
CARTER GLASS ON THE WAR PATH.

Senator Carter Glass of Virginia is one of the most outpoken leaders of the American democracy and when he hoots his bolts the chips fall on every side. He is a memper of the senate banking and currency committee and chairnan of the senate sub-committee charged with recommendng changes in the federal reserve act. Senator Glass is one f the authors of the federal reserve act. He was a stalwart upporter of all the policies of Woodrow Wilson. In a statenent to the press he severely criticised a proposal to have he federal reserve banks grant large financial credits to oreign banks. He charged that the state department at Vashington, without any sanction of law, has sought to concol private credits and to interfere with the federal reserve stem. Speaking of President Hoover the Virginia leader

"The president of the United States has not and never was intended to have any authority whatsoever over federal reserve banking policies, which are definitely fixed by statute, both affirmatively and negatively." He branded the proposal to have the federal reserve bank "thrust into the ortex of European financial operations in the guise of buyng prime commercial short time bills as a "discreditable proposition." He reminded the American people that the domnating figures of the New York federal reserve bank once lid the same thing for England but that it is no defense or excuse for administration leaders to flout the federal reserve banking laws a second time.
