THE AMERICAN LANGUAGE

An English professor is coming over to edit a diction- pose. ary of American English, or, more properly, the American language.

Yankee professors, after refusing to admit these many years that there is such a thing as an American language, have happened upon the amazing discovery that there is one after all, and are bent now on isolating and imprisoning it in the marble walls of lexicography.

Ambrose Bierce, himself a master of English, satirically defines a lexicographer as a "pestilent fellow who, under pretense of recording some particular stage in the development of a language, does what he can to arrest its growth, stiffen its flexibility, and mechanize its methods.

"For your lexicographer, having written his diction-ary, comes to be considered 'as one having authority,' whereas his function is only to make a record, not to give a law

"The natural servility of the human understanding having invested him with judicial power, surrenders its right of reason and submits itself to a chronicle as if it were a statute.

"Let the dictionary (for example) mark a good word as 'obsolete,' and few men thereafter venture to use it, whatever their need of it and however desirable its restoration to favor—whereby the process of impoverishment is accelerated, and speech decays.

"On the contrary, the bold and discerning writer, who, recognizing the truth that language must grow by innovation, if it grow at all, makes new words and uses the old in an unfamiliar sense, has no following, and is tartly reminded that 'it isn't in the dictionary,' although down to the time of the first lexicographer no author had ever used a word that was in the dictionary."

Bierce recalls the golden prime and high noon of Eng-lish speech; when from the lips of the great Elizabethans fell words that made their own meaning and carried it in their very sound; when a Shakespeare and a Bacon were possible, and the language now rapidly perishing at one end and slowly renewed at the other was in vigorous growth and hardy preservation, the lexicographer was a person unknown, the dictionary a creation which his Creator had not created him to create.

Don't be afraid to use a picturesque, unstilted, effec-tive word, regardless of whether it is in the dictionary. If it's a good word, it'll be there eventually.

And if you converse in the tongue your neighbors understand, abandon the idea that you speak English. American is your language.

Conditions change in form, but opportunity continues and spreads, growing with the population and wealth of the country. The essential thing is to do what the opportunists of former times did-fit their energies and abilities to the needs of the day.

Opportunity is ever shifting, and comes not once to every man, as the poet said, but over and over again to every man and woman. It is especially so in America, where conditions and classes are so plastic and the forces of life are always flowing full and strong. Only the dull do not see it and the lazy do not use it.

EMBATTLED SCIENCE

In a way, all that spectacular marshalling of local, scientific and oratorical talent at the Scopes trial in Dayton, Tenn., which opens July 10, looks superfluous.

To a layman, considering the main facts in the case, it looks rather simple. The legislature enacted a law providing punishment for any teacher who should teach evolution. The defendant taught evolution, and admits it. It looks like sure conviction, if the legal machinery works as it was intended to, in spite of mitigating circumstances. Technically, the defendant looks like a goner. And it looks as if some of his scientific friends really want him convicted, as a "martyr to science."

Nevertheless all the elaborate preparations on both sides, all the scenery and talent, all the color, sound and fury, are probably a good thing. For they will exploit the case for all it is worth and show what it really means.

There will be a notable clash between two ideas, two interpretations of human life and destiny. The case is immensely bigger than anybody in it. Science, rather than the science teacher, is on trial.
