





What do parents owe their children? A sound mind in a sound body. This is all.

He that has these two, has little more to wish for; and he that wants either of them, will be but little the better for anything else.

John Locke observes that men's happiness or misery is in most part of their own making-"he, whose mind directs not wisely, will never take the right way; and he, whose body is crazy and feeble, will never be able to ad- be supported in every section, by every class of Americans. vance in it.'

"I confess," he wrote, "there are some men's constitutions of body and mind so vigorous, and well framed by nature that they need not much assistance from others; but by the strength of their natural genius, they are from their cradles carried towards what is excellent; and by the privilege of their happy constitutions, are able to do wonders.

"But examples of this kind are but few; and I think I may say, that of all men we meet with, nine parts of them are what they are, good or evil, useful or not, by their education.'

Locke wrote this in the seventeenth century. In the light of our increased knowledge of men's minds and inner rated. natures, we disagree with him today concerning the relative importance of heredity and education, but the latter still is the greatest single factor in man's existence once than at other seasons. Look at the housewives, farmers, he is born.

Education is not all a matter of books. The parent's duty is not done when he sends his child to school regularly.

We repeat, the parent's duty in his child is simply-a sound mind in a sound body; but this end is not to be gained entirely in the schoolhouse. The parent must accomplish the biggest part of the task.

The parent must always keep in mind that the little, or almost insensible impressions on our tender infancies. have important and lasting consequences; and there it is as in the fountains of some rivers, where a gentle application of the hand turns the flexible waters in channels, that make them take quite ordinary courses; and by this direction given them first in the source, they receive different tendencies and arrive at last at very remote and distant places.

MORE MILES PER GALLON

There is talk of a new motor car which will have an eight-cylinder engine, so light, compact and efficient that it will give 50 miles to a gailon of gasoline. If this is anything more than mere talk, it is a big step forward in motor car development. American builders so far, while producing cars distinguished for comfort and convenience and moderate in price, have done less in the way of fuel economy than foreign builders. It is said there are several cars made in England and France that give 30 to 40 miles per gallon. There has been more effort along that line abroad because gasoline is so expensive there. Yet fuel will become more and more important here, as scarcity threatens and the price rises. Mileage may soon be the leading factor in buying cars. The tendency of late has been toward lighter and smaller six-cylinder cars. Some of these give a mileage surprisingly high, compared with old standards. But nobody will say that the possibilities of the gas engine have yet been realized. If such efficiency as that suggested can be obtained along with the smoothness and flexibility of eight cylinders, which latter benefits are ordinarily gained only by an extra expenditure of fuel, there is going to be something doing in the motor world when the new car appears. It will put every other motor designer on his mettle.


