The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Lee Ivey, President. Fifteen members answered roll call by telling about their first teacher.

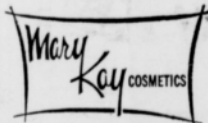
During the business meeting the club voted to send a Christmas box to the State School in Abilene. A box will be placed in Boydston Hardware where members may leave their gifts.

## "WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

What Will Be? Man's Pleasure or God's Will?

James 4:1-3 - "From whence come wars and fightings among you? come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members? Yet lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not. Ye ask, and ye receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lust."

James is here sitting before his people a basic question. Is your aim in life to submit to the will of God, or to gratify your own desires for the pleasures of this world? And his warning is that, if pleasure is the policy of life, then nothing but strife and hatred and division can possibly follow. He says that the results of the overmastering search for pleasure is war and battle. He means that the overmastering desire for pleasure, and the feverish search for it, issue in long-drawn-out resentments which are like wars, and sudden explosions and collisions of hatred which are like battles.

When we look at human society we so often see a boiling mass of competitive hatred and warring strife. One writer has said, "Consider the continual war which exists not only between nations and countries and cities, but also between private houses, or, I might rather say, is present with every individual man; observe the unspeakable raging storm in men's souls that is excited by the violent rush of the affairs of life; and you may well wonder whether anyone can enjoy tranquility in such a storm, and maintain calm amidst the surge of this billowing sea."

The basic cause of this unceasing and bitter conflict is nothing other than desire. It has been pointed out that the Ten Commandments end in the forbidding of covetousness which is desire, for desire is the worst of all the passions of the soul. Someone has said, "All the evils which come upon man, revolutions and wars, stratagems and slaughters - springs from desire. All these things have their fountain-head of desire for more." Cicero writes, "It is insatiable desires which overturn not only individual men, but whole families, and which

even bring down the state. From desire there springs hatred, schisms, discord, seditions and wars."

The New Testament is clear that this overmastering desire for the pleasures of this world is always a threatening danger to the spiritual life. It is the cares and riches and pleasures of this life which combine to choke the good seed. A man can become a slave to lusts and pleasures, and, when he does, malice and envy and hatred enter into life.

The ultimate choice in life

lies between pleasing ones self and pleasing God; and a world in which men's first aim is to please themselves in a world which is a battleground of savagery and division.
