The woman who burned the barns of a few hardworking neighbors and then poisoned a few more by putting arsenic in their drinking water has now taken to reading the Bible and finds much comfort and relief therein.

Nothing more beautiful and sustaining than many of the Psalms has ever been written or ever will be. But a genuine interest in them usually acts in the direction of restraint when it comes to putting arsenic in the neighbor's coffee. The soul which thirsts for the living God as the heart pants for the waterbrooks is inclined to have respect for the water which quenches the neighbor's thirst. And he "abides in the tabernacles" who "walketh uprightly, worketh righteousness, speaketh the truth with his heart, doeth no evil to his neighbor.'

PEACE BY AGREEMENT

Germany is reported to have made direct proposals to France for an honest peace agreement, with military guarantees and other essentials of mutual security. Disputes would be settled by arbitration. There would be no limit set to the duration of the pact.

How France will take this suggestion is uncertain. French resentment for recent wrongs, natural under the circumstances, may interfere with the success of the venture at this time. 
Shooting Stars Travel Forty-Five Miles a Second

Speeds as high as forty-five miles a second are attained by meteors, the "shooting stars" which are drawn into the earth's atmosphere and burn up in a final brief blaze of glory, according to Prof. C. M. Sparrow, of the University of Virginia. The meteors, he says, are small bodies which, entering the upper atmosphere of the earth, are heated to incandescence and remain visible at night until they are the light fixture to be detached.

completely burned up, or fall to earth. The heights at which they appear lie between fifty and a hundred miles above the earth. At that altitude the atmosphere is believed to be almost pure hydrogen, the gas used in balloons. Hydrogen forms but one tenthousandth part of the earth's atmosphere at the ground, but being very light, its density diminishes so slowly with increasing height as to outlas the heavier nitrogen and oxygen.

A Device for Covering Up Seeds Every home gardener has found that

the apparently simple task of covering up seeds is really rather troublesome A simple device, which will do this quickly and thoroughly, is shown in the accompanying illustration. All that is necessary is to set the device over the seeds and pull it backward. It consists of two wings of galvanized iron or heavy tin, about 3 in, wide at one end and 8 in. at the other, and 12 in. long. These are fastened together with an iron band, 6 in. long, bolted to the wings, as shown, about 3 in, from the narrow end. The parts are neld together with 3-16-in. stove bolts. The whole frame, which holds the plades, can be made of one long piece of flat iron, heated and bent to the hape shown. An ordinary broomstick an be used as a handle.

Filing without Scratching

When filing, small particles of metal dhering to the file cause scratches on the work. This trouble can be pre-vented by chalking the file after cleanng it. Powdered chalk may be used and rubbed on with the fingers or a large piece of lump chalk rubbed over




