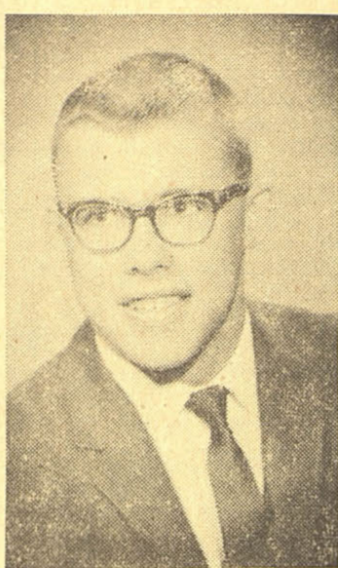

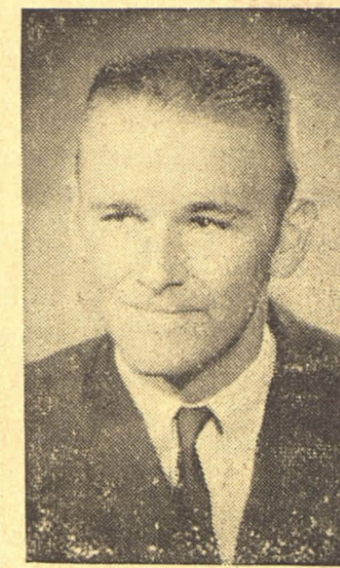

## Junior College Cage Playoff Set Feb. 25-26

The four top teams — two from each zone — will meet in a two-day basketball tournament at Temple on Thursday and Friday nights, Feb. 25-26, to decide the championship of the Texas Junior College Conference. The games will be played in the Temple JC gym.

The schedule calls for Ranger JC and Wharton JC to meet in the opening game at 7 p. m. Thursday. Cisco JC and San Antonio JC will meet at 9 p. m. in the second game of the doubleheader program.

The two winners will meet at 7 p. m. Friday for the championship, and the two losers will play for third place honors.

Cisco and Ranger were the first and second place winners, respectively, in the north zone, while Wharton and San Antonio won first and second honors in the south zone. Season's records of the four teams are: Cisco 27-1, Ranger 19-6, Wharton 29-3 and San Antonio 19-7.

Cisco is the only one of the four teams with a national ranking — third place among all of the junior college teams in the nation.

The only set-back on the Cisco record for the season was in the Temple tournament last Dec. 3-5 when Wharton beat the Wranglers, 85-82. Cisco won over San Antonio, 100-to-84, in the same

tournament.

Coach Leland Willis of the CJC team reported that his squad would workout daily this week and would leave about noon Thursday for Temple. All members of the squad were in good condition except for Bill Marvin, Abilene, the No. 1 substitute, who was out with the flu today.

Admission charges at the games will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for students.

Mrs. Mayberry died at 9:20 a. m. Saturday in Graham Hospital after an illness of three months.

Born Nov. 3, 1880, in Coryell County, she was a descendant of a family prominent in Texas history. Her great grandfather, Moses Shipman, was one of the original 300 who came to Texas with Stephen F. Austin. He was the first to be granted a league of land in the colony. Two of his sons were with Fannin and Bowie at the Conception Mission, and all three were with Milan in the San Antonio attack. Mrs. Mayberry's grandfather was Captain Daniel Shipman, and her mother, Mrs. Saphronia A. Lee, was a cousin of General Robert E. Lee.

A resident of Cisco for the past 40 years, Mrs. Mayberry moved here from Corpus Christi. She married C. N. Mayberry in Gatesville in 1898. He died in 1960. She was a longtime member of the Woodmen Circle and the Hillcrest Church of Christ in Corpus Christi.

Surviving are one son, J. H. Mayberry of Corpus Christi; four daughters, Mrs. Shelley Jackson, Mrs. Jack Anderson, and Mrs. R. L. Medford, all of Cisco, and Mrs. L. E. Tillery of Dallas; three grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

## NLRB ISSUES COMPLAINT IN UNION TROUBLE OF BOSS CO

CHILLICOTHE, MO. — The Kansas City Regional Director of the National Labor Relations Board today issued a complaint against the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, AFL-CIO, and its local union number 148 in Chillicothe, Missouri.

The complaint alleges that certain of the union officers and agents assaulted certain employees of Boss Manufacturing Company and threatened to cause harm to other employees and to their families if the employees did not observe the picket line at Boss' Glove Factory at Chillicothe.

The complaint further alleges that the activities of the union representatives were incited and instigated by Gladys Cohen, Director of Organization for the union. It claims that the purpose of the threat and violence was to interfere with the employees' rights to strike and not to engage in concerted union activities.

Also named in the complaint were officers of the local union as well as others assigned to picket duties.

The charge had been filed by Boss Manufacturing Company, nationally known glove manufacturer, with the NLRB against the union on January 12, 1965. The company charged that the union engaged in unfair labor practices by threatening and intimidating the non-striking employees. Following an investigation of this charge by representatives of the Kansas City Regional Office of the NLRB, the Regional Director issued this complaint.

A hearing has been set for March 25 at Chillicothe.
