

If Hindenburg can win, with his record of reaction CHAS, G. DAWE and with such support, probably all such efforts as the Dawes settlement are in vain. If he can win, Americans have been deceived in the German revolution and are throwing away any money they lend Germany and any efforts they make to befriend Germany.

But it seems unlikely that Hindenburg can win. The former kaiser is thought to have small influence except upon the Old Guard of Prussianism. 

NEW CLUB ORGANIZES




