TWO JAPANESE TOWNS ERASED BY EARTHQUAKE

LONDON, July 4. - Two towns were wiped out and hundreds of homes destroyed in an earthquake today according to Tokio cables Hundreds are reported dead. The two towns were seaports of the west Japan coast. A train outside Tottori, the largest of the two towns, was reported hurled from the track. Advices from the stricken communities are very meager. ORVILLE WRIGHT, AMERICAN

The recent determination of Orville Wright, pioneer American aviator, to give the first Wright plane to Great Britain for historical purposes, instead of turning it over to an American institution has aroused much discussion.

Wright explains his action by stating that he fears his original plane would not be preserved with safety in any American museum. He asserts that the original Langley plane was altered by museum officials to suit their ideas.

For years Wright was engaged in the bicycle business in Dayton with his brother, the late Wilbur Wright. It is not conceded that the bicycle business had anything to do with the flying machine invention. Heredity, though, may have had something to do with the Wrights' inventive genius. Many years ago, Bishop Wright, the father, invented a typewriter, though he did not perfect it, and he worked over other inventions. An older brother, Lorin Wright, also made, patented and sold an improved hay- half. Two years ago Miss Annie

GENERAL DAUGAN

The man on whom France now counts to subdue the troublesome Riffs in Morocco was one of France's outstanding heroes of the World war-and one of the mod-

He never got beyond the command of the Moroccan division of the colonial corps, but he did such execution in difficult places that he received the honor of leading, the first French contingent into Germany after the armistice. For this march he chose the First Regiment of the Foreign Legion, then composed largely of volunteers from Alsace-

The entry of the regiment into Chateau Salins coincided with the arrival of the German mission on the way to Nancy to negotiate turning over the Alsatian railways to French direction.

An officer on General Daugan's staff asked him where the German cars could be parked while the column marched through.

"You see that high spot in the public square, up there," asked the general pointing. "Place them there so they can't miss a good sight—their fellow-countrymen taking possession of Alsace-Loraine in the name of

General Daugan has seen much colonial service in his varied career under the Tricolor and is fitted to deal with conditions existing in Morocco.

ARISTOCRACY OF BRAINS

A wealthy woman has left \$5,000 to the board of education in her city to be used in affording "superior advantages for superior intelligence." This is typical of a new tendency in education.

In a way it is undemocratic. It means an aristocracy of brains. The ordinary democratic idea is to give all children about the same kind of education. In such a system there is likely to be more pulling along the backward pupil than pushing ahead the exceptional one, and more emphasis on teaching the pupils the things that are hard for him than letting him specialize on the things that he finds easy. One system tends to produce a uniform product. The other tends to develop genius.

In practice there has to be a compromise usually be-

tween the two ideas. There is good reason in many cases for not going to the extreme in picking out and pushing ahead the "superior intelligence" to the neglect of the rest. Superior intelligence may not be any good either for itself or for humanity unless it is combined with superior morality. There have been plenty of examples of brilliant but immoral and unsocial geniuses.

"SHOW ME!" SAYS GERMANY

Germany is willing to sign the security pact proposed by the Allies. She is also willing to sign the other agree-Editor and Publisher ments proposed, and to join the League of Nations. But Germany is in no hurry. As a recent Berlin dispatch remarked, "The German government is inclined to let problems drift until the French troops begin marching out of the Ruhr."

The rest of the world has almost forgotten that France still occupies the great German industrial district, but Germany has not forgotten it. Her workers have given up their industrial strike against France, driven by necesity, but neither they nor the rest of the German public have acquiesced in it. All Germany looks forward to a day of liberation. There will be no complete fulfillment of German pledges until France marches out, and there will be no assumption of new pledges until the French croops are on their way.

France, under the fire-eating Poincare, wanted "direct action" and went into Germany to get it. France got direct, too. And inasmuch as France, along with England and Belgium, wants that security pact signed, Germany will probably have her way.





FORT WORTH, July 4 .- Beef steers were neglected Friday, but cows sold readily at an advance of 15c to 25c and calves were 25c up. Mixed shipments made up the bulk of the receipts, estimated at 2.500 head of cattle and 500 calves Some cattle, however, were on through billing. Good heavy calves reached \$7 and a few light calves went at \$8. Some hard canners sold at \$1.50, but the good canner grades sold at \$1.65 and \$1.75.

Hogs were purchased on a steady basis. The choice kinds were quot able at \$14, but the best here stopped at \$13.85. Most sales were from \$13.50 to \$13.75. Pigs and sows brought as much as \$12. Hog receipts wer close to 600 head. Around 1,000 head were offered in the sheep house. Market condi-

tions remained quotably unchanged

When the market advanced last week it was signal for cattle shippers to crack down. At least, they so construed it, and the only reason asigned why more shipments were not offered for sale Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday was probably because cattle could not be loaded out any faster. Official receipts for Monday and Tuesday alone were 16,661 head of cattle and 3,926 calves. The total for the five days amounted to approximately 38,000 head of cattle and calves. Southern Hospitality at Convention For 130 Bishops and 5000 Followers

Beginning October 7 next and continuing until the 23rd, the Forty-eighth Triennial General Convention of the Episcopal Church in the United States will be in session in New Orleans. In attendance at the Convention there will be at least 130 bishops, many of them from missionary districts in all parts of the world, 546 clerical and lay delates, and in addition 500 members of the Woman's Auxiliary. Altogether the Convention will muster between four and five thousand visitors in the Crescent City for the three weeks of Crescent City for the three weeks o its deliberations. There will be daily sessions of the bishops, deputies and Woman's Auxiliary, mass meetings at night, exhibits of work in the mission fields, conferences and special

sion fields, conferences and special services of a diverse character.

The population of an average-sized small city will thus move bodily into New Orleans and the task of entertaining them will fall upon the Diocese of Louisiana at the head of which is the Rt. Rev. Davis Sessums D. D. its Bishop. It is no small task, but fortunately it is old-fashioned Southern hospitality which will be invoked in this instance; and will be invoked in this instance; and in Bishop Sessums the Far South, which the Convention will visit for the first time in the 140 years of the history of the Episcopal Church, has no finer exponent of its famed hos-

pitality.

Bishop Sessums, the host of the gathering, is a Southerner by birth. He was born in Houston, Texas, graduated from the University of the South, and his whole life has been spent in the Southland; as rector first of Grace Church, Galveston, Texas, then of Calvary Church, Memphis, Tenn., and finally, of Christ Church, New Orleans. Elected Coadjutor Bishop, and consecrated in June 24, 1891, on the death of Bishop Gallaher the December following, he succeeded to the charge of the Diosucceded to the charge of the Dio-cese, over which he has since exer-semble October 7 next.




