Beef Cattle Judging Saturday; Old Fiddlers Contest Due

The vagaries of Texas weather interposed objections to the Eastland County Livestock show today in the shape of a cold norther and a chilly mist, and the number of entries this morning was much below what had been expected. However, exhibits continued to arrive and, in the event of fair weather tomorrow, the big day of the show, a satisfactory climax to the two-day event was

expected. Judging was to begin at 2 this afternoon, with dairy cattle, sheep, hogs and goats first to the arena. Beef cattle are to be judged tomorrow together with horses

and mules. Judges will be Dr. Verne A. Scott of John Tarleton college, Stephenville, and Mark Buckingnam, Erath county agent. C. Metz Heald, Eastland county agent, was to judge an exhibit of grain sorghums prepared by FFA boys of the Cisco and part-time chapters from grain grown with seed that the Cisco chamber of commerce supplied.

In the dairy cattle division this morning there were entries by A. Z. Myrick, who had six Jersey head; Dr. F. E. Clark, two Jersey heifer calves; J. C. Thurman, one Jersey and Billy Dawkins,

INCREASING bank deposits in rural communities indicate a better condition among the farmers this year than in several. The Rising Star bank, for instance, reported deposits at an all-time high with nearly \$400,000 in the bank. A good peanut crop and improved cotton crop were cited as largely responsible for the increase. More money among the farmers means better times for everybody.

Multiplied Benefits

WINTER season business prospects for Cisco have been materially brightened by recent WPA projects and highway construction approval. Under the government's relief plans it is necessary to get these projects under way as quickly as possible, with emphasis upon employing jobless men and getting money in circulation. Moreover, a greater percentage of the funds will be disbursed in the form of wages, so that the benefits of the expenditure to local business will be increased.

THE biggest item, of course, and the most encouraging, is the \$162,000 Highway No. One relocation project over Eighth street. This will probably release \$100,000 in wages during the winter. Other construction approved by the WPA includes the \$15,-000 west ward remodelling, now under way; the \$5,600 Sandy park project at Lake Cisco due to start tomorrow, and the \$35,000 state fish hatchery project for which the funds have just been released. Altogether work that has been assured here through the government's road and relief work program total \$217,600 approximately of which perhaps two-thirds will be paid laborers.

OTHER WPA projects on which approval is anticipated are the water treatment plant at Lake Cisco, involving \$25,000 and several other public school construction.

THIS is work that will be done in Cisco exclusively. In addition to it, Washington has recently allocated and released to State WPA Adm'r H. P. Drouth \$142,000 to be used on lateral or "farm-to-market" roads in Eastland county. Laborers of the Cisco area will get their share of this work, of course.

I have just been to town and walked up and down the sidewalks elbowing town and country people, exchanging the time of day and the looks of the weather. and maybe entering further into affairs with this one or that one of my acquaintances. I am doing my home town the honor of calling it a country town. It is all right to insist that everybody remember that we have city delivtry, and gas facilities for every home and office that wishes them, and electricity for light and power, and a city school system, and real city water, and a big hotel, and daily papers, and other certified ways. But we are not far away from the rural districts, we count the rural folk as a part of us. So I can't see but that I am right in calling us a country town, with an apology for the term. When I was living in Indianapolis with many of the facilities and the ambitions and the meannesses even to the gang district of a metropolis, some one asked me if the city did not seem like a big country town. And it did have direct access to as well as dependence upon the Hoosier farms that lay around the city in every direction and fed it to a considerable ex-

Of course I may be biased in my point of view. For I have had the privilege or being at both ends of the country road, not at the same time of course. I used to live three miles and a half west of a small Kansas town; I know what it is to change overalls and shirt, maybe for a clean garments of the same name, and drive behind a pair of farm plugs equipped in jingling chain harness, into town for the Saturday trading. I also know something of staying dressed up and following a profession, or putting on some other kind of airs, in a city. Of the two the most enjoyable was the first. Perhaps one may find a compromise in being suburban; than he can go either way as fancy, or need, may prompt him. He can have a city bath, and lights, and taxes, and opportunities to spend his money; and at the same time he can breathe country air, can eat vegetables of his own raising, milk his own cow (I don't mean instead of a neighbor's), can see grass and weeds growing from his own doorway (can see from his doorway I mean), and can have the disadvantages of both.





Now the secret is out. Reis turned the craft loose on Lake George recently and opened the throttle wide. 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
