# Engineer Making Survey A. R. DANIELS Cisco, Eastland, Ranger DIED AT 3 P.M. AT CISCO HOME Area For T. and P. R. R.

A technical survey of the Cisco — Eastland — Ranger area to depict the area's facilities and potentialities for location of chemical plants in connection with the National Defense Program is being made under contract for the Texas & Pacific Railway company by Burt C. Blanton, Dallas, industrial engineer and ziness economist, who was Cisco today.

The Blanton survey-report will be submitted by the Texas & Pacific railway to the War Department in an effort to secure location in the tricity area of a methanol plant, or other types of chemical industries which may be con-templated to meet defense requirements in this section of

The survey will provide a complete and comprehensive technical prospectus, with especial presentation and analyzation of the area's fuel, power, water supply and manufacturing facilities.

Blanton's field work on the rvey is being made also in 44 astland, Ranger and in this y and vicinity.

GALVESTON, Oct. 29.—Santa e's net railway operating income for September was \$4,259,371, acording to a statement released by President E. J. Engel. This is an increase of \$1,848,316, compared with September, 1940. Gross for the system was \$19,976,915, an increase over Sept., 1940 of \$5,510,919, or 38.10 percent. # STEEL ACUTE strikes in other areas

NEW YORK, Oct. 29. - Heavy osses in vitally needed steel production will be reported soon uness the present strike in the cap delay, Iron Age said Wednesday in its weekly review of the steel

Discussing the general situation facing the industry, the trade publication said:

"The coal strike, so dangerous to the national defense program that it seemed destined to a swift death at the hands of an aroused er wages and the dispublic, had an immediate effect on the strange situation whereby G. W. Weatherby, Cisco, 1 mare; a few labor leaders (not the rank and file of workers) are able to cripple defense work are beginning to come out.

"The loss in steel output for this week, if the strike in steel company owned coal mines continues through the week, will be about 55,000 tons for United States Steel corporation plants alone, including 11,000 tons in the Youngstown area, 14,000 tons in Chicago and 30,000 tons at Pittsburgh. Heavy losses in production will inevitably be reported soon by other large steel companies if the coal strike continues, since almost all steel companies are short of coal supplies, due to the coal strike earlier this year.

"While the security of the country itself seemed to be involved the Roosevelt-Lewis struggle for control of the defense program, many classes of innocent bystanders were being trampled. Among these are the nondefense plants which are unable to get enough, or in some cases, any, steel under the present priorities system. In many cases a few hundred tons of steel would permit them to stay in business. To see thousands of tons of steel lost because of the coal strike, and because of other strikes occurring in the last few months, puts the steel consuming plants suffering from priority rationing in a special class of mourners over the strikes."
