Five hundred monkeys have been used by the health offices in New York and Washington during the last two years in experiments looking to the development of vaccines against influenza and pneumonia. Dr. William Park of the New

York health department said today: "We haven't learned anything about influenza, only that the invisible, unidentified organism which causes it can pass through a stone wall.'
