Cities Service Concern Buys Lathrop Discovery Well

LONGVIEW, Feb. 7. - Purchase of the W. A. Moncrief and associates interest in the J. K. Lathrop No. 1 discovery well for \$3,500,000 by the Arkansas Fuel and Oil company, a subsidiary of the Cities Service company, today clanaxed aweek of feverish activity in east Texas oil fields. Oil men credited the transaction with bringing the first "big money"

into the new oil field. Potential flush production esti-mates of the wildcatter have varied from 10,000 to 15,000. Tested Friday on a pinched outlet the well flowed 440 barrels per hour. The Lathrop test is located 12 miles from any other producer.

Arkansas Democrats Support \$20,000,-000 Relief Project

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Rebelion against the \$20,000,000 compromise drouth relief bill project agreed on by President Hoover and house and senate leaders broke out among progressive republicans and a small group of democrats today.

Minority Leader Robinson and Senator Caraway, his colleague from Arkansas, are battling as hard for the president as they fought against him earlier in the week. They accept the \$20,000,000 project as a satisfactory means of providing food and all other relief to needy until next harvest.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—President Hoover and Congressional leaders have composed their differences on further drouth relief, and \$20,000,000 is to be appropriated from the pub for that purpose. The text of the compromise agreement has been made public.

Minority Leader Robinson and Senator Caraway, democrat, Ar-kansas, who led the relief fight, told questioners the compromise language was sufficiently broad to permit food loans to distressed farmers. Majority Leader Watson said he was satisfied. He said President Hoover would agree to a \$20,000,000 solution of the drouth relief problem.

Insurgents Opposed

Disturbing opposition developed. however, in the insurgent republican group. Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa, said the compromise would not satisfy him.

But the leaders were in line today on the issue which has contributed more than any other this session to legislative turmoil and the prospect of an extra session. Speaker Longworth and House Majority Leader Tilson approved the new agreement. Watson said it had been accepted by the President as a satisfactory plan of meeting distress.

Back-bench democrats, meanwhile, appeared to be suspicious of the compromise. It does not mention the word "food" which the president told republican leaders he would not accept under any circumstances.

The agreement, made public late yesterday by Watson, is in two parts. It modifies the \$45,000,000 feed, seed and fertilizer loan appropriated some time ago. That bill permitted loans to feed workstock but not cattle, hogs or other farm animals. The \$45,000,000 is to be made availabe for feeding all farm animals.

How It Is Spread The additional \$20,000,000 appropriation is to be disposed of as loans or advances for the follow-

ing purposes: 1. Assisting the formation of local agricultural-credit corporations, livestock loan companies or

similar organizations. 2. Increasing the capital stock of such companies or corporations. 3. Loaning to individuals on the security of capital stock of such

corporations. 4. Loaning or advancing to farmers.


