stakes that will firmly support themselves, and also the weight of the fence and waters. To make a stake self-supporting, it must have roots to enable it to retain a firm hold of the earth. The willow, white, or yellow, is for this purpose about as near being "the right thing in the right place," as any tree we can find. It grows without trouble, and is a natural denizen of wet, marshy grounds; therefore it is well adapted for stakes through bottom lands. The stakes may be cut from three to ten feet in length, and from three inches to a foot in diameter. They may be set in holes made with a post auger, about two feet deep, firmly ramming the earth around them; or they may be pointed, and driven into the ground. In one season they will be well rooted, thrifty trees, well able to resist, and hold the fence against, the impetuosity of the rushing water.

The willow grows easily from cuttings, and when properly pruned, makes a beautiful tree. From its rapid growth it is rendered valuable as a shade tree for pasture lands. It grows almost as well on the hill top as in the valley, unless the former be very dry or rocky.

(Editor's Note: The following is a copy of a letter which was written to the Abilene Reporter-News following the Cisco-Ranger game football story printed in Saturday's edition of the Reporter-News. Cecil Deadman, who keeps statistics for all the Lobo varsity football games and makes them available to The Press for use in articles, gave us permission to reprint the letter in our newspaper.)

Dear Mr. Hart, have meant to write before about what appears to be a decided bias on behalf of the REPORTER-NEWS against the Cisco Football program. I was a newcomer to Cisco two years ago when the team made it to the State Quarter-finals and I saw then as I see now an attitude that maligns the program. The article by Steve Katz in this morning's edition is all I can handle. It is to a large degree inaccurate and without question biased. I do not know when or why the folks at the REPORTER-NEWS got down on Cisco but I feel it is terribly unfair for the same old attitude to keep coming through.

I'm not sure who provided the statistics for the Cisco-Ranger game but they were inadequate and inaccurate. I am enclosing a copy of the final stats taken on the side line. This has been my job for the past two seasons. I am also enclosing the game work sheets so that perhaps you can see why I am complaining.

In reading the article in this morning's edition the impression is that Cisco played a dirty football game. It is unfortunate that a writer would choose to draw this conclusion from an obviously emotional and distraught Ranger player who had just finished his poorest performance of the season. It is much easier to lay blame than to give credit. The fact is that Cisco had one of their finest defensive showings of the year.

If there was any "LA Raider" play the shoe was on the opposite foot. Ranger was flagged six times! Of those six only one was a procedure call. Three were clipping calls which ultimately resulted in Cisco trapping Grumbles for a Safety. They

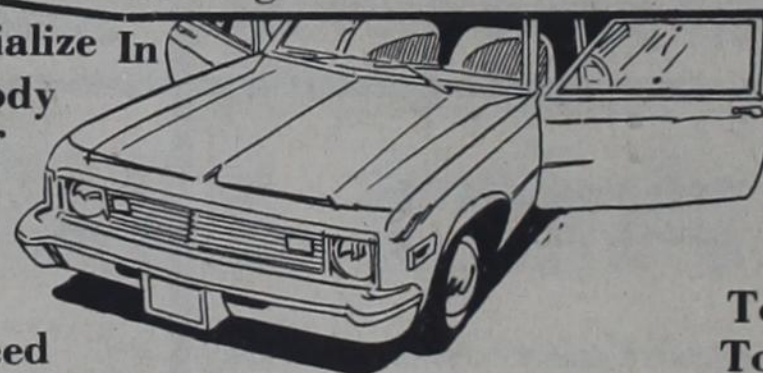
