government. The plan calls for 25 adult school teachers to attend a course at Texas Technological college at Lubbock and five nursery schol teachers to have a course in their work at North Texas Teachers college, Denton. The courses will begin tomorrow and last through August 30.

Reason given for the move is that it will provide better teachers in the government-paid schools when they are opened again in September. The teachers will receive small salaries during August to take care of their expenses, just as they would if they were teaching their regular classes

NOTEBOOK IS SUICIDE CLUE FOR SUSPECT

CHICAGO, Aug. 1 — A black
notebook signed by Mandeville Zenge and abandoned in a taxicab indicated today the rejected suitor hunted in connection with the muti-lated murder of Dr. Walter Bauer has committed suicide.

There was nothing in the note book to indicate that Zenge knew of the mutilation murder, and its discovery left police more confused than ever in their efforts to unravel the murder mystery.

The notebook. Zenge's father in Canton, Ohio, and turned over to police by officials of the Yellow Cab company, contained the hurriedly scrawled notation: "There is nothing left for me now that I have lost Louise, so I'm going to end it all."

On The Way Up

A lot of people do a lot of guessing as to whether the depression has passed. In Washington the politicians quarrel like naughty school boys over the all absorbing question of whether or not the United States is safely on the road towards better times.

The departments of government have for several months been issuing official statistical reports that show the nation on the way up—as having gotten safely "around the corner," and "out of the depression." After all, if soberminded men and women will forget their partisan prejudices they must know that this nation has always found official statistical reports of the government to be dependable, and this class of information must not be confused with the hullaballo of the politicians.

The Russian Submarine Tragedy

During the last few years Soviet Russia has been building up a powerful war machine, either, as some say, for world conquest, or to protect the nation's own interests and maintain Russian peace without and within.

In building up the huge fighting machine naturally the Soviet has had to experiment, and it is in these experiments that two major disasters have occurred.

This morning American readers learned that a Soviet submarine, foundering in the Gulf of Finland, took the lives of 55 members of the crew. It was a tragedy similar to that which cost the lives of 44 American sailors in 1927. Incidentally, the Russian sub was the B-13, if you are superstitious.

It must be an awful feeling to be in a ship one trusts and have it sink. It must be even worse to know that that ship, which has been trustworthy under water in the past, will rise to the surface only when naval divers, on the ends of air tubes that the crew does not have, explore the depths of the ocean to discover the cause of the tragedy and make the world safe for war. It must be an awful feeling to go to the bottom of the sea and know one must suffocate or drown

Recently the telegraph wires of this and other nations burned with the news flash that the Maxim Gorky, greatest plane in the world, had crashed near Moscow, killing its



SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

TT seems there always are fresh beets in the markets these days, but summer's the only time when baby beets are available. If I put up some of these deliciously tender roots, I'm sure to regret it, for they have a sweetness all their own.

Aside from this baby beets are

ideal for home canning. Less perishable than most vegetables, they do not lose flavor through delay in canning.

Oven canning is particularly suitable. Heat to 275 degrees F. while packing the vegetables. I add lemon juice to preserve the bright color and to prevent spoilage since non-acid vegetables require the addition of acid.

Scrub Beets With Brush Wash beets thoroughly, using a leaving about two inches of stem. Take care not to break the skin nor cut the long straight tap root. Drop into a kettle of boiling water and boil twenty or thirty min-utes. Dip into cold water and slip off skins. Pack in hot sterilized jars, adding 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar and 1 tea-

Pour over them boiling swetened vinegar, fill jars within an inch of the top. Half seal and place in preheated seal at once.


AUSTIN, Aug. 1. — Clamor for a special session of the 44th Texas Legislature will begin immediately after August 24, when the people
