writes, "I've never been rich in money, but have had a home and family. This will be my first year all alone. I don't hear from my church, I am completely alone except for my Lord. "I live on S.S. and my

prescriptions have been \$260 this month. My food stamps don't stretch for any extras. I'm diabetic and should have a balanced diet, including fruit, but there's never enough.

"I know you all have so many with children, etc., but if you might have enough left over for a small food basket and a head scarf, I'd be ever so grateful!

"A ceiling and roof fell in on the house where I lived and this is my first month in this apartment. My moving and utility expenses have been extra high this month (November) and I have not had money for groceries and to pay all of my bills. God bless you for all of the good

work that you do. "I am handicapped and the state sends in a lady three hours a day, 5 days a week. She comes from 8 a.m. until 11 a.m. to help me with my shower, grooming, errands, house work, cooking, and exercise (since I have had a number of strokes and I'm only 52 years of age).

"I would appreciate anything that you can do to help me."

HOUSE PLANTS

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Since we have moved our plants inside to protect them from the winters cold temperature I am devoting this column to house plants, including information on the three most popular ones. Generally speaking, most house plants are killed by too much T.L.C. (tender loving care). Usually house plants are killed by over watering and NOT under watering. Let's first look at the rubber plant. The correct name for the rubber plant is Ficus Elastica and it is a member of the Moraceae family. It is a native to Southeast Asia and the Maloy Archipelago regions where it grows to a height of 65 to 80 feet. It likes half-shaded and warm places. During the summer is requires a great deal of water and can be kept outside during this time. During the winter it likes to be 59 to 64 degrees.

Another of the more popular house plants is the Sansevieria or Snake Plant as it is better known. Its correct name is Sanservieria Trifasciate and is a member of the Liliaceae family. The Sanseviera is a native to East Africa and is a robust plant. It is a warm-loving plant and should be kept in a sunny or light shaded location. In no instance should it be kept too wet. Dry summer type air suits it very well. When kept in a cool place, it should be watered even less often than usual. As a pot plant, the Sansevieria may grow to a height of three to four feet.

Now lets look at the Split Leaf Philodendron. This plant is a native to Brazil and is one of the most popular of all house plants today. The Philodendron can have enormous leaves reaching two feet across and three feet long. It likes medium to hight light near a bright east or south window and prefers a temperature of 65 to 85 degrees. Allow the surface of the potting mixture to dry out between watering and fertlize every two months with a water soluable fertilizer. This plant likes humidity of 25 percent or more. This is a very

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CAPITOL UPDATE

As of this point you have probably heard all you want to hear about "no pass, no play" but, as is often the case with a politician, I feel compelled to make at least one more statement concerning that issue.

As I have observed the continuing and escalating controversy, with Mark White being the leader on one side and the Texas Coaches Association appearing to be the leader on the other side, it has come to my attention we may be asking the wrong question. The question has been up to this point, "Why can't the child play?" I think the question we had better ask is "Why can't the child pass?"

Recent data indicates that as many at 50% of Texas high school students are failing one or more courses. Now, I submit to you that if 50% of a doctor's patients died, someone would immediately begin to question the type of medicine that was being practiced. It looks like we may be blaming the victims, and penalizing them, when they may not be at fault.

I am starting with the assumption that our schools are intended to help all children become all they are capable of becoming. Some children will, of course, achieve brilliant academic success and others will not. Does that mean the children who do not achieve outstanding academic success are failures? I think it does not. I think it simply means some children are better at "book learning' "than others.

ty, are spending billions of dollars on our state educational system with increasingly dismal results. I suspect we will see some short term improvement in test scores but we will see about 10-20% of our students pushed out of the school system. That is not what we want. That is not what we need. That would be one of the most disastrous consequences that could conceivably come from our

educational reform.

The problem simply cannot be that we are not spending enough money, that we do not have a sufficent number of quality teachers, or that kids are any less intelligent than previous generations. The problem is that we are attempting to design a very beautiful system (and it is beautiful on paper) that applies to all of our 1,089 school districts from the "top down." By "top down" I mean the Legislature, the Texas Education Agency and the school district. The mistake we are making is not approaching the problem from the "bottom up."

What difference could it possibly make how any individual school district educates its children so long as it meets minimum standards of education? We are. so hung up on regimenting districts and the structure of the "pecking order" that we are completely overlooking

the intent of the school system. We have beautifully orchestrated lesson plans, mounds of pages of TEA guidelines, and truck loads of organizational directives but we are still turning out uneducated children.

I am not so naive as to think I can do it singlehandedly and possible it cannot be done at all, but if we want education to succeed and if we want educated children, we must go back to a system of allowing local control of education until such time as local control has demonstrated its inability to perform its function. It should not be a great shock to anyone that the decline of education of our children has run directly parallel to the increased level of interference with local control of education by the state and federal governments.

The solution is no great mystery, the mystery is how do we arrive at a solution, meaning "we, the people."



GIFTS...CONTINUED..

Among the gifts, Christmas or otherwide, from which you might get double pleasure, is an unusual strand for tree decoration.

Raid your jewelry box for beads you no longer wear but you haven't parted with because of sentiment or they're still "too good" for a garage sale item.

Cut the string and dump the beads from each necklace into is own clear PLASTIC CUP.

Thread a small needle. A beading needle would be best, but they are difficult to persuade to carry very heavy thread. This is going to be pretty enough to keep, so you may as well make sure it lasts by using sturdy thread. The invisible stuff that comes on bobbins will usually be small enough for the eye of the beading nee-

Working with no more than four feet of thread (doubles to a two-foot length), mix your beads to suit your fancy. The object is to have a tree decoration more meaningful and more durable than the fragile glass beads that used to come from Czechoslovakia but are now labeled "Made in Taiwan."

Join several of the two-foot lengths of strung beads to make your rope for your tree. Shorter lengths do not tangle as much.

Warning Note: This beadstringing project is not one to work on the presence of small children or other inquisitive pets.

Candles are always pretty gifts. If you're in a pinch for time, buy plain candles 21/2" in diameter (or larger) and decorate for Christmas with cutouts. Too, with the currend fad for stickers, a personalized candle is possible in short order.

A more time-taking, but more in the treasure class, is a combination of new and used material.

Clear glass tumblers of any size, old Christmas and/or birthday cards, re-

mains of once-burned candles, a glue that dries clear, sharp scissors, and a means of melting your wax. You're in buiness!

Trim your pictures from the cards to fit inside the squeaky clean tubler you are using. Brush a thin film of glue on the picture face, place your cut-out inside the glass facing out. Use two or three pictures if they are small-only one, if large. Set aside for the glue to dry while you melt your wax.

Wax NEVER should be melted over direct heat because of the danger of fire. If you don't have a double boiler, use a make-shift. If you are going to work with several colors, use clean cans so you ca thow away instead of clean up.

While your wax is melting pick a left-over candle no more than three-fourths inches in diameter for a glass of three to four inches in diameter. Trim the wick and was until about half an inch of wick shows. Put aside but be sure you can reach it easi-

When wax is melted, pour about half a cup of it into

your prepared tumbler and swirl it around inside until all of your pictures have a wax backing. You may use more wax as needed, but experiment to find out how long the hot wax remains liquid enough to spread-and to find out how fast you work. Build up the inside wax until you have at least a third of an

inch coating your cutouts.

Pour wax to half an inch depth in your tumbler. Place your trimmed candle in the center of your glass. You may need to do some more trimming as the top of the candle should not reach more than half the depth of the glass. When it is lighted, it shows your cutouts in a soft, flickering light that is very pretty, especially when the rest of the lights are off and you're toasting marshmallows-or yourself.

Do not fill the glass with more than half inch of waxno matter if it will make sure the candle stays where you put it. Candles must have air to burn, so give them a

Have a good time, but do remember: NO DIRECT HEAT.







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2 Out of 3 Customers Believe Service Is The Same

Results of a nationwide survey of telephone customers track with Southwestern Bell Telephone's efforts to study customer attitudes in Texas.

A Gallup Poll done for the United States Telephone Association (USTA) showed two out of three residential telephone customers in the United States believe the overall quality of their local telephone service has remained about the same since the breakup of the Bell System nearly two years ago. Eighteen percent say their service has improved, while 14 percent say it is worse.

These nationwide results illustrate overall customer confidence in areas similar to Southwestern Bell Telephone's research involving customer attitudes, according to Jim Adams, president of the phone company's Texas Division.

"Every quarter, 1,350 Texas customers are surveyed to determine their perceptions of Southwestern Bell Telephone," Adams said. "We ask questions about the company's management, about the quality of service we provide, and the value of that service to the customer."

Other key comparisons of the Gallup Poll and Southwestern Bell Telephone's customer research show:

-Two thirds or more of all telephone customers say phone service compares favorably in value with other necessities, such as electricity, food and home heating fuel. Just under half think thir monthly bill for local telephone service is inexpensive or about right. Meanwhile, eight out of 10 Southwestern Bell Telephone customers say they get their money's worth from local telephone service.

-- Seven out of 10 respondents in the national survey believe that telephone company employees really care about helping their customers; three out of five say their local telephone company is well managed. Southwestern Bell's survey shows seven out of 10 customers say helpfulness of company employees is excellent and that the company's management is good.

"We're pleased that results of the Gallup-USTA survey reflect, on a national level, what we've known for some time in Texas—that customer attitudes and service are much better than some headlines and 'guesswork' assessments have indicated," Adams said. "Our measurements show that customer perceptions of service are now higher than they were before divestiture."

Last year Southwestern Bell launched an informational program called Tele-Help to help customers better understand the changes in the telecommunications business. "So far, we've given away some 10 million Tele-Help brochures,"

Adams said. "Our research indicates that customers participating in the Tele-Help program feel they have a much better understanding of how industry changes af-

fect their service."

Southwestern Bell also helps support the Tele-Consumer Hotline-a toll free information service developed by the Consumer Federation of America and the Telecommunications Research and Action Center. Adams said the hotline has received about 4,400 calls from Southwestern Bell customers since March of this year.

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

Senate passed its version of the tax bill 22-9 after rejecting six separate attempts to insert a corporation profits levy by narrow (usually 16-15) margins and six other amendments. Only amendment of substance attached in floor debate was a halfcent-a-gallon increas in diesel fuel levy to make it the same as the gasoline tax.

Here is what the bill (HB 730) now calls for and its estimated biennial veild: *Increase sales tax rate from 3.25 to four per cent, \$288.5 million.
