Huey Long's Seven Point Platform For Poverty Reduction

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A statement urging every community in the land to form an organization to support a seven point platform looking to redistribution of wealth has been placed in the Congressional record by Senator Long (D-La.)

Headed "Carry out the command of the Lord," the statement proposed formation of "share our wealth" societies with the motto "every man a king," and to work for the following:

1. Limit poverty by providing that every deserving family shall share in the wealth of America and possess not less than \$5,000 free of debt.
2. Limit fortunes to a few million dollars such as will allow the balance of the people to share in the wealth and profits of the land.
3. Old age pensions of \$30 a month for persons over 60 who earn under \$1,000 a year and who possess under \$10,000 in cash and property.
4. Balance agricultural production with what can be sold and consumed "according to the laws of God which never have failed."
5. Care for vets of all wars.
6. Limit work hours to prevent over production and give workers a share in recreations, conveniences and luxuries of life.
7. Taxation to run the government, to be supported first by reducing big fortunes from the top; providing employment in public works whenever the agricultural surplus is such as to render unnecessary in whole or in part any particular crop.

Principles On Which The Labor Union and Workers League Rest

(The following preamble of the Labor Union constitution is reproduced in this issue as there were many calls for the Citizen last week after the edition had been exhausted.—Editor.)

As there have been many erroneous reports circulated as to the aims and purposes of the Cisco Labor Union and Workers Cooperative League, the Citizen has been requested to publish the preambles to the constitution and by-laws of the organization, which constitution is in conformity to the principles set out in these preambles. The union is simply a body of workers, whose members are banded together for the purpose of bettering the condition of all who labor with their hands, and have for their objective the improvement of conditions that will enable the working man to make a decent support for himself and family. It is neither political nor sectarian, and does not interfere with any man in his party or church affiliations. Naturally its members will individually support those candidates for political preferment whose principles more clearly coincide with their economic views, and the principles of government they can endorse.

In adopting the constitution the Cisco branch voted unanimously as its introductory the following preambles: "To uphold the constitution of the United States and the state of Texas; to cherish, protect and promulgate our interests as working men and women; to become fully informed as to the laws of life and culture; to cultivate the social ties existing between members of this organization; to abolish injurious privileges and to bring all under the constraint of wholesome duty, to this end is this constitution written and adopted by the members of the Cisco Labor Union and Workers Cooperative League as their constitution and future rules of government.

We do earnestly request all members and those in sympathy with organized labor to patronize those merchants who have a union card on display in their windows.

The Cisco local meets every Tuesday night in the old Apex office, off Breckenridge highway, East Cisco. All laboring men are invited to join us.

Paschall Heads Legion Preparedness Program

Creigler Paschall, Cisco, has been appointed by L. Perkins, State Commander American Legion, as chairman of the West Texas district of the national disaster preparedness program.

As chairman of the West Texas district, Mr. Paschall will be in charge of organizing local posts which will in turn cooperate with the Red Cross and city and county officials in the event of emergencies. Paschall's district comprises 12 counties.

The position and title of Mr. Paschall carries with it no compensation or expense account, being entirely honorary.

BUYER OF BOOTLEG BOOZE AMENDABLE UNDER NEW LAW

According to the interpretation of the new federal whiskey law, as held by Clyde Eastus, federal district attorney, buyers of bootleg booze may be prosecuted the same as the seller. This law is now in effect. If convicted, either the buyer or the seller, will be subject to a fine of \$1,000 and two years imprisonment. However, the buyer will not be subject to the penalties if the whiskey contains the government stamp. He will not be held responsible for how the stamp became affixed to the container. Whiskey in quantity of not over one-half pint is not subject to the provision of the law.

WAGES OF 20,000 WORKERS ARE HIKED BY FORD PLANT

DETROIT, Feb. 6.—The Ford Motor company revealed today that wages of 20,000 production men in the Detroit area have been increased 10 per cent, representing upward adjustments that are to be extended to branch production men and will amount to a quarter of a million dollars a month. The increases, it was explained, are in line with a conviction of Henry Ford that "every wage increase helps the country."

The January payroll of the Ford company was \$7,500,000, a statement said. Ford wages in the Detroit area now range from \$4 to \$8.50 a day in the shops.

Eldest Eastland Co. Person Buried Here, Aged Hundred-Eight

"Mother Kemp," as was Aunt Frances Williams known to her colored friends and acquaintances, died at the home of Oscar Wilson last Sunday. She was born in Knoxville, Ala., July 8, 1826, and would have reached her 108th birthday had she lived till next July. This old centennarian was probably the oldest person in Eastland county, certainly the oldest colored person. She had made her home with Oscar Wilson for many years.

The body was prepared for burial by the Wippen Funeral Home, which had charge of the burial arrangements.

Jim Schmick, One Of Organizers Eastland County, Died Tuesday

James Knox Schmick, one of the pioneer citizen of Eastland country, passed away at the home of his brother, "Uncle" Henry S. Schmick, early Tuesday morning, at the age of 89 years. His death terminated and illness of several days duration, though he had been in failing health for some time. The body was given a Masonic burial Wednesday, in the Eastland cemetery, he being a life member of Eastland lodge.

The Eastland Telegram Tuesday carried the following sketch of Mr. Schmick's life:

James Knox Schmick was born Dec. 5, 1844, near Phocohontas, Randolph county, Aarkansas, the son of C. L. Schmick and wife. He served in the Civil war and came to Texas in 1868, settling near Merriman. He helped organize Eastland county and was elected its third sheriff. His brother, H. S. Schmick, was the first sheriff. Another brother, Ike Schmick, served the county as county clerk.

Patterson Advises Farmers Get In On Hog-Corn Contract

The following communication from J. C. Patterson, county agent, came too late for last week's Citizen, but thinking it may not be too late, and probably some farmers may not have signed the hog-corn contract, who would like to do so, we are publishing his letter now:

To the cotton farmer who has already reduced his cotton acreage by diversifying with other crops and livestock in previous years, and who feels the government cotton program is unfair to him, the corn-hog contract may offer interesting possibilities.

Suppose a farmer changed from an all-cotton farm system to half cotton and half feed a few years ago. He milks cows and feeds hogs and raises chickens for a steady year 'round living, and takes his cotton money in the fall for paying the bigger bills. He makes the same percentage reduction in his 1934 cotton crop as the neighbor who still plants nearly the whole farm to cotton, but he will receive only half as much in the way of a government check.

In many such instances it works out that the diversified farmer may sign a corn-hog contract to reduce corn acreage or hog production or both, and receive government benefit checks that will total just as much, or even more, than those received by the all-cotton farmer. In addition the diversified farmer is in a much better position than the all-cotton farmer to use the extra feed which the farm can grow under the terms of the cotton and corn-hog contracts.

The corn-hog contract is open to every farmer in the county who produces a surplus of either corn or hogs, and who can otherwise qualify, the county agent points out. The rush of the cotton campaign makes a farm-to-farm canvass of farmers in the interest of the corn-hog program an impossibility, but men who may be eligible to sign these contracts should investigate the plan. Completed contracts should have been in the hands of local committees by last Saturday. Additional evidence of sales may be added later.

BAN ON GOLD AND GOLD CERTIFICATES IS LIFTED BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

For a short while what is considered the world's best money—gold and gold certificates—was classed as the "queer" in business and financial circles. It just wasn't money, for the time being. We saw a man go into a Cisco mercantile establishment with a gold certificate which he tendered in payment for some purchase, but his money was handed back to him. The salesman said it was not negotiable at that time, that he had recently been informed by officials of the bank that the bank could not accept it, nor even handle the gold. The owner might send it to the treasury department at Washington for redemption, but in that case the government might become inquisitive about him hoarding gold, and not turning it in when called for redemption.

But the ban is lifted, so we were told at the First National bank Tuesday. Instructions have been sent out from the treasury department to accept this class of currency in the transaction of business. So don't burn that gold certificate for fear of being arrested for hoarding. Take it to the bank and get Roosevelt dollars for it.
