Group Considers Co-Op Formation To Dry Peanuts

A group of peanut raisers from the Flatwoods, Pumpkin Center and Carbon areas are considering forming a co-operative to operate a peanut drying facility, it is reported.

An informal meeting was held recently at which growers from those areas met and discussed their mutual problems and needs.

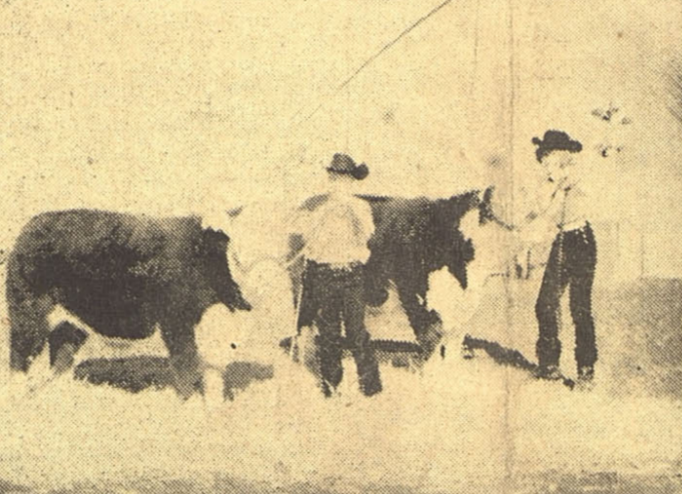
Another meeting is scheduled for Wednesday at 7 p.m. at the Carbon High School Auditorium to explore the possibilities further. Present to talk with the group will be Charles K. Baker of Texas A&M University, and considered an expert on the formation of co-operatives.

A spokesman for the group said that there has been some consideration of buying the T. C. Wylie interests in Carbon which consists of an eight bin dryer.

Such a co-op would probably handle marketing and the sale of seed and fertilizer in the spring, the spokesman said.

Representatives of the group plan to visit cooperatives over the state to observe their operations and methods.

Mr. Wylie was not available for comment and it was not determined if the sale of the Carbon facilities would also include his shelling plant in Ranger.

TWO CISCO CLUB STUDENTS SHOW TOP PRIZE WINNERS

Two Cisco 4-H Club members scored big for Eastland County last Thursday, Jan. 7, in the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarterhorse show in Odessa.

Lynn Pippen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Pippen of Route 1, showed her big Hereford steer "Richard" to fifth place in a class of 60 heavy-weight steers from all over Texas. Bobby Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Lee of Route 1, placed his steer "Bozo" fifth in a class of 60 lightweight steers. The youngsters sold their prize-winning animals in the premium sale in which only the top ten steers of each class were eligible to sell.

Assistant County Agent Bill McCutcheon expressed pride in the showmanship of the two youngsters and in the quality of the steers. The Odessa Show has been regarded to be the top Hereford show in Texas, and placing that high in classes with that number of steers was quite an accomplishment for the local entrants, Mr. McCutcheon reported.

"These youngsters were a big credit to Cisco and helped put it on the map for a lot of people at the Odessa Show," the agent added.

Mrs. Nance had been ill for over two months. She had lived in Cisco 34 years, moving in 1931 from Winters.

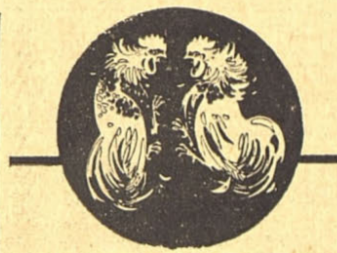

Texas Rangers and agents of the Texas Liquor Control Board, accompanied by Eastland County Sheriff Lefty Sublett, conducted a surprise raid on the site of "possible" chicken fights Sunday at mid-morning.

Rangers Earl Stewart and John Wood arrested about 70 men on charge of "being concerned with a chicken fight."

LCB agents also filed charges on a Ranger liquor dealer, one of those present, alleging his pickup contained two cases of beer and a quart of whiskey.

The officers made the raid on the old Parrish place about six miles south of Ranger on Farm-to-Market Highway 571.

Complaints were filed at the downtown office of Ranger Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood.

By Monday night about half of the men charged had paid fines of \$25.00, plus costs, which totaled \$40.50 each. About half a dozen of those arrested were from Ranger. Practically every community in the county was represented and also present were men from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Baytown, Houston and Abilene.

A few of those charged, Justice of Peace Underwood said, posted bonds of \$200 each and declared intentions to "fight" their cases.

The Sunday morning raid was one of several conducted recently by the Texas Rangers in this section of the state. Chicken fighting is illegal in Texas. It is lawful, however, in Oklahoma and New Mexico, although betting on the fighting cocks is an offense in those states.

An officer said it was his "understanding" that chicken fights were scheduled to get underway Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m.

In addition to the men picked up at the rural site, it was also reported that there were several dozen others in Ranger Sunday morning and allegedly were "planning" to attend the afternoon fights.

As evidence the Rangers picked up many sets of gaffs and also took a picture of the pit which they say was to be used for the fights.

Constable Ralph Veal said Tuesday that about a year ago he warned a Ranger man against staging chicken fights at the same location. The Rangerite heeded the warning, Veal said, and hurriedly cancelled the event.

Only one of the men arrested was jailed. He was held in the city jail in Ranger only a few hours.

"You can't put me in jail unless my roosters go with me," the man said.

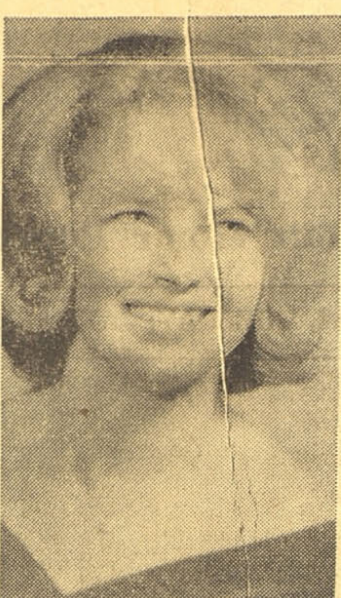

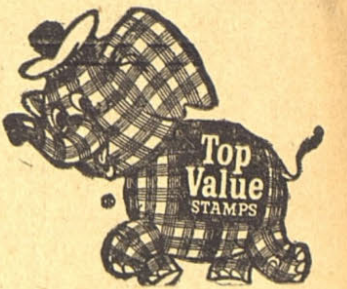
